## ECLIPSES IN 1865.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME.

In the year 1865 there will be two Eclipses of the SUN, and two of the MOON; but only one of the latter will be visible at Perth.

I.—April 11. A partial Eclipse of the MOON, from 33 minutes before noon to 1 hour 12 minutes after noon, and therefore not visible at Perth, the MOON being below the horizon.

II.—April 25. A total Eclipse of the SUN, not visible in Australia.

III.—October 5. A partial Eclipse of the MOON will commence at 5 hours 21 minutes in the morning. The MOON will set 3 minutes afterwards, slightly eclipsed on her south-eastern limb.

IV.—October 19. An annular Eclipse of the SUN, visible only in the northern hemisphere.

THE COLONY OF  
WESTERN AUSTRALIA,

AS defined by Her Majesty's Commission, includes all that portion of New Holland situated to the westward of 129 degrees East longitude; its greatest length is therefore 1,280 miles from North to South, and 800 miles from East to West. The City of PERTH is situated in 32 degrees South.

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A BRIEF CHRONICLE OF OCCURRENCES AND EVENTS FROM  
OCTOBER 1, 1863, TO SEPTEMBER, 1864.

[Under the above head the most remarkable events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the ALMANACK: the following notes are therefore to be taken as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

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1863.

OCTOBER.—License-fee of 2s 6d per month imposed upon each person cutting sandalwood on Crown Lands.....A new weekly journal (*The West Australian Times*) published.....The amount of deposits in the Savings' Bank on the 6th of this month was upwards of £1,247, the advantages of the institution being much appreciated, especially by the laboring class..... The Bishop's Collegiate School at Perth again revived... The Perth Building Society makes rapid progress, the number of shares taken up to the 8th of this month representing the amount of £13,925; the average weekly receipts £31, and the amount disbursed £1,300.....Governor Hampton returns from his tour to K. G. Sound, and proceeds to the Eastern districts.....Metropolitan Rifles and Fremantle Volunteers assemble for target-practice.....Mr F. D. Wittenoom, Sheriff of the Colony, and who had filled several important public offices, died on the 28th. Deceased was universally respected, and his loss much regretted by all classes of the colonists.....Much discussion among the graziers and agriculturists with respect to a proposed revision of the Land Regulations, the proposal being supported by the former and opposed by the latter.

NOVEMBER.—A despatch received from the Secretary of State stating that no conditional-pardons will be granted to prisoners hereafter sent to

the Colony.....Mr John Cowan returns from an expedition to the eastward of York. He travelled over Mr M. Lefroy's track, and found the country well grassed, and tolerably supplied with water.....Account sales received from India represent Western Australian horses as realizing good prices.

DECEMBER.—A most destructive fire occurs at the Greenough Flats, by which wheat and other crops to the value of £2,000 are destroyed..... Metropolitan Rifles and Fremantle Volunteers assemble in Perth for the purpose of witnessing the presentation of commissions to the officers of the former Corps.....The first annual meeting of the Perth Building Society held on the 8th instant.....By the return of the cutter *Mystery* very satisfactory intelligence is received of the progress of the Nicol Bay settlement.....The *Dalhousie*, with 270 convicts, arrives on the 28th.....During the past year much progress is made in the exploration and settlement of new country, both to the north and south of the metropolis.....The average weekly liabilities of the W. A. Bank, on the 31st, were: £62,973, and assets £77,578... ..The price of flour is £16 10s per ton; wheat, 6s per bushel; beef and mutton, 5d to 7d per lb.

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## 1864.

JANUARY.—Addition made to St. George's Cathedral, consecrated by Bishop Hale on the 8th.....The *Robert Morrison* leaves for England with a cargo of wool, copper ore, wattle bark, and manna gum, valued at £30,000.....Sixty horses shipped on board the *Alert* at Champion Bay for Madras.....A meeting of delegates from the various agricultural societies held on the 13th at the Freemasons' Hotel, Perth, for the purpose of suggesting a new system of Land Regulations.....Metropolitan Rifles challenge the Fremantle Volunteers to a competitive match, which is accepted, and the match came off at Fremantle on the 16th February, when the Perth Corps were the victors... ..Slab-tiles first made at Guildford.....An expedition formed for the purpose of proceeding to Camden Harbour in search of gold (said by a prisoner in the Convict Establishment, named Wildman, who visited that locality, as mate of a ship in 1856, to exist there); also with the intention of ascertaining the adaptability of the country for pastoral and agricultural purposes.....Arrangement made for the investment of money in the Savings' Banks... The Fremantle Working Man's Association publish their annual report, which gives the receipts at £50; number of members 151, and of books issued, 1729.....£214 collected in aid of the sufferers by the fire at Greenough Flats.....Eighty-two horses shipped in the *Dalhousie* for Calcutta.....The Bishop's Collegiate School again opened.....At the annual meeting of the Western Australian Mining Association, held on the 27th, it was resolved to borrow £5,000 to develop its mineral resources.....A man in the employ of Mr Middleton, on the Canning,



bitten by a poisonous snake, but having had sufficient presence of mind to cut out the bitten part, recovers in a few days from the effects.

