1.—May 27.—A Partial Eclipse of the SUN; invisible in Australia.

2.—June 11.—A Total Eclipse of the MOON; invisible in Australia.

3.—November 21.—An Annular Eclipse of the SUN; invisible in Australia, the Sun being below the horizon at the time of eclipse.

4.—December 5.—A Partial Eclipse of the MOON, visible in Australia. First contact with penumbra, 9h. 59m.; first contact with shadow, 11h. 10m.; middle of Eclipse, 12h. 51m.; last contact with shadow, 14h. 32m.; last contact with penumbra, 15h. 43m.

The Supreme Court of Western Australia has, in addition to its Common Law and Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, jurisdiction in Bankruptcy—the Local Bankruptcy Act being almost identical with the English Act of 1869. It has also jurisdiction in Lunacy and Equity, and by Local Ordinance 27 Vic. No. 19, of 1873, a Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes was constituted, with all the jurisdiction of the Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes in England, vested in it under the 20th and 21st Vict., ch. 85.

SITTINGS OF THE SUPREME COURT.

The Court holds its sittings at such times and places as the Chief

Justice by rules and orders may prescribe.

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling or any number of shillings, or of pounds

and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

sixpence per ounce.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Viâ Brindisi—Under half an ounce, 6d.; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, 1s.; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional.

LETTERS FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every ½ ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Newspapers received from places beyond the limits of the colony are delivered free, but when reposted are

subject to a charge of 1d. each.

BOOKS, &c.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter.—Viâ Brindisi for the United Kingdom—1 ounce, 1d.; 2 ounces, 2d.; 4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 4d. for every additional four ounces. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—1 ounce, 1d.; 2 ounces, 2d.; 4 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each additional 2 oz. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 8d. for each ½-lb. or fraction of ½-lb. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c. Regulations—Every book, packet or parcel of any kind, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication.

BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY.—2 ounces, 1d.; 4 ounces, 2d.; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each 4 oz.

REGISTRATION LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late Letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, if as a fee thereon stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

DIOCESAN SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

The governing body of the Church of England in Western Australia is the Synod, established in 1872, and consists of the Bishop, all licensed clergymen, and lay communicant representatives elected by the congregations; no act being valid unless it carries the consent of the three orders. The Synod must meet at least once in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place in every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, by which in the first instance nominations are made, and the appointments ultimately confirmed by the Bishop. The elections of Synodsmen usually take place in November, and the Synod assembles in March. Secretary—Rev. G. H. Sweeting. Registrar of the Diocese.—R. C. Loftie, Esq. Marriage Law Amendment Act, 1879.

[Assented to by the Governor, 22nd October, 1879.]
Epitomised.

No marriage shall be celebrated, except under special license for that purpose to be issued by the Governor, or except after due publication of banns, or intimation in writing of an intention to have such marriage shall be affixed for three consecutive Sundays on the door of the place of worship in which it shall be intended to celebrate such marriage, until one of the parties shall give notice under his or her hand in the form given in the Schedule A of this Act or to the like effect, to the district registrar of the district within which the parties, or one of them, shall have dwelt for not less than seven days then next preceding; and shall state in such notice the name and surname, and the profession or condition of each of the parties intending marriage, the dwelling place of each of them, and the time during which each has dwelt therein. But if etheir party shall have dwelt in the place stated in such notice during more than seven days, it may be stated therein that he or she has dwelt there seven days and upwards.

The district registrar shall forthwith post a true copy of such notice in a conspicuous place in his office, and shall also enter a true copy thereof fairly into a book to be for that purpose provided by the registrar general, to be called "The Marriage Notice Book;" and such book shall be open at all reasonable times without fee to all persons desirous of inspecting the same; and for every such entry the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shifting.

Every district registrar shall, on the first day of every month, transmit to the registrar general all such notices received by him during the month preceding, and such notices shall be thereafter kept in the general registry, in such order and manner as the registrar general shall think fit, so that the same may be most

readily seen and examined.

