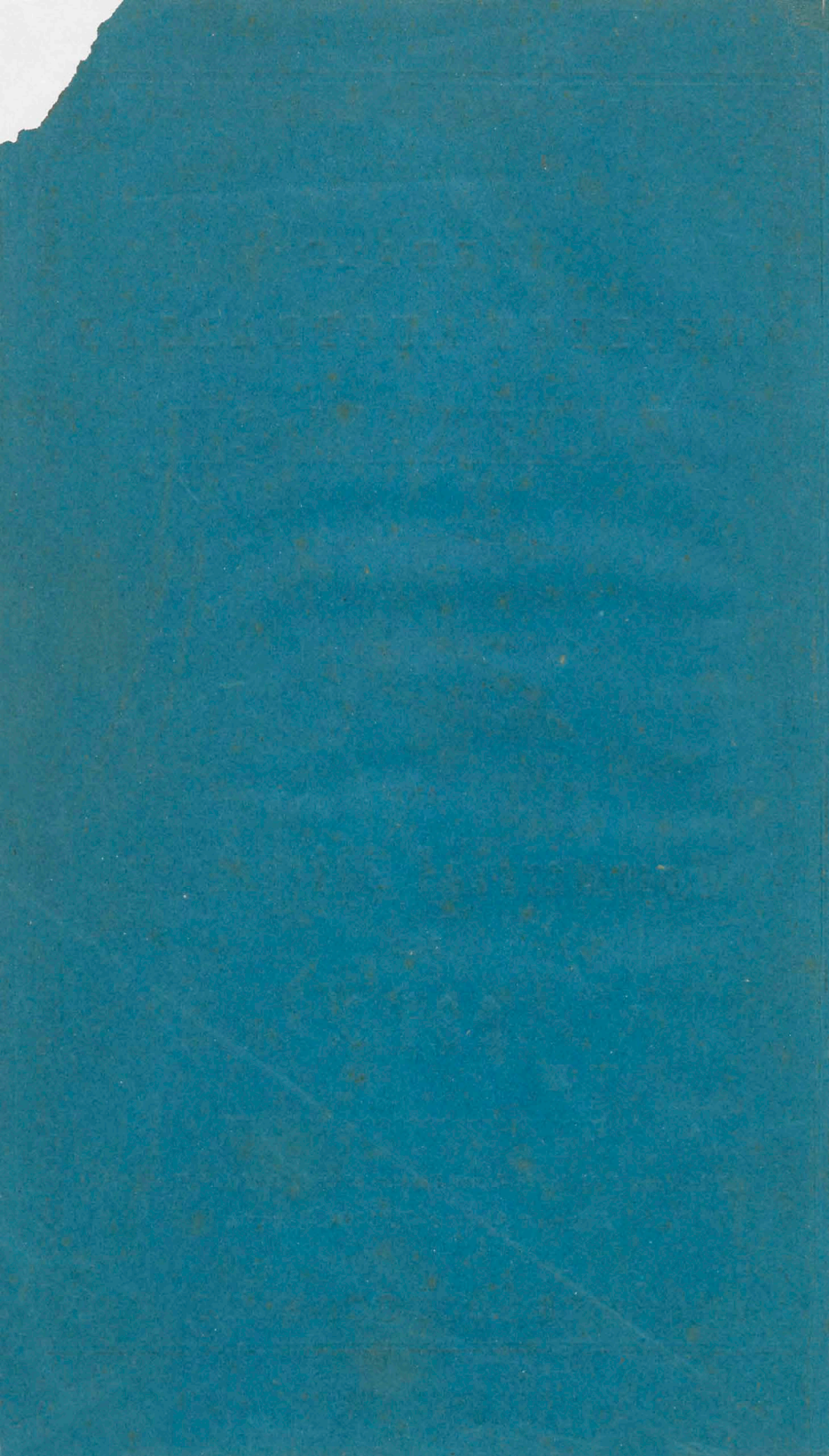

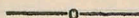

ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR 1876.



In the year 1876 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.  
 First.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon on March 10th, invisible in Western Australia.

Second.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun on March 26th, invisible in Australia.

Third.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon on September 4th, visible in Australia.

At Perth, the following will be the times of the different phases :—

} Perth mean time.

At Perth the the Moon will set nine minutes after the last contact with the shadow.

At the middle of the Eclipse, rather more than one-third of the Moon's diameter will be obscured. The first contact with the shadow takes place at eight degrees from the north point of the Moon's limb towards the east.

Fourth.—A total Eclipse of the Sun on the morning of September 18th, invisible at Perth. This Eclipse will be visible as a partial one over the eastern half of Australia.

GREGORIAN CALENDAR, OR NEW STYLE.

Previous to 1552, the length of the year had been reckoned at 365 days 6 hours, as computed by Julius Cæsar. (b.c. 45); but as the true length of a solar year is 365 days, 5 hours and 49 minutes, an error had arisen from this computation, amounting in 1582 to 10 days in advance. To rectify the Calendar, and to prevent future irregularities, it was decreed as follows by Pope Gregory XIII.—

- The year 1582, to consist of ... 365 days
- The ordinary year to consist of ... 365 days
- The year 1584, and every fourth year afterwards (termed leap year) to consist of ... 366 days
- The years 1700, 1800, 1900, 2100, and so on, three out of every four centuries afterwards, to be reckoned not as leap years, but as ordinary years ... 365 days

This mode of computation, termed the Gregorian Calendar, or New Style, has been gradually adopted in the countries of Europe, except Russia, and Greece, where the Old Style still prevails.

The New Style was adopted in Great Britain in 1752, when it was enacted that September 3rd of that year should be reckoned as September 14th, (the difference of time then amounting to 11 days).

GOLDEN NUMBER.

Golden Number, in chronology, is that number which indicates the year of the Lunar cycle for any given time. It was called the Golden Number, because in the ancient calendar it was written in letters of gold, on account of its great usefulness in ecclesiastical computations, especially in fixing the time of Easter.

MEMORANDA FOR JANUARY.

LIBRARY

To REMOVE FRUIT STAINS FROM LINEN.—Soak the stained spot in warm water and rub the crystal of Oxalic Acid upon the stain under the water, washing it off as soon as the stain disappears. Afterward wash in hot water and soap.

To DESTROY ANTS.—Put unslacked lime round the opening to their nests; or lay pieces of raw meat or liver about, on which the ants will congregate; when covered put the pieces of meat in boiling water, and when dry, put down again to collect more.

MEMORANDA FOR APRIL.

To PRESERVE STEEL GOODS FROM RUST.—After bright grates have been thoroughly cleaned, they should be dusted over with unslacked lime, and thus left until wanted. The coils of piano wires, thus sprinkled, will keep from rust for many years. Table-knives which are not in constant use ought to be put in a case in which sifted quicklime is placed, about eight inches deep. They should be plunged to the top of the blades, but the lime should not touch the handles.

MEMORANDA FOR JUNE.

To REMOVE FRECKLES.—Dissolve, in half an ounce of lemon juice, one ounce of Venice soap, and add a quarter of an ounce each of oil of bitter almonds and deliquated oil of Tartar. Place this mixture in the sun till it acquires the consistency of ointment. When in this state add three drops of the oil of Rhodium and keep it for use. Apply it as follows. Wash the freckled parts at night with elder-flower water, then anoint them with the ointment. Wash copiously in the morning with rose water.