FEBRUARY.—Scale of inland book-postage reduced.....On the 9th the foundation-stone was laid of a new club-house in Perth for the Sons of Australia Benefit Society.....Peruvian cotton-tree seed received, distributed, and found to flourish exceedingly well.....At the annual meeting of the Swan River Mechanics' Institute, it was shown that 6,775 volumes of books were issued during 1863, that the number of ordinary members was 150, and of honorary members 49.....Proposition made by a Mr Larnach to lease a large extent of country, rejected.....A fine new vessel—the *Sea Ripple*—of 188 tons, built in London for Messrs. Bateman, to be employed in the Western Australian trade, arrives on the 29th.....Price of beef and mutton reduced to 3d and 5d per lb.....Several shepherds stuck up and robbed by runaway convicts... A rifle-match comes off on the 27th, between 10 married and 10 single members of the Fremantle Volunteers, the latter being defeated by two points.....Proclamation made of the establishment and time and places of sitting of Local Courts, viz.:—At Police Court, Perth, first Saturday in each month; ditto Fremantle, last Monday in ditto; ditto Swan, last Friday in ditto; ditto York and Vasse, second Thursday in ditto.

MARCH.—The *New Perseverance* sails on the 2nd with the expedition previously referred to. This expedition was organized almost solely by voluntary contributions. The following are the names of the members composing it:—Mr Panter (leader), Dr. Martin, (botanist, &c.), Messrs. F. and H. Caporn, DuBoulay, Scott, Manning, M. Stokes, R. Gallop, jun., E. Thomas, and — Logue, accompanied by police constable Buck, 2 natives, and the convict Wildman, the reputed gold-discoverer.....A melancholy accident occurs at Guildford to Miss M. Shenton, who was drowned while bathing.....An old and respected colonist named Quartermaine was shot at and severely wounded by a convict named Graham, who afterwards becomes notorious for bushranging and the commission of numerous robberies.....A shepherd, in charge of Mr Davis' station, on the Irwin, killed by the natives.....Mr B. Clarkson returns from an expedition to the eastward of Northam. He describes the country passed over as good, with water easily procurable.....Many escapes made by convicts from road-parties, who are, however, speedily recaptured.....Considerable quantities of tobacco produced in the Eastern districts, many farmers growing sufficient for their establishments.....Hooping cough very prevalent in Perth, and spreads to many other parts of the Colony... A valuable communication on the minerals of Western Australia, from W. B. Clarke, of Sydney, received and published.....Mr R. D. Hardey, accompanied by Mr Robinson and the native Kowitch, leaves York on the 15th, on an expedition to the furthest point of Mr H. M. Lefroy's track.....A return rifle-match between the Metropolitan Rifles and Fremantle Volunteers comes off at Perth on the 28th, the former corps



being the victors by 11 points.....The Western Australian Races comes off upon the Perth race-course, on the 30th and 31st, the winning horses being:—For the Maiden Plate, Mr T. Wilding's Lady Stirling; Town Plate, Mr Keenan's Nonsuch; Galloway Stakes and Hack Stakes, Mr Monger's Chusan; Ladies' Purse, Mr Prinsep's Star of the South; Three-Year-Old Stakes and Queen's Plate, Mr Bibra's Baron; Settlers' Stakes, Mr Wilson's Chusan; Consolation Stakes, Mr A. Warren's Bushman.

APRIL.—The establishment of a Sanitarium for invalided Indian troops prominently brought forward by a small but respectable section of colonists, and a deputation wait upon the Governor on the 1st April to represent their views upon the subject.....Graham, the bushranger, captured by Serjeant Finlay and a native constable, between Albany and Esperance Bay.....A cricket-match between the Perth and Fremantle Clubs played at Fremantle on the 8th, resulting in favour of the former by two runs.....The Perth Working Man's Association fully organized on the 4th instant, by the election of a committee, treasurer, &c..... Intelligence received from Melbourne and Adelaide of the revival of the anti-transportation movement to convicts being sent to Western Australia.....The convict ship *Clara* arrives on the 12th with 301 convicts... Esperance Bay first occupied as a grazing station, by Messrs. Dempster... Proposals made to form a recreation-ground between the two principal jetties at Perth, but although a considerable amount was subscribed for the purpose, the work was not undertaken.....Notification made of an increased charge, from 1st July, on letters sent to Western Australia from the United Kingdom, via Southampton or Marseilles, but no alteration on those sent from the Colony.....Mr T. Burges proceeds from Champion Bay in the *Flying Foam*, on an expedition to Exmouth Gulf.....Several deaths from hooping cough occur.....Some superior rams introduced by Mr Ranford from South Australia..... Meeting held at Perth to take into consideration the formation of a cricket-ground.

MAY.—The foundation-stone of the Trinity Congregational Chapel, Perth, laid by Governor Hampton, on the 10th. The design of this Chapel is extremely chaste, and when completed, will be the most elegant religious edifice in the Colony.....Overland communication established between the Murchison and Shark's Bay.....From the large quantities of the article on hand in the Singapore and China markets, the merchants refuse to purchase sandalwood for export.....A number of horses shipped in the *Sea Ripple* for Singapore.....At a special criminal sitting held this month, the notorious convict Graham was tried for shooting and wounding Mr Quartermaine, and sentenced to penal servitude for life..... A military review in honour of the Queen's birthday held at Perth on the 24th.....Western Australian timber in much demand in Adelaide, and orders received for large supplies.....,Mr Willoughby—a gentleman

attached to the staff of the *Melbourne Argus*—arrives, for the purpose of collecting information as to the working of the convict system.

