ECLIPSES IN 1871.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME AT PERTH:

In the year 1871 there will be two Eclipses of the SUN and two of the MOON, all visible in Australia.

I. *January 7.*—A partial Eclipse of the MOON, to the extent of nearly seven-tenths of her diameter (0.688.) The first contact with the shadow will be at 3h. 29m. a.m., on the MOON's south-eastern limb, and the last contact with the shadow at 6h. 29m. a.m. on the south-western limb, the middle of the Eclipse being at one minute before 5 o'clock.

II. *June 17.*—An annular Eclipse of the SUN, beginning on the Earth generally at 11h. 37m. p.m. mean time at Greenwich, in lat. 22deg. 16min. South, long. 105deg. 56min. East, and ending on the Earth generally at 5h. 32min. a.m. mean time at Greenwich, on the 18th, in lat. 8deg. 51min. South, long. 176deg. 43min. West. The line of central Eclipse will pass along the whole of the North-West Coast of Australia.

III. *July 2.*—A partial Eclipse of the MOON, to the extent of more than one quarter of her diameter (0.343.) The first contact with the shadow will be at 8h. 9m. p.m. on the MOON's north-eastern limb, and the last contact with the shadow at 10h. 12m. p.m. on the north-western limb, the middle of the Eclipse being at ten minutes past 9 o'clock.

IV. *December 12.*—A total Eclipse of the SUN, visible as such from the northern parts of Australia, but at Perth the SUN only partially eclipsed. Begins on the Earth generally at 1h. 26m. mean time at Greenwich, in lat 15deg. 40min. North, long. 73deg. 43min. East, and ends on the Earth generally at 6h. 41min. a.m. mean time at Greenwich, in lat. 3deg. South, long. 169deg. 29min. East.

DIRECTIONS FOR THE GARDEN, ETC.

Prepare ground for onions; plant out cauliflowers, brocoli, cabbage, &c.; sow peas, beans, carrots, spinach, lettuce, cress, and endive for early crops; sow early stone turnips; sow wheat and Cape barley; examine fruit trees, removing all decayed limbs and suckers; keep potatoe crop clean.

Continue the garden operations of last month; sow cress, radish and lettuce for succession crop; pinch and prune vines; finish sowing barley; prepare the ground for the oat crop; be careful to leave sufficient furrows to carry off the water. Let the rams and ewes be driven in the same flock.

FROM OCTOBER, 1869, TO SEPTEMBER, 1870,

[Under the above head the most remarkable events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1869.

OCTOBER.—Congratulatory addresses from the country districts presented to Governor Weld, who arrived in the colony the month previous.....The *Swan* wrecked at the Irwin.....Gold found at Dandalup.....MacLaren, Baker, and Garner executed at Perth Prison on the 14th instant.....A deputation waits upon the Governor, urging the necessity for harbour improvements, &c.

NOVEMBER.—The annual meeting of the York Agricultural Society honored with Governor Weld's presence..... His Excellency makes a tour through the Eastern Districts, and to Champion Bay.

DECEMBER.—A Band of Hope Society inaugurated at Fremantle.....Mr. Doyne, C.E., arrives on the 23rd instant, to report on the practicability of harbour improvements, and to give estimates on the construction of railways.

1870.

JANUARY.—Report of discovery of Gold at the BlackwoodMr. W. H. Knight returns to Perth after an unsuccessful search for gold to the eastward of Champion Bay.....New line of road between Victoria Plains and the Irwin opened by Mr. Assistant-Surveyor Forrest..... Medical Board appointed by the Governor.....A piece of silver testimonial plate presented to Mr. W. C. Clifton by the members of the Coöperative Society at Albany..... Bounties to Volunteers enrolled in the colony suggested... ..His Excellency the Governor makes a tour to the

Southern districts.....Bush-fires unusually frequent throughout the colony..... The W. A. Races took place on the 23rd and 24th instant.

FEBRUARY.—A scheme proposed by the Toodyay Agricultural Society for forming a horse-breeding establishment to supply the Indian market, at Champion Bay.....The Inland Money Order system again agitated.....A grand stand proposed to be erected on the Perth racecourse..... The Government announce readiness to coöperate in subsidising the West Coast Anglo-Australian Telegraph scheme to Java Head or Ceylon.....A general census of the whole colony decided to be taken on the 31st March... ..A shipment of timber sent by the *Nightingale* to Dunedin, New Zealand, for the construction of wharves there.....Mr. Doyne's report on harbour improvements and the Bar at the mouth of the Swan published..... Intelligence received of the promotion of the Very Rev. Martin Griver to be Roman Catholic Bishop of Tloa, and Bishop Administrator of this Diocese.....The flying squadron arrives at Melbourne.