To LOOSEN GLASS STOPPERS OF BOTTLES.—With a feather rub a drop or two of salad oil round the stopper, and then place the bottle near the fire, or wrap a piece of flannel round the neck wrung out of boiling water. When the part of neck surrounding the stopper is warm, gently tap the stopper from side to side with a light wooden instrument. However tight the stopper may be, this treatment, if persisted in, will loosen it.

MEMORANDA FOR SEPTEMBER.

**AN EXCELLANT RICE PUDDING.**—Add two quarts of milk, one cup each of rice and sugar, a teaspoonful of salt. Wash the rice and add it to the milk cold, and bake. The secret of having it nice consists in its being taken out of the oven before the milk is all dried away. It should be creamy in consistency, and when cool it is better than a pudding made with eggs, as there is no watery whye. Essence of lemon or raisins is an improvement.

MEMORANDA FOR NOVEMBER.

**MUTTON HAMS.**—Select a leg of mutton weighing about seven pounds, hang it up for two days. Take six ounces of course brown sugar, an ounce of saltpetre four ounces bay salt, and three ounces of common salt. Mix them well together, and rub the mixture well into the ham, lay it in a tub with the skin downwards, and rub it in the mixture every day for a fortnight; then hang the meat in wood smoke for a week. It will be found excellent cut into rashers and broiled.

To DESTROY INSECTS.—The "Journal of Chemistry" gives the following valuable receipt for the destruction of insects :—Take two pounds of alum and dissolve it in three or four quarts of boiling water ; let it stand on the fire until the alum disappears ; apply it with a brush while nearly boiling hot, to every joint and crevice in closet, bedstead, pantry, shelves and the like. This will destroy red and black ants, cockroaches, spiders and all the crawling pests which infest a house.

## GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

### JANUARY

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Cabbages, Cauliflowers and Brocoli may be planted in moist situations. Cucumbers should be attended to, and watered copiously morning and evening. Fiant Potatoes for Autumn crop.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Bulbs may be planted towards the end of this month. Ripe seeds should be gathered, care being taken to select the best kinds.

### FEBRUARY

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—If the weather during the last month has been unpromising the sowing of seeds will have been deferred. They should now be sown without delay. Weather permitting, Kidney Beans, Spinach, Mustard and Cress and Radish may be sown. The best Melons and Cucumbers should be allowed to ripen for seed, care being taken that they are at a safe distance from others likely to hybridize.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—This is the dryest month of the year and very little can be done beyond collecting ripening seeds, and attending to watering. Dahlias will require great care, as no plant suffers so much from drought.

### MARCH

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Plant out Celery, sow Lettuce, Cress, Radish, Potatoes, Turnips, and quick podding Peas. Towards the end of the month, if the weather is favorable, plant Onions, Shalots, and Garlic, transplant Cabbages and Cauliflowers.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Fork over, manure and clean gardens; cutting back Verbinas, Petunias, and straggling plants. Sow hardy Annuals. Propagate Rotes by cuttings. Cuttings should be from matured wood of the season's growth; shade them with a glass pan or garden frame, if possible. With Fuchsias, Pansies, and Herbaceous Perennials, protection is necessary. Plant out Pinks, &c.

## APRIL

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—This is the principal month of the year for gardening operations generally. Sow Parsnips, Turnips, Spinach, Cabbage, Radishes, Parsley, Broad Beans and Peas. Carrots are best sown in drills. Plant out Pot-herbs, either in separate beds, or as borders for walks. Sow white and red Beet, and plant when ready, Onions, Cabbages, Lettuces &c.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Divide and plant out in prepared beds, Pansies, Holyhocks, Polyanthus, and Mimulus. Pansies may be propagated by cuttings, protected under glass, and by side shoots. This is by far the best month for planting slips and cuttings of all kinds, especially Picotees, Pinks, and Carnations. These flowers are well adapted to the climate of this colony, and deserve especial attention from the amateur gardener. All spring flowering Bulbs and Tubers, should be planted this month.

## MAY

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Continue planting out Cabbage, Cauliflowers &c., &c., the same as last month, and earth up advancing crops. The later varieties of Peas, Beans, &c., may be sown. Dig and manure ground for future crops.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—This is a good month for planting Anemone and Ranunculus bulbs, and if the beds are well manured, a fine display of bloom may be expected. Transplant Roses, Fuchsias and Geraniums. Sow Annuals, and give all borders a dressing of manure.

## JUNE

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Sow for late crops, Carrots, Turnips, Onions, Parsnips, Peas and Beans. Transplant Onions and Leeks. Earth up Cabbages &c.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Plant out layers of trees, shrubs &c., of last year's layering. Continue to sow hardy annuals. Cut down such flowers as have done blooming, and dig borders. Propagate Chrysanthemums.

June is the usual month for pruning vines, but sometimes it is better deferred until July. This is also the best month for transplanting fruit trees.

## JULY

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Earth up Peas, Beans and Potatoes. Plant Potatoes for Summer crop. Sow Carrots, Parsnips &c., but discretion must be used, according to the favorableness of the season.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Cuttings of Roses, Geraniums, Fuchsias, Wall-flowers &c., may be planted. Chrysanthemums and other plants may be propagated by dividing them at the roots. Transplant and thin out Annuals.

**AUGUST**

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Continue to sow and transplant according to conditions of soil and moisture, Cabbage, Beans and other culinary vegetables. Sow Cucumbers in frames for early crops. Plant Potatoes.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Sow tender Annuals in sheltered places for transplanting. Plant Roses, Geraniums and Fuchsias. Layer and plant out cuttings of Petunias, Pinks, &c. Sow Balsams and Coxcombs. Divide and plant out Dahlias. Tie up flower stems.

**SEPTEMBER**

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Keep beds clear of weeds. Earth up crops. Sow Tomatoes in sheltered positions. In moist situations, Potatoes may be planted. Sow Beans and Peas. Plant Cucumbers, Pumpkins and Melons.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Ranunculi, Anemones and Tulips should be in full bloom in this month. Sow tender Annuals, and thin and plant out the hardy varieties. Attend to weeding and tie up flower stems.

**OCTOBER**

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Pinch off the runners of the early sown Melons and Cucumbers, and thin out Carrots and Onions; keep down the weeds as most of them will now be seeding. In favorable situations, Peas, Beans, &c., may still be sown.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—The gardens should be looking gay this month most of the Annuals being in full bloom. Take up Bulbs as the leaves die off. The seed of early Annuals will be getting ripe and should be carefully collected. Tie up stems of Pinks and Picotees.

**NOVEMBER**

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Take up Onions—if ripe; gather seed-Peas and Beans; dig early potatoes. Thin Melons and Cucumber beds. Earth up, and hoe Potatoe crops.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Finish transplanting tender Annuals. Continue to take up and store in dry sand the Bulbs as they ripen. Gather flower seeds. Plant out Dahlias for summer blooming. Tie up loose straggling flower stems.

**DECEMBER**

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Gather Peas and Beans for seed. Sow in favorable spots for early spring crops. Plant Cauliflower, Cabbage, &c. Stop the shoots of Melons and Marrows. To prevent Melon plants being blown about and injured, they should be pegged down at intervals.

**FLOWER GARDEN.**—Continue to gather seeds, and attend to watering. Tie up flower stems.

## LAND REGULATIONS.

— o —

### CLASSIFICATION OF LAND, AND CONDITIONS OF SALE AND OCCUPATION.

CROWN LANDS shall be classed severally as Town, Suburban, Rural, and Mineral,

Waste Lands of the Crown shall be sold at not less than ten shillings an acre; and the minimum acreage of ordinary rural sections shall be forty acres, but any land that is so shut in by private lands or other bounds as not to contain forty acres, may be sold at such rate as each case may seem to the Governor in Council may justify.

