

In the year 1878 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

February 2.—An annular eclipse of the Sun, last portion of which will be visible in Perth; ending of eclipse taking place at

6.42 p.m.

February 17.—A partial eclipse of the Moon. First portion invisible at Perth. First contact with shadow (not visible), 5·26 p.m.; middle of eclipse (visible), 6·54 p.m.; last contact with shadow, 8·22 p.m.; last contact with penumbra, 9·23 p.m. July 29.—A total eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Australia.

August 13.—A partial eclipse of the Moon. First contact with penumbra, 5.5 a.m., being only partially visible. First contact with shadow (not visible), 6.26 a.m.

6. Any combination of code employing in the same message groups of figures and letters is strictly prohibited, and telegrams

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

Regulations—Every book packet or parcel of any kind must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication, under a penalty of not less than £5.

Books and Parcels Transmitted within the Colony.—2 ounces, 1d.; 4 ounces, 2d; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each 4 oz.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded.