MARCH.—The Fremantle company of Rifle Volunteers disbanded.....The Perth old town clock removed to the Guildford Court-house.....New river steamboat launched by Mr. W. Green.....The shipping port of Fremantle proposed by Mr. Doyne to be established by building wharves at Mangles' Bay.....Tenders called for the re-erection of Mandurah Church on a plot of ground given by Mrs. H. H. Hall.....Burglary at the Perth Police Court.....Tenders accepted for the erection of a police station at Greenough and Dongarra.....Small-pox attacks Mr. Hooley's family at Nickol Bay, but without any fatal results.....An athletic club proposed to be formed in Perth.....Great distress and loss experienced in the Northern and Eastern districts from the want of water.....Considerable agitation on the Education Question, and on a grant to Roman Catholics.....Mr. Forrest leaves with his Expedition to Eucla on the 30thBishop Griver leaves Perth for Albany, *en route* to Rome, on the 31st March.

APRIL.—New Wesley Church opened in Perth on the

10th instant.....Heavy tropical shower fell at Victoria Plains.....Grand regatta at Perth on the 18th instant—Easter Monday—and the Weld Challenge Cup raced for on the 23rd instant.....An intimation received from the Secretary of State to the effect that in the event of the discovery of gold in the colony the Government waives all right to minerals on Crown lands. The Weld Rifle Challenge Cup won by Private Geo. Inkpen at the Perth butts on the 19th instant.....St. John's Church, Fremantle, attempted to be destroyed by fire on the 20th instant.....A fire brigade proposed to be established at Fremantle.

MAY.—Slate quarries at Kelmscott opened by the Government, and several fine slabs forwarded to Perth.....Paving of Perth streets with slate suggested.....Two men at the Blackwood killed by burning charcoal in a close tent in which they were sleeping.....The Town Hall clock illuminated for the first time on the 30th inst.

JUNE.—The new Constitution Act passed third reading in the Legislative Council, and assented to by the Governor on the 1st inst.....The Town Hall opened the same day with grand display, a luncheon being afterwards given in the large room, and His Excellency the Governor delivered his inaugural address, and formally handed over the building to the City Council.....Heavy winter rains set in.....The remaining shares—614—of the Western Australian Bank disposed of at from £25 upwards.....A portion of the area at the rear of the Town Hall decided to be converted into a temporary Legislative Council Chamber... ..The city flag first hoisted on the Town Hall tower flagstaff on the 1st instant.....A Volunteer Cavalry Corps established in Perth.....A Tea-meeting, got up by Messrs. Henry Gray and Ackrill, at which nearly 1000 persons were present, given in the Town Hall on the 6th instant.....Mr. G. Simpson, representing the Ballarat Timber Company, proceeds to the Vasse to establish timber cutting works, &c.....A Benevolent Fund, for the relief of distressed women and children, and the protection of female servants out of employ, started by Archdeacon Brown.....Professor Hume, mesmerist and

electro-biologist, visits the colony.....Advices received of the sale of pearl shells from this colony in London at £200 a ton.....St. Matthew's Church, Guildford, enlarged.....The steam dredge fitted at North Fremantle.. ..Bishop Hale intimates his intention of resigning his bishopric; but at the request of a large deputation his Lordship withdrew.....Prospectus of the Electro-Magnetic Company published.....Another proposal made by Bishop Hale to make further efforts to ameliorate the condition of the aborigines and half-caste children. A good deal of attention is given to the subject, and Mr. W. L. Brockman makes the munificent donation of £100 towards the object.

JULY.—Postage on newspapers posted in the colony abolished, 1st instant.....Carter's soap and artificial manure manufactory opened at North Fremantle.....The census of the colony to the 31st March published. The number of the population was found to be 24,785—showing an increase of 9,948 since the previous census, taken in 1859.....Intelligence received of the safe arrival of Forrest's Expedition at Eucla.....Writs for the election of members to serve in the new Legislative Council issued on the 19th instant.....A Deposit Agency in connection with the W. A. Bank established at Fremantle.

AUGUST.—Mr. Barlee leaves for Albany, on an official visit to South Australia and Victoria.....Messrs. Utton and Co.'s rope factory opened at Bunbury, 1st inst.....Grand concert at the Town Hall, 29th instant.....Mr. Forrest, with his Expedition, reaches Adelaide, 29th inst.

SEPTEMBER.—Exhibition and Bazaar at the Town Hall opened on the 6th instant.....Snow-storm at Kojonup, 5th instant.....Mr. Brown, Government geologist, arrives.....Mr. E. Gray reports the discovery of a bed of coal at Champion Bay.....Lighthouse erected at Bunbury... ..Considerable activity in the whaling enterprise.....Mr. Surveyor Cowle and Capt. EXTENT, CLIMATE, AND PRODUCTIONS OF WEST AUSTRALIA.



THE colony of West Australia, as defined by Her Majesty's Commission, includes all that portion of New Holland situated to the westward of 129 degrees East longitude; its greatest length is therefore 1,280 miles from North to South, and 800 miles from East to West. The City of Perth is situated in 32 degrees south latitude, and 115 degrees 46 minutes 43 seconds east longitude. With so extensive a coast line on the Indian Ocean, and with a westerly aspect, from which the prevailing winds blow, there are abundant rains during the tillage season, and the farmer is relieved from that anxiety about his crops which is felt in other parts of Australia by drought. The heat of summer is moderated by alternate land and sea breezes. The Darling and Roe ranges of hills, rising to the height of 1,500 to 2,000 feet above the sea level, lie parallel to the western coast, at ten to twenty-five miles from it, and are dotted with numerous thriving farms amongst its hills and valleys. These ranges are twenty to fifty miles across, and on their eastern side the undulating grassy lands are situated which constitute the principal sheep and cattle runs.

