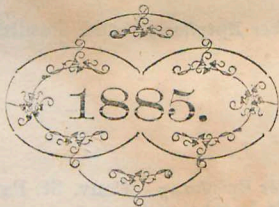
In the Year 1885 there will be two Eclipses of the SUN and two of the MOON.

- 3.—A Total Eclipse of the SUN, on September 8, 1885; invisible in Western Australia, but visible in Queensland, New South Wales, and Tasmania.
- 4.—A Partial Eclipse of the MOON, September 23, 1885; visible in Western Australia.

Gregorian Calendar, or New Style.

Previous to 1552 the length of the Year had been reckoned as 365 days 6 hours, as computed by Julius Cæsar (B.C. 45), but as the true length of a solar year is 365 days, 5 hours, and 49 minutes, an error had arisen in this computation amounting in 1552 to 10 days in advance. To rectify the Calendar, and to prevent future irregularities, it was decreed as follows by Pope Gregory XIII.—

The year 1582 to consist of	365 days
The ordinary year to consist of	365 days
The year 1584, and every fourth year afterwards (termed leap year), to consist of	} 366 days
The years 1700, 1800, 1900, 2000, and so on, three out of every four centuries afterwards, to be reckoned not as leap years, but as ordinary years	

GOLDEN NUMBER.

Golden Number, in chronology, is that number which indicates the year of the Lunar cycle for any given time. It was called the Golden Number because in the ancient calendar it was written in letters of gold, on account of its great usefulness in ecclesiastical computations, especially in fixing the time at Easter.

Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late Letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of the Inland Mails if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

DIOCESAN SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

The governing body of the Church of England in Western Australia is the Synod, established in 1872, and consists of the Bishop, all licensed clergymen, and lay communicant representatives elected by the congregations; no act being valid unless it carries the consent of the three orders. The Synod must meet at least once in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place in every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, by which in the first instance nominations are made, and the appointments ultimately confirmed by the Bishop. The elections of Synodsmen usually take place in November, and the Synod assembles in July. Secretary—Rev. G. H. Sweeting, Registrar of the Diocese—Septimus Burt, Esq. The Marriage Act.

[Epitomised.]

No marriage shall be celebrated, except under special license for that purpose to be issued by the Governor, or except after due

publication of banns, or intimation in writing of an intention to have such marriage shall be affixed for three consecutive Sundays on the door of the place of worship in which it shall be intended to celebrate such marriage, until one of the parties shall give notice under his or her hand in the form given in the Schedule A of this Act or to the like effect, or to the district registrar of the district within which the parties, or one of them, shall have dwelt for not less than seven days then next proceeding; and shall state in such notice the name and surname, and the profession or condition of each of the parties intending marriage, the dwelling place of each of them, and the time during which each has dwelt therein. But if either party shall have dwelt in the place stated in such notice during more than seven days, it may be stated therein that he or she has dwelt there seven days and upwards.

The district registrar shall forthwith post a true copy of such notice in a conspicuous place in his office, and shall also enter a true copy thereof fairly in a book to be for that purpose provided by the registrar general, to be called "The Marriage Notice Book;" and such book shall be open at all reasonable times without fee to all persons desirous of inspecting the same; and for any such entry the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Every district registrar shall, on the first day of every month, transmit to the registrar general all such notices received by him during the month preceding, and such notice shall be thereafter kept in the general registry, in such order and manner as the registrar general shall think fit, so that the same may be most readily seen and examined.

After the expiration of seven days from the entry of such notice, the district registrar, upon being requested so to do by or on behalf of either party mentioned therein, shall issue under his hand a certificate in the form of schedule B to this Act annexed; Provided that no lawful impediment be shown to the satisfaction of the district registrar why such certificate shall not have been sooner forbidden, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, by any person authorised in that behalf as hereinafter provided; and every such certificate shall state the particulars set forth in the notice, the day on which the notice was received, posted, and entered, and that the full period of seven days has elapsed since the posting and entry of such notice; and for every such certificate the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Any person whose consent to a marriage is required by law may forbid the issue of the district registrar's certificate, by writing, or

causing to be written at any time before the issue of such certificate, the word "forbidden" opposite to the entry of the notice of such intended marriage in the marriage notice book, and by subscribing, or causing to be subscribed thereto, his or her name, place of abode, and character as parent or guardian.

