MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District

Post Offices, at the following rates:-

For Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5 but not exceeding £10, two shillings. For the United Kingdom, for sums not exceeding £2, one shilling; above £2 and not exceeding £5, two shillings; above £5 and not exceeding £7, three shillings; above £7 and not exceeding £10, four shillings.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Post Office Savings Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working-day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—

The offices marked thus * will be connected by Telegraph during the current year. There will then be nearly 800 miles of telegraph in operation in the colony, including a direct line from King George's Sound to Champion Bay —a distance of about 540 miles.

Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, and Wanerenooka. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

TELEGRAPH MESSAGES.

The charge for transmitting and delivering Messages between the various Telegraph Stations is as follows:—

For messages between any two Stations in Western Australia, a uniform rate of 1s. for the first ten words, and 1d. for each additional word, is charged. Press Messages are transmitted at one-fourth of the above rate. No charge is made for the date, address, or signature to any message. Messages are delivered free of charge within one mile of the office; over that distance mileage at the rate of 6d. per mile is chargeable. Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables. On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after hours, and on Sundays, double the ordinary rate will be required upon all messages.

RATES OF POSTAGE CHARGEABLE ON LETTERS, NEWSPAPERS, BOOKS, PACKETS, &c.

Town Letters.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which the leters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding half an ounce, two-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, two-pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two-pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not

exceeding one ounce, four-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

Ship Letters.—On letters transmitted out of the colony by sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the colony—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every half ounce, or fraction of a half ounce, sixpence additional.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Viâ Southampton—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional. Viâ Brindisi—Not exceeding half an ounce, 9d.; above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 6d.; above one ounce, and not exceeding 1½ ounce, 2s. 3d.; and for every additional ½oz. or fraction thereof, 9d.

LETTERS FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every half ounce or fraction of half an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Viâ Brindisi, three pence. Newspapers posted for delivery within Western Australia, or for transmission out of the colony, are exempt from postage unless forwarded to countries through the United Kingdom, where foreign postage has to be collected. Nothing but the address must be written upon Newspapers under any circumstances. The postage on

Newspapers to the Mauritius is 1d.

Books, &c.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter.—Viâ Southampton for the United Kingdom—1 ounce, 1d.; 2 ounces, 2d.; 4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces 8d.; and 4d. for every additional four ounces. Viâ Brindisi for the United Kingdom—4 ounces, 7d.; 8 ounces, 1s. 2d.; and 7d. for every additional four ounces. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—1 ounce, 1d.; 2 ounces, 2d.; 4 ounces, 3d.; and 6d. for each ½lb. or fraction of a ½lb. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 8d. for each ½lb. or fraction of a ½lb. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c. Regulations—Every book packet or parcel of any kind

must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication, under a penalty of new less than £5.

Books and Parcels Transmitted within the Colony—2 ounces, 1d.; 4 ounces, 2d.; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each 4oz.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late letters are received till within five minutes of the dispatch of Inland Mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

GOODS FREE OF DUTY.

Animals, living; baggage, personal, of immigrants; bags and sacks; bales for wool; blasting powder; books, printed, not being account; bottles, glass and stone, imported full; brewery and distillery plant; bullion and coin; chloride of lime; churns; coals, coke, and other fuel; cotton waste; disinfecting fluid; drainage pipes; tiles; earth closets and patent water closets; emery cloth; filters; fire engines and hose; flour; forges; forge backs; gas pipes; machinery; implements for whaling purposes; implements, agricultural, inclusive of ploughs, harrows, hay rakes, riddles and sieves; iron, material specially imported for the construction of bridges, wharves, jetties, or patent slips, rod, bolt, bar, hoop, pig, black sheet, plates for malt

kilns, lamp posts, plates, rivets, bolts, nuts, screws, and casting for ships; india-rubber, sheet, for engine packing; machinery for agricultural purposes, for boring, brick and tile making, planing, punching, sawing, shearing, turning, quartz crushing, coffee roasting, manufacture of boots and shoes, for mills and looms, for steam vessels, machine saws, for preserving or boiling down meat or fish, for sugar manufacture, for mining purposes; maps and charts; mill stones; pictures; prints; statuary; plants; seeds and bulbs; printing machinery, presses, type, materials, printing ink; provisions and stores, Military and Naval, required for Her Majesty's Service; pumps and other apparatus for raising water; railway plant, all material for construction of railways, tramways, and Electric telegraphs; sewing machines; specimens of Natural History; staves and hoops for casks; steam engines; uniforms and appointments, Naval, Military, and Civil, imported by officers stationed in the colony for their own use; water pipes, not otherwise described, all materials specially imported for constructing waterworks; weigh bridges for carts; wire for fencing; wire cloth for quartz crushing machinery.

