First contact with penumbra, Dec. 28, 9h. 35m. p.m.; first contact with shadow, 11h. 20m. p.m.; middle of eclipse, December 29, 0h. 9m. a.m.; last contact with shadow, 0h. 58m. a.m.; last contact with penumbra, 2h. 43m. a.m.

Retired on full pay as a Lieut.-Colonel of Royal Engineers, with rank of Major-General, 16th April, 1869; served principally in the West Indies and coast of Africa, and acted as brigade-major in the combined French and English expedition to the Baltic in 1854; was engaged in the siege and capture of Bomarsund, for which he received brevet rank; was employed under the Colonial Office in 1855-6 as Commissioner to the Gold Coast; and in 1856-7 and 1860 at the Courts of Paris and the Hague, to assist the ambassador and minister in carrying out negotiations with respect to the French and Netherlands possessions on the coast of Africa; appointed Lieut.-Governor of Dominica, August, 1857; and Governor of Bermuda, February, 1861; despatched on a special mission to the settlements on the West Coast of Africa, 1864; Governor of the Straits Settlements, 1867 to Nov. 1873.

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### TELEGRAPH MESSAGES.

For Messages between any two Stations in Western Australia, a uniform rate of 1s. for the first ten words, and 1d. for each additional word. Press Messages are transmitted at one-fourth of the above rate.

No charge is made for the date, address, or signature of any Message.

Messages are delivered free of charge within one mile of the office; over that distance mileage at the rate of 1s. per mile is chargeable.

On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after office hours, and on Sundays, double the ordinary rate will be required upon all Messages.

Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of *an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables.*

### WESTERN AUSTRALIA, PORT DARWIN, AND LONDON TELEGRAPH.

#### *Conditions.*

1. The length of a word is limited to a maximum of ten letters.

2. Only ordinary dictionary words should be used. Artificially-constructed words are subject to the cypher rate.

3. Groups of figures may be transmitted, and will be charged at the rate of five to the word, if expressing ordinary commercial quotations ; but if used for code purposes they will be subject to the cypher rate.

4. Groups of letters or artificially-constructed words will be treated in the same manner as figures.

5. Cipher telegrams must be collated—*i.e.*, repeated back in their entirety from station to station. Half rate extra is charged for collating.

6. Any combination of code employing in the same message groups of figures and letters is strictly prohibited, and telegrams composed in this manner cannot be accepted.

7. Addresses may be written in code, at the sender's risk, under arrangement with the administrations concerned. The signature may also be a code word, or the last word of the message may replace it.

8. The following abbreviated form for expressing "Reply paid," "Acknowledgment of receipt," "Collating," and "Telegram to follow" has been agreed to, so that only one word need be paid for to convey these instructions :—

#### FOREIGN MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices, at the following rates:—

For Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, and New Zealand, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5 but not exceeding £10, two shillings. For the United Kingdom, for sums not exceeding £2, one shilling; above £2 and not exceeding £5, two shillings; above £5 and not exceeding £7, three shillings; above £7 and not exceeding £10, four shillings.

### INLAND MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders are issued and paid within the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the General and undermentioned Post Offices in the colony, at the following rates of commission:—For sums not exceeding £5, 6d.; above £5 and not exceeding £10, 1s. No Money Order can be issued for a larger amount than £10.

### POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Post Office Savings Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working-day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Vasse, Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, Northampton, and Williams River. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

### RATES OF POSTAGE.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the city or town in which the letters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding half an ounce, two pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, two pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-towns within Western Australia—Under half-an ounce, two pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four-pence; or for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted by sailing vessels to the Australian colonies, three-pence per half-ounce; to all other places, six-pence per half-ounce.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Via Southampton—Under half an ounce 6d.; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional. Via Brindisi—Not exceeding half an ounce, 9d.; above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce,

1s. 6d. ; above one ounce, and not exceeding  $1\frac{1}{2}$  ounce, 2s. 3d. ; and for every additional half-ounce or fraction thereof, 9d.

LETTERS FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every half ounce or fraction of an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Newspapers printed and posted in the colony for delivery beyond the boundaries of the city or town at which they may be published, and posted within one week from the date of publication, Free. Newspapers posted for transmission to places beyond the limits of the colony, or posted within the city, or any town in the colony, for delivery within the boundaries of such city or town, 1d. each. Newspapers received from places beyond the limits of the colony are delivered free, but when re-posted are subject to a charge of 1d. each.

