ECLIPSES IN 1876.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME AT PERTH.

In the year 1876 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I.—*March 10.*—A partial eclipse of the Moon, to the extent of one quarter of her diameter, the first contact with the shadow being at four minutes past one o'clock after noon, and the last contact with the shadow at four minutes after three o'clock; but as the Moon will not rise until 20 minutes past 5 o'clock, this Eclipse will not be visible at Perth.

II.—*March 25-26.*—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, not visible from any part of Australia.

III.—*September 4.*—A partial eclipse of the Moon, to the extent of one-third of her diameter; visible at Perth. The first contact with the shadow will be on the northern limb at 59 minutes past 3 o'clock a.m., and the last contact with the shadow at 13 minutes after 6 o'clock in the morning on the W.N.W. limb. On this day sundials will be one minute fast of mean time. The moon will be above the horizon of Perth between five minutes past six p.m. of the 3rd, and three minutes past seven on the morning of the 4th, and will be full at four minutes before five o'clock on the same morning.

IV.—*September 18.*—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, invisible at Perth, or from the western parts of Australia. The Eclipse begins on the Earth generally at 2h. 55m. a.m., ends on the Earth generally at 8h. 9m. a.m.; the Sun centrally eclipsed between 3h. 59m. a.m. and 5h. 4m. a.m., mean time at Perth.

PORT REGULATIONS.

Under the provisions contained in the "Shipping and Pilotage Consolidation Ordinance, 1855," His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to direct that the following Rules and Regulations be observed, and that any person convicted of a breach thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5. All former rules and regulations issued under this Ordinance are hereby repealed :—

PILOTAGE.

1. At any port in Western Australia where a Pilot is provided, the payment of pilotage in accordance with the regulated scale shall be compulsory on all Masters of vessels, with the exceptions of those below mentioned.

2. At the Port of Fremantle it shall not be necessary for Masters of vessels to employ an outward Pilot; but whenever such Pilot is required his services must be paid for.

3. The masters of all vessels *bonâ fide* engaged in the Coasting Trade of the colony will be exempted from Pilotage Charges if, from the time of their sighting any port at which a Pilot is provided until their anchors are dropped in such port, they hoist at the main-mast head a flag (not less than 9 feet 6 inches in size) with a black ball in the centre. Such flag shall be recognised as the Exemption Flag.

4. The Masters of vessels *bonâ fide* owned in the colony will be required to pay an annual sum of £5 in full of all Pilotage Charges.

5. The Master of every vessel (not being a coaster) *bonâ fide* built and owned or *bonâ fide* owned in the colony, must possess a Certificate of Exemption from the Local Board of this colony. A charge of £2 10s. will be made for such Certificate.

6. Masters of vessels possessing an Exemption Certificate will render themselves liable to a fine equal to pilotage if they fail to fly the "Exemption Flag" in the manner pointed out in Regulation No. 3.

7. Masters of *bonâ fide* Coasters who do not fly the "Exemption Flag," in the manner pointed out in Regulation No. 3, will render themselves liable to a fine not exceeding £5.

LIGHT DUES.

8. All vessels (except vessels of War and vessels chartered by Her Majesty) arriving from beyond seas shall be chargeable with

Light Dues at all ports in Western Australia where lights are provided, and at the rate of 2d. per ton, inwards and outwards, on their registered tonnage,—to be ascertained according to English rule.

9. The Master of any vessel who has paid light dues at any one port in Western Australia, and who may desire to visit other ports in the colony for the purpose of loading or unloading thereat, will be furnished with a Certificate from the Collector of Customs, which Certificate shall free him from Light Dues at any other port in Western Australia for a period of three months from the date thereof, provided no voyage be made to any place outside the colony within such three months.

10. The Masters of vessels *bonâ fide* engaged in the Coasting Trade of the colony may agree with the Collector of Customs at Fremantle to compound the payment of Light Dues by one annual payment in accordance with the following scale :—

The Collector of Customs shall in every case furnish the Master with a Certificate that the vessel named therein is free from payment of Light Dues till the 31st day of December then next ensuing, and no longer.