The colony possesses one of the most healthy climates in the world. The mortality since its occupation has not averaged one per cent. No portion of the colony is better adapted to the British constitution. The mean of the barometer is about 30 inches, and of the thermometer about 63 degrees. In general salubrity of climate, West Australia possesses a marked superiority over any of the Australian colonies. It is subject to no extremes of heat or cold. Cattle have been seldom known to die from lack of water, and in the very driest weather there is a sufficient supply of food for them. Exposure to weather, by night or day, appears to produce no ill effects on the constitution of the colonists, many of whom, for months together, rarely sleep in any but the most temporary dwellings. Snow is never seen; ice only in the depth of winter, and then only in the very early morning.

Owing to the superior attractions of the gold-fields discovered in neighbouring colonies, the tide of emigration from England has hitherto swept past the shores of West Australia, and but little is known abroad of its actual capabilities and resources.

Energy and capital alone are required to raise West Australia to a foremost position. There is room for thousands of enterprising settlers. Millions of acres of good sheep country are lying vacant. Forests of 'Jarrah' or mahogany, which effectually resists the 'white ant' or 'Teredo Navalis,' said to be the finest timber in the world, offer a splendid field for capital, and every inducement is held out by Government. License fee merely nominal—labour cheap and plentiful. An abundance of sandalwood, in which a profitable export trade is carried on with Singapore and China. Rich lodes of copper ore, covering an area of some 5000 square miles, visible in some places for several miles along the surface, eight feet in width, crowded together in such close proximity that it is difficult to find a square mile without indications sufficient to establish workings. Lead mines, giving 86 per cent. of pure lead. Fish abounds on the coast and in the estuaries.

Although the territorial extent of the country is great, the population is still extremely limited. There is room for many thousands of enterprising settlers. Several gentlemen of capital from South Australia, finding the grazing country so much superior to what they had imagined, have within the last few years become denizens of West Australia, and have taken up sheep runs in the Southern districts, thus utilising lands which our own settlers have hitherto allowed to remain unproductive. Others have taken their flocks northward, to the Nickol Bay country. Between Roebuck Bay and Nickol Bay, nearly two millions of acres of first-class pastoral land have been recently discovered. The grasses here have a peculiarly succulent character, and are found to remain nutritious even after a drought of eighteen months.

TIMBER AND WOODS.—The principal timber-trees of this colony are of the Eucalyptus or Myrtle family. Amongst

the most generally useful of them is that commonly called manogany, and by the natives Jarrah. Of this wood it was stated some years ago by the late Admiral Sir Jas. Stirling, before a committee of the House of Commons, that there is sufficient to build twenty British navies. None of the neighbouring Colonies possess timber of a similar character to the jarrah, or endowed with equally valuable properties. If cut at the proper season, *when the sap is down* (a precaution too little attended to), it will be found to be the most enduring of all woods. On this condition it defies decay; time, weather, water, the white ant, and the sea worm have no effect upon it. Specimens were forwarded to the Melbourne Exhibition of portions of wood which had been nearly thirty years partly under water and partly out. Others had been used as posts, and for the same period buried in the sand, where the white ant in a few weeks destroys every other kind of wood. For this peculiar property the jarrah is much sought after for railway sleepers and telegraph posts in India and the Colonies. During the past year large quantities of jarrah sleepers have been sent to Calcutta, and considerable shipments of the timber in the form of planks and telegraph posts to Melbourne and Adelaide. The wood is admirably adapted for dock-gates, piles, and other purposes, and for keel-pieces, kelsons, and other heavy timber in ship-building. Vessels of considerable burthen are built entirely of this wood, the peculiar properties of which render copper sheathing unnecessary, although the sea-worm is most abundant in these waters. Another most valuable kind of timber is a variety of white gum, called Tooart—close grained, not to be split, very hard, and capable of enduring a great amount of heat without rendering. It is used for keels, capstans, windlasses, naves of wheels, &c., also in the engine rooms of steam-vessels, liable to exposure or great heat. Both tooart and jarrah were used to a small extent in the construction of one of H.M. ships, the *Hannibal*, and the former wood especially

met with high encomiums from the Admiralty surveyors. The bluegum, which grows in immense forests, and attains a vast height and size, to the southward of Cape Leeuwin, is allied to the toart, and quite distinct from the Victorian one. A splendid field for capital will be found in those magnificent timber forests, and every inducement is offered by the local Government for its introduction. The license-fees are merely nominal; labour is cheap and abundant (although of a rough kind), and the chief difficulty at present experienced is the high price of freight. The Sandalwood of Western Australia has long proved a most valuable export, in large quantities, to Singapore and China. The Raspberry-jam, a species of acacia, has an agreeable scent, and is well adapted for cabinet purposes. The Casuarina, or Sheaoak, is remarkable for its numerous large bars of radial fibre, which render it difficult to be split in the direction of its circumference, and it shrinks the least of any wood in the direction of its radius. The sheaoak is used not only for shingles, but for axe-handles, spokes and felloes, &c.; the Morell for shafts, &c. Both the white and blue gums are so hard as to be used for tramways.

