In the year 1880 there will be four Eclipses of the SUN and two of the MOON.

1.—January 11.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, visible only in the extreme north of Australia.

2.—June 22.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, visible in Australia. First contact with the penumbra, 7h. 1m. p.m.; first contact with the shadow, 7h. 58m. p.m.; beginning of total phase, 9h. 15m. p.m.; middle of Eclipse, 9h. 33m. p.m.; end of total phase, 9h. 51m. p.m.; last contact with shadow, 11h. 8m. p.m.; last contact with penumbra, 12h. 5m. a.m. (June 23.)

3.—July 7.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Australia.

4.—December 1.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Australia.

5.—December 16.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, visible in Australia. First contact with the penumbra, 8h. 14m. p.m.; first contact with the shadow, 9h. 27m. p.m.; beginning of total phase, 10h. 37m. p.m.; middle of Eclipse, 11h. 22m. p.m.; end of total phase, 12h. 0m. 6s. p.m., or 0h. 6m. a.m., 17th; last contact with the shadow, 13h. 16m., or 1h. 16m. a.m., 17th; last contact with the penumbra, 2h. 29m. a.m., 17th.

6.—Dec. 31.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Australia.

The Supreme Court of Western Australia has, in addition to its Common Law and Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, jurisdiction in Bankruptcy—the local Bankruptcy Act being almost identical with the English Act of 1869. It has also jurisdiction in Lunacy and Equity, and by Local Ordinance 27 Vic. No. 19, of 1873, a Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes was constituted, with all the jurisdiction of the Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes in England, vested in it under the 20th and 21st Vict., ch. 85.

SITTINGS OF THE SUPREME COURT.

The Court holds its sittings at such times and places as the Chief Justice by rules and orders may prescribe.

By general order, dated 24th June, 1861, the Court holds sittings at Perth on the first Wednesday in each month, and continues such sittings by adjournment until all the cases on the Criminal Calendar are disposed of. The Court then proceeds with all causes, rules, and motions set down for hearing and argument.

Special orders can be obtained for holding sittings in other localities, when public convenience requires.

DIOCESAN SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

The governing body of the Church of England in Western Australia is the Synod, established in 1872, and consists of the Bishop, all licensed clergymen, and lay communicant representatives elected by the congregations; no act being valid unless it carries the consent of three orders. The Synod must meet at least once in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place in every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, by which in the first instance nominations are made, and the appointments ultimately confirmed by the Bishop. 2. Only ordinary dictionary words should be used. Artificially-constructed words are subject to the cipher rate.

3. Groups of figures may be transmitted, and will be charged at the rate of five to the word, if expressing ordinary commercial quotations ; but if used for code purposes they will be subject to the cipher rate.

4. Groups of letters or artificially-constructed words will be treated in the same manner as figures.

5. Cipher telegrams must be collated—*i.e.*, repeated back in their entirety from station to station. Half rate extra is charged for collating.

6. Any combination of code employing in the same message groups of figures and letters is strictly prohibited, and telegrams composed in this manner cannot be accepted.

7. Addresses may be written in code, at the sender's risk, under arrangement with the administrations concerned. The signature may also be a code word, or the last word of the message may replace it.

8. The following abbreviated form for expressing "Reply paid," "Acknowledgment of receipt," "Collating," and "Telegram to follow" has been agreed to, so that only one word need be paid for to convey these instructions :—

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Post Office Savings Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working-day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Vasse, Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, Northampton, and Williams River. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Viâ Southampton—Under half an ounce, 6d.; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, 1s.; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional. Viâ Brindisi—Not exceeding half an ounce, 9d.; above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, 1s. 6d.;

above one ounce, and not exceeding $1\frac{1}{2}$ ounce, 2s. 3d.; and for every additional half ounce or fraction thereof, 9d.

