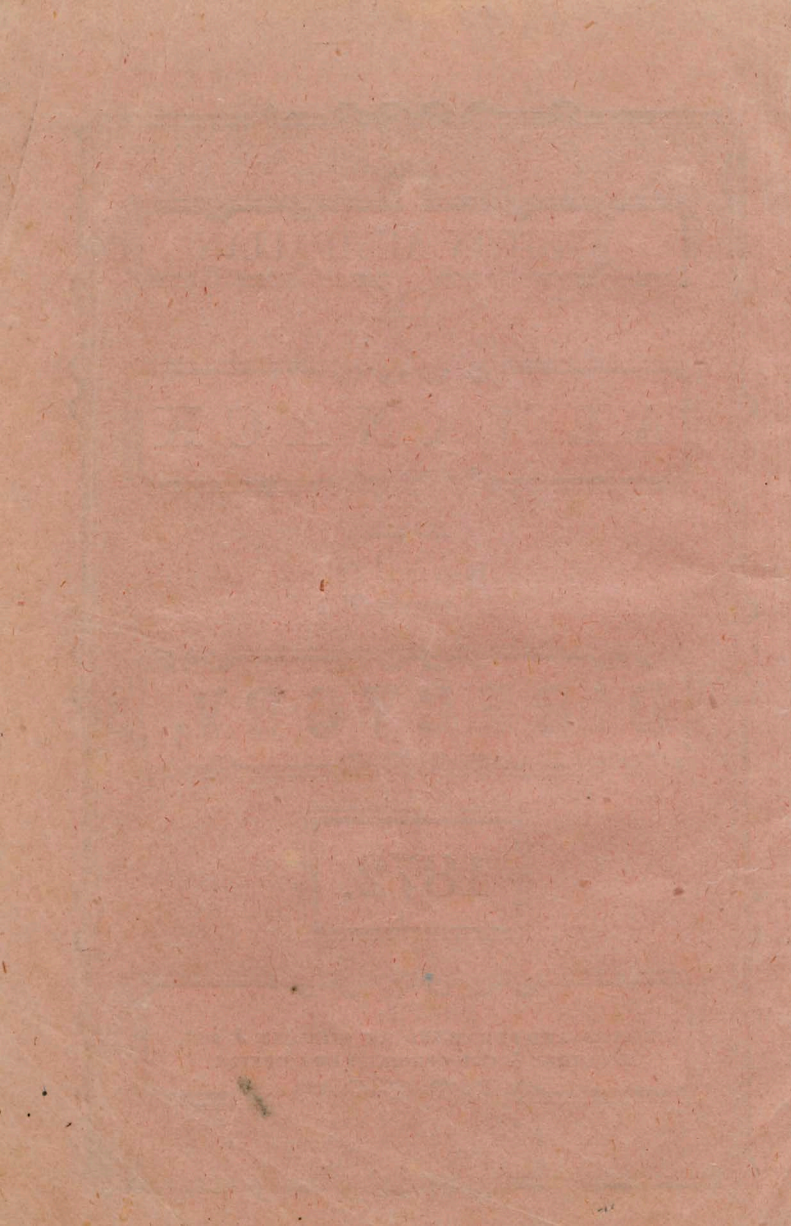

ECLIPSES IN 1872.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME AT PERTH.

In the year 1872 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I. *May 23.*—A partial eclipse of the Moon, to the extent of about one-tenth of her diameter. The first contact with the shadow will be at 24 minutes after 6 o'clock in the morning, on the south limb; and the moon will set slightly eclipsed ten minutes afterwards.

The following eclipses will not be visible from any part of Western Australia.

II. *June 6.*—An annular eclipse of the Sun.

III. *November 15.*—A very partial eclipse of the Moon.

IV. *December 1.*—A total eclipse of the Sun.

Prepare ground for onions ; plant out cauliflowers, brocoli, cabbage, &c. ; sow peas, beans, carrots, spinach, lettuce, cress, and endive for early crops ; sow early stone turnips ; sow wheat and Cape barley ; examine fruit trees, removing all decayed limbs and suckers ; keep potato crop clean.

BRIEF CHRONICLE

OF

Occurrences and Events

FROM OCTOBER, 1870, TO SEPTEMBER, 1871.

(Under the above head the most remarkable events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.)

1870.