No marriage in pursuance of such notice shall be celebrated three calendar months after the entry of such notice, nor until the certificate mentioned in the fourth section hereof shall have been produced to the minister or district registrar celebrating the marriage, nor in any case until a declaration upon oath, or a solemn affirmation shall have been made in manner prescribed by the Ordinance 19th Victoria No. 11, section 4.

This Act shall be taken to be part of the Ordinance 19th Victoria No. 11 as fully and effectually as if incorporated therewith, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Marriage Law Amendment Act," 1879."

The Dog Act.

(Epitomised.)

The word "owner" in this Act means any person who shall at any time keep and have in his custody under his control any dog, and the occupier of any house or premises where any dog is kept or harbored, or permitted to live or remain. Provided, that such occupier shall not be deemed to be the owner if he can prove that he was not the proprietor of the said dog, and that such dog was kept or harbored, or permitted to live or remain in the said house or premises, without his sanction or knowledge. Provided also, that where there are more occupiers than one in any house or premises let in several apartments or lodgings, or otherwise, the occupier of that particular part of the premises in which such dog shall have been kept or harbored, or permitted to live or remain, shall be deemed to be the owner of such dog, subject as aforesaid.

Registration of Dogs.

The owner of every dog shall, on or within fifteen days after the first day of January, 1884, and on or within fifteen days after the first day of January in each and every ensuing year, register such dog at the office of the municipality within which municipality it is intended to keep such dog, with the person appointed to register dogs at such office; or if it be not intended to keep such dog within any municipality then such dog shall be registered at the Court of

Petty Sessions which shall be nearest to the place where it is intended to keep such dog; or at the residence of any person who shall have been appointed as for that purpose.

The owner of every such dog shall, previous to such registration, pay to the person appointed to register dogs in a municipality, for the use of the municipal council, or to the Clerk of the Court of Petty Sessions, or to such other person duly appointed by the said court as aforesaid, the registration fee mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto; and shall at the time of such payment deliver to the said clerk, or to the person appointed as aforesaid, a description of the said dog, embracing the several particulars of the animal, with a declaration thereunder written of the truth thereof, under the hand of such owner or of some person authorised by the owner in that behalf. Every such registration shall be in force from the day on which the same shall be so made until the thirty-first day of December then next ensuing, and no longer; provided that when a registration shall be made after the first day of July in any year, one-half only of the fee mentioned in the Second Schedule shall be payable in respect of such registration.

If any person shall knowingly make a false declaration respecting all or any of the particulars contained in the aforesaid description, or shall insert or omit, or wilfully cause to permit to be inserted or omitted, in such description, any matter or thing whatsoever contrary to, or for the purpose of concealing the truth, he shall forfeit a sum not more than forty shillings, to be recovered as a penalty under this Act.

Every clerk of such Court, and every person appointed as aforesaid, shall keep for public inspection a correct list, arranged in alphabetical order, of the names of all persons who shall have registered any dog during the current year, and the number of dogs registered by each person, together with the registered number of such dogs; and any person applying for the particulars of any dog so registered, or for the name of the registered owner thereof, or for a certified copy of the receipt hereinbefore mentioned, shall be entitled to receive the same on payment of a fee of one shilling.

In any proceedings under this Act it shall not be necessary for the informant to establish the fact of non-registration; but the proof of due registration shall lie on the defendant, and the said receipt, or a certified copy thereof, shall be admissible as evidence of such registration.

Every person who, after the expiration of fifteen days from the first day of January, 1884, and after the expiration of fifteen days

from the first day of January in each and every year thereafter, shall be the owner of any unregistered dog, shall forfeit and pay, in respect of such unregistered dog, a sum of forty shillings, recoverable as a penalty as aforesaid. Provided that this section shall not apply to the dogs of aboriginal natives.

It shall be lawful for any person at any place to seize and detain any dog unattended and wandering at large, and upon notice thereof given to any Justice of the Peace, such Justice shall summon the owner to appear before him and claim such dog; and if such owner or some one on his behalf shall not, within twenty-four hours after service of such summons, or within such further time as such Justice may deem reasonable, appear and claim such dog, the same shall be forthwith killed; and if any unregistered dog shall be found at large in any part of the colony without being under the immediate control of some person, any such dog so found at large shall be liable to be immediately killed and destroyed; and all persons are hereby authorised, and all persons specially or generally authorised in writing by a Justice of the Peace in that behalf, are ordered and required to seize, kill, and destroy every such dog so found at large accordingly.

