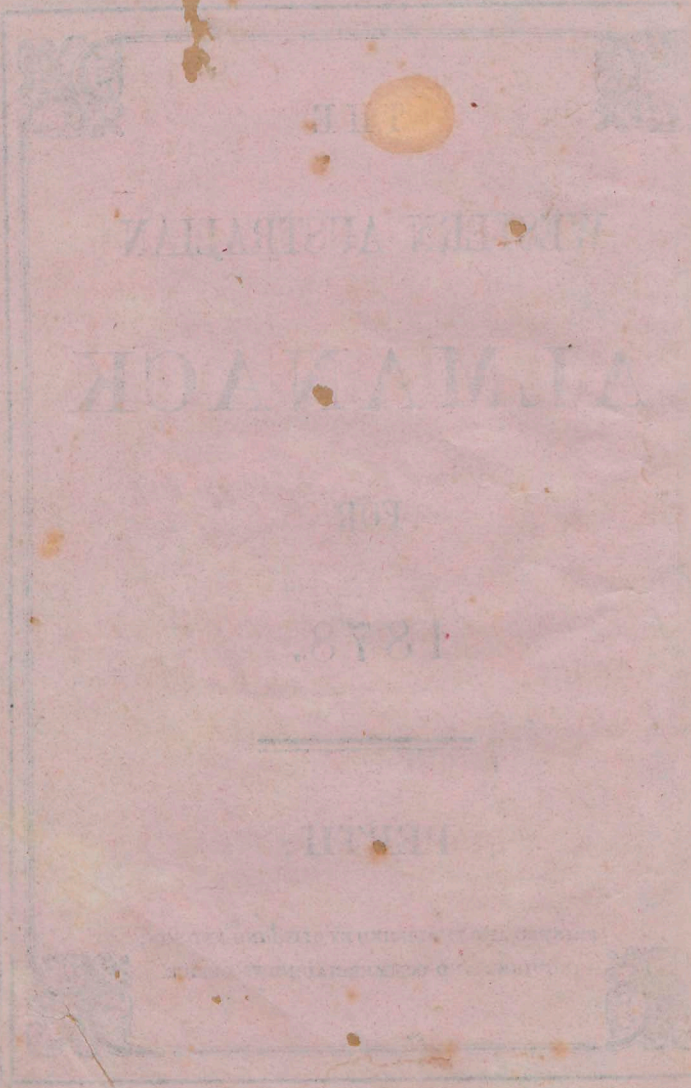

ECLIPSES.

In the year 1878 there will be two Eclipses of the SUN and two of the MOON.

February 2.—An annular eclipse of the SUN, last portion of which will be visible in Perth; ending of eclipse taking place at 6.42 p.m.

February 17.—A partial eclipse of the MOON. First portion invisible at Perth. First contact with shadow (not visible), 5.26 p.m.; middle of eclipse (visible), 6.54 p.m.; last contact with shadow, 8.22 p.m.; last contact with penumbra, 9.23 p.m.

July 29.—A total eclipse of the SUN, invisible in Australia.

August 13.—A partial eclipse of the MOON. First contact with penumbra, 5.5 a.m., being only partially visible. First contact with shadow (not visible), 6.26 a.m.

On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after office hours, and on Sundays, double the ordinary rate will be required upon all Messages.

Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables.

3. Groups of figures may be transmitted, and will be charged at the rate of five to the word, if expressing ordinary commercial quotations; but if used for code purposes they will be subject to the cipher rate.

4. Groups of letters or artificially-constructed words will be treated in the same manner as figures.

5. Cipher telegrams must be collated—*i.e.*, repeated back in their entirety from station to station. Half rate extra is charged for collating.

6. Any combination of code employing in the same message groups of figures and letters is strictly prohibited, and telegrams composed in this manner cannot be accepted.

7. Addresses may be written in code, at the sender's risk, under arrangement with the administrations concerned. The signature may also be a code word, or the last word of the message may replace it.

8. The following abbreviated form for expressing "Reply paid," "Acknowledgment of receipt," "Collating," and "Telegram to follow" has been agreed to, so that only one word need be paid for to convey these instructions:—

working-day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Vasse, Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, Northampton, and Williams River. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which the letters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding half an ounce, two pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, two pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two-pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four-pence; or for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

SHIP-LETTERS.—On letters transmitted by sailing vessels to the Australian colonies, three-pence per half-ounce; to all other places, six-pence per half ounce.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Viâ Southampton—Under half an ounce, 6d.; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional. Viâ Brindisi—Not exceeding half an ounce, 9d.; above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 6d.; above one ounce, and not exceeding 1½ ounce, 2s. 3d.; and for every additional half-ounce or fraction thereof, 9d.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, if as a fee thereon stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

History of Western Australia.

Brief Chronicle of Occurrences and Events from October, 1875, to September, 1876.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1876.

OCTOBER.—A project put forward by Mr. Rigg, of Melbourne, for lighting Perth with gas.....The Geraldton Volunteer Rifle Company formed, and Mr. J. DeC. Hillman appointed to its command.....The Rev. T. G. Rose inducted to the pastorate of Perth Trinity Congregational Church, 3rd.....A Local Court established at Dongarra.....The barque Hero of the Nile stranded near the Murray, 20th.....A copy of Gould's work on Birds, costing about £135, purchased in England by the colonists for presentation to Bishop Hale, recently translated to Brisbane.....The Wesleyan Young Men's Association resuscitated by the Revs. Wm. Lowe and W. S. Worth.....The Perth Horticultural Society's Spring Show—the most successful ever held—took place at the Town Hall, 31st.....The obituary for the month includes the name of Mrs. Landor.