OCTOBER.—One of Mr. Randell's boats, laden with railway sleepers for the Dharwar, foundered on the River Bar.....A Horticultural Society established at Champion Bay.....The pearling cutter Flying Scud wrecked at Butcher's Inlet, near Nickol Bay.....A lighthouse fixed at Bunbury.....Perth Horticultural Society held its annual exhibition on the 21st.....The Zephyr, Captain Setten, arrived at Fremantle on the 15th, being the fastest voyage hitherto made by her, having left the London docks on the 22nd July.....A large and beautiful meteor was seen to fall to the eastward of Perth on the evening of the 17th.....A complimentary dinner given to Mr. Forrest the explorer at Taylor's Hotel on the 24th.....Mr. S. H. Parker, barrister, fined £25 and costs, by His Honor the Chief Justice, for alleged suppression of evidence in the case of one Henry Wells Young, a ticket-of-leave holder.....The Colonial Secretary and Bishop Salvado return to the colony.....The remains of Captain Watson, of the barque Amur, discovered in the bush at Lake Matilda, near Albany.....A boat belonging to the Dharwar foundered during a strong gale, in Gage's Roads, when a seaman named Mantz was drowned, and a midshipman named Thornbury swam ashore, a distance of nearly a mile.....A fossilised human foot found on the Irwin, at a depth of about eighteen feet in hard rock.....A teamster in the employ of Mr. White, of the Canning, was killed by a team overturning upon him, the horse having taken fright.....Revenue of the quarter (July, August, September,) £18,353 9s. 8d.; expenditure, £25,598 18s. 7d.....The York Agricultural Society held their annual

show on the 26th, when His Excellency Governor Weld and suite attended.....General election of members to serve in the Legislative Council—Perth, 19th; Fremantle, 21st; Swan, 26th; York, 28th.

NOVEMBER.—The Dharwar left Gage's Roads with 16,000 jarrah railway sleepers, being the largest shipment of timber ever made from the colony.....Colonel Bruce died at his residence in Perth on the 5th, and was buried on the following day.....The annual show held under the auspices of the Toodyay, Northam, and Victoria Plains Agricultural Society, held at Newcastle on the 2nd.....(2nd) Mr. Edmund Stirling and Mr. Jno. Stirling, proprietors and publishers of the 'Inquirer' newspaper, were summoned to appear before the Chief Justice to show cause why judgment should not be pronounced against them for publishing therein a letter signed by Mr. S. H. Parker, a barrister, commenting upon the conduct of the Chief Justice in inflicting upon him a fine of £25. The defendants were adjudged guilty of contempt of court, and were ordered to be imprisoned for a term of one calendar month.....Mr. A. Shenton, proprietor of the 'Perth Gazette,' was at the same time adjudged guilty of contempt of court, for having published a libellous article relative to the same cause, and was ordered to pay a fine of £100 and be imprisoned for the term of two calendar months.....Messrs. Stirling and Shenton released from prison, 4th.....The annual meeting and show of the Bunbury Agricultural Society was held under the auspices of His Excellency the Governor and suite on the 9th.....The election of members to serve in the first Representative Council of West Australia terminated this month:—Toodyay election, 1st inst.; Vasse, 4th; Bunbury, 9th.....A blacksmith named Shaw, in the employ of Mr. B. Mason, was found dead, from heart disease, at the timber-station on the Canning.....The schooner Gift chartered by the Government and despatched to Shark's Bay, with Sub-Inspector Piesse, to investigate a report of the kidnapping of aboriginal natives on the North-West Coast.....A farm laborer in the employ of Mr. Lukin at Deepdale, Toodyay, inadvertently set fire to his master's premises, and, overcome by remorse, deliberately committed suicide.....Gold prospecting vigorously continued at the Irwin.... A brutal assault committed on Mr. Birch, sen., by a prisoner named Burrell.....The machinery and part of railway plant belonging to the newly-established Timber Company at Lockeville, arrived per Star of the Mersey.....Mr. H. Saw, an old and well-known colonist, died at Fremantle on the 25th.....Mr.

Walter Williams died suddenly of heart disease at Waneroo, on the 11th.....Tenders invited for the construction of the Electro-Magnetic Telegraph Company's lines to King George's Sound and the Eastern districts.....The eighth annual meeting of the Perth Building Society held on the 18th.