JUNE.—The first of this month, being the anniversary of the foundation of the Colony, passes off without any public amusement.....The *New Perseverance* returns from Camden Harbour on the 6th with the exploring party, who had succeeded in discovering many million acres of fine country, but no gold, the statement of the convict Wildman proving utterly devoid of truth.....New club-house erected at Perth by the Sons of Australia Benefit Society.....Communication received from the Deputy Master of the Sydney Mint, giving, as the result of an assay of some Western Australian quartz, 5 dwts. 17 grains of gold per ton.....A man killed in the Wanerenooka Mine by an earth-slip.....A ploughing-match and cattle show held at Guildford on the 14th.....Mr T. Burges and party land from the *Flying Foam* at the Gascoigne River, where Mr Cooper, master of that vessel, is speared by the natives, but, happily, not dangerously.....At a meeting of the Congregationalists held at Fremantle on the 22nd, a pulpit-bible and a purse of 20 sovereigns were presented by the inhabitants of Fremantle to the Rev. Joseph Johnston, in appreciation of his pastoral services among them for 10 years.....The Legislative Council assembles on the 22nd, when the Governor, in his opening Speech, stated that the amount of revenue received in 1863 was £71,708, and the expenditure £71,073.....The most important acts passed during the sitting of Council were the following:—An Ordinance granting facilities for depositing small savings at interest with the security of the Government; an Ordinance for protecting oyster-fisheries; an Ordinance to amend the Jury Ordinance, by providing payment of jurors' actual expenses, exclusive of loss of time; an Ordinance to amend the City of Perth Ordinance, by dividing the City into three wards, the Council to comprise three ratepayers from each ward, and the chairman to be elected by the general body of ratepayers, instead of, as hitherto, by the Council; and an Ordinance to consolidate and amend the laws to regulate the branding of Live Stock, by compelling owners of cattle and horses to have registered brands, and imposing a penalty for non-registration of from £2 to £20, and for not branding cattle above the age of one, and horses above the age of two years, a penalty of not more than £5.

JULY.—Metropolitan Volunteers assemble for rifle-firing at 250 and 300 yards; the practice considered very creditable, one member (Mr Mitchell) making the extraordinary score of seven bull's-eyes consecutively.....An aboriginal native named Mackie hanged for the murder of an aboriginal female.....An exploratory trip made to the distance of 170 miles eastward of Champion Bay by Mr H. Gray, who discovers a considerable extent of agricultural land; and another exploring party, comprising Mr Hunt (leader), Messrs. Seabrook, Cowan, Easton, Police Constable Edwards, and the native Kowitch, with 23 horses and five months' provisions, leave York on the 9th instant, for the



purpose of examining the country to the north-eastward of that district.....The first lithographic music produced in the colony and issued by Mr G. Barrow, entitled "The Ministrisly of the West".....Advices received from Singapore and China of a partial revival of the sandalwood trade.....Large orders for Western Australian jarrah-wood received from Adelaide, where it is much appreciated and in considerable demand for telegraphic posts, &c.....Western Australian wool realizes 2s. per lb. at the last London wool-sales.....Another vessel (the *Europa*) purchased by Mr Ranford, of Adelaide, for the Western Australian trade.....A boat-race comes off at Albany between the boats of that town and those of the steamship Rangitaria.....A company formed in Melbourne for settling the country around Camden Harbour.....Price of flour advances to £22 a ton.....Half-yearly report of the Fremantle Working Man's Association shows the number of members as having increased to 151.....Notification made in the *Government Gazette* that the first person who may drive 100 head of horses or stock, or 200 sheep, from any part of Western Australia (not included within the North District) to any other part of the same situate to the north of the tropic of Capricorn, before the 1st August, 1865, will be entitled to a free grant of 100,000 acres for pastoral purposes.....Graham and three other convicts make their escape over the walls of the Convict Establishment, but are speedily recaptured.

AUGUST.—Whale-fishery again successfully carried on at Port Gregory.....First shipment of wool (7 bales) produced at Nicol Bay, arrives at Fremantle.....Upwards of 300 bags of flour exported to Mauritius.....Satisfactory intelligence received of the progress of Mr Padbury's settlement at Nicol Bay, and of Mr Wellard's at Tien Tsin Harbour.....Considerable depression caused among the small farmers in the Eastern Districts in consequence of the stoppage of the sandalwood trade.....Advices received of the great value of fluid-gum, a quantity sent by Mr Carr having realised a price in the London market at the rate of £160 per ton.....Price of town allotments reduced, and a great demand for them in consequence.....Amended land regulations approved by the Imperial Government, except that portion having reference to the sales of mineral land, which are suspended until further advices from the Secretary of State.....A company, designated the Roebuck Bay Pastoral and Agricultural Association, and comprising a large number of the most influential colonists, formed during this month, for the purpose of establishing a settlement in the neighbourhood of Roebuck Bay.....Nearly 300 tons of copper-ore shipped at Champion Bay on board the *Bride*.....Several cargoes of sawn timber awaiting shipment at the Vasse

SEPTEMBER.—A man named Barten drowned by the swamping of a boat opposite Dalkeith.....Several colonists preparing to proceed to Nicol Bay and Hampton Downs.....Congregational singing introduced in St. George's Cathedral, Perth.....A large block of carbonate-copper-



ore, containing 70 per cent. of metal, brought to Perth from one of the Champion Bay mines.....Advices received that the increased rate of postage on letters from the United Kingdom, before referred to, will not at present come into operation.....A debating society formed in Perth.....Anniversary meeting of the Metropolitan Rifles celebrated at Perth by prize-firing and a dinner.....The convict-ship *Merchantman* arrives with 257 convicts.