NOVEMBER.—Shares to the number of about 3,000 subscribed in Perth in the proposed City Gas Company.....Successful promenade concert under the auspices of the Metropolitan Rifle Volunteers held at the Perth Town Hall, 17th.... The French Transport Navarin, conveying prisoners from France to New Caledonia, arrived in Gage's Roads, disabled.....The Towerses visit the colony.....The obituary for the month contains the names of Mr. Richard Jones and Mrs. Wear.

DECEMBER.—H.M.S. Wolverine arrived from England en route to Sydney, 7th.....Wreck of the steamer Georgette near Cape Leuwin and loss of five lives, 1st.....Commissioner Wynne

and a staff of assistants despatched to the Lacepede Islands to protect the guano deposits thereon.....The imports of the colony for the year ended 30th Sept. amounted to £370,690, and the exports, £368,831.

1877.

JANUARY.—Governor Robinson inaugurated the first exhibition in connection with the Western Australian Agricultural Association, at Perth, 10th.....The Hon. M. Fraser proceeded to Sydney to attend the Intercolonial Telegraph Conference.....Very successful Regatta on Perth Water on New Year's Day.....The first silk, consisting of a hundred pounds, exported from the colony by Mons. L. A. Beurteaux.....The obituary includes the names of Mr. S. T. Mitchell and Mrs. John Smith.

FEBRUARY.—A roll of satin, fifty yards in length, the produce of cocoons educated by Mr. Clayton at the Government magnanerie, received by the Government from Macclesfield.....The Fremantle Masonic Hall dedicated, 8th.....Private Sidney Hymus, M.R.V., won Capt. Hillman's 1876 prize medal.....Mr. Charles Tuckey presented by the Austrian Government with a gold watch for succouring the survivors of the ship *Stefano*.....The obituary includes the names of Mrs. A. P. Bussell, Mrs. E. P. Barrett, and Mr. S. H. Glyde.....Terrible hurricane at the Lacepede Islands, involving the loss of many lives and the destruction of several ships, 16th and 17th.

MARCH.—Governor Robinson visited Champion Bay in H.M.S. *Nymphe*.....The Tobin principle of ventilation introduced in the Perth Supreme Court House.....Large quantities of live stock brought to Champion Bay by a Melbourne squatter.....Mr. John Moir murdered by natives near Esperance Bay.....A fine tract of country reported to have been discovered at Beagle Bay.

APRIL.—H.M.S. *Nymphe* left for Lacepede Islands, *en route* to Sydney, 4th.....The coasting steamer *Rob Roy* arrived from Melbourne.....The early closing movement and Tuesday half-holiday to assistants adopted by the storekeepers of Perth.....A purse and testimonial presented to Capt. H. O'Grady by the W. A. Marine Insurance Company for meritorious conduct in taking the barque *Amur* to sea during the hurricane at the Lacepede Islands.....The Railway Supplementary Loan for £26,000 subscribed for in Melbourne at one per cent. premium...
...A Skating Club formed in Perth.....The first case of "black-birding" tried in the Perth Supreme Court, the offender being sentenced to five years' penal servitude.....The obituary for the

month contains the names of Mr. John Stokes, Mr. Arthur Trimmer, and Mr. John R. Thompson.

MAY.—The Right Rev. Bishop Parry, successor to Dr. Hale, the first bishop of the Diocese, arrived with his family from England by the Hastings, 26th; the enthronement of his lordship in St. George's Cathedral taking place the day following..... A further analysis of blanket sand from Kendenup Reef showed very satisfactory results.....Bonedust first exported.....The barque Hadda wrecked on the Abrolhos.....Mr. George Shenton appointed Lloyd's Agent at Fremantle.....Her Majesty's Birthday celebrated by a grand review of the troops.....The obituary contains the name of Mr. F. M. Roe, fourth son of the Hon. Capt. Roe, R.N.

JUNE.—The anniversary of the foundation of the colony celebrated by a Regatta at Fremantle.....Operations resumed on the Geraldton-Northampton Railway.....An old colonist named Moon killed at Fremantle by the wheels of a cart passing over him.....Bishop Parry publicly welcomed at the Perth Town Hall.....The obituary for the month contains the names of Miss Knight and Mrs. D. S. Murray.

JULY.—Intelligence received by Governor Robinson that Her Majesty had appointed him to be a Knight Commander of the Order of S.S. Michael and George. This is the first instance of such a distinction being conferred upon a Governor or other public officer serving in Western Australia.....Fourth session of the second Legislative Council opened by Sir Wm. Robinson, 10th.....A commission appointed to arrange for the representation of the colony at the Paris Exhibition of 1878, and the Legislature voted £1,000 for the purpose.....A Mounted Volunteer Corps, under the command of Mr. R. H. Rose, formed at Bunbury.....His Excellency Sir Wm. C. F. Robinson received intimation of his appointment to the Governorship of the Straits Settlements.....The first session of the third Synod of the Church of England opened, 11th.....First direct shipment of wool to London made from Port Walcott.....Communication with Eyre Station, on the Eucla Telegraph Line, 17th.....Johnston Memorial Church, Fremantle, dedicated, 22nd.....The obituary contains the names of Mrs. Robert Hester and Mr. Cockman.

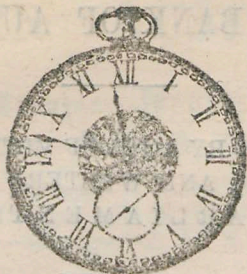