Town and Suburban Lands shall be offered by public auction, at an upset price to be determined by the Commissioner of Crown Lands and approved by the Governor in Council, and may be put up either by order of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, or upon the application of some person, who shall at the time of making such application deposit ten per cent. of the upset price with the Receiver of Revenue; such deposits shall, if no advance on the upset price be made, be considered as part payment on completion of purchase. An amount equal to ten per centum on the purchase money shall be paid on the fall of the hammer when lands are up for sale by order of the Commissioner of Crown Lands. In every case the balance shall be paid within thirty days of the day of sale, and in default thereof the purchaser shall forfeit his purchase money, and also all right of title to the land. If any lands put up as specified in this regulation be not sold they may be purchased at any subsequent period at the upset price, without going to auction.

Every application for land shall be made in the form in Schedule 4, and be accompanied by a fee of two shillings and sixpence, which shall be allowed on completion of purchase, or otherwise forfeited.

After payment of purchase money and fulfilment of conditions, a permit to occupy shall be issued by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, which shall be delivered up on receipt of Crown Grant for the land purchased.

Not more than one-fourth of the external boundaries of any selection shall be allowed on any frontage line, unless by approval of the Commissioner of Crown Lands in special cases.

A frontage line shall be taken to mean the boundary of a road, river, public reserve or any sea-coast, permanent stream or coast.

When, from the frontage not being a straight line, or from the inference of other frontage lines, natural features, or the boundaries of private lands, the rules provided in respect of form cannot be accurately observed, the form of the section shall be determined as nearly in accordance with the foregoing provision as circumstances permit. But the depth shall in no case exceed four times the breadth.

Every section of rural land shall be in one block, and, except as hereinbefore provided, of a rectangular form. Provided, always, that if any section when surveyed prove to differ in any respect from that intended by the purchaser, the Government will not be responsible for any loss or inconvenience which the purchaser may experience, nor will the purchase money be returned: Provided, also, that when the land is found to be in excess, such excess may either be retained by the Government or paid for by the purchaser at a price determined aforesaid, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Crown Lands. Provided, further, that if the Surveyor shall find that the whole extent of land in the selected locality falls short of the quantity paid for by the purchaser, so much of the purchase money as exceeds the price of the land to be conveyed shall be returned to him by the Receiver of Revenue, upon a voucher certified to by the Commissioner of Crown Lands. The permission to occupy shall in any case be amended, and the Crown Grant made out in accordance therewith, and the permit shall be delivered up when the Crown Grant shall be issued.

The time and place of any auction sale of Waste Lands of the Crown shall be notified in the *Government Gazette* at least two calendar months next preceeding the day or days of sale, in which the lands to be offered at such auction, and the upset prices at which they are so offered, shall be set forth.

#### LANDS FOR SPECIAL OCCUPATION.

In each District there shall be laid out, prior to selection, land for special occupation, within defined areas; land within such areas may be taken up in sections of not less than one hundred acres, nor more than five hundred acres, upon conditions of deferred payments and improvements; and the price of land within such areas shall be ten shillings per acre.

The amount of Common Land within such areas shall in no case exceed two hundred per cent. of the land fitted for agricultural purposes, and there shall also be set apart Village Sites, to be sub-divided into allotments of five acres, to be sold at an upset price of one pound per acre by public auction.

The Governor may at any time place such Common Lands under the management of any person or persons, and direct the manner in which any fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and disposed of for depasturing thereon, or delegate the power of regulating fees to any Local Board, Trust, Municipality, or Officer; provided that the holder of the adjoining land shall not be liable to prosecution for unintentional trespass of stock on unenclosed lands within such specified occupation areas.

1. The annual fee to be paid yearly, in advance; the first payment to be made at the time of the granting the application, and to be at the rate of one shilling an acre or fractional part of an acre.
2. The licensee shall not, during the currency of the license, sub-let, assign, or transfer his or her right, title, and interest therein, except by permission of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and on payment of a fee of ten shillings; and the licence shall become absolutely void on the assignment of licence except as above provided.

3. The licensee shall, within the term of his license, or before he can claim the grant either by payment or otherwise, enclose the land described in his license with a good and substantial fence, and have cleared and cropped at least one fourth of the area.
4. If the licensee shall by himself, his tenant, or agent, during the period of three years have occupied the allotment for not less than two years and a-half, and provided and made the improvements of the nature in the previous conditions mentioned, and shall prove to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, by such evidence as may be required, that he has complied with all the conditions of the said licence, he shall be entitled, at any time within thirty days after three years from the commencement of the license, to demand and obtain a Crown Grant, upon the payment of seven shillings for each acre or fractional part of an acre; or failing compliance with the above conditions he may obtain a lease of the said allotment; and every such lease shall be for a term of seven years, at a yearly rental (payable in advance) of one shilling for every acre or fractional part of an acre so demised, which shall contain the usual covenant for the payment of rent, and a condition for re-entry for non-payment thereof; and upon the payment of the last sum due on account of the rent so reserved, or at any time during the term, upon payment of the difference between the amount of rent actually paid—such being calculated at the rate of one shilling a year per acre—and the entire sum of ten shillings for each acre, the lessee or his representatives, if he or they have fulfilled all the foregoing provisions in regard to improvements, shall be entitled to a grant in fee of the lands leased; and every such grant shall be subject so such covenants, conditions, exceptions, or reservations as the Governor in Council may direct: Provided that in the case of death of the licensee during the currency of such license, it shall not be obligatory on the executors or administrators to comply with the said conditions of occupation.

Any immigrant who can prove that he or she has fulfilled the above conditions with regard to improvement, shall be entitled to have remitted to him or her an amount equal to the passage money paid by such immigrant on account of himself or herself, family, and servants, to be accounted for as paid, either as rent or otherwise, as the case may be. Provided, that such immigrant shall select within lands set apart for special occupation within a period of six months from date of arrival in the Colony, and shall immediately occupy such lands after selection in accordance with the terms of these regulations. Provided, further that the land granted for each statue adult shall not exceed in value £15.

All annual rents are to be paid in advance on the first day of March in each year; licenses and leases from time to time granted, during the year may be dated as from the first day of March, the first day of June, the first day of September, and the first day of December; the portion in this case that is to be charged for the portion of the first year, shall be so calculated, but no period less than one-fourth of a year shall be allowed in such calculation. Failure of payment of rent shall forfeit all right to the land and improvements thereon.

For the encouragement of planting vineyards, orchards, and gardens,

the Governor shall, within land set apart for special occupatio for such purposes, have power to dispose of land in blocks of not less than 10 acres, at ten shillings per acre.

## REDEMPTION OF TILLAGE LEASES.

All holders of Tillage Leases under any regulations previously existing may come under the provisions herein contained. A cash payment is to be made of the balance between the total amount of rents paid and the whole price of land, estimated at twelve shillings and sixpence for each acre; or if rent is paid at the rate of one shilling and threepence for each acre, until such rent with that already paid amounts in the aggregate to twelve shillings and sixpence per acre. Provided that no rent paid at a period prior to 1864 be computed in payment of such tillage land.

## FOR THE SALE OF LANDS IN THE NORTH AND EAST DISTRICT.

With a view of providing for the early and extensive settlement of the Northern portion of the territory of Western Australia, in which large tracts of good country are reported to have been recently discovered, the Country Lands therein which shall first be selected for purchase as hereinafter provided, to the total extent of 150,000 acres, within twelve calendar months from the date on which these Regulations shall come into operation, shall be sold at the fixed price of seven shillings and sixpence per acre; and any portion of the said quantity of 150,000 acres which may remain unsold at the end of the twelve months aforesaid, or the purchase of which shall not then have been fully completed, shall be sold afterwards at not less than ten shillings per acre, or such other sum as may then have been established as the minimum price for Waste Lands in West Australia.

