RATES OF POSTAGE CHARGEABLE ON LETTERS, NEWSPAPERS, BOOKS, PACKETS, &c.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which the letters are posted—Under half

an ounce, one penny ; exceeding half an ounce, two pence ; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, two-pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-Towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two pence ; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, fourpence ; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted out of the colony by sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the colony, as opportunity occurs—Under half an ounce, sixpence ; exceeding half, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling ; and for every half ounce or fraction of a half ounce, sixpence additional.

The above rates must be fully prepaid by stamps, or the letters will be detained.

FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Viâ Southampton—Under half an ounce, sixpence ; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling ; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional. Viâ Brindisi—Not exceeding half an ounce, 10d. ; above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 8d. ; above one ounce and not exceeding two ounces, 3s. 4d., above two ounces and not exceeding three ounces, 5s. ; every ounce additional, 1s. 8d.

FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every half ounce or fraction of an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Viâ Marseilles or Brindisi, three pence. Newspapers posted for delivery within West Australia, or for transmission out of the colony, are exempt from postage unless forwarded to countries through the places above mentioned, except where foreign postage has to be collected.

CONDITIONS.—To be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides, and to be posted one hour before the closing of the mail. Except the name and address of the person to whom sent, there must be no other word or communication, letter, character, figure or number written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted. Newspapers sent to any Post Office, and unclaimed, must be returned to the General Post Office, Perth, at the expiration of thirty days.

BOOKS, &c.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter—Viâ Southampton for the United Kingdom—1 oz. 1d. ; 2 oz. 2d. ; 4 oz., 4d. ; 8 oz., 8d. ; and 4d. for every additional 4 ozs. Viâ Brindisi for the United Kingdom—

4 oz. 7d ; 8 oz. 1s. 2d.; and 7d. for every additional 4 ozs. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—1 oz. 1d. ; 2 ozs., 2d. ; 4 ozs., 3d. ; and 6d. for each $\frac{1}{2}$ d. or fraction of a $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 oz., 4d. ; 8 oz. 8d. ; and 8d. for each $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. or fraction of $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c. Regulations—Every book packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No book packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY—2 ounces, 1d. ; 4 oz, 2d. ; 8 oz. 4d. ; and 4d. for each $\frac{1}{2}$ lb.

The General and other Post Offices are open from 9 a m. to 4 p.m. daily, Sundays excepted.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. A statement of the hours of closing the mails is kept affixed on some exterior part of each Post Office, in order to avoid the frequent occurrence of letters being put in after the departure of the mails ; but late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, and till within a quarter of an hour of the despatch of any Ship Mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

Telegraph Department.

Telegraph Stations have been opened at the following places, viz.:—Perth (head office), Fremantle, Guildford, Newcastle, Northam, York, Pinjarrah, Bunbury, and Williams (temporary); and during the year 1873 telegraphic communication will be extended to Champion Bay, Greenough, the Irwin River, Busselton, and King George's Sound. There will then be about 780 miles of wire in operation.

The charge for transmitting and delivering Messages between the various Telegraph Stations is as follows :—

From Perth to Fremantle and *vice versa*, for 10 words, 1s. ; for every additional word, 1d. ; from Perth to all other Stations (except Albany) and *vice versa* and between

All intermediate stations, for 10 words, 1s. 6d. ; for every additional word, 1d. ; from Perth and all other stations to Albany, and *vice versá*, for ten words, 5s. ; for every additional word, 2d. No charge is made for the date, address, or signature to any message.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices, at the following rates :

For Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling ; above £5 but not exceeding £10, two shillings. For the United Kingdom, for sums not exceeding £2, one shilling ; above £2 and not exceeding £5, two shillings ; above £5 and not exceeding £7, three shillings ; above £7 and not exceeding £10, four shillings.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS' BANKS.

Post Office Savings' Banks are opened at the under-mentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working day from nine in the morning till four in the evening :—

Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Vasse, Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, and Wanerenooka. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings' Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

Education.

The following is the Report of the Inspector of Schools to June 30, 1872.

During the half-year my time has been chiefly occupied in the classification of scholars under the Standards prescribed in the Bye-laws, with a view to conduct the

examination for "results" twice in the year instead of annually, in accordance with a programme I submitted to the Central Board on the 16th December last. The schools in the Northern District have not yet been visited.

I.—NUMBER OF SCHOOLS.

The number of Elementary Government Schools in operation on the 1st January, 1872, was 60.

Since that date the schools at Dongarra and Tipperary have been closed.