PORT REGULATIONS.

Under the provisions contained in the "Shipping and Pilotage Consolidation Ordinance, 1855," His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to direct that the following Rules and Regulations be observed, and that any person convicted of a breach thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5. All former rules and regulations issued under this Ordinance are hereby repealed:—

PILOTAGE.

1. At any port in Western Australia where a Pilot is provided, the payment of pilotage in accordance with the regulated scale shall be compulsory on all Masters of vessels, with the exceptions of those below mentioned.

2. At the Port of Fremantle it shall not be necessary for Masters of vessels to employ an outward Pilot; but whenever such Pilot is required his services must be paid for.

3. The masters of all vessels bonû fide engaged in the Coasting Trade of the colony will be exempted from Pilotage Charges if, from the time of their sighting any port at which a Pilot is provided until their anchors are dropped in such port, they hoist at the main-mast head a flag (not less than 9 feet 6 inches in size) with a black ball in the centre. Such flag shall be recognised as the Exemption Flag.

4. The Masters of vessels bond fide owned in the colony will be required to pay an annual sum of £5 in full of all

Pilotage Charges.

5. The Master of every vessel (not being a coaster) bond fide built and owned or bond fide owned in the colony, must possess a Certificate of Exemption from the Local

^{*}Note.—The expense of this Department is borne equally by the Imperial and Local Governments,

Poard of this colony. A charge of £2 10s. will be made for such Certificate.

6. Masters of vessels possessing an Exemption Certificate will render themselves liable to a fine equal to pilotage if they fail to fly the "Exemption Flag" in the manner

painted out in Regulation No. 3.

7. Masters of bond fide Coasters who do not fly the "Exemption Flag," in the manner pointed out in Regulation No. 3, will render themselves liable to a fine not exceeding £5.

LIGHT DUES.

8. All vessels (except vessels of War and vessels chartered by Her Majesty) arriving from beyond seas shall be chargeable with Light Dues at all ports in Western Australia where lights are provided, and at the rate of 2d. per ton, inwards and outwards, on their registered tonnage,—

to be ascertained according to English rule.

9. The Master of any vessel who has paid light dues at any one port in Western Australia, and who may desire to visit other ports in the colony for the purpose of loading or unloading thereat, will be furnished with a Certificate from the Collector of Customs, which Certificate shall free him from Light Dues at any other port in Western Australia for a period of three months from the date thereof, provided no voyage be made to any place outside the colony within such three months.

10. The Masters of vessels bond fide engaged in the Coasting Trade of the colony may agree with the Collector of Customs at Fremantle to compound the payment of Light Dues by one annual payment in accordance with the

The Collector of Customs shall in every case furnish the Master with a Certificate that the vessel named therein is free from payment of Light Dues till the 31st day of December then next ensuing, and no longer.

Applicants prior to 30th June in any year will be required to pay the full rates; those subsequent to that date will only be required to pay one moiety.

Masters of Coasters not availing themselves of this

privilege will be required to pay Light Dues at the rate of two-pence per ton inwards and outwards.

TONNAGE DUES.

11. The masters of all vessels arriving from beyond seas, with eargo beyond one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on their registered tonnage.

12.—The masters of all vessels arriving from beyond seas, with cargo less than one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d per ton on the

cargo landed.

13. The Masters of all vessels clearing out for parts beyond seas, with cargo beyond one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on their registered tonnage.

14. The Masters of all vessels clearing out for parts beyond seas, with eargo less than one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on

the cargo taken away.

15. The following vessels will be exempt from Tonnage Dues:—

(1.) All vessels bond fide engaged in the Coasting Trade of this colony.