After the expiration of seven days from the entry of such notice, the district registrar, upon being requested so to do by or on behalf of either party mentioned therein, shall issue under his hand certificate in the form of schedule B to this Act annexed; Provided that no lawful impediment be shown to the satisfaction of the district registrar why such certificate should not issue; and provided that the issue of such certificate shall not have been sooner forbidden, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, by any person authorized in that behalf as hereinafter provided; and every such certificate shall state the particulars set forth in the notice, the day on which the notice was received, posted, and entered, and that the full period of seven days has elapsed since the posting and entry of such notice; and for every such certificate the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Any person whose consent to a marriage is required by law may forbid the issue of the district registrar's certificate, by writing, or causing to be written at any time before the issue of such certificate, the word "forbidden" opposite to the entry of the notice of such intended marriage in the marriage notice book, and by subscribing or causing to be subscribed thereto his or her name.

place of abode, and character as parent or guardian.

No marriage in pursuance of such notice shall be celebrated three calendar months after the entry of such notice, nor until the certificate mentioned in the fourth section hereof shall have been produced to the minister or district registrar celebrating the marriage, nor in any case until a declaration upon oath, or a solemn affirmation shall have been made in manner prescribed by the Ordinance 19th Victoria, No. 11, section 4.

This Act shall be taken to be part of the Ordinance 19th Victoria, No. 11, as fully and effectually as if incorporated therewith, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Marriage Law

Amendment Act, 1879."

History of Mestern Australia.

Brief Chronicle of Occurrences and Events from October, 1879, to September, 1880.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1879

OCTOBER .- A snow-storm visited Fremantle .- The Press of the colony strongly agitates the necessity of forest conservancy.-The Perth Ice Company issue their prospectus; Mr. J. M. Ferguson being appointed Manager of the concern.-The Government receive notification of the moiety of the £200,000 4d per Cent. Public Works Loan being successfully floated in London.—The Rev. David Shearer, M.A., Presbyterian Minister arrives, from London per Charlotte Padbury on the 1st instant, with Mrs. Shearer and family.—A young man named Butterly bitten on the chest by a snake: he ultimately recovered.—The Director of Public Works issues tenders for the erection of the Perth Railway Station; the tender of Mr. T. Smith being accepted.—The Council dissolved by affluxion of time on the 24th instant.—The total amount for awards for land affected by the construction of the Fremantle-Guildford Railway amounted to £8000.—The Rev. Joseph Odgers appointed pastor of Trinity Congregational Church, vice the Rev. T. G. Rose, resigned. -The "W.A. Times" changes hands, and the title of the journal altered to the "West Australian" from that of the "W.A. Times."-Mr. James Ramsay, a Bunbury settler, killed while in the act of unloading some timber from his team on the 27th inst.-The obituary for the month contains the names of Mrs. Donald Cameron, Mrs. J. F. Fordham, Mrs. Edmund Harris, and Mr. David Guthrie.

NOVEMBER.—The first issue of "The Standard," a Church England newspaper, issued under the Editorship of the Venerable Archdeacon Brown, the Manager of the Swan Boys' Orphanage.—On the 5th instant an action for libel was instituted by Mr. James Pearce (proprietor of the Herald newspaper) against the proprietors of the Inquirer newspaper, for inserting a letter signed "E.S.V.P.," in the Inquirer of September 3. Damages were laid at £1000. Mr. Burt was retained as counsel for the plaintiff, and Mrs. S. H. Parker for the defendants. The chief objections to the letter made in the plaintiff's plea were the allusions made to the writer in reference to the general comments of that journal, together with the inferences of certain letters referring to Sir Luke Leake and Sir Harry Ord having appeared in the Straits Times being written by the Herald's editorial writer, Mr. James Roe. The Chief Justice summed up at considerable length, pointing out that the letter was not privileged. The jury, which consisted of

Messrs. W. Holman (foreman), J. Snowball, W. Owston, W. Britnall, C. W. Ferguson, S. J. Chipper, R. N. Waldeck, James Brittain, J. Gallop, jun., George Ingleton, W. Wheatley, and George Towton, recorded a verdict for the plaintiff, £50, and costs. —The usual annual regatta under the auspices of the Perth Yacht and Boat Club came off on Perth Water on the 11th inst .- Sir Archibald Burt, Chief Justice of the colony, died on the 21st instant, after a long and useful career in the service of the Crown of upwards of forty years .- A monument, sent out from England to the care of Dr. C. H. Elliott, of Guildford, for erection in the Church of England Cemetery over the grave of Mr. C. A. J. Piesse, formerly Colonial Secretary of this colony.-Mr. Alexander Forrest and party, after a very successful exploration of the colony from the DeGrey River to the Port Darwin telegraph line, arrive at Fremantle per Rob Roy on the 26th inst.; a hearty welcome being accorded to the active leader and his party.-Mr. G. M. Meares appointed Acting Resident Magistrate at York during temporary absence of Mr. Cowan.-Mr. Alexander Forrest presented the Government with a living crocodile, which he had brought with him from the Northern Territory. The reptile was afterwards placed in the Government Garden, but it died shortly afterwards. The body was preserved and placed in the museum. The obitury for the month includes the names of Mrs. William Pearse (a colonist of fifty years') and Sir A P. Burt (Chief Justice).