One town lot of half an acre may be sold at the same rate and at the same time to every purchaser of 160 acres of such Country Land, or of each multiple thereof, within twelve calendar months from the date on which these Regulations shall come into operation.

Every application for Country Lands must be for 40 acres, or for some multiple thereof.

The deposit on any application for land must be one-tenth of the purchase money thereof.

One calendar month shall be allowed for completing a purchase, and paying the title deed fee of £1 and record fee of ten shillings.

Any balance of payment due upon a purchase, which shall not be paid within the month allowed by clause 49, shall be charged with a fine of 5 per cent. in addition within the next 60 days, and of 10 per cent. in addition after the expiration of the said 60 days.

If the total amount of purchase money, fines and fees, be not paid within six calendar months from the date of sale, the sale shall be cancelled, and all payments forfeited to the Crown.

No purchaser of land shall have any right to occupy the same until

his purchase shall have been completed by payment of the balance due thereon, and the title deed fees.

Country Lands available for general purchase shall be within such limits of territory as shall from time to time be publicly notified as open for sale by the Government Resident.

Within such limits there shall at all times be open for purchase by the first *bond fide* applicant who may have paid the required deposit of 10 per cent. :—(1) all unsold and unreserved lands within Division A of these Regulations; (2) all unsold lands in Divisions C of these Regulations which may not be public reserves or held under any lease, chargeable with rent; (3) all unsold portions of any C lease (except a selected homestead) after the expiration of the first year of the lease, and the expiration of six calendar month's notice to be given by the Government Resident or any person authorized by the Colonial Government; and (4) after the expiration of the third year of the lease, and of a like notice, all unsold portions of any such homestead.

All sales of land within the limits referred to shall be made and conducted by the Government Resident of the District, to whom applications are to be made in the prescribed forms.

The Government Resident shall also be Sub-Collector of Revenue, and shall receive all applications and payments for land.

Applications for land shall have priority according to the actual time and receipt by, and payment of deposits to, the Government Resident.

Applicants for Town and Suburban lots by purchase shall have the benefit of the upset price as their first bidding at auction.

Claims to Town Lots, in virtue of Country lands purchased, shall lapse if the required lots be not selected within six months after the completion of the purchase of the Country land.

No title deed and record fee will be charged for Town lots acquired by the purchase of the Country land.

Full titles will be prepared at Perth; and in the meantime the completion of a purchase shall be notified to the purchaser and such notification shall serve as authority for the immediate occupation of the land.

One title deed and record fee only shall be charged for all adjoining Town and Suburban lots purchased by any one person at any one sale, provided that the same may be required to be included in one and the same deed. The same rule is to apply to adjoining Country lots

Town and Suburban lots shall be sold by Public Auction by the Government Resident, or his appointee, at a time and place to be publicly notified, and after notice of not less than two weeks.

The upset price of Town and Suburban lots shall be notified from time to time by the Government Resident.

Compensation shall be given according to valuation or agreement for any lawful improvements effected on lands under lease which may be resumed for public purposes, or be purchased by other than the lessee of such lands, provided such improvements were made prior to the notice of the intended resumption.

Payments for land shall be receivable at the Revenue Office in Perth, at the option of applicants, to whom receipts are to be given for transmission to the Government Resident with an application for land.

Purchasers of Country Land within the limits of C Leases, shall have no free right to depasture stock within such limits, except upon their own purchases.

All unsold lands shall be liable to resumption by the Government wholly or in part, and at any rate, for public purposes.

In laying out the Country, or in receiving applications for the purchase of land, suitable sites shall be reserved for the exclusive use of Aboriginal natives so as to allow them free access to wood and water.

No Convict or person holding a Ticket-of-Leave, or person under sentence or order of Transportation or Penal Servitude, shall be introduced or allowed to remain within the Northern portion of the Territory of Western Australia to which these regulations are intended to apply.

Save in so far as the same are altered by these Regulations the existing Land Regulations are to be deemed to be in force in these Districts.

#### PASTORAL LANDS.

The Pastoral Land of the Crown in Western Australia shall be divided into three classes, to be denominated respectively, 1st Class, 2nd Class, and 3rd Class.

First Class Lands shall comprehend all Pastoral Crown Lands comprised within the following boundaries, with the exception of lands set apart for special occupation purposes, viz:—

On the *South* by the sea coast, to the mouth of the Fitzgerald River, thence by a line running in a North-westerly direction through Mount Sterling to the summit of Wongong Hills, thence by a North line of about thirty-four miles in length, thence by a West line, through a spot twenty miles North from the centre of Dandaraga Spring, thence by a North line to a spot five miles East from the Coal Seam near the Irwin River, thence by a West line five miles in length to the said Coal Seam, and thence by a direct line to the great Southern bend of the Murchison River, next below the Geraldine Mine; on the *North* by the said River downwards to the sea coast, and on the *West* by the sea coast between the South and North boundaries above described.

The Second Class shall comprehend all other lands in the Colony open for lease, except those in Class Three.

The Third Class shall comprehend all such lands as are at present comprised within the North and East Districts of this Colony.

The *North District*, bounded on the West and North by the sea coast, including the islands adjacent to it; and on the South by the River Murchison, and by a true East line through the summit of Mount Murchison.

The *East District* comprised between the longitude 121 and 129

degrees East, and between the latitude 30 degrees South and the South coast, including the adjacent islands.

NORTH AND EAST DISTRICT.

The land in these Districts shall be divided into two divisions—A and C; 'A' lands being for annual licences, and those in C for more extended occupation. 'A' shall comprise all land within two miles of the sea coast, including the adjacent islands; and C shall be the remainder.

Permission to proceed to the North or East District, for the purpose of occupying land under these Regulations, shall be obtained by making application in the form in Schedule 6. Such permission shall be valid for twelve months from its date.

Free pasturage for the stock enumerated in an application, and for their natural increase, shall be allowed on the unappropriated lands of the District referred to, for the space of twelve months from the date of their arrival therein; and within this period runs, not exceeding (100,000) one hundred thousand acres for any one establishment, may be selected in one uniform shape, and be reported in the form in Schedule 7, for approval.

Any person claiming such a run shall forward to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, with his application for the same, a certificate, signed by some creditable person, of the date on which the stock enumerated in his permission to proceed to such District actually arrived therein, either by land or water.

On the approval of such selection and certificate, a license in the Form in Schedule 8, free of rent, and not transferable, shall be issued for the occupation of the land selected, for the term of three years, to commence from the end of the twelve months hereinbefore last mentioned.

At any time within the three years last named, the lawful occupant of any run shall be permitted to select, within such run, lots of land not exceeding (20,000) twenty thousand acres each. Any such selections of C land, shall, on approval, be granted on pastoral lease, in the form in Schedule 9, for eight years, to commence on the first day of January next following the date of application: and similar selections of A land within a run shall, on approval, be granted on annual license, subject to renewal from year to year, at the option of the Government.

C leases shall be chargeable with five shillings per 1,000 for the acreage therein, for each of the first four years, and ten shillings per 1,000 acres for each of the second four years. A license shall be charged at the same rates for acreage. All payments to be in advance.

C leases and A licenses shall be transferable while chargeable with rent, on its being shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the lands described in them have been properly stocked.