India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 8d. for each $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. or fraction of $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c. Regulations—Every book, packet or parcel of any kind, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication, under a penalty of not less than £5.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late Letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, if as a fee thereon stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

The Postal and Telegraph Guide, published yearly by the Postmaster General's Department, contains the Local and Foreign Rates of Postages, Charges for Telegrams, &c.

Marriage Law Amendment Act, 1879.

[Assented to by the Governor, 22nd Oct., 1879.]

Epitomised.

No marriage shall be celebrated, except under special license for that purpose to be issued by the Governor, or except after due publication of banns, or intimation in writing of an intention to have such marriage shall be affixed for three consecutive Sundays on the door of the place of worship in which it shall be intended to celebrate such marriage, until one of the parties shall give notice under his or her hand in the form given in the Schedule A to this Act or to the like effect, to the district registrar of the district within which the parties, or one of them, shall have dwelt for not less than seven days then next preceding; and shall state in such notice the name and surname, and the profession or condition of each of the parties intending marriage, the dwelling place of each of them, and the time during which each has dwelt therein. But if either party shall have dwelt in the place stated in such notice during more than seven days, it may be stated therein that he or she has dwelt there seven days and upwards.

The district registrar shall forthwith post a true copy of such notice in a conspicuous place in his office, and shall also enter a true copy thereof fairly into a book to be for that purpose provided by the registrar general, to be called "The Marriage Notice Book;" and such book shall be open at all reasonable times without fee to all persons desirous of inspecting the same; and for every such entry the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Every district registrar shall, on the first day of every month, transmit to the registrar general all such notices received by him during the month preceding, and such notices shall be thereafter kept in the general registry, in such order and manner as the registrar general shall think fit, so that the same may be most readily seen and examined.

After the expiration of seven days from the entry of such notice, the district registrar, upon being requested so to do by or on behalf of either party mentioned therein, shall issue under his hand a certificate in the form of schedule B to this Act annexed; Provided that no lawful impediment be shown to the satisfaction of the district registrar why such certificate should not issue; and provided that the issue of such certificate shall not have been sooner forbidden, in manner hereinafter mentioned, by any person authorized in that behalf as hereinafter provided; and every such certificate shall state the particulars set forth in the

notice, the day on which the notice was received, posted, and entered, and that the full period of seven days has elapsed since the posting and entry of such notice; and for every such certificate the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Any person whose consent to a marriage is required by law, may forbid the issue of the district registrar's certificate, by writing, or causing to be written at any time before the issue of such certificate, the word "forbidden" opposite to the entry of the notice of such intended marriage in the marriage notice book, and by subscribing or causing to be subscribed thereto his or her name, place of abode, and character as parent or guardian.

No marriage in pursuance of such notice shall be celebrated three calendar months after the entry of such notice, nor until the certificate mentioned in the fourth section hereof shall have been produced to the minister or district registrar celebrating the marriage, nor in any case until a declaration upon oath, or a solemn affirmation shall have been made in manner prescribed by the Ordinance 19th Victoria, No. 11, section 4.

This Act shall be taken to be part of the Ordinance 19th Victoria, No. 11, as fully and effectually as if incorporated therewith, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Marriage Law Amendment Act, 1879."

History of Western Australia.

Brief Chronicle of Occurrences and Events from October, 1878, to September, 1879.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1878.

