ECLIPSES IN 1867.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME AT PERTH.

In the year 1867 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—*March 5-6.* An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, not visible from any part of Australia.

II.—*March 20.* A partial Eclipse of the Moon. First contact with the shadow at 2h. 58m. p.m. on the south-eastern limb. Middle of the Eclipse at 4h. 31m. p.m. Last contact with the shadow at 6h. 3m. p.m. on the W. by S. limb two minutes after sunset.

III.—*March 29.* A total Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Australia.

IV.—*September 14.* A partial Eclipse of the Moon. First contact with the shadow at 6h. 39m. a.m. on the north-eastern limb, being thirty-one minutes after sunrise. Middle of the Eclipse at 8h. 8m. a.m. Last contact with the shadow at 9h. 37m. a.m. on the W.N.W. limb.

The system adopted in the Government Schools of this Colony corresponds, in its main features, with the National system of Ireland. Certain modifications, however, have been introduced, with the view of meeting the special requirements and circumstances of the Colony.

The primary object of the Government has been to secure, on the basis of religion, a sound and serviceable education for the children of the middle and lower classes, without any distinction of religious sect; and of which all can avail themselves without fear of interference with their religious convictions.

The proceedings of each day are commenced with general instruction from the Scripture Lesson Books, in which the Ministers of all religious denominations, co-operating with the Board, are invited to take part as often as they please, stipulating only that they abstain from alluding to those differences of opinion which unhappily divide the Christian Church, but no children are required to attend without their parent's sanction.

Not less than five hours of every school day are devoted to secular instruction.

The General Board have expressed their willingness to facilitate, to the utmost of their power, any arrangements Ministers of religion may wish to make for the special instruction of the children of their own denomination in the school-room, during the half hour usually set apart for reading the Scripture Lessons.

For the purpose of facilitating such special instruction, the Board are willing to supply Bibles on the application of any Minister co-operating with the Board.

The increased number of pupils attending the Government Schools affords every reason for supposing that the system meets with the general approval of the public.

ROMAN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS.

Perth.—There are two Female Schools and one Infant School, under the superintendence of the Sisters of Mercy; one for the girls of the middle class, whose parents can afford the payment of a moderate fee for their education; the other is open gratuitously to girls of all denominations. Girls and boys under seven years of age are admitted to the Infants' school. Attached to the Convent there is also an institution for native girls. Number of pupils attending the several schools—256.

Fremantle—There are three schools under the superintendence of the Sisters of St. Joseph, to which children of every denomination are admitted. Number of pupils—175.

NOTE.—Baptism being a Sacrament, there is no fee; at Churches—a service of thanksgiving—an offering in accordance with usage immemorial, is expected, which should be regulated by the circumstances of the parents.

In the burial fees custom has sanctioned a difference in the fees of the metropolitan and rural districts.

This difference, as specified in the above scale, is hereby authorised and fixed.

For general information, a list of the above charges is posted in all the Churches of the Colony.

The Ports of Western Australia are open for ships of all nations, with moderate Harbor and Pilotage Dues: imported articles are subject to the following Custom Dues: On Beer, Porter, Cyder, and Perry, bottled and in wood 4d. per gallon; Cigars and Snuff, 2s. 6d. per lb.; Coffee, 4s. per cwt.: Spirits, Cordials, or Strong Waters, not being perfumed or Medicinal Spirits to be used in Medicine or perfumery only, for each and every Imperial gallon on such Spirit, Cordials, or Strong Waters of any strength, not exceeding the strength of proof by Syke's Hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater strength than the strength of proof or any quantity greater or less than a gallon, 12s. per gallon; Sugar, refined, and Candy, 4s. per cwt.; Sugar, moist and Molasses, 3s. per cwt.; Tea, 2d. per lb.; Tobacco manufactured 1s.; Wine, bottled and in wood, 2s. per gallon; on all goods, wares, and merchandize imported into this colony, and not otherwise charged with a specific duty a duty of 7 per cent., according to the invoice value.

GOODS FREE OF DUTY.—Animals living; bread and biscuit; bags and locks, bales for wool; books printed, not being account; bottles, glass and stone, imported full; bran; bullion and coin; personal of immigrants; coals coke and other fuel; corn and other grain; flour and meal; im-

REGULATIONS FOR THE DISPOSAL OF WASTE LANDS.

THE following are the principal features of the regulations at present in force:—

Sale of country lands to first applicant, without auction, at 10s. per acre, in blocks of 40 acres and upwards.

Sale of town lands in small allotments by auction at an upset price varying from £1 to £6.

Pastoral lands are divided into three classes' A, B, and C.

Land in class A is that nearest the settled districts, and is let on annual tenure, at the rate of £1 per 1000 acres. All lands so let are open to purchase to first applicant.

Land in class B comprises all land in the settled districts not in class A, and is let on lease in blocks not exceeding 10,000 acres for terms of eight years, with preferable claim of lessee to renewal. The rent for each lease is £5 per annum, and 10s. for every 1000 acres comprised in it. The lessee has the pre-emptive right over the whole lease during the first year, and over such portion as he may choose for his homestead during the two succeeding years, after which all the land is open to general purchase.

Land in Class C lies in the newly-discovered districts to the north and east. Permission for free pasturage for one year for stock is granted to applicants, during which they are entitled to select 100,000 acres of land in one block, of which a free run is granted during three years, after which period leases are issued in blocks not exceeding 20,000 acres for eight years, on the annual payment of £5 for each lease, and 5s. per 1000 acres during the first four years of its currency, and 10s. per 1000 acres during the last four years. Lessees are entitled to a preferential claim for a renewal of such leases.

Tillage leases are granted in blocks not exceeding 320 acres for eight years on an annual payment of £5 for the lease, and 1s. for each acre comprised in it, the lessee having a pre-emptive right over any portion of the land during the currency of his lease.

Licenses to cut timber are issued on easy terms, either to a pair of sawyers per month, or per square mile to those largely engaged in the timber trade.

Mineral Lands.—Every facility is afforded to test mineral lands by annual license, on payment of 2s. per acre for the first, and 4s. for the second year; such land being satisfactorily tested, leases of ten years' duration are issued at 8s. per acre, per annum, with pre-emptive right during the currency of the lease.

Mineral lands are sold at a fixed price of £3 per acre—£1 per acre payable on application for the land, and £1 per acre in the two succeeding years.

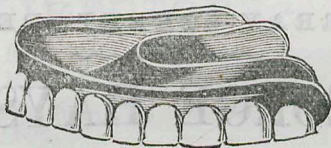
