

For Messages between any two Stations in Western Australia, a uniform rate of 1s. for the first ten words, and 1d. for each additional. Press Messages are transmitted at one-fourth of the above rate.

No charge is made for the date, address, or signature to

any message.

Messages are delivered free of charge within one mile of the office; over that distance mileage at the rate of 1s. per mile is chargeable.

On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after office hours, and on Sundays, double the

ordinary rate will be required upon all Messages.

Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables.

parcel of any kind must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication, under a penalty of not less than £5.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late letters are received till within five minutes of the dispatch of Inland Mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

BRIEF CHRONICLE

O F

OCCURRENCES AND EVENTS,

FROM OCTOBER, 1873, TO SEPTEMBER, 1874.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1873.

OCTOBER.—Dr. Griver, Administrator of the Roman Catholic Church in this colony, and Bishop of Tloa, translated to the See of Perth.....Intimation received that the Royal Assent had been given to the Bill passed by the Legislature for raising a loan of £100,000 for the construction of a line of railway and telegraph from Champion Bay to Northampton.....The s. s. Georgette foundered off the

Murray River on the 20th inst.....The exports of the colony for the year ending 30th September, 1873, amounted to £278,502 16s.; the imports during the same period amounted to £153,680 16s. 2d.....Large orders received from South Australia and New Zealand for Jarrah piles and railway sleepers....The drainage of Perth again engages attention, and the sum of £1000 is voted for a brick drain to Claisebrook.....Several street lamps erected in Perth.....Angora goats introduced from South Australia by Mr. W. Padbury.

NOVEMBER.—Gold prospectors from Victoria, employed by the Government, arrive, and are located in various districts.....The Legislative Council affirmed the resolution that it is desirable to accept the offer made by the Government of South Australia to extend its telegraph line to Eucla, concurrent with an extension from King

George's Sound to Eucla.

DECEMBER.—Governor Weld left the colony on a visit to New Zealand, Lieut-Colonel Harvest being sworn in Administrator.....New Quarantine Regulations promulgated.....The All England Cricketers arrive at Albany, en route to Melbourne, and are welcomed by telegraph by the Weld Club....Mr. James Major, C.E., estimates the cost of the proposed railway to the Eastern districts at £400,000.....A man named Goswell murdered his paramour at Beverley.....Colonel Warburton's exploring party from South Australia reached the Oakover River, 13th.

1874.

JANUARY.—An organ for St. George's Cathedral, to cost about £500, ordered from England.....Great progress made at the pearl-shell fishery on the North West Coast and at Shark's Bay.....A fund organised for building a Home on the Swan for the male children in the Perth Protestant Orphanage.....The first moiety of the £100,000 public loan successfully negociated through the National Bank of Australasia in Melbourne.....Intelligence received of Chief Justice Burt being raised to the dignity of a Knight Bachelor in recognition of his valuable public services in the West Indies and Western Australia.....The

inland postage on newspapers again re-imposed.....A Central Vaccine Board appointed at Perth.....The Royal Assent given to the Constitution Amendment Act, whereby the number of members in the Legislative Council is

increased by three.

FEBRUARY.—Intelligence of the arrival of Colonel Warburton's party at Roebourne received in Perth, 5th.... The ship Naval Brigade arrives from England with fifty time-expired soldiers and their families.....Mr. Wm. Foster murdered at Narrogin, 13th.....The Rev. Joseph Gegg, Colonial Chaplain, installed Dean of Perth in St. George's Cathedral, 22nd.....Prospectors from Victoria discover gold in various parts of the colony.....First session of the second Synod of the Church of England opened, 4th.....The 8th observed as a Harvest Thanksgiving Day.....Several Angora goats introduced by Mr. Padbury from Victoria.....The revenue of the colony for 1873 amounted to £134,802, being an increase over the preceding year of nearly £30,000. The Imperial expenditure during the same period amounted to £30,000.

MARCH.—Mr. John Forrest's exploring party left Perth en route to the Murchison River, 18th.....Colonel Warburton and his exploring party arrive at Fremantle by the Mary Ann, 25th.....The barque Chalmers wrecked on the Murray Reef, 19th.....H. M. gunboat Beagle arrived at Fremantle, 21st.....Kelmscott Church consecrated by the Bishop of Perth, 29th.....Colonel Warburton and his son leave Perth for Albany en route to Adelaide, 26th; and finally leave by the ss. Baroda on the 29th. Addresses were presented to the Colonel by the Corporations of Perth and Fremantle, and he was accorded a

public reception at both towns.