If any constable or any other person shall wilfully or maliciously kill or destroy any dog which shall not be at large contrary to the provisions of this Act, such constable or other person shall pay to the owner of such dog the full value thereof, and also a penalty of not less than twenty shillings nor more than five pounds, recoverable as aforesaid.

If any constable who shall be ordered by a Justice of the Peace in writing to destroy any unregistered dog which may be at large contrary to the provisions of this Act shall neglect to destroy or to use his best endeavours to destroy the dog mentioned or described in such order, such constable shall for every neglect forfeit and pay, as a penalty, a sum not exceeding forty shillings

Dogs of Aboriginal Natives.

It shall be lawful for any person to lay a complaint before any Justice of the Peace to the effect that an aboriginal native has in his possession an unregistered dog which has killed, maimed, or wounded sheep, or an unregistered dog not required by the said native for the procuring of food and likely to cause injury to sheep. On reasonable grounds shown, the said Justice shall cause the said native to be summoned or brought before him, and shall investigate the said complaint. If the complaint be proved to the satisfaction of the said Justice, the said Justice, if he shall think fit under all

the said circumstances of the case, may order the destruction of the said dog; provided that no dog shall be destroyed under this section if upon demand, to be duly made by the Justice, the said native shall agree to register the said dog, and shall do so within one week, in which case the Justice shall cause the dog to be registered in the manner prescribed by this Act as nearly as may be, receiving and duly accounting for the registration fee. And provided further, that any native summoned or brought up as aforesaid, and in possession of more than two unregistered dogs, shall be allowed to select and keep any two of such dogs, neither of such dogs being proved to have killed, maimed, or wounded sheep; and no order for the destruction of dogs under this section shall apply to or include any dogs so selected and kept, and every dog registered by a native, under the provisions of this section, shall, during the period of registry, be exempted from the operation of any other provision of the section.

Every order for the destruction of a dog under the next preceding section shall be directed to a constable to be designated by the said Justice, or if there be no constable within five miles of the place where the said Justice is sitting, to some other fit and proper person who shall be willing to execute the said order without reward.

Destruction of Wild Dogs.

If any person shall produce to any Justice of the Peace the tail of a dog, and shall prove to the satisfaction of such Justice that it is the tail of a wild dog, he shall be entitled, if such dog was destroyed within the Central District, to a reward of ten shillings, and if such dog has been destroyed in any district other than the Central District he shall be entitled to a reward of five shillings, to be obtained as hereinafter mentioned. The said Justice shall forthwith cause the said tail to be entirely destroyed in his presence, and he shall give to the said person a certificate in writing signed by the said Justice and certifying that the whole tail of a wild dog has been produced to him by the said person and has been entirely destroyed in his presence, and that the said person is entitled to such as aforesaid as a reward for the destruction of a wild dog.

Upon the production of such a certificate as aforesaid to the Clerk of the Court of any Petty Sessions or of any Resident Magistrate, or Police Magistrate, such person shall be paid by such Clerk the sum named in the said certificate, and the said Clerk shall retain the said certificate and deal with it as hereinbefore provided for.

Miscellaneous.

If any dog shall in any street or upon any highway rush at or

attack any person, horse, bullock, sheep, or any other such domestic animal, whereby any such person or animal may be injured, endangered, or put in fear, the owner of every such dog shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than five shillings nor more than five pounds for every such offence over and above the amount of any damage which such dog may have occasioned, and such penalty and damages shall be recoverable as aforesaid. But the recovery of such penalty only shall not affect the right of any person to proceed by action or otherwise against the owner of such dog for damages for any injury sustained by reason of the attack aforesaid.

If any person shall wilfully set on, urge, or permit any dog to attack, or chase any person, or any horse, sheep, bullock, or other such domestic animal he shall forfeit and pay, as a penalty, any sum not exceeding ten pounds; but the recovery of such penalty shall not affect the right of proceeding by action or otherwise for damages as aforesaid.

In any action or other proceeding for damages for injury done to man or beast by any dog, it shall not be necessary for the party seeking such damages to show a previous mischievous propensity in such animal, or the owner's knowledge of such previous mischievous propensity, or that the injury was attributable to neglect on the part of such owner.

All offences against this Act, and all penalties in respect thereof, shall be heard and determined, and all damages (in cases where the amount claimed shall not exceed twenty pounds) for any injury occasioned or done by any dog as hereinbefore mentioned, and the value of any dog improperly destroyed as aforesaid may be ascertained or recovered in a summary way before any Justice of the Peace.