New Government Schools have been established at Dumbarton and Middle Swan.

II.—ATTENDANCE OF SCHOLARS.

Appended to this Report is a Comparative Statement, showing the average attendance in the Government Schools during the last quarter of the year 1871, and for

each of the two quarters of the present year.

It will be observed, from the figures above, that in the Government Schools the total quarterly averages in 1872 have fallen below that of December, 1871. In the case of Individual Schools I have frequently heard teachers and others attribute this reduction in the attendance to one or both of the following causes:—

1. That the scale of fees fixed was beyond the means of the parents.
2. That the scholars had been withdrawn to Assisted Schools.

After carefully considering the matter, I am led to believe that the attendance in the Government Schools has been affected only to a trifling extent by either of the above-named causes.

With respect to the first, I find on calculation that the aggregate amount paid as School Fees, divided by the total average attendance, gives, in the centres of population, an average fee at the rate of ($3\frac{3}{4}$ d.) threepence three farthings per child per week; in the rural Schools, something less. By a similar calculation, the average fee paid by scholars in Assisted Schools is shown to be (2d.) twopence. In the latter schools, however, a great proportion of the scholars receive gratuitous instruction; as many as 39 per cent. are returned in one school as free scholars. I have been informed that the average fee received from the "paying" scholars is about threepence halfpenny per week. Thus it would appear that the rate of fees fixed for children in Government Schools differs but little from that paid in Assisted Schools, where, as a whole, the parents of the children are in comparatively poorer circumstances. Again, in the Government Boys' School at Perth, the District Board on revising the Fee List raised

the total amount about 100 per cent.; the average attendance was, however, higher in June, 1872, than in December, 1871, and I understand has also improved in regularity.

With regard to the alleged reason that the scholars are withdrawn to Assisted Schools, I may state that the last Returns from these schools shew that the attendance was considerably less in the June than in the March quarter.

Allowing for the closing of two schools, and considering the circumstances of those in which the attendance has fallen, I believe the difference in the averages in question to be caused mainly by change of Teachers and other interruptions in the ordinary course of school work.

As a matter very much affecting the position of Schools established since the passing of the Education Act, I have endeavoured to ascertain the percentage of scholars for whom a claim may be made under Sections 20 and 26 of the Elementary Education Act. From the returns to hand, it appears that about 63 per cent. of the average attendance have been present not less than 90 days during the half-year.

I beg to draw the attention of the Central Board to the fact of not less than twelve schools are disqualified from receiving grants under Bye-Law XIX.

III.—TEACHERS.

At the commencement of the year there appeared to be a disposition on the part of some of the Teachers receiving fixed stipends to place themselves under the Education Act as regards the conditions and amount of their remuneration. No such change has yet been voluntarily made. Several teachers are waiting until the result of the first examination is known, so as to compare the amount thus obtainable with their present yearly salary.

Some disappointment has been felt by teachers succeeding to schools where the fixed stipend was formerly £25 and the Fees, by having to transmit the latter, under the new arrangement, to the Central Board. I have explained to the teachers, whenever the matter has been mentioned to me, that the first portion of the Bye-Law XI refers only to Government Schools, where Teachers receive *fixed* salaries not exceeding £40 per annum.

The rule now in force certainly presses hard on new Teachers appointed to what were formerly known as Grant-in-aid Schools. With an average attendance of from 12 to 15 I do not think it difficult for an energetic

teacher to realize £25 per annum under the new Regulations; but unless he retains the Fees he is worse off than his predecessor. In Schools with an average attendance just named, the Teacher in a Government School is paid a trifle less than would be the case were his an Assisted School. As an instance, I may notice the last return from the Parkfield School.—

I beg to submit this matter for the consideration of the Central Board, and I would beg to suggest that in the outlying districts the Teachers appointed to old-established Grant-in-aid Schools, or to new Schools of similar character, should be allowed to retain the School Fees.

IV.—CLASSIFICATION OF SCHOLARS.

The following is a summary of the examination and classification of Scholars, under the Standards:—

Generally, I found the Scholars in the different Schools fairly arranged according to the Standards prescribed in the By-Laws. In almost every case where it was found necessary to alter the classification, it was to fix a lower Standard than the one assigned by the Teacher.