BOOKS, &c.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter.—Viâ Southampton for the United Kingdom—1 ounce, 1d. ; 2 ounces, 2d. ; 4 ounces, 4d. ; 8 ounces, 8d. ; and 4d. for every additional four ounces. Viâ Brindisi for the United Kingdom—4 ounces, 7d. ; 8 ounces, 1s. 2d. ; and 7d. for every additional four ounces. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—1 ounce, 1d. ; 2 ounces, 2d. ; 4 ounces, 3d. ; and 6d. for each  $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. or fraction of  $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 ounces, 4d. ; 8 ounces, 8d. ; and 8d. for each  $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. or fraction of a  $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c. Regulations—Every book, packet or parcel of any kind, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight ; nor contain any written communication, under a penalty of not less than £5.

BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY.—2 ounces, 1d. ; 4 ounces, 2d. ; 8 ounces, 4d. ; and 2d. for each 4 oz.

#### REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, if as a fee thereon stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

# History of Western Australia.

## Brief Chronicle of Occurrences and Events from October, 1877, to September, 1878.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

### 1877.

OCTOBER.—Sir Harry Ord, successor to Governor Robinson, is expected to arrive in the colony next month.....The Hon. A. O'Grady Lefroy, Colonial Treasurer, deputed to represent the colony at the Paris Exhibition.....Messrs. Henry Brockman, Samuel Fortescue Moore, and Edmund Ralph Brockman appointed to the Commission of the Peace.....The revenue of the colony last quarter was £35,123 0s. 9d., and the expenditure for the same period, £44,601 19s.....Intimation received that Capt. Audley Coote, who left England for Australia last month to make arrangements for a duplicate cable to the colonies, had partly arranged for a steam service between Perth and Singapore..... Baron von Mueller, the eminent Government Botanist of Victoria, pays a visit to this colony. The Baron proceeded as far as Shark's Bay in the North, travelling overland to Albany through the southern and south-eastern districts; his journey proving eminently successful in a scientific point of view.....Rich specimens of gold found at Roebourne, computed to yield five to six ounces to the ton.....A shock of earthquake was felt at Pinjarrah during the early part of the month, its effects extending over a radius of about fifty miles.....A meteor of extraordinary size and brilliance seen at Perth on the 17th inst., illuminating the sky for nearly half an hour.....The Chairman of the City Council received a telegram from the Lord Mayor of London soliciting his co-operation in obtaining subscriptions to the Indian Famine Relief Fund.....The Roman Catholics purpose erecting a new Boys' Schoolroom in Perth.....Sericulture progresses satisfactorily, both in the Government establishment and that of Mons. Beurteaux.....The Rev. Frank Coghlan, Assistant Colonial Chaplain, resigned, in consequence of a disagreement as to his parish duties.....Another shipment of sheep, consigned to Mr. Butcher, arrives at Champion Bay by the ship Inchgreen, from Melbourne.....The wool clip this year is highly satisfactory.

NOVEMBER.—Governor Ord arrived at Albany per R.M.S. Tanjore on the 5th instant, and at Fremantle on the 12th instant. His Excellency received congratulatory addresses of welcome at Perth and Fremantle and the various outports. His Excellency was accompanied by Lady Ord, and his son, Lieut. St. J. St. Geo. Ord, R.A., Private Secretary.....Mr. Walter Padbury resigned his seat in the Legislative Council, as representative of the Swan district, intending to visit Europe.....Mr. J. G. Lee Steere addressed his constituents at Bunbury, who censured his rejection of intercolonial steam communication with the Eastern colonies .....At the annual meeting of the City Council the overdraft for the year was announced to be £835 19s. 11d. The total liabilities of the Council, including the cost of the main drain, stood at £2,835 19s. 11d. Mr. S. H. Parker elected Chairman of the City Council, the only opposing candidate being Mr. G. Shenton..... The Eucla Telegraph line, under the direction of Mr. Superintendent Fleming, rapidly progressing towards completion..... The jarrah timber trade continues to advance.....The Government offer a reward of £50 for the conviction of the persons who placed stones on the Geraldton railway line.....A regatta came off on Perth Water on the 9th inst., and was tolerably successful .....A Roman Catholic Church erected at York at a cost of £5,000.....Mr. Becher Skinner admitted a practitioner of the Supreme Court.....Bachelder's pantoscope exhibited throughout the colony with great success.....Mr. Martin Commerford, Postmaster at Geraldton, a public servant of twenty years' standing, accused of stealing a letter containing a cheque for £1; he was honorably acquitted.....Mr. John Fleay, jr., a settler residing near York, had his dwelling and farm property completely destroyed by fire; the damage being estimated at upwards of £1,000.....The annual show and races throughout the rural districts fairly successful.....The obituary for the month contains the names of Mrs. Parry (wife of the Lord Bishop of Perth), Mr. T. Little, Mr. Thomas Middleton, Mr. W. R. Bunbury, Dr. Growse, Mrs. Samuel Moore, Mr. George Longbottom, and Mrs. R. A. Sholl.....The blight disease again appears in the grape crop.....The barque Trinculo arrived at Bunbury laden with guano from the Lacepede Islands, forty-two days out. The crew, numbering thirty-three, were in great distress for want of food and water.