One-half of all fines and penalties under this Act shall, in municipalities, be paid to the municipality, and shall elsewhere be paid into the Colonial Treasury; and one-half of the said fines and penalties shall be paid to the person who has informed against the offender.

History of Western Australia.

BRIEF CHRONICLE OF OCCURRENCES AND EVENTS
FROM OCTOBER, 1883, TO SEPTEMBER, 1884.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the *W. A. Almanack*. The following Notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's History.]

1883.

OCTOBER.—The Governor appoints a Commission, of which the Hon. John Forrest, C.M.G., is chairman, to enquire into the treatment of aboriginal native prisoners at Rottneest Island Prison, and to report generally upon the condition of the aboriginal population of the Colony.—The tender of Mr. Edward Keane, to construct the third section of the Eastern Railway—from Chidlow's Well to York—for £105,000—accepted by the Government, and the work proceeds forthwith.—Reports received of the shipment, at Melbourne and Sydney, of large numbers of sheep and other stock for the Kimberley district.—William Watkins and John Maroney tried and found guilty of the murder of an old man named James

Jenkins, of the barque Ribston, drowned through the upsetting of a boat off Lockeville.—Mr. Matthew Barnett prosecutes his Temperance Mission at the North with much success.—A tailor named Haines murdered his wife in Wellington-street. He confessed his guilt and was afterwards executed at Perth Prison.—The Very Rev. Archpriest O'Meara, of the diocese of Melbourne, visits the Colony.—The Governor, with Lady Barker, visits the eastern and northern districts, being everywhere very cordially received.—The Burnett Coffee Rooms, in Hay-street, formally opened by the Mayor (Mr. Geo. Shenton).—Much dissatisfaction expressed at the decision of the Executive not to appoint an Emigration Agent to represent the Colony in England, as was promised in His Excellency's opening address to the Legislative Council, by whom a vote of £20,000 was passed for the purpose of promoting immigration during the following year.—Intelligence received of the death, in England, of the Right Rev. Dr. Short, formerly Diocesan of South Australia, and in whose jurisdiction this Colony was included up till the year 1856, when it was erected into a separate diocese and Archdeacon Hale (now Bishop of Brisbane) was nominated as its first Bishop.—In proof of the rapid settlement of the Colony in the North and south-eastern districts, a Government return shows an increase in acreage in 1882 of fully two hundred per cent. and an increase in revenue from this source alone of £25,000 for the year.—During the year 1882 jarrah timber to the value of £93,000, and sandalwood (upwards of 9,000 tons) of the value of £96,000, were exported from this Colony.—His Excellency the Governor receives notification of his election as one of the Vice-Presidents of the Royal Humane Society of Australasia.—An epidemic of measles breaks out in Perth, the first cases being those of two aboriginal natives who came from Albany, at which port, it was afterwards ascertained, a steamer—the Pathan, from London—had touched with passengers on board who were suffering from the disease. [It may be here added that the epidemic subsequently spread with great rapidity throughout the Colony, the victims to its effects, direct and otherwise, numbering probably 500 persons of all ages. The only other epidemic of measles that has occurred in the Colony broke out in 1860-1.]—The Totalisator Bill assented to.—The obituary for the month contains the names of Mrs. Geo. Rewell, Mrs. Brand, and Mr. John Joyce.