I should remark, that although in the above summary the Scholars are classified under the several Standards without reference to the subject comprised in each, the degree of proficiency attained in the various branches under the same Standard was far from equal. Reading, and Writing including Dictation, are subjects much better taught than Arithmetic. In several instances I considered it advisable to make a compromise, by recording a lower Standard in Writing than that actually attained, and a

corresponding higher mark for Arithmetic, so that a larger share of attention might be devoted to the neglected subject, as also to impress on the Teacher the necessity of a thorough knowledge in each subject to ensure successful passes.

FISHERIES IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Fisheries are established at Port Gregory, Fremantle, King George's Sound, and on the North-west Coast, which, inclusive of the pearl shell fishery, employ 26 ships, and 25 boats. During the year 1871 at these stations 119 tuns of oil, 150 tons shell, and 49 tons of preserved fish were secured, of the approximated value of £36,493.

USEFUL HINTS.

CURE FOR APPLE BLIGHT.

Four oz. sulphur, two oz. lime, and one gallon of water, boiled together for fifteen or twenty minutes, and applied

to American blight as follows, will be found useful:—The roots of the tree should be laid bare and the mixture sprinkled over them at a temperature of 130 deg. Fahrenheit. A little sulphur may be dusted upon them before covering up. It is also worthy of trial as a mixture for curing scab in sheep.

METHOD OF COVERING A BANK OF EARTH WITH GRASS.

To cover a steep bank quickly with grass the following method is recommended by a German horticultural association. For each square rod to be planted, take half a pound of lawn grass seed, and mix it intimately and thoroughly with about six square feet of good dry garden earth and loam. This is placed in a tub, and to it liquid manure, diluted with about two-thirds of water, is added, and well stirred in, so as to bring the whole to the consistency of mortar. The slope is to be cleaned off and made perfectly smooth, and then well watered, after which the paste just mentioned is to be applied with a trowel, and made as even and thin as possible. Should it crack by exposure to the air, it is to be again watered and smoothed up day by day, until the grass makes it appearance, which will be in eight or fourteen days, and the whole declivity will soon be a close carpet of green.

CURE OF SNAKE-BITE.

The danger of snake-bite is such an ever-present one during the hot months of the year, especially to thoughtless children and men engaged in bush-work or farming, that we repeat Professor Halford's instructions, his system of ammoniacal injection having proved very successful:—“Cut freely after lifting the skin well up from the vein; expose half an inch of the vein. The veins at the bend of the elbow must not be chosen, but those on the thumb-side of the forearm from the back of the hand, midway between the wrist and the elbow, or on the inner side of the leg, between the ankle and knee. Don't spill the ammonia, as the caustic alkali destroys the tissues upon which it is spilt, producing sores and sloughs. Greater confidence will lead to improved practice, but 30 drops at least of the liquid ammoniæ B. P., sp. gr. .959, should be injected, and repeated as often as necessary in severe cases. It may not be always found that a person with sufficient nerve is near at hand, or one with intelligence enough to follow the above instructions; and a doctor may

not be within reach. In such cases the following course is recommended as being within the power of any one to carry out:—Immediately on being bitten, tie or get tied on a ligature between the wound and the heart; suck the wound at once, then scarify freely, and give plenty of whiskey or brandy. Also apply ammonia to the wound, and give it by the mouth frequently, but not in too strong doses to burn the gullet.”

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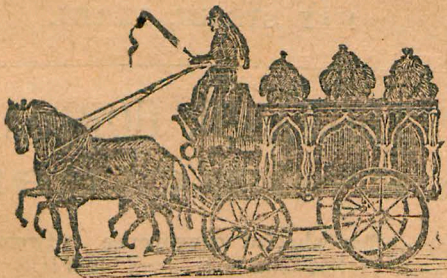


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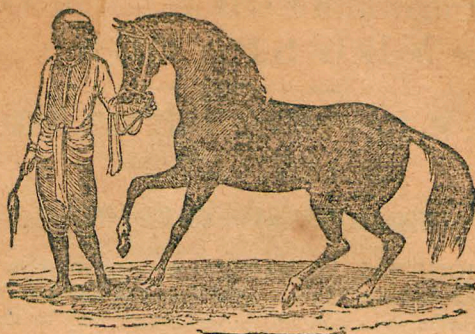
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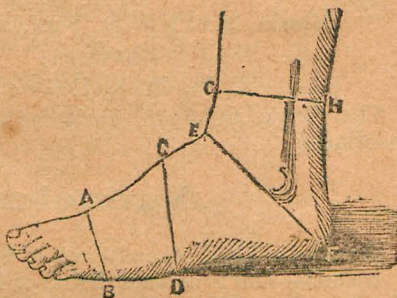
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