Runs or leases may be resumed, either wholly or in part, for public purposes or for sale, on giving twelve months' notice; but compensation shall in such case be given, according to valuation or agreement, for any lawful improvements existing on the lands described in a lease chargeable with rent at the time of giving such notice.

During the free occupation of a run, and during the first year of a lease, the lawful occupant of the same shall be allowed a right to cultivate; but no claim for damages by trespass of stock shall be admissible unless the land trespassed upon shall, at the time of trespass, be properly fenced.

In all other respects the disposal and tenure of the Crown Lands in the North and East Districts will be governed by the provisions of the existing Land Regulations.

No protection or Government establishment in the North or East Districts will be guaranteed to the public until deemed expedient by the Government.

#### FIRST AND SECOND CLASS PASTURE LANDS.

First Class lands shall be let at £1 per 1000 acres per annum.

Second Class lands shall be let at 10s. per 1000 acres per annum.

A lessee in the occupation of his lease shall be entitled to claim from the purchaser of any portion thereof the fair value of any lawful improvements effected on such portion, which, however, shall in no case be estimated at more than the actual outlay made by the lessee. The value of such improvements shall be made by one competent person appointed by the purchaser and one by the lessee. Any difference of opinion between such valuers to be determined by an umpire to be appointed by themselves, or in case they shall not agree in such appointment, by the Governor.

Improvements may be considered to be either buildings, wells, tanks, dams, cultivation, grass paddocks, fencing, or any beneficial work done on the run to increase its productiveness and powers of carrying stock.

The occupier of a depasturing lease shall have the right to purchase in the proportion of ten acres to each one thousand acres leased; each lot to contain one hundred acres; and improvements shall be made in each allotment to the extent of twenty-five pounds declared value. To be redeemed in five years, at five shillings an acre.

A pasturage license or lease shall entitle the holder thereof to the exclusive right of pasturage over the land specified, and on the terms therein stated. Such license or lease shall give no right to the soil or to the timber, and shall immediately determine over any land reserved, sold or otherwise disposed of under these regulations.

The Commissioner of Crown Lands, is authorised to insert in any lease such conditions and clauses of forfeiture as may seem to him to be required for the public interest; as also a clause permitting the lessee to cut such timber as may be required for domestic uses, for the construction of buildings, fences, stockyards, or other improvements on the land, but not for sale, or removal off the land.

Any person desiring to rent lands for pastoral purposes, may obtain

an annual license to occupy for pastoral purposes, in blocks not less than one thousand acres, on payment of one pound for each thousand acres annually.

Any person desiring to lease lands for pastoral purposes, may obtain a lease to occupy for such purposes, in blocks of not less than ten thousand acres, on payment of one pound for each one thousand acres annually. The duration of such lease shall be for fourteen years.

On every application, there shall be paid a fee of two shillings and sixpence.

Nothing in these regulations shall in any way effect land held in lawful occupation in the Northern and Eastern Districts of the Colony, except as hereinbefore provided.

Leases shall be liable to forfeiture in the following modes:—

For non-payment of Rent, as hereinbefore provided.

Upon any conviction of felony against the lessee.

In the event of a lessee being convicted of any offence against the Law, the case may within three months after such conviction, be inquired into by two or more Justices, who, if they think fit, may adjudge the lease to be forfeited with or without compensation, for the value of improvements. Provided, always, that no such adjudication of forfeiture pronounced by the Justices shall take effect until confirmed by the Governor.

The positions of runs, and the arrangements of boundary lines shall be subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Crown Lands; and any description furnished by an applicant for land shall be full and particular, and shall refer to some fixed point or object which can be recognised by the Survey Office. The Government will not be responsible for any errors in descriptions so furnished; but any erroneous description, if found to interfere with other parties, may be rectified if practicable, on approved application, in such a manner as not to disturb the boundaries of any lease previously granted.

Applicants for land, either by lease or license, or by purchase in the exercise of a pre-emptive right, will be liable to a charge for Surveys should such be required for adjusting or completing a claim; and if an applicant be unwilling to await the convenience of the Government, to make the necessary survey, such charge shall be fixed at the time of approving an application, and shall be deposited before the required survey will be made. Applications for lease or license to be in the form in Schedule 10.

The Governor reserves the right to lay out, declare open, and make, either permanently or for temporary use, public roads through any lands leased or licensed. Also, to take away any indigenous produce, rock, or soil required for public purposes; to cut and remove timber, sandalwood, and other woods from lands under pastoral lease or license, or to issue licenses for cutting and removing the same therefrom to sell any mineral land comprised within the limits of any pastoral lease whatever; or with the written consent of the lessee, and notwithstanding his pre-emptive right, to sell any other portion of such lease, at any time, and with a right of immediate entry; to depasture on any unenclosed land any horses or cattle in the employ of

the Government, while working on or passing over the said land, together with a right for any person to pass over such unenclosed land with or without horses, stock, or conveyances, while travelling from one part of the country to another, on all necessary occasions.

### LICENSES TO CUT TIMBER ON THE WASTE LANDS OF THE CROWN.

Application by a pair of Sawyers, Splitters, or Cutters, for a license to fell, cut, split, and remove any timber, sandal, jam, fire or other wood growing or being on any waste lands of the Crown in Western Australia, shall be made to the Collector or to any Sub-Collector of Revenue, or to any Resident Magistrate, who shall thereupon issue the required License, after payment in advance of the fees in that behalf herein mentined.

#### FEES CHARGEABLE FOR LICENSES TO CUT TIMBER.

For any quantity not exceeding 640 acres of Land	... ..	£20 per annum.
Do. exceeding 640 and not exceeding 1280	... ..	£40 per annum.
Or 10s. per month for each pair of Sawyers		
To cut Sandalwood	... ..	2s. 6d. per Month for each man.

No such license shall be issued for a period less than one nor more than six months. The names of the parties applying for a license shall be inserted therein, and no such license shall be transferable.

Applications for special licenses to fell, remove, and sell the timber growing or being on any particular waste lands, shall be addressed to the Commissioner of Crown Lands by letter, fully describing the quantity, position, and boundaries of the land required, and the date from which a license is to commence. Any such application shall be accompanied by a deposit of £5, or by the receipt of any Collector of Revenue for that amount. The land applied for shall be selected and described according to the rules laid down.

Such license as last aforesaid shall be prepared in the office of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the form in Schedule 11, and shall be deliverable by any Collector of Revenue or by the Resident Magistrate of any District in which the land may be situate, on payment of any balance due thereon.

Every such license shall be for twelve calendar months; and if not taken up at Albany within two calendar months, or at Perth and other Districts within one calendar month from the date of deposit, the license shall be forfeited, together with the deposit, and the land shall be open to fresh applicants. The license shall not be transferable.

No rights or privileges shall be conveyed by any such license beyond those of felling, cutting up, and removing any indigenous timber growing or being on the land licensed; and at the expiration of the license all timber left on the ground shall be the property of the Government unless otherwise arranged by special application in writing, addressed to the Colonial Secretary, or by a renewal of the license for a further term, to which an existing lessee shall be considered to have a preferable claim.

## LICENSES TO CUT TIMBER.

The following additional regulations as to Timber Licenses were promulgated in the *Government Gazette* of the 16th February, 1875.

