Some efforts have been made to record historic incidents. On the whole, however, such attem to have been isolated. No concerted move has been made by any large body of men and women to organise the rescue of ha penings in this State forty, fifty and more years ago from oblivion. It is feat, therefore, that there is abundent room and an urgent mission for a society of men and women who will take up this task.

At the same time there are many Western Australians by birth or by ade tion who meet neither of the above classifications but the are animated by a sincere love of the State and a desire to honour its past. They can play a real part in the pro esed body.

It is suggested that the society should be known as the Western Australian Pociety and that its objects should be: -

- (1) Collection, classification and preservation of historical records of the State;
- (2) Sublication of selected records from time to time either in special bulletins or incor orated in an official journal of the Society;
- (3) The promotion of social gatherings of members at quarterly or annual intervalo;
- The securing of premises which could be used as a social centre for members and a rejectory for the documents of the Paciaty.

Your co-operation in the formation of this Pociety will be appreciated and your attendance is cordially invited at a preliminary meeting in Karrakutta Club lecture room on Se tember 10 at 8 .m.