DECEMBER.—The first Legislative Council under a Representative form of Government assembled on the 5th.....A local fire insurance company proposed to be established at Perth, with a capital of £10,000 in shares of £10 each.....Sir Alexander T. Cockburn-Campbell returned to Albany after an absence of some months on a trip to England.....Mr. S. H. Parker was adjudged guilty of contempt of court in writing and publishing in the 'Inquirer' newspaper a letter reflecting on the administration of justice, and for such contempt was ordered to pay a fine of £100.....The annual meeting of the ratepayers of Perth held on the 5th, when Mr. Glyde was re-elected Chairman of the City Council.....Mr. Malcolm Fraser, who succeeds Captain Roe as Surveyor-General, arrived.....Revenue for quarter ended 31st December, £24,191 15s. ; Expenditure, £26,286 11s. 3d.

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JANUARY.—An Oddfellows' Lodge, in connection with the Manchester Unity, opened at Guildford.....A little boy, son of Mr. Edward Gibbs, wandered from his home at Waneroo, and perished in the bush.....Legislative Council prorogued on the 18th, having passed, *inter alia*, a new Bankruptcy Bill ; a Road Boards Bill, establishing a system of local self-government in local matters ; and a Bill to amend the Representation of the People, and to alter the Property Qualification of members of the Legislative Council.....The West Australian Telegraph Company amalgamated with the Electro-Magnetic Telegraph Co..... Annual meeting of the Swan River Mechanics' Institute held on the 16th.....A man named Thomas Mead died at Geraldton from injuries received by his horse falling upon him.

FEBRUARY.—Perth Horticultural Society held their annual show on the 8th.....The barque Kassa brought the remainder of the railway and other plant for the West Australian Timber Company at Lockeville.....A fire broke out on the premises of Mrs. Higham, in High-street, Fremantle, on the 6th, causing considerable damage.....The monthly subscription to the Fremantle Literary Institute reduced from one shilling to sixpence...

A bazaar in aid of funds for the erection of a schoolroom in connection with Trinity Congregational Chapel, Perth, took place in the Town Hall on the 15th and 16th.....A man named Collins, employed by Mr. Chidlow, of Northam, as a teamster, was accidentally drowned by falling into a well, in endeavoring to obtain water to quench his thirst.....A Local Court established at Northam.....Fremantle, Guildford, Albany, Bunbury, Busselton, and Geraldton declared municipalities, according to the Ordinance 34th Vic. No. 6.....Annual festivities of the scholars attending the Church of England and the Wesleyan Sunday-schools held on the 17th.....Mr. Solomon Cook, an old and deeply-respected citizen, died on the 24th.

MARCH.—Mr. Arthur Shenton, proprietor and Editor of the *Perth Gazette* for upwards of twenty years, and a much-respected colonist, died on the 16th.....A man named Holditch found murdered near North Fremantle Bridge; a person named Davis, and his paramour, Coady, were convicted of the crime, and suffered the extreme penalty of the law in July.....First telegraph post at York erected on the 14th, and at Northam on the 18th.....The barque *Fitzroy* from London met with a serious accident in coming into harbor at Gage's Roads by striking on the Straggler rocks.....The monitor *Cerberus*, destined for the protection of Melbourne, arrived in Gage's Roads on the 16th.....An Odd-fellows' Lodge of the Manchester Unity established at Geraldton... The stone crushers ordered by the Government arrive from England in the *Fitzroy*.....Supposed discovery of petroleum within ten miles of the mouth of the Murchison River, and also at a place about forty miles from York.....The new Bankruptcy Act came into operation on the 29th.

APRIL.—A fancy fair under the auspices of the Sisters of Mercy, in aid of the funds for the completion of the Roman Catholic orphanage, held in Easter-week, whereby £160 was realized.....Mr. Guger, a Swiss gentleman, arrived in Perth with the object of starting sericulture and vine-growing on an extensive scale.....The inmates of the Native Mission at Albany transferred to Perth and temporarily housed in premises adjoining the orphanage.....Deputy Commissary Johnston relieved by Staff Assistant Paymaster Elliot.....A man named James Fanning hanged at Perth on the 14th for a criminal assault on a girl named Dawes, on the Albany Road.....His Excellency the Governor confirmed the bye-laws adopted by the City Council.....A sawyer named Stephen Oates killed instantaneously at Bunbury, on the 25th, by a piece of timber falling upon him whilst

engaged in a saw pit.....A woman of the name of Hester Lanarcham burnt to death at Butler's Swamp on the 29th..... Mr. McKail resigned his seat in the Legislative Council as representative of the Albany district.....Perth races held on the 12th and 13th, when the Queen's Plate was won by Mr. J. Lockyer's *Southerner*, and the Maiden Plate by Messrs. K. & A. Brown's *Mowerina*.