In order to promote the introduction and establishment of new industries, and commercial undertakings of public utility, it shall be lawful for the Governor or Officer Administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, to grant Special Licenses to cut and remove timber from the waste lands of the Crown for any period not exceeding 14 years, anything to the contrary notwithstanding in the existing Land Regulations contained; and such licenses shall be subject to such rents, fees, conditions, and reservations as the Governor in Council may prescribe, but shall not entitle the licenses to any right of renewal at the expiration of the term.

Any Timber License already granted, or agreed to be granted, for a longer period than 12 months, with a right of renewal, and otherwise not in conformity with the existing Land Regulations, shall not on that account be held to be invalid, but may be held and renewed according and subject to the terms and stipulations on which the license was granted, or agreed to be granted.

## LANDS INFESTED WITH POISONOUS INDIGENOUS PLANTS.

It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the commendation of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, supported by such evidence as may be required to prove that the land applied for is infested by poisonous indigenous plants, and after a proper survey has been made, to grant a pre-emptive right to such land for term of twenty-one years, on the following conditions:—

- 1.—That not less than one thousand acres, to be taken up.
- 2.—That One pound be paid every year in advance for each one thousand acres, or fraction of one thousand acres.
- 3.—That all expenses incurred in survey and in production of necessary evidence has been previously deposited with the Receiver of Revenue, or paid to the parties concerned and employed.
- 4.—That if the land so granted shall be completely fenced in with a good and substantial fence, and the poisonous indigenous plants entirely eradicated therefrom, the occupier shall, at the expiration of the aforesaid term of years, be entitled to receive, on payment of such fees as are required by these regulations, a Crown Grant.

No lands held under lease or license for pastoral purposes are to be included in these provisions.

Any person may obtain a lease of lands proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands to be infested with poisonous indigenous plants, for a period of twenty-one years, at the rate of two shillings and sixpence per annum per 1,000 acres; but in no case shall the annual rent amount to less than one pound. Any such lease shall determine on application made to lease the land under the foregoing sections.

## MINERAL LANDS.

Any person on application to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, or

to the Collector of Revenue of the District, may on approval, and on payment of a registration fee of two shillings and sixpence, obtain a license in the form in Schedule 12, to search, for a period of two years, for minerals in any Crown Lands excepting Town, Suburban, or lands let under Tillage Lease, and except gardens, stockyards, and buildings on runs.

Any person registered as above, on defining a block of not more than two hundred acres, describing the position of a post placed in the centre of such block, and on payment of a fee of a £1, shall obtain a right to mine (in the form in Schedule 13) over such land for a period of 12 months, renewable for a further period of twelve months, on payment of a fee of £1. During currency of mining right, lessee shall be entitled to remove not more than five tons for the purpose of testing, but no person shall hold more than one mining right at the same time,

Leases in the form in Schedule 14, of portions of land not exceeding two hundred acres nor less than twenty acres, will be granted for purposes of mining for any metal or mineral, excepting precious metals, for a term of seven years, at a rental of five shillings per annum for each acre.

Any person or company holding a mining license, or lease, who shall show to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands that he or they have erected on the land held under such lease or license all the plant, buildings, and machinery necessary for the due and proper working of the mine, or who shall enter into a bond with sureties to put up such permanent buildings and machinery within a certain time, shall be entitled to a grant from the Crown on payment of three pounds for each acre; payment may be made, if desired, in three annual instalments of one pound an acre; but the Crown Grant will in no case be issued until the whole payment be completed and the fees for grant and registration paid. The quantity of land to be so sold and granted shall not be less than twenty acres, but in case such a quantity does not exist the price at which the plot may be sold shall be fixed by the Commissioner of Crown Lands and approved by the Governor in Council, provided the same be not less than three pounds an acre.

If the lease of a mine be forfeited or not renewed, the lessee may remove or otherwise dispose of all machinery, improvements, and minerals brought to the surface within three months of notice being given by Government, in default of which the same will be liable to forfeiture. If any lease shall remain unworked and undeveloped for a period of twelve months, such lease shall be liable to forfeiture.

The rent shall be paid on the first day of January in each year, in advance; and not less than one years' rent shall be received. Every lease issued during the year shall be dated from the 1st January preceding. Lessees may determine their leases by giving three months' notice in writing, but no rent shall be in any case refunded.

Applications to lease mineral lots must be addressed to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and accompanied by a receipt showing that the rent thereupon has been paid to the Treasury on account.

Every application for a lease or for a license shall be in the form provided in Schedule 15, and shall contain a full description and boundaries of the land to be included in the lease asked for. Every

license or lease shall be in the form of a parallelogram, but in no case shall the length be more than three times the breadth. The direction of the boundry lines shall be according to application.

Annual returns of ores raised shall be furnished to the Commissioner of Crown Lands.

Nothing in these Regulations shall prevent the licensee or lessee from transferring or sub-letting, on approval of Commissioner of Crown Lands, and on payment of a fee of ten shillings.

No mining license or lease shall be granted within the limits of an occupied tillage lease, except to the lessee of such tillage lease, or to others with his written consent.

The lessee of a mining lease shall pay to the lessee of any pastoral lease full compensation, according to agreement or approved valuation, for all lawful improvements which may have been made by such last mentioned lessee on any portion of his lease that may be thus absorbed for mining purposes.

In no case shall the holder of a mining license or lease be entitled to any compensation for improvements or for outlay of any description, after the abandonment or forfeiture of his holding.

The lands available for selection as mineral lands, or for mining leases, shall be all the waste lands of the Crown open to general selection for purchase, lease or license; and all lands under pastoral lease or license except such homesteads as may have been or which may hereafter be selected under authority of any existing Regulations.

All rents chargeable for mining leases shall be payable to the Collector, or to a Sub-Collector of Revenue, within 15 days next after the established rent day named in any such lease; failing which payment, a lease shall be absolutely and indefeasibly forfeited, unless within 30 days after such rent day the lessee shall duly pay the full amount of the annual rent, together with an additional sum equal to one-half of the same. But the Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, may cancel any such forfeiture, on sufficient grounds shown, and on the lessee duly paying, within 60 days next after such rent day, a sum equal to twice the established rent for the current year.

The residue of any unexpired term for which a forfeited or abandoned mining lease may have been granted shall not afterwards be disposed of, unless the applicant for the same shall duly pay, in manner aforesaid, such sum in addition to the established rent as the Governor may direct.

All deposits and instalments which may have been paid on account of mineral lands shall be forfeited, together with all claims to the land, if by any default of an applicant for the same a lease shall not be duly completed.

There shall be no right of way or thoroughfare through or over any enclosed portion of mineral land leased under these regulations, except by recognized roads, or for Government purposes.

In all other respects the rules for the sale, letting, and disposal of the waste lands of the Crown in Western Australia shall apply to all lands therein which may be required for mineral purposes.

Nothing in these Regulations contained shall be deemed to apply

to auriferous lands Before any mineral lands are abandoned or forfeited, it shall be obligatory on the occupant to enclose by a substantial fence, all shafts and dangerous cuttings made by him during his occupancy.

### COMMON LANDS.

The Governor may at any time proclaim any Crown Lands as a common; and may place it under the management of any person or persons, and direct the manner in which any fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and disposed of for depasturing thereon; and at any time alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common; or delegate the power of regulating fees to any local board, trust, municipality, or officer.