Applicants prior to 30th June in any year will be required to pay the full rates; those subsequent to that date will only be required to pay one moiety.

Masters of Coasters not availing themselves of this privilege will be required to pay Light Dues at the rate of twopence per ton inwards and outwards.

TONNAGE DUES.

11. The masters of all vessels arriving from beyond seas, with cargo beyond one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on their registered tonnage.

12.—The masters of all vessels arriving from beyond seas, with

cargo less than one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on the cargo landed.

13. The Masters of all vessels clearing out for parts beyond seas, with cargo beyond one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on their registered tonnage.

14. The Masters of all vessels clearing out for parts beyond seas, with cargo less than one-fourth in extent of their registered tonnage, will be charged 3d. per ton on the cargo taken away.

15. The following vessels will be exempt from Tonnage Dues :—

- (i.) All vessels *bonâ fide* engaged in the Coasting Trade of this colony.
- (ii.) All vessels of War and all vessels chartered by Her Majesty.
- (iii.) All vessels in ballast.
- (iv.) All vessels in distress, and in such case seeking repair or provisions.

16. The Master of any vessel who has paid Tonnage Dues at any one port in Western Australia, and who may desire to visit other ports in the colony, for the purpose of loading or unloading thereat, will be furnished with a Certificate by the Collector of Customs, which Certificate shall free him from payment of Tonnage Dues at any other port in Western Australia for a period of three months from the date thereof, provided no voyage be made to any place outside the colony within such three months.

TELEGRAPH MESSAGES.

For Messages between any two Stations in Western Australia, a uniform rate of 1s. for the first ten words, and 1d. for each additional word. Press Messages are transmitted at one-fourth of the above rate.

No charge is made for the date, address, or signature of any Message.

Messages are delivered free of charge within one mile of the office; over that distance mileage at the rate of 1s. per mile is chargeable.

On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after office hours, and on Sundays, double the ordinary rate will be required upon all Messages.

Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of *an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables.*

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices, at the following rates :—

For Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5 but not exceeding £10, two shillings. POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Post Office Savings Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working-day from nine in the morning till four in the evening :—

Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Vasse, Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, and Wanerenooka. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two-pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four-pence; or for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted out of the colony by sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the colony—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction of a half ounce, sixpence additional.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Via Southampton—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional. Via Brindisi—Not exceeding half an ounce, 9d.; above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 6d.; above one ounce, and not exceeding 1½ ounce, 2s. 3d.; and for every additional ½ oz. or fraction thereof, 9d.

LETTERS FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three-pence for every half ounce or fraction of an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Newspapers printed and posted in the colony for delivery beyond the boundaries of the city or town at which they may be published, and posted within one week from the date of publication, Free. Newspapers posted for transmission to places beyond the limits of the colony, or posted within the city, or any town in the colony, for delivery within the boundaries of such city or town, 1d. each. Newspapers received from places beyond the limits of the colony are delivered free, but when re-posted are subject to a charge of 1d. each.

Regulations—Every book packet or parcel of any

kind must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication, under a penalty of not less than £5.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late letters are received till within five minutes of the dispatch of Inland Mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

The Supreme Court has, in addition to its Common Law and Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, jurisdiction in Bankruptcy—the Local Bankruptcy Act being almost identical with the English Act of 1869. It has also jurisdiction in Lunacy and Equity, and by Local Ordinance 27 Victoria No. 19, of 1873, a Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes was constituted, with all the jurisdiction of the Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes in England, vested in it under the 20th and 21st of Victoria, ch. 85.

SITTINGS OF THE SUPREME COURT.

The Court holds its sittings at such times and places as the Chief Justice by rules and orders may prescribe.

By general order, dated 24th June, 1861, the Court holds sittings at Perth on the first Wednesday in each month, and continues such sittings by adjournment until all cases on the Criminal Calendar are disposed of. The Court then proceeds with all causes, rules, and motions set down for hearing and argument.

Special orders can be obtained for holding sittings in other localities, when public convenience requires.

History of Western Australia.