Rates of Postage chargeable on Letters, Newspapers,  
Books, Packets, &c.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which letters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding



half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, two-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce two-pence additional.

**INLAND LETTERS.**—*For transmission between separate post towns within Western Australia*—Under half an ounce, two-pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four-pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

**SHIP LETTERS.**—*Or letters transmitted out of the Colony by Sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the Colony, as opportunity occurs*—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, one shilling additional.

The above rates must be fully prepaid by stamps, or the letters will be detained.

**FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.**—*Viâ Southampton*—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce one shilling additional.

*Viâ Marseilles*—Not exceeding half an ounce, 10d; above  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce and not exceeding 1 ounce, 1s 8d; above one ounce and not exceeding 2 ounces, 3s 4d; above 2 ounces and not exceeding 3 ounces, 5s; every ounce after the first, 1s 8d.

**NEWSPAPERS.**—*Viâ Southampton*—One penny each. *Viâ Marseilles*—Threepence each.

**NEWSPAPERS** posted for delivery within Western Australia, or for transmission out of the Colony, to be prepaid by stamp one penny each.

**CONDITIONS.**—To be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides.

Except the name and address of the person to whom sent there must be no other word or communication, letter, character, figure, or number, written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted.

Newspapers received from beyond seas (except newspapers received direct from France or foreign countries by way of France) will be delivered to their original address free of charge, but if re-posted in the Colony, one penny each must be prepaid. All newspapers re-posted are liable to a fresh rate of postage. Newspapers sent to any Post Office and unclaimed must be returned to the General Post Office, Perth, at the expiration of thirty days.

**BOOKS, ETC.**—*Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter*—*Viâ Southampton* for the United Kingdom—4 ounces, 4d; 8 ounces, 8d; and 8d for each half pound or fraction of half a pound. *Viâ Marseilles* for the United Kingdom—4 ounces, 8d; 8 ounces, 1s 4d; and 1s 4d for each half pound or fraction of half a pound—Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—4 ounces, 4d; 8 ounces, 6d; and 1s for each pound or fraction of a pound. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon and Mauritius—4 ounces, 3d; 8 ounces, 6d; and 6d for each half pound or fraction of half a pound. Malta and Gibraltar, 4 ounces, 4d; 8 ounces, 8d; and 8d for each half pound or fraction of half a pound.

**REGULATIONS.**—Every book packet must be sent either without a cover or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

No book packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

*Books, etc., transmitted within the Colony*—4 ounces, 2d; 8 ounces, 4d; 1lb, 8d; and 4d for each  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb.

**PARCELS, ETC.**—Packets containing samples of merchandise and such like, transmitted within the Colony, half the inland letter rate.

The General and other Post Offices are open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, Sundays excepted.

The system of registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have a shilling stamp affixed thereon by way of fee in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded. A statement of the hours of closing the mails is kept affixed on some exterior part of each Post Office, in order to avoid the frequent occurrence of letters being put in after the departure of the mails: but late letters are received till within five minutes of the dispatch of any Inland Mails, and till within a quarter of an hour of the despatch of any ship mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of two pence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

#### MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, and Queensland, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices at the following rates:—

United Kingdom—Fourpence for each pound or fraction of a pound.

Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5, but not exceeding £10, two shillings.

#### POST OFFICE SAVINGS' BANKS.

Post Office Savings' Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—

Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Bunbury, Vasse, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, and Wanerenooka.

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to any more than £30 in any one year.

When the first deposit is made the Depositor will receive a numbered Book, in which his name, address, and occupation, and the date and amount of his deposit, will be entered.

Any Depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited, can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings' Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth. By the return mail he will receive a warrant from Perth, which will enable him to get his money at the Post Office named by him.

If a man begins to deposit in one Post Office Savings' Bank, at York, for instance, and afterwards goes to Bunbury or Vasse, or some other town, he can



go on depositing, wherever he may be.

And if he has put his money into a Post Office Savings' Bank in one town, in York, for instance, and wants it repaid to him in some other town, he can have it so repaid without difficulty.

While the money of any Depositor lies in the Post Office Savings' Bank, he will be allowed interest on it at the rate of three pounds fifteen shillings per annum for every hundred pounds—that is, he will receive ninepence a year, or three farthings a month, for every complete pound which he may deposit.

Parents may deposit for their children, and women, whether married or single, may deposit on their own account.

Depositors will not have to pay the postage of any letters which they may write to or receive from the General Post Office, with respect to their deposits.

The Postmasters are forbidden to disclose the names of Depositors, or the amount they may deposit, to any one but the Postmaster-General, or to any other officer duly authorised by the Government.