 RATES OF POSTAGE CHARGEABLE ON LETTERS, NEWSPAPERS,
 BOOKS, PACKETS, ETC.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which letters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding half an ounce but not exceeding one ounce, two-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, two-pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-Towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two-pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted out of the colony by sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the colony, as opportunity occurs—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, one shilling additional.

The above rates must be fully pre-paid by stamps, or the letters will be detained.

FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Via Southampton.—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every half ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional.

VIA MARSEILLES.—Not exceeding half an ounce, 10d.; above half an ounce and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 8d.; above one ounce and not exceeding two ounces, 3s. 4d. above two ounces and not exceeding three ounces, 5s.; every ounce additional, 1s. 8d.

FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every half ounce or fraction of half an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Via Marseilles or Brindisi, threepence. Newspapers posted for delivery within West Australia, or for transmission out of the colony, are exempt from postage unless forwarded to countries through the places above mentioned, except where foreign postage has to be collected.

CONDITIONS.—To be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides, and to be posted one hour before the mail is closed.

Except the name and address of the person to whom sent, there must be no other word or communication, letter, character, figure, or number written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted.

Newspapers sent to any Post Office, and unclaimed, must be returned to the General Post Office, Perth, at the expiration of thirty days.

BOOKS, ETC.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter—Via Southampton for the United Kingdom—2 ounces, 2d.; 4 oz. 4d.; 8 oz. 8d., and 4d. for every additional 4 ounces. Via Marseilles for the United Kingdom—4 ounces, 8d.; 8 ounces, 1s. 4d.; and 8d. for every additional 4 ounces. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—4 ounces, 6d.; and 1s. for each pound or fraction of a pound. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 ounces, 3d.; 8 ounces, 6d.; and 6d. for each half pound or fraction of half a pound. Malta and Gibraltar—4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces 8d.; and 4d. for every additional 4 ounces.

REGULATIONS.—Every book packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

No book packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY.—4 ounces, 2d.; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 4d. for each half-pound.

The General and other Post Offices are open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, Sundays excepted.

The System of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded. A statement of the hours of closing the mails is kept affixed on some exterior part of each Post Office, in order to avoid the frequent occurrence of letters being put in after the departure of the mails; but late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, and till within a quarter of an hour of the despatch of any Ship Mails, if as a fee thereon stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices, at the following rates :—

Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5 but not exceeding £10, two shillings; United Kingdom—fourpence for each pound.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS' BANKS.—Post Office Savings' Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working day from nine in the morning till four in the evening :—

Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Roebourne, Bunbury, Vasse, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, Wanerenooka.

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in any one year.

Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited, can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings' Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

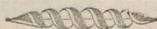

OF
WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

SYNOPSIS OF THE EXISTING REGULATIONS, PRO-
CLAIMED AT PERTH, AUGUST 20, 1864.

GENERAL RULES.

Applications for land, whether for lease, license, or purchase, to be sent in to the Surveyor-General, in established printed forms, procurable without charge at the Survey Office, or from Resident Magistrates. Such applications are to contain at full length all the names of the applicant, his calling and address.

Selections of country land to be in one uniform shape, in length not exceeding three times the breadth.

Boundaries to be parallel to all others in the same district.

Opposite boundaries to be parallel, except on rivers or roads.

Frontage on a river or open water not to exceed one-fourth part of the outer boundaries of a selection.

Both banks of a river whose course is known and mapped, not allowed in one selection, except in special cases.

LAND REGULATIONS.

Required boundaries subject to Governor's approval or adjustment.

Description by applicants to be full and particular, and to refer to some fixed marks in Survey Office maps.

Government not responsible for any errors in such description, but will rectify them when practicable.

Applicants liable to a charge for survey, when such is required for fixing a claim to land.

Such charge to be deposited before survey made.

Private surveys admitted under directions from Surveyor-General, to whom reports are to be made.

Maps of the country and of townsites open to inspection at Survey Office, and at the offices of Resident Magistrates of districts.

Two or more lots of land purchased by the same person at any one public sale, and adjoining each other, may on application, be included in one deed, and for one fee only.

Title deeds when completed and enrolled, are deliverable by the Colonial Secretary, or by the Resident Magistrate of the district in which the land may be situated.

No title deed will be prepared until the balance of purchase-money and the title deed fee have been paid.

Applications for full title are to contain at full length all the names of the applicant; also his calling and address.

Lands granted or sold by remission for military or naval services are not chargeable with title deed fees.

Deposits and payments for land to be made only to a Collector or Sub-Collector of Revenue, or to other persons duly authorised to receive the same.

Applications to purchase or lease land will have priority according to the actual time of paying deposit thereon.