BRIEF CHRONICLE OF OCCURRENCES AND EVENTS FROM OCTOBER, 1874, TO SEPTEMBER, 1875.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1874.

OCTOBER.—A Company, styled the Standard Gold Mining Company (Limited), established at Albany for the purpose of working a supposed auriferous quartz reef at Kendenup.....The second general election of members to serve in the Legislative Council takes place.....The first turf of the Geraldton-Northampton Railway—the first public railway started in Western Australia—turned by Governor Weld, 22nd.....Several pure-bred Lincoln stud sheep imported by Mr. G. Slater.....A Farmers' and Tradesmen's Society, with Mr. W. Padbury, M.L.C., as its President, established at Guildford.....A sugar-mill, to be set up at Yatheroo, imported from England by Mr. W. Padbury.....The Government quartz-crushing machine commenced work at Fremantle.....The Bishop of Perth consecrated the Moorumbine Church, which is the most remotely situated place of worship in the colony, being upwards of 120 miles from the sea-coast.....Quartz containing gold visible to the naked eye found near the Blackwood Bridge.....The first revenue cutter for the protection of the pearlers on the North-west Coast, commanded by Captain Pemberton Walcott, despatched from Fremantle.....A branch of the Colonial Mutual Provident Society (Limited) established in Perth.....A severe epidemic of the influenza type visits the colony, and many deaths occur therefrom.

NOVEMBER.—The first session of the second Legislative Council opened on the 18th and adjourned 21st to 22nd February, 1875.....The Legislature voted a sum of 500 guineas for Mr. John Forrest and his party in recognition of their services on their exploratory journey from the Murchison to South Australia.....

H.M.S. Barracouta arrived from England, 4th, and left for Sydney, 6th.....A bonus of £2,500 for the erection of smelting works at Champion Bay voted by the Legislature.....Ships' moorings laid down at Fremantle, Bunbury, Geographie Bay, and Champion Bay.....A regatta held on Perth Water, 9th.....The early-closing movement agitated by store employés.....Human remains, supposed to have been buried fifty years, discovered on Dirk Hartog's Island, off Shark's Bay.....The Guildford section of the Metropolitan Rifle Volunteers created a separate company, under the command of Lieut. S. R. Hamersley.....Influenza very prevalent.....Mr. Edward Hamersley, Mr. Stephen Trigg, Mr. Elsegood, and Mr. Wm. FitzCook, old colonists, died.

DECEMBER.—The Transit of Venus over the Sun's disc visible at Perth, 9th.....Tenders accepted by the Government for materials and construction of the Eucla Telegraph extension ; the South Australian Government having already intimated its willingness to extend its line to the eastern boundary of Western Australia.....A public reception accorded Mr. John Forrest and the other members of his exploring party, on their return from Adelaide, 14th.....The brig Centaur wrecked on Little Island Reef, 9th.....A plan for establishing a bathing house in the Swan suggested by the Bishop of Perth.....Destructive explosion at Mr. Edmund Birch's Dispensary, by which Mr. Birch was fatally injured, 19th.....William and Henry Clarkson murdered by natives on the Murchison whilst driving stock overland to Nickol Bay.

1875.

JANUARY.—Governor Weld planted the first pole of the Eucla telegraph extension, at Albany, 1st.....Governor Robinson arrived at Albany per steamer Pera from Galle, and Governor Weld left the Sound for Hobart Town, via Melbourne, by the same vessel, 4th.....Public reception in Perth of Governor Robinson, and His Excellency took the oaths of office, administered by Sir A. P. Burt, Kt., C.J., 11th.....The Legislative Council resumed its sittings from the adjournment in November, on the 22nd inst., when Earl Carnarvon's despatch on the resolution of the Council for the adoption of Responsible Government was sent up to the House by Governor Robinson.....The election of a member to serve in the Legislative Council, in the room of Mr.