MAY.—Major Crampton appointed Commandant, *vice* Colonel Bruce, deceased, and Captain Burk, late of the 68th regiment, Staff Officer of Pensioners, Perth district.....Captain Smith appointed Superintendent of police.....A meeting of the Toodyay Agricultural Society held on the 25th for the purpose of requesting the Government to impose a protective duty on flour... A new local bi-weekly journal published in Perth, styled the *Colonist*.

JUNE.—A man named Max died at York of lockjaw, the result of injuries received in blasting a rock.....A Young Men's Association formed at Pinjarrah.....The Government prepared a piece of ground near Claisebrook for the purpose of planting mulberry trees.....A man named John Edmund Johns, who fell down the hold of the *Tartar* in April, died in hospital on the 5th instant.....A testimonial, consisting of a beautifully-finished epergne, presented to Captain Roe by the officers of the Survey Department.....A pensioner named McKay, the bugler attached to the Perth garrison, awoke one morning to find himself blind.....A man of the name of Maurice Murphy was found dead in a well on the premises of Mr. Metheringham, at Perth.

AUGUST.—A Thomson's Road Steamer, yclept the "Pioneer," imported into the colony by the Rockingham Timber Company.On the 8th the Road Steamer made a trip from Fremantle to Perth, conveying fourteen tons of flour.....Major Crampton, Commandant and Staff Officer of Pensioners, died on the

15th.....The Legislative Council was prorogued on the 17th, having passed, among other bills, a new Education Act providing for compulsory attendance of children at schools, and affording the people, by means of district boards, direct control over public instruction. The Land Regulations, also, were modified and liberalized, and a Public Loan Bill for raising £60,000 was adopted.

RATES OF POSTAGE CHARGEABLE ON LETTERS, NEWSPAPERS, BOOKS, PACKETS, ETC.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which letters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding half an ounce but not exceeding one ounce, two-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, two-pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-Towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two-pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four-pence, and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted out of the colony by sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the colony, as opportunity occurs—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every half ounce or fraction of a half ounce, sixpence additional.

The above rates must be fully prepaid by stamps, or the letters will be detained.

FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Viâ Southampton.—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every half ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional.

VIA BRINDISI.—Not exceeding half an ounce, 10d.; above half an ounce and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 8d.; above one ounce and not exceeding two ounces, 3s. 4d., above two ounces and not exceeding three ounces, 5s.; every ounce additional, 1s. 8d.

FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every half ounce or fraction of an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Viâ Marseilles or Brindisi, threepence. Newspapers posted for delivery within West Australia, or for transmission out of the colony, are exempt from postage unless forwarded to countries through the places above mentioned, except where foreign postage has to be collected.

Except the name and address of the person to whom sent, there must be no other word or communication, letter, character, figure or number written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted.

Newspapers sent to any Post Office, and unclaimed, must be returned to the General Post Office, Perth, at the expiration of thirty days.

BOOKS, ETC.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter—Viâ Southampton for the United Kingdom—1 oz. 1d.; 2 oz. 2d.; 4 oz. 4d.; 8 oz. 8d., and 4d. for every additional 4 ounces. Viâ Brindisi for the United Kingdom—4 ounces, 7d.; 8 ounces, 1s. 2d.; and 7d. for every additional 4 ozs. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, & New Zealand—1 oz. 1d.; 2 oz. 2d.; 4 ozs. 3d.; and 6d. for each $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. or fraction of a $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 8d. for each half pound or fraction of half a pound. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c.

REGULATIONS.—Every book packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides.

No book packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY.—2 ounces 1d.; 4 ounces 2d.; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 4d. for each half-pound.

The general and other Post Offices are open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, Sundays excepted.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded. A statement of the hours of closing the mails is kept affixed on some exterior part of each Post Office, in order to avoid the frequent occurrence of letters being put in after the departure of the mails; but late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, and till within a quarter of an hour of the despatch of any Ship Mails, if as a fee thereon stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices, at the following rates :—

Victoria, United Kingdom, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5 but not exceeding £10, two shillings; for sums not exceeding £2, one shilling; above £2 and not exceeding £5, two shillings; above £5 and not exceeding £7, three shillings; above £7 and not exceeding £10, four shillings.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS' BANKS.—Post Office Savings' Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working day from nine in the morning till four in the evening :—

Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Northam, Roebourne, Bunbury, Vasse, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, and Wanerenooka.