DECEMBER.—An exhaustive financial and general statement of the transactions of the Perth City Council during the past year published in a special supplement to the Inquirer of the 3rd inst. under instructions of the retiring Chairman (Mr. S. H. Parker). -The Hon. G. W. Leake, Q.C., appointed Acting Chief Justice, vice Sir A. P. Burt, deceased; and Mr. E. A. Stone appointed to the office of Acting Attorney General.—Messrs. Stone and Burt's Music Hall (St. George's) in Howick Street opened, the inaugural event being the performance in the Hall, by amateurs, of the Colleen Bawn, on the 11th inst.; the performance being the most successful of the kind ever held in the colony.-Mr. G. F. Wilkinson appointed organist of St. George's Cathedral, vice Mr. C. H. Compton, resigned.—The Hon. H. H. Hocking, Attorney General, obtains an extension of leave of absence for six months.— A deputation waited on His Excellency the Governor on the 8th instant relative to an extension of wharfage accommodation at Fremantle.—Tommy Pierre, an aboriginal native of the colony, who had accompanied the Messrs. Forrest on each of their explorations, died on board the s.s. Otway at King George's Sound on the 11th inst.—Two natives, named George and Paddy, both prisoners confined at Rottnest Penal establishment, rescued from drowning by a local prisoner named George Casely, on the 30th ultimo.—The first screw steamer built in the colony launched from

the yard of Messrs. Lawrence & Son, and christened the Lady Ord. -The following report received from the party at work on the Irwin Coal Seam :- "The foreman in charge of the staff at the Irwin Coal Seam reports having sunk fifty feet, and has brought up many good specimens of coal; the prospects of a rich mine favorable; strong flow of water, however, prevents deeper sinking until proper appliances are available."-Mr. George Christmass, a colonist of 50 years' standing, died at Northam on the 14th inst.— The ship Benledi, of 1057 tons register, commanded by Capt. Boyd, while on a voyage from Sydney to Calcutta, wrecked on the Pelsart group of Hontman's Abrolhos about the 17th inst.; no lives lost.—The Government indent to Melbourne for two of Cobb's coaches for the use of the inland mail service. - The arbitrators appointed to adjudicate upon the value of some property belonging to Mr. Joseph Shaw and reserved for the Eastern Railway, and for which the Government allowed £250, awarded the owner £877.— Mr. J. H. Monger imported twelve prize rams and ten ewes from Victoria per Rob Roy on the 23rd inst.—Various Zulu trophies. comprising an assegai and other weapons of warfare, brought to the colony by Captain O'Grady, of the schooner Amur, and some gentlemen who had been actively engaged in the recent war between the British troops and the Zulu tribes.—An old settler, named Grainger, died at the Invalid Depôt on the 17th inst.— The obituary of the month includes the names of Mr. Charles Wisbey, jr., and Mr. George Christmass.

1880.