OCTOBER.—Much anxiety expressed owing to the non-arrival of the schooner Brothers, Taguer, master, now three months out from Esperance Bay.—The steamer Start, which left Melbourne about two months since, also anxiously looked for.—Mr. Forrest, Deputy Surveyor General, returns from the North-west Settlements, having carried out a Trigonometrical survey of the whole of the settled portion of that territory, extending over a distance of 400 miles.—The P. & O. Company further reduce their passenger rates between King George's Sound and the Eastern colonies.—Mr. Louis F. Vanzuilecom appointed a justice of the peace.—Mr. George Shenton, M.L.C., entertains the scholars attending Wesley Sunday School with a picnic at Crawley Park.—Mr. William Cousins appointed head master of the Government Boys' School, *vice* Mr. C. Trotter, resigned.—Mr. Landor, Police Magistrate of Perth, died.—Mr. John Forrest, F.R.G.S., appointed Acting Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the absence of the Hon. Malcolm Fraser, who is on a semi-official visit to Europe.—A Masonic Hall proposed to be erected at Geraldton.—A new Episcopalian Church decided to be erected at Fremantle.—Two men—Vincent and Gray—sentenced to fifteen years' penal servitude for coining and circulating spurious money.—The Government hand over to the City Council all the public lands and public buildings, including the Claisebrook Mulberry Plantation, in Perth.—The first sale of Cheriton Short-horns held at Gingin on the 26th ult., by Mr. James Morrison.—The final survey of the Fremantle-Guildford section of the Eastern Railway progressing most satisfactorily.—A son of Mr. H. E. Victor, C.E., residing in Perth, very courageously and with imminent risk to his life jumped off Perth Bridge and rescued a man who was drowning.—Mrs. Prunster, of Guildford, while in a fit, fell down a well and was drowned.—Sir Luke Leake, F.R.G.S., Mr. Richard Pether, and Mr. Bernard Smith elected trustees of the Swan River Mechanics' Institute.—Great

disappointment expressed throughout the colony by members of the various Volunteer Corps owing to the Government prohibiting free selection of land for five years' service, as was anticipated by them under the existing Land Regulations.—A Small Debts Court established at Kojonup, under the Judgeship of Mr. J. C. Rosseloty, Resident Magistrate of the district.—Upwards of one hundred tons of castor oil salvaged from the wreck of the James Service and shipped to Melbourne.—A young man named George Carter, whilst in a fit, fell upon a burning log near his house at Northam and was so seriously burned that he died shortly afterwards.—News received from Melbourne of the death of Mr. Edward Henty, one of the pioneer settlers of this colony.—The bronze medallion of the Royal Humane Society awarded to Mr. T. B. Wall, for attempting to save the life of R. MacTavish, who fell off the Geraldton Jetty.—News received from Cape Town of the death of the Rev. Samuel Hardey, formerly the Superintendent of the Wesleyan Circuit in this colony.—The proposed erection of the New Church of England Cathedral receives considerable attention, a site where the Gaol stands being agitated for, instead of where St. George's Cathedral at present stands.—The obituary for the month contains the names of Mr. E. W. Landor, Mrs. G. R. Teede, Mr. George Chipper, and Mrs. John Burdett Wittenoom, the wife of the first Colonial Chaplain of the colony.

NOVEMBER.—Mr. John Forrest, Deputy Surveyor General, appointed a justice of the peace.—Thirty-one miles of the Geraldton-Northampton Railway opened for traffic.—Mr. Rowley C. Loftie appointed Police Magistrate of Perth, *vice* Mr. Landor, deceased.—Mr. James Cowan appointed to succeed Mr. Loftie as Registrar of the Supreme Court, and Mr. John Adam to succeed Mr. Cowan as clerk to the Perth Bench of Magistrates.—Mr. John Forrest, Acting Commissioner of Crown Lands, proceeds on an official visit to Port Walcott and the Lacepede Islands.—The Rob Roy makes her first trip from Fremantle to Port Walcott.—The Mandurah Preserving Company, under the management of Mr. C. E. Broadhurst, commences active operations, its productions of tinned fish being considered superior to anything before attempted in Australia.—Mr. Ryder erects a pump near the Perth Causeway, chiefly at his own expense.—The obituary of the month contains the name of Mr. Gordon Drummond Ralston, for many years Foreman of Mechanics at the Fremantle Convict Establishment.