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in any one year.

Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings' Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING A WILL.

A WILL cannot be made in language too simple or concise ; must be written in ink, on paper or parchment, and, if contained on one sheet, must be signed at the end by the Testator, in the presence of one or two Witnesses ; and if written on more than one sheet, the Testator and the Witnesses must sign each sheet, independently of the end aforesaid.

The Witnesses (*a*) must rigidly comply with every particular required by the Attestation Clause, at the end of which clause they must sign their name (*b*).

The signature of the Testator must be acknowledged by him, in the presence of Witnesses ; and in order that this be properly done, he must (after having signed the Will) take it in his hand and say, "I acknowledge this to be my last Will and Testament, and request you to witness it." To avoid the evils of intestacy, the following form may suffice as a general guide :—

WILL.

This is the last Will and Testament of me, Charles Smith, of Richmond, near Fremantle, in the colony of West Australia, gentleman. After payment of all my just debts, funeral and testamentary expenses, I give, devise, and bequeath unto
also to . . . And as the residue and remainder (*c*) of all my real and personal estate, I give, devise, and bequeath the same unto . . . And I hereby appoint . . . or the survivors of them, and . . . Executors of this my Will. As witness my hand this . . . day of . . . 18 . . .

[*a*] These must be parties not interested in the Will, or their claim to such interest becomes forfeited.

[*b*] In all cases where a name is given, it is indispensable to describe fully and clearly the christian name, the surname, residence, and trade or profession.

[*c*] The residue becomes the property of the next of kin, unless otherwise provided for.

ATTESTATION.

Signed and acknowledged by the said Charles Smith, the Testator, as and for his last Will and Testament, in the presence of us, being present at the same time, who at his request, in his presence, and in the presence of each other, have hereunto subscribed our names as Witnesses. }

A CODICIL TO A WILL is to be made with the same regulations as the Will itself, and may be written thus :—

This is a Codicil to my last Will and Testament, bearing date the day of 18 , and I direct it may be taken as part thereof. I give, devise, and bequeath, &c. As witness my hand this day of 18 .

Obliterations or alterations of any sort in a Will ought, if possible, to be avoided as dangerous; when of necessity made they ought to be signed by the Testator and Witnesses in the margin, or as near to the alteration as possible, and the alteration specially noticed in the Attestation Clause as having been made before the Will was signed.

Marriage after making a Will renders the Will void.

If a person wishes to dispose of all his property in one gift, the words "all my real and personal estate" may be used.

It is not indispensable for a Witness to know the contents of a Will, which, if desired, may be so folded as to prevent any other than the signature and the Attestation Clause being read.

It may be useful to remark that Personal (*d*) property left without a Will is divisible as under :—

If the deceased leave Children and no Widow, the whole property is to be divided equally amongst the Children.

If he leave a Widow and Children, the former is entitled to one-third (*e*), and the latter to the remaining two thirds.

If he leave a Widow and no Children, the former is entitled to half, and the next of kin to the remainder, as under :—a Father, the whole amount; if no Father, a Mother, Brothers and Sisters, or their issue, equal portions; if none, Uncle, Aunts, Nephews, and Nieces, equal portions, &c.

[*d*] These rules do not apply to real estates.

[*e*] There are a few local and trifling departures from this rule,

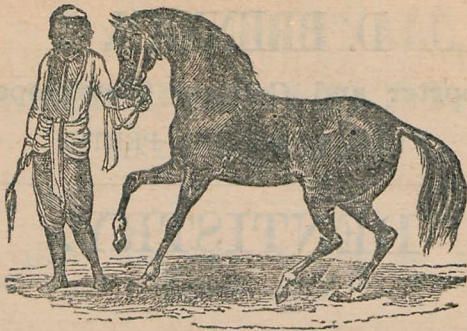

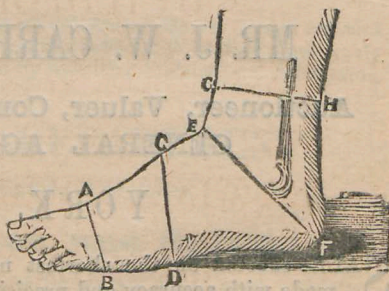