JANUARY.—Intelligence received from Melbourne of a company being formed by a number of capitalists to form a large squatting station in the Beagle Bay (Kimberley) district. Lord Cairns, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, publishes a letter in the Inquirer of the 7th inst. soliciting the help of the people of this colony in the support of the Homes for Young People established in London by Dr. Barnardo.-Mr. Edward Shenton and Mr. W. Hepburn Gale appointed Lieutenant and Sub-Lieutenant, respectively, of the Geraldton Rifle Volunteers .- Mr. Alfred E. Burt, a son of the late Sir A. P. Burt, appointed Acting Registrar of Deeds and Deputy Registrar of Titles.—Many sudden deaths from sunstroke occur during the month, chiefly among the members of the Enrolled Pensioner Force.—The Hon. J. H. Thomas appointed a governor of the Perth High School.—A settler at Champion Bay named Joseph Warren, and his daughter, Elizabeth Warren, tried at the criminal sittings of the Supreme Court on the 7th inst. on the charge of stealing a flock of a sheep, the property of Messrs. Major and Barlee. The case occupied the Court three days, and resulted in both Warren and his daughter being acquitted.-The Heliograph is successfully used as a means of communication between Fremantle and Rottnest Island.—A man named Charles Hopkins, in the employ of Mr. Joseph Harris, of the Caming, fell off a hay-stack and broke his neck while securing a tarpaulin to save the stack from rain.—The half-yearly meeting of shareholders of the Western Australian Bank held on the 14th inst., at which the shareholders voted the Manager (Mr. Lochée) a sum of £200 in recognition of his long and valued services.—The Rev. Joseph Johnston, Congregational Minister at Fremantle, returns to the colony from London per R.M.S. Assam on the 22nd inst., after an absence of ten months.—The Government notifies its willingness to forward applications for the introduction of as many Chinese Coolies as are required by the settlers.—Mr. James Gallop, a very old colonist, died at Fremantle on the 21st inst.—Mr. Thomas Salkilld, one of the earliest settlers, and who for upwards of twenty-five years filled the office of sexton of St. George's Cathedral, died on

the 27th inst.

FEBRUARY.—A man in the employ of Mr. James Anderson Hall, near Roebourne, speared by an aboriginal native during Mr. Hall's absence from the station.—News received by telegraph that Sir William Robinson, K.C.M.G., had been appointed to succeed Sir Harry Ord as Governor of Western Australia .- A stream of pale light, resembling a comet, visible in the Western sky, and by telegraph it is reported that the phenomenon is visible throughout Australia. The Government astronomers at Adelaide and Melbourne report it to be a comet.—A man named Webster, a brickmaker, crushed to death by a quantity of clay falling upon him. -Intelligence received of the appointment of Mr. Wrenfordsley, Procureur and Advocate General of Mauritius, as Chief Justice of this colony.—The average grain crop for the season estimated at 15 bushels per acre throughout the colony, and prices range for wheat, 5s. per bushel; Cape barley and oats, 2s. 6d. per bushel; English barley at 6s. per bushel.—The Brethren of the City of Perth Lodge, No. 4702, M.U.I.O.O.F., celebrated their anniversary by a dinner at the Lodge-room Murray Street, on the evening of the 3rd inst.—The annual Race-meeting of the W.A. Turf Club held on the 4th and 5th inst.; a horse named "Priestess," belonging to Mr. Maitland Brown, won the Queen's Plate; six horses started.—The general elections for representatives to serve in the Legislative Council held this month. At Perth, out of the three candidates nominated-Sir Luke Leake, S. H. Parker, and Dr. Scott-the two former were elected; Mr. Parker heading the poll with 352 votes .-Much interest evinced throughout the colony upon the lamentable distress prevailing in Ireland, and a public subscription started for the purpose of collecting money to send to the Lord Mayor of Dublin for distribution among the distressed. At the Roman Catholic Cathedral on the 22nd inst. upwards of £35 was collected, and afterwards forwarded by His Lordship Bishop Griver in aid of the Fund.-The obituary for the month includes the name of Mr.

MARCH.—Chief Justice Wrenfordsley arrives.—A rifle contest arranged between the Perth Metropolitan Rifles and the South Australian Association. The match came off on the 20th, the Metropolitan Rifles being the victors by five points. Each squad fired on his own ground, the result being telegraphed.—The foundations of St. George's new Cathedral completed.—A water-supply for Fremantle advocated by the Inquirer.—The obituary for the month includes the name of Mr. F. W. Pearson. Mr. John Dunn,

of the Phillips River, murdered by natives.

APRIL.—Sir Harry Ord leaves Perth, en route to England, 5th. -Sir William Robinson arrives at Albany from Europe to relieve Sir Harry Ord as Governor of the colony, 6th .- The new Hall attached to the Western Australian Bank formally opened by a Ball given by Mr. and Mrs. Lochée.-The Bunbury Jarrah Timber Company formed.—Cobb's coaches introduced from Melbourne by the Government for the purpose of the inland mail service. - Governor Robinson held a Levée at Government House for the first time after his resumption of the administration of the Government of the colony, 17th.—A large number of sheep and other stud stock imported by Mr. Padbury, Mr. Shenton, and others.-Much interest manifested in the arbitration proceedings-Palmer v. the Crown-in connection with the Northern Railway, for the construction of which the plaintiff was the contractor. Claim, £6000.—Formal welcome given to the Rev. D. Shearer at a public tea-meeting, Sir Luke Leake, Speaker of the Legislative Council, presiding, 28th.—The obituary for the month includes the names of Mr. John Rhodes, Mr. Yelverton (of Quindalup), and Miss Catherine Smith.