Applications for land situate in a district where there is a Sub-Collector of Revenue, will not be approved until after the arrival of the next mail from such district.

Lands may be reserved or withdrawn from sale or lease, or may be resumed for public purposes.

Compensations to be given for any improvements on land resumed for public purposes.

No compensation allowed for improvements after the expiration, abandonment, or forfeiture of a lease, or for improvements on land under Class A license.

Valuations required to be made by one valuer appointed by land holder and one by the Governor, or by an umpire.

Existing contracts, promises, and engagements to hold good.

Unauthorised occupation of Crown lands punishable.

Governor not compelled, but only authorised, to let or sell lands applied for.

FOR THE SALE OF LANDS.

Waste Crown lands for sale, are distinguished as town, suburban, country, and mineral lands.

Town and suburban lands to be sold by public auction, at upset prices, to be regulated by the Governor.

Ordinary country land to be sold at the fixed price of ten shillings per acre, to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same, and in lots of not less than forty acres each. Special lots of smaller size are charged a higher price, thus, for ten acres or less, £1 per acre; for more than ten acres and less than forty acres, fifteen shillings per acre.

A deposit of one-tenth the purchase money is payable when the land is applied for; and the balance, with title deed fee of £1, within one month afterwards.

Deposits returnable if applications not granted; but forfeited on non-completion of purchase, or if applications are not followed up.

Country lands may be selected for purchase previous to survey.

All lands to be sold according to some numerical mark

or reference, which is also to be inserted in the title deed.

Town and suburban lands will be advertised for sale by public auction as they are applied for, in at least two consecutive *Government Gazettes*, in which the place of sale, the upset price of each lot, and the officer by whom it is to be sold, will be stated.

The days of sale for such lands are—at Perth and the Vasse, the first Wednesday in every month; at Bunbury, the second Wednesday in every month; and at Albany and Geraldton, not less than two months after the date of notice.

The appointed time for land sales by public auction is one hour after noon.

The applicant for a lot has the benefit of the upset price as his first bidding.

A fee of £1, payable in advance, for every title deed from the Crown.

In all title deeds the Crown reserves the precious metals and a right to make roads, canals, &c.; also to resume for public purposes.

Lands may be granted for public purposes, without purchase.

Remissions in the purchase of land may be granted to naval and military officers and men.

Lands purchased with such remissions to be granted to the purchasers after two years' residence in the colony.

Licenses to cut timber may be issued at ten shillings per month for a pair of sawyers, or £20 per annum per one square mile for special selections.

No part of any such special selection will be sold during the currency of a timber license without the written consent of the lessee.

Licenses to cut sandalwood may be issued at two shillings and sixpence per man per month.

The Agent General for Crown Colonies is authorised to

receive payments in England for lands to be purchased in Western Australia.

The sale and other disposal of the waste lands in Western Australia are regulated by instructions from the Queen, or through one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, proclaimed in the colony.

FOR PASTORAL LANDS.

For pastoral purposes the waste lands are divided into Class A and Class B, except in the North and East Districts hereinafter mentioned.

Class A lands are for annual license, subject to renewal.

Class B lands are leased for eight years, without right of renewal.

Lands let for pastoral purposes are known as runs.

No part of an occupied townsite will be let as a run.

Unoccupied townsites, if let, will be subject to special conditions.

Lands required for special purposes may be exempted from lease or license.

The rents payable are irrespective of any future rates on stock.

Runs are liable to forfeiture if appropriated to other than pastoral uses, or for non-payment of rent, or on conviction for felony.

Runs are transferable in the form printed on the back of each lease or license, attested by one credible witness.

Transfers are to be forwarded to Surveyor-General for Governor's approval, and for record in the Survey Office; and are chargeable with a fee of ten shillings in advance.

Transfers not sanctioned unless the land has been properly stocked.

Leases and licenses are prepared in the Survey Office, and are deliverable by the Collector of Revenue, or by a Sub-Collector at out-stations.

LAND REGULATIONS.

Leases not fully paid for within two calendar months after being deliverable, are forfeited, together with all improvements and deposits.

Only half rent is chargeable for the current year on all runs granted after 30th June.

Government reserves the right to lay out roads, take indigenous produce for public purposes, and graze any stock at work on a run.

Persons may search for minerals on a run, paying the lessee for any damage caused to him thereby.

Persons may pass over any unenclosed part of a run, with or without stock or conveyances.

The aborigines have a right to seek their subsistence on any unenclosed part of a pastoral or tillage lease, or on any part of an annual license.

Lessees are permitted to cut timber, and to make use of that or of any other indigenous produce of their runs, but not sell or remove the same off their lands.

The Government may grant licenses for any person to cut and remove timber, sandalwood, and other woods, off runs.

Boundaries of runs may be altered on application by paying certain fines for new leases.

No such alterations allowed in leases issued under the Regulations of 1850.

Any valuations required are to be made by one person appointed by the Governor, and another by the lessee of a run, or by an umpire if they cannot agree.

Rents for leases are due in advance on the 1st January in each year, and must be paid before the 15th of that month, or they are liable to an extra charge.