NOVEMBER.—Eighth Annual Show of the Western Australian Agricultural Association held at Guildford, 7th. Among the exhibits were two bullocks shown by Mr. Padbury from the famous Yatheroo runs, weighing 1504 and 1488 lbs.—Mr. Matthew Burnett, accompanied by Mrs. Burnett, left Perth finally, on his way to Albany, and thence to Adelaide, 15th.—Mr. Geo. Shenton elected, for the third time in succession, Mayor of Perth. At his nomination he was warmly eulogised upon the great advances Perth had made, in matters municipal, since he assumed office.—The Australian Mutual Provident Society purchase a valuable block of land, in St. George's Terrace, whereon to erect office premises.—The Right Rev. Dr. Griver, Roman Catholic Bishop of Perth, arrives at Albany, per R.M.S. Rome, after an extended visit to Europe, 21st.—The camels purchased by Messrs. J. & W. Bateman from Sir Thomas Elder for employment in the construction of the telegraph from the Mines to Roebourne—a distance of about 750 miles—arrived at Northampton from South Australia, in charge of Mr. Mills. The party got over the journey safely and without loss, but great privations were encountered owing to the scarcity of water.—Intelligence received from London by wire that the Secretary of State for the Colonies had approved of the concessions asked for by Mr. Anthony Hordern, in consideration of his proposal to construct a railway from Beverley to Albany on the land-grant principle.—A townsite declared at Roebuck Bay in the name of Broome, in honor of His Excellency the Governor.—The remains of a human body accidentally unearthed at Truslow's, Wanneroo. Subsequent enquiries established the fact that they were those of a man named Michael Hands, who had been missing for some years. A companion of Hands, named Edward Jenkinson, who was arrested on suspicion of being the murderer, was convicted of manslaughter, and sentenced to penal servitude for twenty years.—The Governor gives his assent to the Totalisator Bill.—A proposal submitted to form a Chamber of Agriculture in the Colony.—Hon. Malcolm Fraser, C.M.G., Colonial Secretary, leaves Perth to attend the Intercolonial Conference at Sydney.—The obituary contains the names of three very old colonists, who arrived in the first year of settlement, and whose combined ages amounted to 250 years—Mrs. Minsion, Mr. Bayly Maycock, and Mr. John Oliver.

DECEMBER.—Heavy thunderstorms in the eastern and northern districts, doing considerable damage to the crops.—The rainfall for the year amounted to forty inches, or upwards of eight

inches over last year.—Mr. Matthew Burnett leaves Albany for Adelaide, 11th.—Prospectus of the Perth Gas Company (Limited) issued.—An unsuccessful attempt made to form an Orange Lodge in Perth.—Slight shock of earthquake felt in Perth on the morning of the 24th.—Many deaths from measles occur in Perth and Fremantle.—The sudden decrease in the value of sandalwood in the Singapore and China markets produces a very depressing effect in the traffic in that article, of the 9,000 tons of which was exported throughout the year a large quantity still remaining unsold.—The erection of the Northampton-Roebourne Telegraph line commenced, under the supervision on the part of the Government of Mr. H. Stuart Carey, Mr. C. D. Price being in charge of the contractors' party.

1884.

JANUARY.—Third section of the Eastern Railway, the terminus being at York, commenced by the contractor, Mr. Ed. Keane.—Unsuccessful attempt to burn down Mr. Summers' coach factory, in Hay-street.—At the annual meeting of the W.A. Turf Club, Dr. Scott's Flemington won the Queen's Plate; time, 5 min. 55 secs.—An offer received by the Government from a London Syndicate to construct a line of railway from York to Geraldton on the land grant principle.—H. B. Haynes executed for the murder of his wife.—Mr. Ed. Keane's tender for the completion of St. George's new Cathedral accepted.—A bathing-house erected in front of the Esplanade, between Barrack-street and William-street jetties.—The comet Pons visible at Perth.—Lord Rosebery, on his way to England, lands at Albany and becomes the guest of the Government Resident, Mr. Loftie.—The appointment of Mr. E. A. Stone to be a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of this Colony approved by the Secretary of State.—The Secretary of State formally approves of the action of His Excellency the Governor in erecting the town of Fremantle into a city.—The obituary for the month contains the names of many old colonists, among them Mrs. C. Spencer, Mrs. John Taylor, Mrs. George Leeder, Mr. Alfred Walker, and Warder Payne.

FEBRUARY.—Her Majesty's gunboats Harrier, Undine, and Swinger arrive at Fremantle from the East Coast of Africa, on their way to Sydney. The Rev. D. McNab, a Roman Catholic clergyman, proceeds to King Sound for the purpose of establishing a Native Mission there.—The steamship Natal (Messrs. Trinder,

Anderson & Co.'s line) arrives from London, via Suez Canal, after a passage of fifty-three days.—The obituary for the month contains the names of Mr. Henry Wittenoom (the only surviving son of the late Rev. J. B. Wittenoom, first Church of England chaplain of this Colony), Mrs. E. G. B. Lennard, Mr. Edward Beere, and Mr. Robert Spencer (son of the late Sir Richard Spencer, R.N.)