(II.) All vessels of War and all vessels chartered by Her Majesty.

(III.) All vessels in ballast.

(iv.) All vessels in distress, and in such case seeking

repair or provisions.

16. The Master of any vessel who has paid Tonnage Dues at any one port in Western Australia, and who may desire to visit other ports in the colony, for the purpose of loading or unloading thereat, will be furnished with a Certificate by the Collector of Customs, which Certificate

shall free him from payment of Tonnage Dues at any other port in Western Australia for a period of three months from the date thereof, provided no voyage be made to any place outside the colony within such three months.

Diocesan Synod — The governing body of the Church of England in Western Australia is the Synod, established in 1872, and consists of the Bishop, all licensed clergymen, and lay communicant representatives elected by the congregations; no act being valid unless it carries the consent of the three orders. The Synod must meet once at least in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place in every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, by which in the first instance nominations are made, and the appointments ultimately confirmed by the Bishop. BRIEF CHRONICLE

OF

OCCURRENCES AND EVENTS,

FROM OCTOBER, 1872, TO SEPTEMBER, 1873.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1872.

OCTOBER.—The official report of the Government Geologist published, which recommends prospecting for gold in several localities in this colony....The Bishop of Perth left for Sydney to be present at the Church Conference..., Shock of earthquake experienced at Champion Bay on the 6th instant....A new volunteer corps organised at Fremantle....A large number of horses sent to Calcutta by Mr. Donald Macpherson...Mrs. Pratt, Mr. H. Camfield, Mrs. Walter Jones, Mrs. Lowe, and Mr. Fred. Peel, old colonists, died....Revenue of the colony for the quarter ended 30th September, £26,107 13s. 9d.; Expendituce, £23,570 1s. 8d...Value of Imports for the year ended 30th September, £213,396, Exports, £228,807.....Gold struck by the Rockingham Bay Mining Company on the Serpentine.

NOVEMBER.—A Central Committee formed for the purpose of obtaining exhibits for the Intercolonial Exhibition at Sydney....Intelligence received of the preparation of the three exploring parties—one from Victoria and two from South Australia—to this colony, under the command, respectively, of Mr. Ernest Giles, Mr. Gosse, and Major Warburton....Red rust again appears in the crops....Mr. Edward Newman, M.L.C., killed by a fall from his horse, at Stake Hill, on the 25th inst....The iron barque Hokitika, bound from Newcastle, N.S.W., to Mauritius, wrecked on a sunken rock off Cape Leuwin....The steamer Xantho, in a sinking condition, beached

at Port Gregory....A young man named Ledger murdered by natives at Exmouth Gulf....The Tasmanian whaleship Fanny Nicholson driven ashore during a gale at King George's Sound....Mr. W. L. Brockman, M.L.C., the Rev. Charles Harper, and Mrs. James Gallop, old

colonists, died.

DECEMBER.—The tender of Mr. Major, C.E., Melbourne, for surveying a line of railway from Geraldton to Northampton, and from Perth to York, accepted...Mr. W. E. Marmion elected member of the Legislative Council for the district of Fremantle, in the room of Mr. Newman, deceased; and Mr. Walter Padbury for the district of the Swan, in the room of Mr. W. L. Brockman, deceased...The Hon. F. P. Barlee (Colonial Secretary) left Perth on the 21st instant, to attend the Australasian Conference at Sydney and act as Commissioner at the Intercolonial Exhibition...The line of telegraph between Perth and King George's Sound opened on the 28th...A copper mine discovered near Roebourne...The machinery and plant for the Melbourne and Champion Bay Lead Mining Company arrives.

1873.

JANUARY.—The steam dredge employed in removing sandbanks at the mouth of the river Swan....The Jarrahdale Company's railway to Rockingham opened....A despatch received by Governor Weld from Earl Kimberley, remitting four of the five years' penal servitude passed on Mr. L. C. Burges, jun., for the manslaughter of a native....Shocks of earthquake felt at Williams River and on the North-west coast....The second session of the Diocesan Synod opened on the 29th...The Twinkling Star stranded at Garden Island....A petition for the exoneration and release of Mr. L. C. Burges, jun., convicted of manslaughter of a native, presented to His Excellency the Governor on the 31st.