Edmund Birch, who died on the 16th inst., took place on the 19th. Messrs. G. Randell and E. A. Stone were nominated, and the former was elected.....Police Lance-Corporal Armstrong shot dead by an aboriginal native named Bobbinet, near Kojonup, 13th.....The exports during 1874 amounted to £400,631, and the imports to £367,417.....The Queen appoints Mr. G. W. Leake, formerly Acting Attorney General, to be one of Her Majesty's Counsel for Western Australia.....Messrs. John and Alexander Forrest publicly entertained at Bunbury and York.....Several Chinamen introduced by settlers at Roebourne.....The clip of wool at Nickol Bay exceeds 500 bales.....Mr. William House, an old colonist, died.

FEBRUARY.—The barque *Zedora* wrecked on the Straggler Reef, 10th.....Mr. Thomas Burges elected member for the North District in the Legislative Council.....An effort made to establish a local company for the purchase of the s.s. *Georgette* and her existing contracts.....Very favourable reports received from Ballarat of the yield of gold from quartz obtained from the Standard Mining Co.'s reef, Kendenup.....An organ for Wesley Church, Perth, received from London.....The obituary for the month contains the names of Mr. W. H. Duffield, Mrs. E. C. Dean, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Smith, and Mr. Buggins.....The Perth City Council send an order to England for a fire-engine, to cost about £300.

MARCH.—The Perth Working Men's Association purchase a site for a hall in Beaufort-street.....A lad named Garn killed by falling overboard from a river steamer near Guildford.....Mr. J. H. Monger, against whom a charge of bribery and corruption connection with his election had been preferred by an opposing candidate—Mr. S. S. Parker—vacates his seat as member for York and Beverley, and a writ for a new election is issued.....Favourable accounts of the prospects of obtaining emigrants received from Mr. E. H. Laurence, engaged as Emigration Agent in London on behalf of the colony.....The obituary for the month contains the names of the following old colonists—Mr. Alfred Davies, Mr. George Read, and Mr. William Arnold.

APRIL.—More liberal concessions of land to immigrants settling in the colony promulgated.....Governor Robinson recommends the Home Government to arm the Volunteer corps of the colony with the Sneider rifle.....Considerable reductions in

the staff of the Control and the Convict Departments, and arrangements set on foot for consolidating the latter Department at the Convict Prison at Fremantle.....H. M. S. Sappho, from England, viâ the Cape, and H.M.S. Renard, in the course of her circumnavigation of Australia in guarding the interests of the aboriginal natives employed in the pearl-shell fishery, visit Fremantle.....The parishioners of St. George's Cathedral agitate for the demolition of the present structure, and the erection of a new one in its stead—a proposition which, on being opposed by the Bishop, on the ground of the cost of a building that would meet with his approval was beyond the means of the parishioners, fell through.....The Australian Mutual Provident Society, having established a branch in the colony, send a canvassing agent—Mr. James Barker—to Perth to popularize their plan of life assurance by a series of lectures, a course which proved highly successful.....A man crushed to death on Messrs. Mason, Bird, & Co.'s tramway, 12th.....The imports for 1874 amounted to £364,262, and the exports, £428,836—showing an increase of 75 per cent. on the previous year.....Lieut. A. J. Hillman appointed Captain Commanding the Metropolitan Rifle Volunteers, *vice* Capt. Birch, deceased.....Mr. Lewis Birch, an old colonist, died.

Sherwood (Sub-Lieut.), of the Metropolitan Rifle VolunteersA discovery of gold in alluvial at Roebourne reported—the yield from five tons of dirt being 82½ grains.....Her Majesty's Birthday celebrated by a review of the troops at Perth and a Ball at Government House, 24th.....Meetings held to further consider schemes for harbor improvement and a railway connecting the Eastern Districts with Fremantle.....The obituary for the month contains the names of Mrs. Thos. Buckingham, Mrs. M. Morrissey, and Mr. G. P. Williams.

Gull and Morrison.....Mr. J. T. Monger elected member of the Legislative Council for the York and Beverley districts.....Houtman's Abrolhos leased from the Government for a fishery.....A subscription of £100 raised for

the purchase of a testimonial plate for the Hon. F. P. Barlee.....
Erection of a drill-shed for the Volunteers proposed.....Opening
services in connection with the organ in Wesley Church, Perth
(16th).....A Building Society established at Fremantle.