## Fees at the Government Offices.

Copies of documents deposited in the Public Offices may be obtained on payment of the following fees, established by Government notice of the 10th February, 1848.

For any document containing any number of folios, not exceeding 10 of 72 words each, 7/6d; for each and every folio above ten, 1s; for certified copies of enrolled deeds of grant from the Crown, 10s. A fee of 1s to be paid for every search made or reference to Banking returns, required by the Act of Council, 8 Wm. 4th, No. 1, to be filed and kept in the office of the Colonial Secretary, and where certified copies of such returns are required, a further fee of 10s is payable.

### OFFICE FOR THE REGISTRATION OF DEEDS.

For receiving a memorial, 2/6; giving a receipt fee, and afterwards entering the same, for any number of folios, not exceeding 10 or 72 words each, 7/6; for every folio above the first ten, 1s; for receiving any will or other instrument deposited and recording the same, 10s; for giving out the same, 10s; for each search, 2/6; for any examination of any memorial, 1s.

### REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS, MARRIAGES, AND DEATHS.

Every search in an index (to be paid beforehand), 5s; every certified copy of an entry, 5s; every birth registered, 1s; every marriage registered, no fee; every death registered, 1s; every correction of an entry, 1s; every marriage performed by a District Registrar, 40s; do. by banns, 2/6.

DRAWING CHEQUES.—As almost every body in business here keeps an account with the Bank, the following Hints may be useful:—When not using your Cheque Book, keep it under lock and key. When filling in

the amount, see that you leave no room for additions thereto by another party, and begin writing the amount as much to the left as possible. Always use the same signature as the specimen you have left with the Bank; otherwise the bank, for its own security and yours too, may probably return the Cheque with the remark "signature differs." Perhaps unnecessary to the Readers of the Almanack—Do not draw unless you have money in the Bank to meet the cheque.

TO AVOID CATCHING COLD.—Accustom yourself to the use of sponging with cold water every morning on first getting out of bed. It should be followed with a good deal of rubbing with a wet towel. It has considerable effect in giving tone to the skin, and maintaining a proper action in it, and thus proves a safeguard to the injurious influence of cold and sudden changes of temperature. Sir Astley Cooper said, "The methods by which I have preserved my own health are—temperance, early rising, and sponging the body every morning with cold water immediately after getting out of bed, a practice which I have adopted for thirty years without ever catching cold."

Cash advances to super-cargoes and masters for other purposes than disbursements to the amount of £500, 2½ per cent.

Do exceeding that amount, by special agreement.

Re-shipping goods where no funds, 2½ per cent.

Entering and clearing all ships at the Custom House, except those coming in for supplies, 2 guineas each entry.

The system adopted in the Government Schools of this colony corresponds in its main features with the national system of Ireland. Certain modifications have however been introduced, with the view of meeting the special requirements and circumstances of the colony.

The primary object of the Government has been to secure, on the basis of religion, a sound and serviceable education for the children of the middle and lower classes, without any distinction of religious sect; and of which all can avail themselves without fear of interference with their religious convictions.

The proceedings of each day are commenced with general instruction from the Scripture Lesson Books, in which the Minister of all religious denominations, co-operating with the Board, are invited to take part as often as they please, stipulating only that they abstain from alluding to those differences of opinion which unhappily divide the Christian Church, but no children are required to attend without their parents' sanction.

Not less than five hours of every school-day are devoted to secular instruction.

The General Board have expressed their willingness to facilitate to the utmost of their power any arrangements Ministers of religion may wish to make for the special instruction of the children of their own denomination in the school-room during the half-hour usually set apart for reading the scripture lesson.

For the purpose of facilitating such special instruction, the Board are willing to supply Bibles on the application of any Minister co-operating with the Board.

The increasing number of pupils attending the Government School affords every reason for supposing that the system meets with the general approval of the public.

*Roman Catholic Schools*—There are Roman Catholic Schools both in Perth and Fremantle.

# A P P E N D I X .

## LAND REGULATIONS OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

*Synopsis of the existing Regulations, proclaimed at Perth  
August 20, 1864.*

### GENERAL RULES.

Applications for land, whether for lease, license, or purchase, to be sent in to the Surveyor-General, in established printed forms, procurable at the Survey Office, or from Resident Magistrates, without charge. Such applications are to contain at full length all the names of the applicant, his calling and address.

Selections of country land to be in one uniform shape, in length not exceeding three times the breadth.

Boundaries to be parallel to all others in the same district.

Opposite boundaries to be parallel, except on rivers or roads.

Frontage on a river or open water not to exceed one-fourth part of the outer boundaries of a selection.

Both banks of a river whose course is known and mapped, not allowed in one selection, except in special cases.

Required boundaries subject to Governor's approval or adjustment.

Descriptions by applicants to be full and particular, and to refer to some fixed mark in Survey Office maps.

Government not responsible for any errors in such description, but will rectify them when practicable.

Applicants liable to a charge for survey, when such is required for fixing a claim to land.

Such charge to be deposited before survey made.

Private surveys admitted under directions from Surveyor-General, to whom reports are to be made.

Maps of the country and of townsites open to inspection at Survey Office, and at the offices of Resident Magistrates of districts.

Two or more lots of land purchased by the same person at any one public sale, and adjoining each other, may, on application, be included in one deed, and for one fee only.