DECEMBER.—H.M.S. Cormorant arrives from England on the 2nd instant; leaving for Sydney, to join the Australian

squadron, the same day.—A gentleman signing himself J. D. Jackson, 114 Stanley Street, Sydney, inserts several letters in the *Inquirer*, affirming his belief that Mr. Edward Caleb Souper, formerly in the Government service of this colony, and now residing near Brighton, in England, is the lawful claimant of the Tichborne titles and estates.—The Press agitates for the erection of public baths at Perth and Fremantle.—A young man named George Taylor, whilst in a fit of drunkenness, deliberately shot his father dead at the Victoria Plains on the 5th instant, for which he was found guilty and sentenced to fourteen years' penal servitude.—Mr. Richard Hardey, of the Peninsula Vineyard, awarded the only medal granted to the colony at the Paris Exhibition for Fontainebleau and Muscatel wines.—News received of the total wreck of the schooner *Macquarie*, on the Levillian Shoal, in Shark's Bay.—Considerable aversion manifested at the intention of the Government to convey the mails to and from Albany, instead of by contract, as formerly.—Owing to a boat accident at Freshwater Bay, on the 8th instant, two men, named Harvey and Griffiths, were drowned.—Mr. H. E. Parry, representing an eminent firm in England, arrives from England with the intention of establishing gas works in Perth and Fremantle.—The City Council appoint Mr. G. F. Wilkinson and J. K. Churchyard to re-assess all rateable property in Perth.—The obituary of the month contains the names of Mrs. William Mills, of Fremantle; Mr. Gerald DeCourcy Lefroy, J.P., of Bunbury, who died from the effects of an accident which befel him while superintending the working of a threshing machine; and Mr. Alexander Francisco, for many years Postmaster at Fremantle.

1879.

JANUARY.—Two of Her Majesty's ships—the *Emerald* and *Danæ*—arrive at Fremantle from the Cape, *en route* to join the Australian squadron at Sydney.—Mr. E. H. Wittenoom appointed a justice of the peace.—The annual race meeting of the W. A. Turf Club, held on the 8th and 9th instant, most successful. *Bas Blanc*, an iron-grey horse belonging to Mr. Stephen Monger, won the Queen's Plate.—Mr. Carl Fuchs opens a swimming school in Perth, which is largely patronised.—News received of the death, at Edinburgh, of Mr. Walpole Champneys, formerly a medical practitioner at York.—Two young men, named Faril and Woolley, from Victoria, while exploring for pastoral country in the vicinity of Eucla, reported to be lost. Messrs. Muir and Dorry go out in search of them, but return to Eucla without

discovering any trace of their whereabouts. Subsequently the Messrs. Muir organise another search party, and, aided by a flying party on camels, make another search farther inland, and find the waggon, water-bags, and other equipment of the missing men, leaving no doubt that they had perished.—The revival of the Perth Horticultural Society is announced, under the secretaryship of Mr. William Adlam.—The obituary for the month contains the names of Mrs. Edward Connor, and Mrs. John Mitchell, sen.—Mr. Lewis Stirling appointed Postmaster at Fremantle, *vice* Mr. Francisco, deceased.

FEBRUARY.—Telegraphic communication with the North-Settlements strenuously agitated. Mr. Marmion, M.L.C., dwelt at length on the subject in a debate during a recent sitting of the Legislature.—Mr. Carl Lorenzon, a practical mineralogist and geologist of considerable experience, leaves for the North-west Settlements on a prospecting expedition.—The Hon. H. H. Hocking granted twelve months' leave of absence and proceeds to Europe per P. & O. steamer *viâ* Galle.—Bishop Parry announces the intention of the Church of England to establish a high-class College for Girls.—Arrangements made between the Government and Messrs. Lilly & Co. for the coasting mail steamer *Rob Roy* to visit periodically the North-west Settlements.—The Government purpose introducing fifty Chinese from Singapore, to supply the labor market.—Mr. Alexander Forrest and party sail per *Amy*, for Cossack, on an exploring expedition from the DeGrey River to the South Australian Overland Telegraph Line.