### PUBLIC RESERVES.

The Governor shall make all reserves required for the purposes of the Colonial Government; and upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Crown Lands shall from time to time, and at any time when necessary, make reserves of land, whether surveyed into sections for sale or not so surveyed, for the following objects and purposes:—

- 1.—Sites for Churches and Chapels, with not exceeding one hundred acres of Glebe land attached.
- 2.—Railways, Tramways, and Canals.
- 3.—Quays, Landing Places and Ferries.
- 4.—Sites for Schools and other buildings for the purposes of Education, and land for the endowment of schools and other educational institutions of a public character.
- 5.—Sites for Mechanics' Institutes, Hospitals, and institutions for charitable purposes, Markets, Courthouses, Prisons, or other edifices for public use or purposes for the Colony or any Borough or Road Board.
- 6.—Cemeteries.
- 7.—Places necessary for the embellishment of towns, or for the health and recreation of the inhabitants.
- 8.—For the endowment of Municipal Corporations within the Colony.
- 9.—For resting places and commonage for horses, cattle and sheep, and generally for any purposes of public utility, convenience or enjoyment.

A full and complete description of every such reserve, and of the purposes to which it shall have been dedicated, shall so soon as possible after it shall have been made, be published in the *Government Gazette*, and set forth on the authenticated maps in the Land Office.

Provided that the Commissioner of Crown Lands may temporarily reserve land for such purposes, and if such temporary reserve be not confirmed by the Governor making the same, a reserve within six months from which such temporary reserve was made, such land shall thereupon cease to be so reserved.

The specified purposes for which any reserve shall be held may be changed, and any such reserves may be leased or sold, either in whole or in part, by order of the Governor; and notice of such change or sale shall be published in the *Government Gazette* at least thirty days before such change or sale; and the Governor may order that the rents, profits, or proceeds arising from any reserve, or the sale or disposition thereof, shall be paid to any person or persons or corporation having the management of such reserve; otherwise, all monies received shall go to the credit of the land fund.

The Governor may from time to time order and direct that any such reserves as aforesaid shall vest in and be held by any corporation, or other person or persons having corporate succession, to be named in the order, in trust for the like or other public purposes, to be specified in such order in such manner and with powers of leasing for any term not exceeding twenty-one years from the date of the lease.

Reserves for roads, public highways, water works, and drains shall be made by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, with the approval of the Governor, and shall be set forth on the authenticated maps in the Land Office of the Colony.

### FREE GRANTS OF LAND TO IMMIGRANTS.

(PROCLAIMED IN "GOVERNMENT GAZETTE," 16TH FEBY., 1875.)

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the existing Land Regulations contained, each adult Immigrant of the laboring classes introduced into the Colony with the sanction, or wholly or partially at the expense of the Imperial or Colonial Government, after two years' residence therein, may, with the permission of the Governor or Officer Administering the Government, select from any unimproved Rural Crown Lands open to selection, a lot not exceeding fifty acres; and, subject to the same conditions, each such immigrant between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one may select a lot not exceeding twenty-five acres of such land; Provided that no greater quantity of land than 150 acres in all be allotted under these Regulations to any one family.

Such lots, when selected, are to be allotted in the first instance to such immigrants by Occupation Certificates, which may be exchanged for grants in fee simple at the expiration of three years from the date of such Certificate respectively, on proof to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands that the whole of the land so allotted shall then have been properly fenced in, and that at least one-fourth of it is under cultivation. Provided that if at the end of the said term of three years the above conditions, or any of them, be not fulfilled, the lot in respect of which default shall have been made shall revert to the Crown, with any improvements that may be thereon.

## GRANTS TO VOLUNTEERS.

A lot of rural land not exceeding (50) fifty acre, may be granted to each of the officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates of the Volunteer Forces, who shall have served continuously for a period of five years from and after the coming into operation of this Regulation.

Such lots may be assigned by occupation certificates, exchangeable at any time, within three years after date, for grants in Fee Simple, on proof being made to the Commissioner of Crown Lands that improvements have been made on the land applied for, in buildings, fences, cultivation or otherwise, to the value of £25; such certificates to be transferable, subject to the conditions aforesaid; but should the conditions be unfulfilled at the expiration of three years from the issue of the occupation certificate, the land to revert to the Crown.

No Volunteer to be entitled to any occupation certificate or grant until he shall have qualified himself under such regulations as the Governor shall from time to time make and publish in the *Government Gazette*, embodying the condition that every such Volunteer has attended at least the Infantry, (12) twelve parade drills, and the Cavalry (8) eight parade drills, during each year of his service, and (should a camp of instruction be formed) at least (3) three days' field service in each year, and at all times has held himself ready for duty, if called out for active service, and has obtained, on the expiration of (5) five years' continuous service, a certificate of good conduct and efficiency from the officer commanding his own regiment, company, or troop, approved by the Commanding Officer of Volunteers, or such officer or inspector as the Governor may from time to time appoint.

## GRANTS TO PENSIONERS.

A lot of Rural land, not exceeding 20 acres, may be granted to each Pensioner introduced with the sanction of Her Majesty's Government into the Colony, who shall have faithfully and soberly served upon the Duty Force continuously for a period of 3 years.

Such lots may be assigned to the Pensioners by occupation certificates, which shall be exchanged at the expiration of the said period of 3 years on proof being made to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands that the Pensioners have fulfilled all such conditions as to the conduct, good service in the Force, and improvements on the Land, as the Governor may from time to time make and publish in the *Government Gazette*.

GENERAL REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE  
CUSTOM HOUSE.

—o—

*Hours* for the transaction of public business at the Custom House are, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., except Saturdays, when the office will be closed at noon.

*Holidays in the Customs*; Christmas Day, Good Friday, and the Anniversary of the foundation of the Colony, the day appointed for the celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday, and such other days as His Excellency the Governor may sanction.

*No Clearance* for vessels will be granted unless all the Official Documents connected therewith are deposited at the Custom House before 3 o'clock, and 12 on Saturdays, but nothing shall prevent the Collector of Customs granting a clearance at any time.

*Masters of Coasters* shall produce Manifests, (in duplicate), Cargo Book, and all other necessary papers before the hours for closing, or the clearance will not be made out till next day.

*No Coasters* will be permitted to cross the Bar, without first obtaining the sanction of the Collector of Customs.

*Boats* plying to and from vessels in Port, without the Collector's License will be dealt with as the Law directs, 25 Vic. No 12.

*Any Boats* proceeding to Perth laden with cargo from vessels in Port, prior to delivery of permit to the Landing Waiter, and obtaining his written permission to proceed, will be subject to loss of Collector's License and penalty under 24 Vic. No. 5.

*Exporters* are reminded that Duty Free Goods, shipped prior to entry, render them liable to a fine at from £10 to £30; and in the event of any sandalwood being shipped prior to entry, it becomes seizable.

*Agents* are cautioned to give notice to Collector upon arrival of a vessels having any Gunpowder on board, who will grant a special sufferance for it to be landed under 14th Vic., No. 4.

*Parties* unaccustomed to enter and clear goods at the Custom House, are advised to employ an Agent, as the practice of writing entries and receiving instructions from clerks at the counter is disallowed. Proper forms will be supplied on application. Merchants and others are requested to fill up their entries as far as possible, prior to passing at the Custom House.

SAMPLES.

At first gaug, Wines and Spirits without charge. On subsequent written application to Collector, 6d. Samples not claimed within one month will be sold for the benefit of Government. Samples of Tobacco ½-lbs. 1s.

Proprietors may have spirits re-gauged, and other goods re-weighed on written application to Collector without charge.

Special charges according to service performed at option of Collector.

From parties requiring service of Landing-waiter, after office hours, a fee of 1s. for first hour or fraction, and 1s. 6d. for second hour may be demanded or an arrangement agreed to by the Merchants. The office hours of Landing-waiter are from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., from first October to 31st March; and from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., from 1st April to 30th September, but no goods are landed after 4 p.m.