Title deeds, when completed and enrolled, are deliverable by the Colonial Secretary, or by the Resident Magistrate of the District in which the land may be situated.

No title-deed will be prepared until the balance of purchase-money and the title-deed fee have been paid.

Applications for full title are to contain at full length all the names of the applicant; also his calling and address.

Lands granted, or sold by remission for military or naval services, are not chargeable with title-deed fees.

Deposits and payments for land to be made only to a Collector or Sub-Collector of Revenue, or to other persons duly authorised to receive the same.

Applications to purchase or lease land will have priority according to the actual time of paying deposit thereon.

Applications for land situate in a district where there is a Sub-Collector of Revenue, will not be approved until after the arrival of the next mail from such district.

Compensations to be given for any improvements on land resumed for public purposes.

No compensation allowed for improvements after the expiration, abandonment, or forfeiture of a lease, or for improvements on land under Class A license.

Existing contracts, promises, and engagements to hold good.

Unauthorised occupation of Crown Lands punishable.

Governor not compelled, but only authorized, to let or sell lands applied for.

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### FOR THE SALE OF LANDS.

Waste Crown Lands for sale, are distinguished as town, suburban country, and mineral lands.

Town and suburban lands to be sold by Public Auction, at upset prices, to be regulated by the Governor.

Ordinary country land to be sold at the fixed price of ten shillings per acre, to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same, and in lots of not less than 40 acres each. Special lots of smaller size are charged a higher price.

A deposit of one-tenth the purchase money is payable when the land is applied for; and the balance, with title-deed fee of £1, within one month afterwards.

Deposits returnable if applications not granted; but forfeited on non-completion of purchase, or if applications are not followed up.

Country lands may be selected for purchase previous to survey.

All lands to be sold according to some numerical mark or reference, which is also to be inserted in the title-deed.

Town and suburban lands will be advertised for sale by Public Auction as they are applied for, in at least 2 consecutive *Government Gazettes*, in which the place of sale, the upset price of each lot, and the officer by whom it is to be sold, will be stated.

The days of sale for such lands are—at Perth and the Vasse, the first Wednesday in every month; at Bunbury, the second Wednesday in every month; and at Albany and Geraldton, not less than 2 months after the date of notice.

The appointed time for Land Sales by Public Auction is one hour after noon.



The applicant for a lot has the benefit of the upset price as his first bidding.

A fee of £1 payable in advance for every title-deed from the Crown.

In all title deeds the Crown reserves the precious metals, and a right to make roads, canals, &c. ; also to resume for public purposes.

Lands may be granted for public purposes, without purchase.

Remissions in the purchase of land may be granted to naval and military officers and men.

Lands purchased with such remissions to be granted to the purchasers after 2 years' residence in the Colony.

Licenses to cut timber may be issued at 10 shillings per month for a pair of sawyers, or £20 per annum per 1 square mile for special selections.

No part of any such special selection will be sold during the currency of a timber license without the written consent of the lessee.

Licenses to cut sandalwood may be issued at two shillings and sixpence per man per month.

The Agent General for Crown Colonies is authorised to receive payments in England for lands to be purchased in Western Australia.

Mineral lands not to be sold until further notice.

The sale and other disposal of the Waste Lands in Western Australia are regulated by instructions from the Queen, or through one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

#### FOR PASTORAL LANDS.

For Pastoral purposes the Waste Lands are divided into Class A and Class B, except in the North and East districts hereinafter mentioned.

Class A lands are for annual license, subject to renewal.

Class B lands are leased for 8 years, without right of renewal.

Lands let for pastoral purposes are known as runs.

No part of an occupied townsite will be let as a run.

Unoccupied townsites, if let, will be subject to special conditions.

Lands required for special purposes may be exempted from lease or license.

The rents payable are irrespective of any future rates on stock.

Runs are liable to forfeiture if appropriated to other than pastoral uses, or for non-payment of rent, or on conviction for felony.

Runs are transferable in the form printed on the back of each lease or license, attested by one credible witness.

Transfers are to be forwarded to Surveyor-General for Governor's approval, and for record in the Survey Office; and are chargeable with a fee of 10s in advance.

Transfers not sanctioned unless the land has been properly stocked.

Leases and licenses are prepared in the Survey Office, and are deliverable by the Collector of Revenue, or by a Sub-Collector at out-stations.

Leases not fully paid for within 2 calendar months after being deliverable, are forfeited, together with all improvements and deposits.



Only half rent is chargeable for the current year on all runs granted after 30th of June.

Government reserves the right to lay out roads, take indigenous produce for public purposes, and graze any stock at work on a run.

Persons may search for minerals on a run, paying the lessee for any damage caused to him thereby.

Persons may pass over any unenclosed part of a run, with or without stock or conveyances.

The aborigines have a right to seek their subsistence on any unenclosed part of a pastoral or tillage lease, or on any part of an annual license.

Lessees are permitted to cut timber, and to make use of that or of any other indigenous produce of their runs, but not to sell or remove the same off their lands.

The Government may grant licenses for any person to cut and remove timber, sandalwood, and other woods, off runs.

Boundaries of runs may be altered on application, by paying certain fines for new leases.

No such alterations allowed in leases issued under the Regulations of 1850.