MARCH.—The Hon. G. W. Leake, Q.C., appointed Acting Attorney General, during the absence, on leave, of the Hon. H. H. Hocking.—The Rev. Joseph Johnston, the highly-esteemed Congregational Minister of Fremantle, who has resided there for upwards of twenty years, leaves for England. Previous to his departure his congregation entertain him at a tea meeting, at which they present him with an address and a purse of sovereigns.—News received by the *Nautilus* from Cossack of the total wreck of the schooner *Rosette*, Captain John Vincent, during a hurricane, on a voyage from Fremantle, and all on board perished. Among the *Rosette's* passengers were Mr. Horley Landor, Mr. Richard Jewell, jr., Mr. Thomas Ralston, and Mr. George Fisher.—The stern-post, with name attached, of the steamer *Start* (Capt. Allen), from Melbourne to Fremantle, found on the beach at Israelite Bay by the assistant Telegraph Operator, Mr. Scott. It is generally believed that all on board perished.—The obituary of the month contains the name of Mr. Stephen Parker, who died at Northbourne, near York,

on the 18th instant, at the advanced age of 85 years.

APRIL.—The Western Australian Bank Incorporation Bill announced by the *Government Gazette* as having received the Royal assent.—His Lordship Bishop Parry married to the eldest daughter of the Hon. G. W. Leake, Q.C., on the 15th instant.—The Ballot Act receives the Royal assent.—A cricket match played between the Metropolitan Club and the New Norcia Clubs, on the ground of the latter; Perth winning by twenty-four runs.—The obituary of the month contains the names of Mrs. Thomas Williams, a colonist of 1829; Mrs. D. Glyn Watkins, Mrs. Matthew Edwards, Mr. John Thomas Helms, and Mr. Josiah Woodrow.

MAY.—Stamped telegraph forms and postal-cards introduced and issued by the Government.—Preparations undertaken to celebrate the Jubilee of the colony, which occurs on the 1st proximo; the public rejoicings being fixed for the 3rd prox.—Mr. Edward MacDonnell delivers a series of public lectures on the confederation of the Australian colonies.—A small Debts Court established at Northampton.—His Excellency the Governor receives despatches conveying the Royal assent to the Loan Bill, 1878, and also to the amendment thereof made by a resolution of the Legislature at a special sitting in January.—Much dissatisfaction expressed by the residents of Fremantle owing to the intention of the Government to convert the Green into the site for the Railway Station in that town.—The obituary of the month includes the names of Mr. J. DeM. Absolon, J.P.; Mrs. Hosking, and Mrs. Alfred Smith.—The Press agitate for the establishment of telegraphic communication between Perth and Gingin and a mail service to Wanneroo.

JUNE.—The Jubilee of the colony celebrated on the 3rd instant, the season being one of great rejoicing in all parts of the colony. Besides other public demonstrations in the city, the Governor, Sir Harry St. George Ord, turned the first sod of the Eastern Railway, the proceedings taking place on an allotment belonging to Mr. James Dyer, in William Street, contiguous to the Public Pound. To further mark the occasion a special issue of the *Inquirer* was distributed gratis the following morning all over the colony, containing particulars of the demonstrations at Perth, Fremantle, and many of the surrounding districts, as far as the facilities by mail and telegraph enabled the proprietors of that journal, Messrs. Stirling Bros., to do so.—A branch Bank of the Union Bank of Australia opened at Fremantle.—A Jew, named Abraham Rosenberg, fined £120 for smuggling a large quantity of jewellery, which was ordered to be confiscated.—Mr.

John Summers appointed Treasurer of the City Council.—News received of the death of Mr. Henry Lance Hughes, at Singapore, for many years engaged upon the staff of the *Inquirer*. Mr. Hughes was the founder of the Swan River Mechanics' Institute.—Two valuable cows and a heifer, belonging to Mr. J. D. Manning, killed by lightning at South Perth, 4th.—Mr. Charles Harper, M.L.C., appointed a justice of the peace.—Messrs. Thos. Smith and George Faulkner Wilkinson appointed by the Government Valuators in connection with land resumed for the Eastern Railway.