Rents not paid as above, may be paid within sixty days after rent-day, with an addition of one-fourth as fine.

Failing the payment of rent and fine as above, a lease becomes absolutely forfeited, or is chargeable with a fine of half the annual rent.

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN

In all leases the year is computed from 1st January to 31st December; and a term of years will commence from the 1st of the previous January.

Deposits are returnable on applications not granted; but they become forfeited if applications are not followed up.

On the determination of any lease by forfeiture or otherwise, the land therein described, and all improvements thereon, revert to the Crown.

LANDS IN CLASS A.

Lands in Class A are let for one year only, as depasturing licenses.

Annual rent two shillings per 100 acres payable on application, and no license fee.

No license issued for less than £1.

Full rent is payable in advance when a license or its renewal is applied for.

Lands in Class A, whether under license or not, are open at all times for sale or tillage lease, and must be given up by a lessee when so disposed of.

No compensation can be claimed for improvements on Class A land.

Unoccupied townsites are obtainable on annual license only.

No renewal of annual license can be *claimed*, but preference will be given to existing lessees whenever practicable if the land has been stocked during the previous year.

Applications for renewal must be sent in to Surveyor General before the end of a year.

Licenses will be given to other applicants, if renewals of them are not applied for before the end of a year.

Alterations required in boundaries of a license during its currency will be liable to a fine of one-half the year's rent.

Alterations required in boundaries previous to renewal are to be applied for by the end of November.

LAND REGULATIONS.

A holder of not less than ten acres of land in fee-simple within a Class A license, has a right to run gratuitously within such license one head of great stock (not being a bull or stallion) for every ten acres so held, and so long as said land may be let for pastoral purposes.

Holders of fee simple land as aforesaid, have no claim for trespass by stock, unless such land was properly fenced when trespassed on.

LANDS IN CLASS B.

Lands in Class B are let on pastoral leases for eight years or less.

B leases are not renewable; but the lessees have a preferable claim to them.

No lease to contain more than 10,000 acres.

Any number of leases may be granted to the same person.

The annual charge for a lease is £5, and rent of ten shillings per thousand acres for the land it contains.

An abatement of rent for the following year is made on application, if 1000 acres or upwards be sold or let on lease or resumed for public purposes.

Leases are granted without competition to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same.

On application for a lease, the lease fee is to be deposited, and will be forfeited, together with all claim to the land, if the application is not followed up.

Lessees in actual occupation, have a pre-emptive right to purchase at ten shillings per acre any portion of a run, not mineral nor less than forty acres, during the first year of a lease.

No other person can purchase within a lease during its first year without the written consent of the lessee.

After the first year of a lease, all unsold lands within it are open to general selection for purchase.

During the first year of a lease, a homestead may be

selected and reported for approval, at the rate of two acres for every 100 acres in the run.

A lessee will have the exclusive right of purchasing land not mineral, within any such homestead during the first three years of his lease; after which, all unsold portions will be open to general sale.

Selected homesteads may be built upon, fenced, and otherwise improved, but not cultivated, except under authority of a tillage lease:

Portions of a homestead may be sold to others, with the written consent of the lessee.

Lessees have a claim to compensation for any improvements effected on portions of their runs sold or resumed.

Purchasers of land within B leases have a free right to depasture on the unenclosed portions of the run, horned cattle or horses, not being bulls or stallions, at the rate of one head for every ten acres so purchased, so long as such portions continue to be let for pastoral purposes.

Such right as aforesaid is without prejudice to the right of the Crown to sell or grant on tillage lease.

Purchasers of land within B leases have no claim for trespass by stock, unless the land trespassed on be properly fenced.

Alterations required in boundaries of a current B lease are chargeable with a fee of £5 for a new lease.

The conditions of leases granted or renewed under the Regulations of March 1850, and January 1860, are not interfered with, except as follows—

- 1.—Lands are sold at a fixed price of ten shillings per acre instead of by auction, and in lots of forty acres, instead of ten.
- 2.—Tillage leases may be granted within pastoral leases with written consent of the lessee.
3. With a like consent, lands may be sold to other than the lessee.

4.—Enclosed portions of pastoral leases are not public thoroughfares.

TILLAGE LEASES.

Lands for tillage purposes are let on leases for eight years or less, without auction.

Tillage leases are not renewable ; but the lessees have a preferable claim to them.

No lease to contain more than 320 acres.

Any number of leases may be granted to the same person.

The annual rent of a lease is one shilling per acre, payable in advance ; but no lease is granted for a less sum than £5, except for the last half of a year.

Abatement of rent for future years is allowed on account of any part of a lease sold or resumed, provided the total rent be not reduced thereby below £5.

Application for a lease to be accompanied by a deposit of the first year's rent, which will be forfeited if the application is not followed up.

Lands available for tillage leases comprise all the waste lands not allotted or reserved.

Lands in B leases will be let on tillage lease or sold to the lessees of the former only, unless with their written consent.

With the foregoing exception, a lease is granted to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same, and without competition.

A lessee is entitled at any time to purchase, at the fixed price of ten shillings per acre, any portion of his lease, not being mineral land, nor less in quantity than forty acres.