FEBRÜARY.—Another concert given by the Minstrels of the West for raising funds for the purchase of a grand piano for the Town Hall....Mr. James Drummond, M.L.C.

died at Toodyay on the 8th....Whooping cough very prevalent in Perth and Fremantle, and many fatal cases, principally among children, occur....Mr. William Smith and Mrs. Pomeroy, old settlers, died....A Lodge of the Order of Good Templars established in Perth on the 26th.

MARCH.-Mr. C. E. Dempster elected member of the Legislative Council, in the room of Mr. James Drummond, deceased, on the 4th inst.... The Hon. H. H. Hocking, Attorney General of the colony, arrived from England. A Seed-advance Fund, for the assistance of needy farmers of the district, organised by the Greenough Agricultural Society ... The vintage season very prolific throughout the colony The erection of lighthouses at Champion Bay, Busselton, and Bunbury commenced ... A large pearl of beautiful lustre, estimated to be worth £2,500, found near Nickol Bay by Captain Black....Intelligence received of the recovery of the schooner Gift, at Macassar, supposed to have been burnt by Malays The Sea Spray wrecked on the North-west coast, and twentythree lives lost ... Accounts received of lectures delivered at Madras by Mr. Helmich (Postmaster General) on Western Australia.

APRIL.—Intelligence received of the contemplated despatch of fifty armed pensioners from England to reinforce the troops in this colony....About sixty tons of copper ore raised from a copper mine near Roebourne....According to a published return the amount held by the trustees of the Post Office Savings Banks on December 31, 1872, was £15,583 14s. 2d., being an increase of £1,367 0s. 11d. within the year, and of over £2,000 since the end of 1870....Mr. Robert King, Mrs. John Hardey, Mr. Seymour Meares, Mrs. Trigg, Lady Richardson-Bunbury, and Mrs. Francis Whitfield, colonists of long standing, died....The revenue of the colony for the quarter ended 31st March amounted to £32,645 1s. 2d.; expenditure for the same period, £27,009 10s. 1d.The survey of the line of railway from Geraldton to the mines commenced.

MAY .- Amendments made in the Land Regulations,

modifying the clauses in reference to mineral lands, and extending land grants to Volunteers and Enrolled Pensioners.... A complete geodetic survey of the country to the eastward of the settled districts proposed to be made by the Surveyor General.... A total eclipse of the moon occurred on the 5th A grand review of the whole of the troops—Pensioners and Volunteers—at Fremantle on the 24th, the anniversary of Her Majesty's birthday............ According to the Blue Book for 1872 the number of convicts of all grades in the colony was 1,691, of whom 17 were invalids in hospital and 22 were lunatic, only 571 being employed on the public works.... A silver cup, presented by Governor Weld, contested for at the Perth rifle butts and won by Captain B. Hamilton-Burke, Staff Officer of Pensioners.

JUNE.—The second session of the Legislative Council assembled for the despatch of public business on the 23rd. ... The P. O. Co.'s steamship Baroda placed in quarantine with a case of small-pox on board The grand concert piano for the Town Hall, which cost about £180, arrived from London A large number of sections for lead mining taken up in the Champion Bay district. A Bushman's Home proposed to be established in Perth ... Mr. David Strickland, of the Blackwood River. awarded the first prize for wheat at the Sydney Intercolonial Exhibition The forty-fourth anniversary of the foundation of the colony celebrated on the 2nd by a Regatta on Perth Water A despatch from the Earl of Kimberley received by the Government intimating to the petitioners re Mr. L. C. Burges, jun's., case, that no further commutation can be made of the sentence passed upon him ... The ship Belleisle, from King George's Sound to Newcastle, N S.W., foundered off Sydney Mr. K. Brown leaves Perth for Melbourne with his racehorses Victorian and Hinda, intended to compete for the Melbourne Champion Challenge Cup.,, A new Chamber of Commerce organised at Fremantle ... The price of mineral lands reduced to £3 per acre.... An address presented to the Hon. F. P. Barlee on his return from Sydney, on the 18th instant, followed by a banquet and a a ball in the Town Hall....A memorial plate placed in a niche in the western façade of the tower of the Town Hall....The total expenditure incurred by Great Britain on account of Western Australia for the year 1872 amounted to £88,524 12s. 6d.; of which sum £3,394 9s. 5d. was required for supplies to H.M. ships on the station....A good deal of attention directed to sericulture....The first lamp-posts erected in the city placed in Hay and Howick Streets....The barque Caroline Hutchings left for London with pearl shells valued at £32,000.