APRIL.—Forrest's expedition to Adelaide left Champion Bay, 1st.....A Government Residency established at the Williams River.....Governor Weld returns from a visit to the Eastern Colonies, 8th.....A gold watch and a purse of sovereigns presented to Mr. J. W. Lewis, second in command of Colonel Warburton's expedition, presented to him by the colonists previous to his departure for South Australia.....Gill, the murderer of Mr. Foster, executed at

Perth Prison on the 4th, having previously made a full confession of the crime.....A piece of plate presented by his fellow-townsmen to Mr. S. Knight, for nearly forty years postmaster at Albany.....Mr. John Hubbard, Mr. James Hough, and Mr. D. H. Scott, old colonists, died.

MAY.—Two interesting libel cases—Eliot v. Carey, and Crowther v. Gray—heard at the Supreme Court.....

Another attempt made to examine the underlying strata between Shark's Bay and the sea coast, under the superintendence of the Rev. C. G. Nicolay, with the view of excavating a canal for shipping.....The new lighthouse at Champion Bay condemned and demolished......A freight of pearl-shells (315 hhds.), wool, &c., valued at £16,000, brought by the Annie Beaton from Port Walcott..... Extensive orders for Jarrah railway sleepers and telegraph poles received from the Eastern Colonies and New ZealandMr. Fred. Sherwood, Mr. Wm. Wood, and Mrs. Joseph Hardey, old colonists, died.....Her Majesty's Birthday celebrated by a Review at Perth and a Ball at Government House, 26th......Munificent gifts to the Perth Protestant Orphanage made by Mr. Gibbs, of Tentesfield, England, and by Mr. Wm. Burges, of Clonmel, Ireland, one of the early settlers in this colony.

JUNE.—Mr. S. R. Hamersley, opposed by Mr. S. H. Parker, elected for the representation of the new constituency of the Murray and Williams in the Legislative Council.....The northern extension of the telegraph completed on the 5th; thus establishing instantaneous communication between every district in the colony south of Roebourne.....Quartz-crushing batteries arrived by the Centaur from Melbourne, and their erection at Fremantle proceeded with.....Capt. Stirling, formerly Commodore of the Australian Squadron, visits the colony on his way to Sydney, and is entertained at a ball at the Town Hall on the 9th.....Private Fred. Read, M.R.V., wins Governor

Weld's challenge cup at the Perth butts.

JULY.—Fourth Session of the Legislative Council opened by Governor Weld, 1st...Trout ova introduced from Melbourne and deposited at Albany...An Act passed the Legislature increasing the payments to teachers

in Assisted Schools from £1 7s. 9d. to £1 15s per head, and in Government Schools from £2 15s. to £3.....A notification received from England that Governor Weld has been appointed to succeed Mr. DuCane in the government of Tasmania.....Inland postage on newspapers again abolished, by a vote of the Legislative Council.....A

comet visible.

AUGUST .- By a unanimous resolution of the Legislative Council the Government submitted a bill to the House for the introduction of Responsible Government. The second reading of the Bill was passed by a large majority, whereupon Governor Weld dissolved the Council, in order that the country might have an opportunity of expressing a deliberate opinion on the measurea step which met with the unanimous approval of the colonists ... A sample of quartz, weighing 17 pounds, taken from a reef on the Preston River, assayed at the Sydney Mint, and found to contain 255/1000 of an ounce of standard gold; or upwards of 33 ounces to the ton The proposition of Messrs. The Legislative Council pass a Land Transfer Act on the Torrens principle, and also a Game Act ... A proposal submitted to the Government for the construction of a large dock or slip for shipping at Fremantle The Legislative Council pass a vote of £15,000—the first instalment—for the construction of the aërial line of telegraph from King George's Sound to Eucla....Rumoured exodus of a large number of miners from South Australia to Champion Bay, and a gentleman representing a Labor Union in that colony arrives for the purpose of making a report of the facilities for settlement Mr. Andrew Muir, Mr. W. Minson, Mr. Geo. Pope, Mrs. Randell, and Mrs. G. F. Stone, old colonists, died The ship Enos Soule partially burnt at Albany.

First trout ova hatched at Albany, 5th The revenue of the colony for the quarter ended 30th instant amounted to £31,741 17s. 1., and the expenditure to £37,368 10s. 11d. Mr. Forrest and his exploring party arrived safely at the Peake Station, on the Australian Transcontinental line of Telegraph, 30th.....Mr. William Cruse, an old colonist, died.