Any other person may purchase in like manner, with the written consent of the lessee.

Mining licenses or leases cannot without lessee's consent

be granted within the limits of an occupied tillage lease, except to the lessee thereof.

The lands in forfeited or abandoned leases, if improved or re-let, will be subject to such increased rent as circumstances may justify.

Leases are liable to forfeiture if not occupied, cultivated, or improved, during the year preceding any rent-day.

PRE-EMPTIVE CLAIMS.

Land to be applied for in manner pointed out in the General Rules.

Existing improvements on land for purchase by other than a lessee, to be valued and charged to the purchaser.

Such valuation not to exceed the actual outlay made by a lessee.

The lessee of a tillage lease in his actual occupation has a pre-emptive right to purchase within the same during the currency of his lease.

The lessee of a B lease granted under the Regulations of 1850, has a similar right to the foregoing.

Such pre-emptive right may be waived, and by written consent of a lessee of any lease, portions of the same may be sold to other persons.

Land is sold at the fixed price of ten shillings per acre, whether improved or otherwise, and in lots of not less than forty acres.

Pre-emptive rights of Class B and tillage leases do not extend over mineral lands, except to licensees or lessees thereof.

A lessee exercising a pre-emptive right, to obtain certificate of Resident Magistrate that he is in actual occupation of his lease, personally or by agents; also that the current year's rent has been paid.

The lessee of a B lease under the Regulations of 1860,,

or under those of 20th August, 1864, has an exclusive pre-emptive right to purchase within such lease until the end of its first year.

Any such lessee has a similar right to purchase any part of his selected homestead, until the end of the third year of his lease.

Lessees claiming to exercise pre-emptive rights, must be in actual occupation of their leases, either personally or by agents.

NORTH AND EAST DISTRICTS.

Lands in the above districts are disposed of on more favorable terms than in other parts of Western Australia.

The North District is comprised between the sea coast and the meridian of 129 degrees east longitude, and to the north of the River Murchison, and of a true east line through Mount Murchison.

The East District is comprised between the meridians of 121 and 129 degrees east longitude, and between the south coast and latitude 30 degrees south.

The lands are divided into Class A for annual license, and Class C for more extended occupation.

Class A comprises all land within two miles of the sea coast, and Class C the remainder.

Lands in Class A are let on depasturing license, under the Regulations hereinbefore explained, except that the annual rent for the same is five shillings per 1000 acres for each of the first four years, and ten shillings per 1000 acres for each of the second four years, payable in advance.

Application for the Governor's permission to proceed to either district, for the purpose of taking up land, must be made to the Colonial Secretary in a certain printed form.

Such permission, if granted, will be valid for twelve months from its date.

To entitle an applicant to obtain this permission, he

must undertake to convey to the district at least 200 breeding sheep, or 100 head of great stock, or a due proportion of both.

On any quantity of stock the bonâ fide property of the applicant, and not less than the above number reaching the district, they and their natural increase will be allowed free pasturage over the unappropriated Crown lands during the term of the permission.

During the said term, the person or company of persons named in such permission will be entitled to select, and report to the Surveyor General, a pastoral run of 100,000 acres of land in the district.

On the Governor's approval of such selection, it will be assigned in pastoral occupancy to the applicant, free of rent for three years, commencing from the end of the first year's permission to depasture.

The assignment last aforesaid will not be made unless the application for it is accompanied by a certificate signed by some credible person, of the date on which the stock enumerated in the Governor's permission to proceed actually arrived on the land applied for.

Such assignment will not be transferable.

A selection of 100,000 acres may include lands in both Class A and Class C, and must be made in conformity with the General Rules.

At any time within the three years named, the whole or any part of a run may be selected and reported to the Surveyor General for lease or license, in blocks not exceeding 20,000 acres each.

Class C lands thus selected will be let on pastoral lease for eight years, commencing on 1st of January next after the date of application for the same.

Class C leases are chargeable with rent at the rate of five shillings per 1000 acres for each of the first four years.

and ten shillings per 1000 acres for each of the second four years.

Class C leases are chargeable with one fee of £5 at the commencement of each lease, but not after the first year.

There is no fee on Class A licenses.

Both leases and licenses are transferable while chargeable with rent, on the Governor being satisfied the lands have been properly stocked.

During the free occupation of a run, and during the first year of a lease, the lawful occupant is allowed a right to cultivate.

No claim for damage by trespass of stock is admissible, unless the land be properly fenced at time of trespass.

Runs or leases may be resumed, wholly or in part at any time, for public purposes, as also for sale, on giving six months' notice.

Compensation will be given for all improvements lawfully made on rented lands resumed as above.

TO OBTAIN LANDS IN THE NORTH DISTRICT.

The Government Resident of the North District, who is also a Collector of Revenue, will receive applications for, and dispose of, lands required in that district, for purchase or for pastoral or tillage purposes.

Such applications are to be made in the printed forms and under the rules elsewhere herein prescribed.

The limits of territory within which lands may be purchased, will from time to time be publicly notified by the Government Resident.