Any valuations required are to be made by one person appointed by the Governor, and another by the lessee of a run, or by an umpire if they cannot agree.

Rents for leases are due in advance on the 1st of January in each year, and must be paid before the 15th of that month, or they are liable to an extra charge.

Rents not paid as above, may be paid within 60 days after rent-day, with an addition of one-fourth as fine.

Failing the payment of rent and fine as above, a lease becomes absolutely forfeited, or is chargeable with a fine of  $\frac{1}{2}$  the annual rent.

In all leases the year is computed from 1st Jan. to 31st December; and a term of years will commence from the 1st of the previous January.

Deposits are returnable on applications not granted; but they become forfeited if applications are not followed up.

On the determination of any lease by forfeiture or otherwise, the land therein described, and all improvements thereon, revert to the Crown.

#### LANDS IN CLASS A.

Lands in Class A are let for one year only, as depasturing licenses.

Annual rent two shillings per 100 acres, and no license fee.

No license issued for less than £1.

Full rent is payable in advance when a license is applied for.

Lands in Class A, whether under license or not, are open at all times for sale or tillage lease, and must be given up by a lessee when so disposed of.

No compensation can be claimed for improvements on class A land.

Unoccupied townsites are obtainable on annual license only.

No renewal of annual license can be *claimed*, but preference will be given to existing lessees whenever practicable.

Applications for renewal must be sent in to Surveyor General before the end of a year.

Licenses will be given to other applicants, if renewals of them are not applied for before the end of a year.

Alterations required in boundaries previous to renewal, are to be applied for by the end of November.

A holder of not less than 10 acres of land in fee simple within a Class A license, has a right to run gratuitously within such license 1 head of great stock (not being a bull or stallion) for every 10 acres so held, and so long as said land may be let for pastoral purposes.

Holders of fee-simple land as aforesaid, have no claim for trespass by stock, unless such land were properly fenced when trespassed on.

### LANDS IN CLASS B.

Lands in Class B are let on pastoral leases for 8 years or less.

B leases are not renewable; but the lessees have a preferable claim to them.

No lease to contain more than 10,000 acres.

Any number of leases may be granted to the same person.

The annual rent for a lease is £5, and 10 shillings per 1000 acres for the land it contains.

An abatement of rent is made on application if 1000 acres or upwards be sold or resumed for public purposes.

Leases are granted without competition to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same.

On application for a lease, the lease fee is to be deposited, and will be forfeited, together with all claim to the land, if the application is not followed up.

Lessees in actual occupation, have a pre-emptive right to purchase at 10 shillings per acre any portion of a run, not mineral nor less than 40 acres, during the first year of a lease.

No other person can purchase within a lease during its first year without the written consent of the lessee.

After the first year of a lease, all unsold lands within it are open to general selection for purchase.

During the first year of a lease, a homestead may be selected and reported for approval, at the rate of 2 acres for every 100 acres in the run.

A lessee will have the exclusive right of purchasing land within any such homestead during the first 3 years of his lease; after which, all unsold portions will be open to general sale.

Portions of a homestead may be sold to others, with the written consent of a lessee.

Lessees have a claim to compensation for any improvements effected on



portions of their runs sold or resumed.

Purchasers of land within B leases have a free right to depasture on the unenclosed portions of the run, horned cattle or horses, not being bulls or stallions, at the rate of 1 head for every 10 acres so purchased, so long as such portions continue to be let for pastoral purposes.

Such right as aforesaid is without prejudice to the right of the Crown to sell or to grant on tillage lease.

Purchasers of land within B leases have no claim for trespass by stock, unless the land trespassed on be properly fenced.

The conditions of leases granted or renewed under the Regulations of March, 1850, and January, 1860, are not interfered with, except as follows—

- 1.—Lands are sold at fixed price of 10 shillings per acre, instead of by Auction, and in lots of 40 acres, instead of 10.
- 2.—Tillage leases may be granted within pastoral leases, with written consent of the lessee.
- 3.—With a like consent, lands may be sold to other than the lessee.
- 4.—Enclosed portions of pastoral leases are not public thoroughfares.

#### TILLAGE LEASES.

Lands for tillage purposes are let on leases for 8 years or less.

Tillage leases are not renewable; but the lessees have a preferable claim to them.

No lease to contain more than 320 acres.

Any number of leases may be granted to the same person.

The annual rent of a lease is 1 shilling per acre, payable in advance; but no lease is granted for a less sum than £5, except for the last  $\frac{1}{2}$  of a year.

Abatement of rent for future years is allowed on account of any part of a lease sold or resumed, provided the total rent be not thereby reduced below £5.

Application for a lease to be accompanied by a deposit of £5, which will be forfeited if the application is not followed up.

Lands available for tillage leases comprise all the waste lands not allotted or reserved.

Lands in B leases will be let on tillage lease or sold to the lessees of the former only, unless with their written consent.

With the foregoing exception, a lease is granted to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same, and without competition.

A lessee is entitled at any time to purchase, at the fixed price of 10 shillings per acre, any portion of his lease, not being mineral land, nor less in quantity than 40 acres.

Any other person may purchase in like manner, with the written consent of the lessee.

Mineral lands within tillage leases will be sold or let under such Regulations as may hereafter be established.



The lands in forfeited or abandoned leases, if improved or relet, will be subject to such increased rent as circumstances may justify.

