ECLIPSES IN 1858.

In the Year 1858, there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I. February 28 .- The Moon will be eclipsed to the extent of one-third of her diameter, on the southern limb. First contact with the shadow at 4h. 53m. a.m.; middle of the Eclipse at 5h. 56gm. s.m.; lest contact with the shadow 7 a.m. The Moon will set, partly eclipsed, at 6h. 19m. a.m.

II. March 15 .- An annular Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in

Australia.

III. August 24 .- The Moon will be eclipsed to the extent of nearly half her diameter, on the Northern limb. First contact with the shadow at 8h. 46m. p.m.; middle of the Eclipse at 10h. 3m. p.m.; last contact with the shadow at 11h, 20m. p.m.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

JANUARY.- In moist soils sow cauliflowers and brocoli early in the month, and cabbages, swedes, carrots, and parsnips. Fruit Garden-Bud trees; thin and trim the lateral shoots of the peach, nectarine, almond tree, &c. Pinch off the tendrils and lateral shoots of the vine. Field .- Harvest Home. Plant and clean maize and potatoes in moist land. FEBRUARY.—In moist soil, transplant cabbage, brocoli, cauli-flowers, carrots, and parsnips. Fruit Garden .- Bud trees, pinch off tendrils and lateral shoots of the vine; cut out small or damaged grapes from the bunches of those intended for table. Field .- Prepare ground for wheat, turnips, &c., where practicable.

MARCH .- Prepare ground for onions and leeks; sow spinach, broad beans, peas, radish, lettuce, and parsley; plant cabbage, brocoli, and cauliflowers in moist soils. Farm .- Sow wheat, oats, Cape barley, and

rve, in moist land for early green food for cattle.

APRIL -- Sow peas, broad beans, endive, lettuce, and turnips; transplant celery, dress and transplant strawberry beds; prepare ground for cauliflowers and cabbage plants, and sow cress and radish for succession

crops. Field .- Sow wheat, barley, oats and peas.

MAY .- Sow cabbage, peas, broad beans, salads, turnips, and onions; earth celery, transplant cauliflowers, brocoli, and all variety of cabbages as soon as ready. Fruit Garden-Transplant and prune fruit trees; prepare and lay down layers. Field .- Finish sowing wheat and barley. Break up new land for next season.

JUNE .- This is the mid-winter month of the southern hemisphere and in our mild climate is a busy one both in garden and field. Sow turnips, carrots, peas, broad beans; transplant artichokes, leeks, onions, and chalots. Fruit Garden .- Transplant fruit trees and cuttings. Field .-

Break up new ground; sow English barley on fine soil only.

JULY.-Continue to sow carrots, turnips, onions, peas, and pot herbs; transplant cabbages, lettuces, and onions; dress strawherries; towards the latter end of the month commence planting potatoes for spring crop. Fruit Garden .- Finish transplanting, and prepare for grafting; cut vines. Field.-Keep the weeds under; continue breaking up new land.

AUGUST .- Finish planting potatoes; transplant onions; sow turnips, chillies, and peas; prepare ground for cucumbers. Fruit Garden.— Transplant evergreens, make layers, and plant cuttings; dig and manure the ground round the vines of last year. Grafting should not be con-

tinued later than this month.

SEPTENBER.—In moist soils potatoes may be planted; plant cucumbers, melons and vegetable marrows; transplant onions, chilies, and tomatoes. Tobacco may be now sown. Fruit Garden.-Transplant olives, guavas, citrons, and oranges. Field.

-Prepare ground for maize

OCTOBER.—Earth up potatoes, sow French beans, scarlet runners, cucumbers, melons, etc., transplant capsicums, tomatoes, and onions. Fruit Garden.—Examine and trim young grafts; thin fruit on peach trees. Field.—Sow maize; plant out tobacco. In this month sheep shearing begins.

NOVEMBEE.—Sow French beans, lentils, &c.; thin your melons, &c. Fruit Garden.—Examine and triple of the plant of the

den.—Remove layers of apple, pinch off tendrils, &c., of the vine. Field—Haymaking. Harvest begins at the close of this month. Thin and earth maize.

DECKMER.—Sow cauliflowers, brocoli, and celery; collect seeds as they open.

Keep the garden clean. Field—Continue to thin and earth maize.

Master of Vasse Mixed School Mr L. T. Cook £50.

These Schools are free to Pupils of any denomination where parents may be unable or unwilling to pay, but in the case of those whose circumstances may be so good as to render their gratuitous education unjust to others, it is intended as a discouragement to such class to limit the amount of instruction; usually the parents prefer paying.

The mode of instruction is according to the Irish National

School System.

In Perth there are also three private schools, 2 boys and 1

girls.

The design has been to confine the schools to secular instruction only, the Biblical Lessons of the Irish National School Society only being read, and all purely doctrinal teaching carefully avoided, leaving the more important subject of religious instruction to the parents themselves, the Ministers of the different denominations (out of the School) and to the influence of Sunday Schools.

ROMAN CATHOLIC.

Perth,—There are three Female Schools and one Infant School under the superintendence of the Sisters of Mercy, one for the education of young ladies, and one middle, the other is open gratuitously to girls of all denominations; girls and boys under seven years are admitted to the Infants' School. Attached to the Convent is also an Institution for Native Girls.

Fremantle Girls' School, under the superintendence of the Sisters of St. Joseph, who admit gratuitously girls of every denomination and boys under seven years; they have also a school exclusively for young ladies.

DUTIES ON IMPORTED ARTICLES.

The Ports of Western Australia are open for ships of all nations, with moderate Harbour and Pilotage Dues; imported articles are subject to the following Custom Duties: On Beer, Porter, Cider and Perry, bottled and in wood, 4d per gallon; Cigars and Snuff, 2s 6d per lb.; Coffee, 4s per. cwt.; spirits, Cordials or strong Waters, not being perfumed, or Medicinal spirits to be used in Medicine or perfumery only, for each and every Imperial gallon of such Spirits, Cordials, or Strong Waters of any strength not exceeding the strength of proof by Syke's Hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater strength than the strength of proof, or any quantity greater or less than a gallon, 12s per gallon; Sugar, refined and candy, 4s per cwt.; Sugar, moist and molasses, 3s per cwt; Tea, 2d per lb.; Tobacco, manufactured, 1s 9d per lb.; Tobacco, unmanufactured, 1s, Wine, bottled and in wood, 2s per gallon; on all goods, wares, and merchandise imported into this colony, and not otherwise charged with a specific duty, and not hereinafter set forth as free of duty, a duty of 7 per cent. according to the invoice value.

Goods free of Duty.--Animals living; bread and biscuit; bags and sacks; bales for wool; books printed, not being account; bottles glass and stone, imported full; bran; bullion and coin; baggage, personal of Immigrants; coals, coke, and other fuel; corn and other grain; flour and meal; implements and machinery, Agricultural; meats salted, cured, and preserved, except bacon and ham; machinery for mills, including mill stones; maps and charts; oatmeal; pumps and other apparatus for raising water; pictures, prints, and statuary; plants, seeds and bulbs; provisions or stores, Military or Naval, required for Her Majesty's service; pulse; rice; staves and hoops for casks; specimens of Natural History; uniforms and appointments, Naval, Military, and Civil, imported by officers stationed in the colony for their own use; goods especially exempted by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council.