JULY.-Samples of quartz sent to Melbourne for assay yielded 14 dwts. of gold to the ton Sugar-growing in the colony strongly recommended by Mr. W. Padbury, who brought with him several choice kinds of cane and the Planter's Friend from New South Wales.... An action for bribery at the Greenough Election of 1872 brought by Mr. H. Gray against Mr. Geo. Shenton, resulting in the unseating of Mr. Shenton ... A bill to raise a loan of £100,000 for public works passed by the Legislative Council....The revenue of the colony for the quarter ended 30th June amounted to £29,123 5s 2d.: expenditure for the same period, £28,855 7s. 6d....£1,500 voted by the Legislative Council for gold prospecting purposes, purchase of stampers, for quartz-crushing, and for boring apparatus....Dr. Rason killed by a fall from his carriage, at York, on the 15th The report of the Harbor Improvement Board recommended by the Legislative Council to be referred for the opinion of engineers in Victoria and South Australia.... A line of railway proposed in the Legislative Council to be constructed between Perth and Fremantle ... Mr. H. Blechynden and Mrs. James Read, old colonists, died.

AUGUST.—Mr. Charles Crowther elected member of the Legislative Council for the Greeuough district, in the room of Mr. Shenton, unseated....The second session of the Legislative Council prorogued on the 2nd instant to the 20th November....A specimen of iron manufactured by Mr. H. E. Victor from ore obtained near Coates pronounced to be equal to No. 1 iron of commerce. Several Angora goats and Merino sheep introduced from South Australia by Mr. Padbury.... A Roman Catholic Retormatory about to be erected at Subiago, in the suburbs of Perth, towards which Bishop Griver subscribes £500.... Shipments of Jarrah proposed to be made to Port Darwin.... A proposal made by Mr. Geo. Ingleton to pave the pathways of the city with composition, patented by Messrs. G. S. Brown & Co., of Melbourne.... A naval officer arrives to assist Lieut. Archdeacon in coast surveys.... Chief Justice Burt left the colony for Europe on leave of absence.

SEPTEMBER .- His Excellency the Governor, accompanied by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, makes a tour to the Champion Bay district ... H.M.S. Pearl, Captain Goodenough, arrived from the Cape of Good Hope on the 7th, and left for Wellington, N.Z., on the 12th, instant. ... A heavy North-west gale occurs at Fremantle on the 7th instant, stranding the Robert Morrison, and driving ashore several smaller craft.... Numbers of residents at Perth and Fremantle proceed to the pearling grounds at Shark's Bay, where immense quantities of valuable pearls continue to be found Further discoveries of gold in quartz made at the Donnelly River and in the Vasse district, causing considerable excitement.... Page 59—Add to Orphanages Bishop Hale's Native and Halfcaste Institution. The orphanage is upon the grounds of Bishop's House, and was erected entirely at the expense of the Bishop of Perth. The larger number of the present inmates were originally maintained at the Native Institution at Albany, which was broken up shortly after the death of Mr. Camfield; and in accomplishment of His Lordship's first and greatest object, an institution in a central part of the colony is thus established, available for the reception of half-caste and native children, and which is, moreover, immediately under the Bishop's surveillance. Towards the support of this valuable public institution,—which would assuredly have collapsed had not His Lordship taken upon himself, at considerable personal expense and self-denial, to foster and give it the careful attention it required at a very critical period—the Government make a small daily allowance for each child. A good deal of the cost of the up-keep of the establishment-much more than the general public are aware of-is borne by the private purse of Bishop Hale. A considerable sum is annually raised by subscriptions; but for the present requirements of the institution, and more especially with a view to increasing its usefulness, appeals are made for still further liberality and public co-operation. The Superintendent of the Orphanage is Miss Sheperd. The number of the inmates is 19.

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