The Government will not hold themselves responsible for leakage or waste by natural causes; every care and precaution to prevent the same while goods are lodged in the Queen's warehouses will be taken.

Proprietors may transfer to any person whole packages of Goods of any kind, standing in their names on the books of the Customs by addressing a written request to the Collector; but no transfer for the future will be noticed, unless the package or packages are properly described by mark, number and importing ship, which coincide with the registered entries in the warehouse. Transfers should be presented at the Custom House as soon as possible by parties receiving the same.

The Government will not be answerable for any charge for freight upon goods from importing ship to shore; but if goods are entered for Bond by the agent of any vessel to facilitate her discharge, they will be detained until such charges are satisfied.

The Government will not hold themselves responsible for any complaints made of bonded goods after removal from the bonded stores. While in store, and on removal, every facility will be afforded to

owners of bonded goods to examine and verify the contents of casks and packages.

## REGULATIONS FOR "A" STORE OR "RECEIVING HOUSE" FREMANTLE.

- 1, The building to be under the control and supervision of the Customs Department.
2. It will open each day from 7 a.m. to 8 a.m., and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, except Saturdays, when it will be closed at noon.

3. No Timber, Coals, Gunpowder, Kerosene, Bricks, Iron, Stone, Tar, Hay, (except hay the property of the Government), nor any other material or substance that in the opinion of the Collector of Customs for the time being may be considered of a dangerous nature, or likely to damage either the store or the goods in it, shall be stowed therein.

4. All goods to be stowed in such places as may be pointed out by the Officer in charge of the "Receiving Store," at the risk and expense of the depositor, and no goods removed without his sanction.

5. All Goods approved by the Collector of Customs, with the exceptions named in Rule No. 3, may be deposited in "A Store" at the following rates of charges :—

Special cases will be decided by the Collector of Customs.

6. All goods after three months' deposit, may at the discretion of the Collector of Customs, be advertised for two clear weeks, and if not claimed and cleared, may be submitted to Public Auction; and from the sum realised it shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to carry to the credit of the Government the full rent and any charges due, and hand over the balance to the owner or his agent, if claimed within 12 months from the date of sale.

7. Smoking and the use of lucifer matches strictly prohibited inside the building.

### SHIPPING

All matters connected with the registration of ships, discharge and engagement of crews &c., are governed in this colony by Imperial Acts of Parliament. The Collector of Customs is Registrar of Shipping *ex officio*, and holds the office of "Shipping Master," a term altered by a late Imperial Act, to "Superintendent of Mercantile Marine," Fees for registration of a vessel £2 2s.; Measuring a vessel under Mercantile Marine Act, 7s. 6d. each compartment. The Harbor Master is recognised as the *Measuring Officer* for Western Australia.

Shipping Master's Fees are levied as per Schedule of "Merchant Shipping Act." Some of the Colonies require *Male* passengers to produce a certificate before landing, that they are *Free* men, these certificates are issued by the Collector of Customs only, and are charged 1s. each.

All the fees named (except for measuring a vessel) are paid into the Treasury.

POPULATION.

The population on the 31st December, 1873, was 25,761. On the 31st December, 1874, it was 26,209; 15,722 males, and 10,487 females. The increase during the year 1874 was 448 and 1874, 153 males and 295 females.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE FOR 1874.

REVENUE.

The Revenue from all sources amounted to £148,072 16s. 1d., as compared with £134,831 18s. 2d., for 1873, or an increase of £13,240 17s. 11d. The principal increase was in customs—which amounted to £82,275 1s. 3d. The receipts from the Imperial Government on account of Convict Service amounted to £13,847 0s 0d., so that the revenue actually raised from local sources was—£134,225 16s. 1d., or about £5 2s. 6d., per head of the population.

EXPENDITURE.

The Expenditure for 1874 was £143,266 6s. 8d., as compared with £114,269 15s. 3d. for 1873. The Imperial Expenditure for the year 1874 on account of Military and Convict services, was £79,850 4s. 4d. divided as under:—

### EDUCATION.

---

The number of Elementary Schools, supported by the Government, is 67, with an aggregate attendance of 2,586—1,391 male, and 1,139 female children—and there are 18 Assisted Schools.

### ECCELESIASTICAL.

---

The number of Churches and other places of worship in the colony is 44, divided as follows:—Church of England, 24; Roman Catholic, 10; Wesleyan, 7; Independent, 3.

### SAVINGS BANKS.

---

Thirteen Savings Banks are open in connection with the Post Office Department. All accounts are kept at the General Post Office. The other offices are only used for the transmission of money. The number of depositors is 1,292; the amount due to depositors is about £19,000.

### IMMIGRATION.

---

Since the cessation of transportation the population of the colony has remained stationary. A few immigrants arrived from time to time, but these arrivals were more than balanced by departures, and the scarcity of labor became so great that the subject was by public opinion forced upon the attention of the Government, and £10,000 was voted for immigration purposes at the Legislative Council of 1873. During the past year several vessels have arrived with immigrants from England, selected by Mr. Laurance, who acted as immigration agent for the colony during his leave of absence in England.

### LOANS FOR PUBLIC WORKS.

---

The public debt of the colony is £135,000. Of this sum £35,000 was borrowed at 6 per cent. in 1872, for the construction of various small public works such as jetties, &c., and for the purchase of the

telegraph lines owned by a private company. In 1873, £10,000 was borrowed at 5 per cent. to be expended in the construction of a line of telegraph between Newcastle and Geraldton, and a railway and telegraph between Geraldton and Northampton. The telegraph between Newcastle and Geraldton has been completed some time, and the railway is in course of construction.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

The system of public instruction now obtaining in this colony was determined by an Act passed by the Local Legislature in 1870, in accordance, as far as the condition of the colony would admit, with the principles of Mr. Foster's Act in England. The Elementary schools of the colony coming under the operation of the Act are divided into Government and Assisted—the latter are owned either by societies, denominations or private individuals, but accept assistance from the State in the shape of a capitation grant—calculated upon attendance and secular results and to the observance of a strict conscience clause during the four hours of secular instruction, insisted upon under the Act. The Government Elementary Schools are under the sole control and supervision of a Central Board and Local District Boards, and an Inspector appointed by the Central Board. The Assisted Elementary Schools are only subject to the supervision of either the Central or the Local Boards, so far as the observance of the conscience clause is concerned; beyond this they have nothing to do in the management of the Assisted Elementary Schools. The Central Board, consisting of five members—laymen—no two of whom can be of the same religious denomination—is appointed by the Governor, and the Local Boards are elected by the general body of electors, for three years. Compulsory attendance of children can be enforced by the District Boards, and at Albany, Beverley, Bunbury, Busselton, Fremantle, Geraldton, Greenough, Guildford, Newcastle, Pinjarrah, and York, the Compulsory Clauses are enforced by officers duly appointed under the 30th clause of the Act. In all Elementary Schools under the provisions of the Act, four hours daily are devoted to secular instruction, and half-an-hour in the morning and a quarter of an hour in the afternoon to reading the Bible or any other religious books. Such books must have received the sanction of the Central Board and must be read without note or comment. The provisions of the conscience clause must be observed, and no catechism or religious formulary which is distinctive of any particular denomination may be used.

A reduction of one third will be made when more than two of one family attend. Special recommendations from District Boards for reduction of fees will be considered by the Central Board.

On the 31st December, 1873, the Society had completed its 25th year, and at that time there were in force **20,085** Policies, assuring **£7,903,040**. Annual Revenue at same date was