The minimum size of ordinary country lands for sale in the North District is eighty acres, and the price ten shillings per acre.

Smaller lots of country land will be charged fifteen shillings per acre, if between twenty and eighty acres, and twenty shillings per acre for twenty acres or less.

The deposit, payable on application to purchase, is one tenth the purchase money.

One calendar month allowed for completing a purchase, and paying the title deed fee.

Five per cent. in addition charged on unpaid balances within the next sixty days, and ten per cent. after the said sixty days.

Purchases remaining incomplete at the end of six calendar months to be cancelled, and all payments forfeited.

No purchaser of land has a right to occupy it until balance of purchase money and title deed fee have been paid.

Full titles, and leases and licenses, will be prepared in Perth, but the completion of a purchase or lease will be notified, and will be authority for occupation of the land.

Payments for land may be made at Revenue Office in Perth, at option of purchaser.

Purchasers of land, within C leases, acquire thereby no free right to depasture stock within such leases.

Suitable sights reserved for exclusive use of the aborigines.

No convict, or person holding a ticket-of-leave, or person under sentence or order of transportation or penal servitude, is allowed to remain in the North District.

Save in so far as the same are altered by these Regulations, the existing Land Regulations for other parts of the territory, are in force in the North District.

MINERAL LANDS.

A mining license, to test the mineral qualities of land previous to leasing or purchasing, may be obtained for one year, by applying to the Surveyor-General in a certain printed form.

The quantity of land in such license not to be less than 80 nor more than 160 acres.

The charge for a mining license is two shillings per acre, and for a renewal for the second year four shillings per acre; no license issued for less than £8, or for less than one year.

Lands available for mineral purposes are all such as are supposed to contain minerals, and are open to general selection for sale, lease or license.

No mining license or lease granted, within an occupied tillage lease, without lessee's consent.

A mining license or lease conveys the exclusive right to use the land for mining purposes only, and to depasture live stock working the same.

A lessee may take indigenous timber, rock or soil required for any use whatever on the land, but is not to sell or remove the same off the land.

No minerals or ores to be removed off a mining license, except small quantities required as samples.

A mining license will be declared forfeited if mining researches thereon are abandoned for one month continuously.

A license may be exchanged for a lease for ten years, on application to Surveyor-General in a certain printed form.

The annual rent for a mining lease is eight shillings per acre, payable in advance.

It is not necessary that the applicant for a lease should previously have held a license.

A mining lease conveys all the rights and privileges enumerated in clauses 6 and 7, as also a right to all ores and minerals raised from the land during or previous to the lease.

Rent for a mining lease is payable to a Collector of

Revenue within fifteen days after the rent day named in the lease.

Failing such payment, a lease is forfeited, unless within thirty days after the rent day a fine of half the rent be paid in addition.

A forfeiture may be cancelled on sufficient grounds shewn, and on paying within sixty days from the rent day twice the amount of the annual rent.

No compensation for improvements or outlay of any description allowed after the expiration, abandonment, or forfeiture, of a lease or license.

All such improvements, and all minerals and ores on and in the land, will then revert to the Crown, unless otherwise previously sanctioned in writing.

Leases and licenses are transferable in the form established for pastoral lands, on satisfactory proof shewn that mining operations have been conducted thereon to a reasonable extent.

Fee for transfer of a lease is twenty shillings, and of a license ten shillings, both in advance.

The unexpired term of a mining lease abandoned or forfeited, will be procurable on payment of such sum in addition to the established rent as the Governor may direct.

Land comprised in a mining lease or license will, on application to the Surveyor-General in a prescribed printed form, be sold to the lessee thereof, or to others with such lessee's written consent.

Land not within a mining lease or license, may be sold in like manner as mineral land, to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same.

Mineral lands will be sold in lots of eighty acres each, and at the fixed price of £3 per acre, payable by depositing £1 per acre on application, and a similar amount on the same date in each of the following two years.

LAND REGULATIONS.

The payment of any such instalment entitles the purchaser to enjoy full use of the land for mining purposes during the next twelve calendar months, and to all ores and minerals he may obtain therefrom.

On the complete payment at any time of £3 per acre, and the title deed fee, a purchaser may claim the full title to the land purchased.

Non-completion of a purchase or lease involves forfeiture of all deposits paid, and of further claim to the land.

The purchaser or lessee of mineral land is liable to pay to the lessee of any other land out of which the mineral land may be taken, full compensation for any improvements thereby absorbed or destroyed.

No right of way or thoroughfare will exist over any enclosed portion of mineral land, except by recognised roads, or for Government purposes.

In all other respects, the general Land Regulations for Western Australia will apply to mineral lands.

Nothing herein contained is deemed to apply to auriferous lands or to coal.

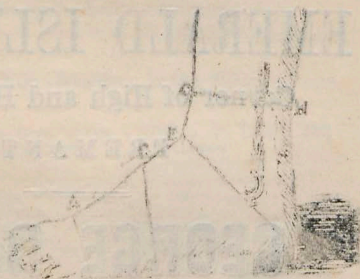