DECEMBER.—Governor Ord visits Champion Bay and the Irwin districts, receiving enthusiastic ovations at each place..... The Eucla telegraph line completed on the 8th instant, and congratulatory messages sent by Governor Ord to the Governors of

all the Australian Colonies, Ceylon, and the Straits Settlements .....Telegraph communication with Beverley established..... Extensive orders for the supply of jarrah railway sleepers received from Calcutta. Mr. C. H. Compton arrived last mail for the purpose of negotiating with the local timber companies for a large supply of jarrah for India.....The P. & O. S.S. Siam, having arrived at Albany six days before contract time, the colonial mails were shipped to Adelaide by the barque Silver Stream from the Vasse on the 1st inst.....His Excellency Sir William Robinson arrived at Singapore on the 29th October .....The Robert Morrison arrives from England with a batch of Government immigrants.....The Postmaster General receives the additional official title of General Superintendent of Telegraphs.....A man named Lee, a newly-arrived immigrant from England, fell overboard from a river steamer near Bassindean on the 17th instant, and was drowned.....Richard Powell, a very old colonist, died at the Invalid Depot.....Frank James, eldest son of Mr. E. S. James, of the Freemasons' Hotel, had his arm so severely lacerated as to render amputation necessary.....Mrs. Attfield, wife of Dr. Attfield, of Fremantle, narrowly escaped being killed, by the horse attached to the vehicle she was driving bolting.....The obituary of the month includes the name of Mr. Herron, of Pinjarrah.....The foundation-stone of the Geraldton Bushroen's Club laid by Governor Ord on the 14th inst.....The first pole of the Geraldton and Northampton Telegraph line erected by Governor Ord.....The Roman Catholic Bishop of Perth (Dr. Griver) proceeds to Sydney to assist at the installation of Archbishop Vaughan, as Archbishop of Sydney.

## 1878.

JANUARY.—Miss Grace Bussell receives the silver medal of the Royal Humane Society, and also a gold watch and chain from the Board of Trade, in recognition of her gallant conduct in saving life at the wreck of the s. Georgette.....Mr. E. R. Brockman elected for the Swan district.....Grand Temperance demonstration, Perth Town Hall, 15th.....The sanitary condition of Perth claims considerable attention, but no definite action is taken.....The Hon. Roger Tuckfd. Goldsworthy, C.M.G., appointed a Vice-President of the Swan River Mechanics' Institute.....The obituary for the month includes the names of Mr. Thos. Courthope Gull, Mrs. Bickley, Mrs. Wells, Miss Nairn, Mrs. Mews, and Mr. Robert Readhead.

FEBRUARY.—Several Imperial buildings, at Guildford and elsewhere, handed over to the Local Government, being no longer

required for convict purposes.....Great heat of the weather experienced here, as in the other Australian colonies; the thermometer reaching its highest register on the 3rd.....Mail signals established on the Town Hall tower.....Obituary:—Mrs. Thos. Halliday, Mr. E. S. James, and Miss Lochée.