Leases are liable to forfeiture if not occupied, cultivated, or improved, during the year preceding any rent-day.

### PRE-EMPTIVE CLAIMS.

Land to be applied for in manner pointed out in the General Rules.

Existing improvements on land for purchase by other than a lessee, to be valued, and charged to the purchaser.

Such valuation not to exceed the actual outlay made by a lessee.

The lessee of a tillage lease has a pre-emptive right to purchase within the same during the currency of his lease.

The lessee of a B lease granted under the Regulations of 1850, has a similar right to the foregoing.

Such pre-emptive right may be waived, and by written consent of a lessee of any lease, portions of the same may be sold to other persons.

Land is sold at the fixed price of 10 shillings per acre, whether improved or otherwise, and in lots of not less than 40 acres.

Pre-emptive rights do not extend over mineral lands.

A lessee exercising a pre-emptive right, to obtain certificate of Resident Magistrate that he is in actual occupation of his lease, personally or by agents; also that the current year's rent has been paid.

The lessee of a B lease under the Regulations of 1860, or under those of 20th August, 1864, has an exclusive pre-emptive right to purchase within such lease until the end of its first year.

Any such lessee has a similar right to purchase any part of his selected homestead, until the end of the third year of his lease.

### NORTH AND EAST DISTRICTS.

Lands in the above districts are disposed of on more favourable terms than in other parts of Western Australia.

The North District is comprised between the sea-coast and the meridian of 129deg. east longitude, and to the north of the River Murchison, and of a true east line through Mount Murchison.

The East District is comprised between the meridians of 121 and 129 deg. east longitude, and between the South-coast and latitude 30 deg South.

The lands are divided into Class A for annual license, and Class C for more extended occupation.

Class A comprises all land within 2 miles of the sea-coast, and Class C the remainder.

Lands in Class A are let on depasturing license, under the Regulations hereinbefore explained, except that the annual rent for the same is five shillings per 1000 acres for each of the first 4 years, and 10 shillings per 1000 acres for each of the second 4 years, payable in advance.

Application for the Governor's permission to proceed to either district for the purpose of taking up land, must be made to the Colonial Secretary

in a certain printed form. Such permission, if granted, will be valid for 12 months from its date.

To entitle an applicant to claim this permission, he must undertake to convey to the district at least 200 breeding sheep, or 100 head of great stock, or a due proportion of both.

On any quantity of stock not less than the above number reaching the district, they and their natural increase will be allowed free pasturage over the unappropriated Crown Lands during the term of the permission.

During said term, the person or company of persons named in such permission will be entitled to select, and report to the Surveyor-General, a pastoral run of 100,000 acres of land in the district.

On the Governor's approval of such selection it will be assigned in pastoral occupancy to the applicant, free of rent for three years, commencing from the end of the first year's free permission to depasture.

The assignment last aforesaid will not be made unless the application for it is accompanied by a certificate, signed by some credible person, of the date on which the stock enumerated in the Governor's permission to proceed actually arrived on the land applied for.

Such assignment will not be transferable.

A selection of 100,000 acres may include lands in both Class A and Class C, and must be made in conformity with the General Rules.

At any time within the 3 years named, the whole or any part of a run may be selected and reported to the Surveyor-General for lease or license, in blocks not exceeding 20,000 acres each.

Class C lands thus selected will be let on pastoral lease for 8 years, commencing on 1st of January next after the date of application for the same.

Class C leases are chargeable with rent at the rate of 5 shillings per 1,000 acres for each of the first 4 years, and 10s per 1,000 acres for each of the second 4 years.

Class C leases are chargeable with one fee of £5 at the commencement of each lease, but not after the first year.

There is no fee on Class A licenses.

Both leases and licenses are transferable while chargeable with rent, on the Governor being satisfied the lands have been properly stocked.

During the free occupation of a run, and during the first year of a lease, the lawful occupant is allowed a right to cultivate.

No claim for damage by trespass of stock is admissible, unless the land be properly fenced at time of trespass.

Runs or leases may be resumed, wholly or in part, for public purposes; as also for sale, on giving 12 months' notice.

Compensation will be given for all improvements lawfully made on rented lands resumed as above.

In all other respects, the disposal and tenure of Crown Lands in these districts will be governed by the existing Land Regulations.

No protection or Government establishment guaranteed, until deemed expedient by the Government.

And the said Tenant hereby agrees not to sub-let, lease, nor assign over, nor in any way dispose of the said— and premises, or any part thereof, nor make, nor suffer to be made, any alteration in the said— and premises, or any part thereof, without the consent in writing of the said Landlord; and the said Tenant hereby agrees that he will not create any nuisance, nor do nor suffer to be done anything that might prejudice any insurance of the said premises or any part thereof. And it is hereby further agreed that if any rent shall be unpaid at any time or times when due (whether in advance or otherwise), or if the said Tenant do not fulfil all the conditions of this Agreement, the said Landlord shall have power to distrain for such rent, and to put an end to this tenancy; and in the latter case, this Agreement may be produced by the said Landlord as a notice to quit, duly given and expired. 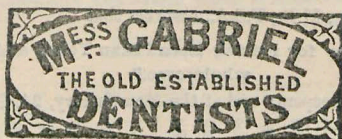