MAY.—The Governor appoints the following gentlemen to be a committee to prepare for the representation of the colony at the Melbourne International Exhibition, for which the Legislature provided a sum of £1000:—Hon Malcolm Fraser, A.I.C.E. (Surveyor General), Hon. Jas. H. Thomas, M.I.C.E. (Director of Public Works), Messrs. C. Crowther and W. E. Marmion, M.L.C.'s; and Mr. Charles Harper.—The first night sale of land held in Perth by Messrs. G. F. Wilkinson & Co.—Sunday religious services in the Perth Town Hall inaugurated by the Rev. David Shearer.—The Perth Co-operative Store Company's landed property, in Murray Street, sold at auction for £2035.—The obituary for the month in

cludes the name of Mr. John Uglow.

JUNE.—The first suit for divorce brought in the colony—Thompson v. Thompson and Francisco—tried at the Supreme Court, 11th.—First shipment of fat bullocks from the North-west Coast arrives at Fremantle.—News of the capture of the notorious Kelly gang of bushrangers, in the subsequent proceedings of which

the name of the Very Rev. M. Gibney, of Perth, stands conspicuous, received by telegraph, 28th.—Presentation of a medal from the Sydney Shipwrecked Mariners Society to Mrs. Boldt, of the German schooner *Moorburg*, made at Fremantle by His Excellency Sir William Robinson, 29th.—Messrs. G. Randell, S. S. Parker, and L. C. Burges appointed nominee members of the new Legislative Council.—The obituary of the month includes the name of Mr.

Samuel Waterman Viveash.

JULY.—The first session of the third Legislative Council under the existing constitution opened, 19th.—The P. & O. steamship Siam grounded in Princess Royal Harbor (Albany), but was ·floated again without sustaining any damage. - Favorable accounts received from Beagle Bay as to the adaptability of the country for sheeps depasturing purposes. - The Postmaster General (Mr. Helmich) arranges for the establishment of both issuing as well as paying money-order offices in the principal districts.-Governor Robinson appoints Messrs. Rigg & Co. and Mr. H. N. Alcock, of Melbourne, and Mr. M. C. Davies of Adelaide, members of a Local Committee to represent Western Australia at the Melbourne Exhibition.—Mr. E. A. Stone appointed a nominee member of the Legislative Council.—The contributions of the colonists to the Irish Relief Fund amount to about £1400.—The obituary for the month includes the names of Mrs. Kenworthy (who arrived in 1829), and Mrs. Dudley.

AUGUST.—A proposition to make all Church sittings "open and free" moved in the Synod of the Church of England, but rejected.—The P. & O. Company's establishment at Albany broken up, and the Agency of the Company handed over to Mr. J. F. T. Hassell.—Two lads, named Wallas and Guerin, drowned by the upsetting of a boat in Perth Water, 8th.—Mr. M. Wallis's tender for building the second section of St. George's new Cathedral accepted.—H.M. schooner Meda, Capt. Archdeacon, intended for coast surveys, arrives from England.—The obituary contains the names of Canon Martelli, Mrs. E. Scott, and Mrs. Dempster.

SEPTEMBER.—The Hon. R. T. Goldsworthy, C.M.G., leaves for England to take up the appointment of Administrator of St. Lucia. He is succeeded by Baron Gifford, V.C.—A motion to provide free passes on the Railways of the colony to members of the Legislative Council confirmed.—The Geraldton Observer first printed.—Mr. Robb (through Mr. Barnfield, his agent) entertained His Excellency the Governor, the members of the Councils, &c., at a lunch at Fremantle on the first running of the ballasting-train on the Eastern Railway; the train conveying the party about two miles up the line.—His Excellency the Governor and Lady Robinson proceed to the Eastern colonies, to be present at the opening of the Melbourne International Exhibition.—The obituary of the month includes the name of Mr. Thomas Lockyer.