MARCH.—Perth High School for Boys opened, 2nd, with Mr. Richard Davies, B.A., Cambridge, as Head-master.....Bishop Griver returns from a visit to Sydney.....An anonymous offer of £2,000 made to the Cathedral Building Fund on condition of a like sum being subscribed by residents of the colony by the 15th July next.....Prospectus of the Deep River (Jarrah) Timber Co. issued.....Pontifical High Mass celebrated at the Roman Catholic Cathedral on the occasion of the death of Pope Pius IX., 7th.....Branches of the Union Bank of Australia established at Perth and York.....Successful experiments with the telephone between Perth and Fremantle.....The value of lead ore exported from Champion Bay during 1877 ascertained to exceed thirty thousand pounds sterling.....Large reductions in the Police Force, consequent upon the decrease in the Imperial grant-in-aid.....Geraldton Lighthouse illuminated, 19th.....The foundation stone of the Perth Roman Catholic Boys' School laid by Bishop Griver, 20th.....The Perth Enrolled Pensioner Force disbanded, 31st.....Obituary:—Mr. Lionel Samson and Mr. H. Snowdon.

APRIL.—Governor Ord received a telegram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies sanctioning the introduction of a loan for the construction of a railway between Perth and Fremantle, 1st.....Mr. Thos. Campbell Carey elected for the Vasse district.....The Hon. Malcolm Fraser, Commissioner of Crown Lands, returns from the Eastern colonies, having effected arrangements for a monthly steam service between Adelaide and Champion Bay.....Sir John Coode's Report on Harbor improvements at Fremantle received.....Mr. S. Browning, of New Zealand, presented £50 to the Perth City Council towards the erection of a public fountain in Perth.....Mr. Charles Harper elected for the North District.....Intimation received of the Royal assent to the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill. Obituary:—Mr. Lancelot Taylor Cooke.....Branch of the Western Australian Bank established at Bunbury.....The projected line of railway to connect Fremantle with Perth, and running thence to Guildford, gives rise to a very general exchange of opinion as to the merits and advantages of the route traversing the south bank of the Swan, and that on the north side of the river.

MAY.—The fifth session of the second Legislative Council under the existing Constitution opened, 29th.....Mr. S. H

Parker elected for Perth, and moves to introduce a measure for a re-construction of the Constitution, giving the people the advantages of Responsible Government. The motion, put for the third time, was, however, lost, by moving the previous question.....The Hon. Capt. Roe, R.N., for upwards of forty years Surveyor General of this colony, died, 29th, and was accorded a public funeral.....Rainfall registered during 1877, 20.487.

JUNE.—Government reserve a block of land of 50,000 acres on the Murchison for a Native Mission.....A Clergy Discipline Bill passed by the Church of England Synod.....A Court of Quarter Sessions established at Roebourne.....The Legislature voted £4,500 for the introduction of Chinese or Coolie laborers in 1878.....The barque Lady Elizabeth wrecked off Rottneest.....The obituary includes the names of Mr. J. G. Broomhall, Mr. James Inkpen, Mr. Geo. King, Mr. E. P. Barrett-Lennard, and Mr. Alfred Robins.

JULY.—Formal expression of public opinion against the introduction of Coolie labor.....Vote passed for Mr. Alex. Forrest's expedition from Port Walcott to Port Darwin.....Mr. C. D. Price received the thanks of the Legislature, at the bar of the House, for his services in connection with the construction of the Eucla Telegraph Line.....A bi-monthly steam service between Fremantle and Melbourne established by Messrs. James Lilly & Co.....Extension of the telegraph to Roebourne projected.....Sir Luke Leake discloses himself as the anonymous donor of £2,000 to the new Cathedral Building Fund, to the gratification of the community generally.....The Legislature passed a Loan Bill of £200,000 for railways and public works.....The barque James Service wrecked on the Murray Reef, and all lives lost, 23rd.....Fifth session of the Legislative Council closed, 24th.....The obituary includes the name of Mrs. Birch.

AUGUST.—A branch of the W. A. Bank established at Fremantle, and a branch of the Union Bank at Geraldton.....Orders sent to England for materials for the Fremantle-Guildford Railway.....Messrs. A. Helmich, E. L. Courthope, J. B. Roe, Jas. H. Thomas, Godfrey Knight, and M. New, appointed magistrates.....Mr. John Pollard drowned in the Williams.....Obituary :—Mrs. J. S. Brooking and Mr. Thomas Duncan.

SEPTEMBER.—A trigonometrical survey of the North-west settlements conducted by Mr. John Forrest, F.R.G.S., Deputy Surveyor General.....Sir Luke Leake, F.R.G.S., Mr. B. Smith, and Mr. R. Pether, appointed trustees of the Swan River Mechanics' Institute.....A Small Debts Court established at Kojonup.....The *Victorian Express* published at Geraldton.