MARCH.—The second section of the Eastern Railway—from Guildford to Chidlow's Well, 21 miles—opened for traffic, 4th.—Favorable reports received from Victoria of the tests made of gold-bearing quartz taken from the Three Wonders Mine, at Woon-gong.—Bishop Parry left Perth to join Dr. Barry, the new Bishop of Sydney, at Albany, and accompany his lordship to his new diocese, 17th.—Public Fountain at Fremantle formally inaugurated, the ceremony being performed by the Mayor, Mr. B. C. Wood, J.P.—Intelligence reached Perth, by telegraph, of the death, at Cannes, in France, of H.R.H. the Duke of Albany, the fourth son of Her Majesty the Queen (29th). The Royal Standard was hoisted half-mast at Government House, and a consultation between the Mayor (Mr. Geo. Shenton, J.P.) and His Excellency the Governor (Mr. F. Napier Broome) resulted in the calling of a public meeting at the Town Hall, at which an address of condolence to Her Majesty and to the deceased Royal Duke's widow (the Duchess of Albany) was adopted. The address, together with several others from the country, having the same purport, were subsequently forwarded to England by the Governor, and in due course were acknowledged by the Secretary of State.—The obituary of the month contains the names of Mr. John Fleay and Mr. R. N. Wells.

APRIL.—A mineral substance, resembling coal, discovered near Giblett's, on the Blackwood.—A Camp of Exercise, composed of the entire Volunteer Force of Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, and York, held at Bullen's Albion Grounds—the Camp forming on the eve of Good Friday and breaking up on Easter Monday evening. The Governor attended mess on the ground, and passed high encomiums upon Col. Angelo and the other officers. The parade showed a total average attendance of about 350 of all ranks.—Specimens of silver, nickel, and antimony brought to Perth from the Darling Range.—The Rev. Robt. W. Campbell (Wesleyan), the successor of the Rev. W. Lowe, as the Superintendent of the Western Australian District (affiliated to the South Australian Conference), arrives from Adelaide and takes up his appointment.—Mr. William Penn Evans, a well-known bookseller, killed while endeavoring to enter a train while in motion at the Fremantle Railway Station. Verdict of Coroner's jury. Accidental death.—

The Government place the control of the (so-called) Public Gardens in the hands of a Committee, with Dr. Waylen at its head.—Among the names of those in the obituary are those of Mr. J. Keys Logue, M.A., T.C.D., and Mr. G. B. Clarke, of the Victoria Plains.

MAY.—The Rev. J. McNeil, an Evangelist, accompanied by his wife, arrives from Melbourne, and holds series of services at various places.—Proposals to erect a lighthouse at Cape Leuwin again brought forward and favorably pronounced upon by the whole of the Australian Governments, but no definite action decided upon.—Reports received of the deportation of large numbers of live stock from Melbourne and Sydney, by sea, and from Queensland, overland, to the Kimberley district.—The tender of Mr. Edward Keane, to complete the new St. George's Cathedral, for £8000, accepted, the work to be completed within two years.—His Excellency F. Napier Broome, Esq., C.M.G., receives intimation from the Secretary of State of his elevation to knighthood.—The usual Queen's Birthday Ball at Government House, in consequence of the death of the Duke of Albany, and in deference to the wish of Her Majesty, expressed to the whole of the Governments of the British Colonies, deferred.—Mrs. W. Trigg, Mrs. Dearden, and Cr. McMahon died.

JUNE.—A Carpenters and Joiners Union formed in Perth.—A telegram received from Mr. Anthony Hordern, in London, stating that his contract to construct a railway from Beverley to Albany, on the land-grant system, had been finally settled with the Crown Agents, acting on behalf of the Colony.—Mr. Wigglesworth, the Manager of the Perth Gas Co., arrives from London in the s. Bonnington, with a large portion of the necessary plant. The company's buildings, in Wellington-street, commenced shortly afterwards.—Mr. Justice Stone travels on circuit to Geraldton for the first time and tries several cases there.—The Hon. Malcolm Fraser, C.M.G., Colonial Secretary, accepts the appointment of Vice-President of the Royal Humane Society of Australasia; the Governor having already been appointed one of the Presidents of that institution, a branch of which it is proposed to establish in Perth shortly.—The West Australian Manufacturing Company formed, with a wealthy and influential directorate.—New buildings for *The Inquirer* and *Daily News*, in St. George's-terrace, commenced; the foundation-stone being laid by Mr. E. Stirling, the oldest Pressman in Australasia.—Sir Luke Leake gives an additional donation, of £500, to the new St. George's Cathedral Building Fund.—Prospectus of the Perth Fire Insurance Co. Ld. issued.—

Wachter's Champagne as supplied to Prince of Wales.—P. A. GUGGERI, Perth.

JULY.—The Rev. Edwin Parker, the first West Australian born to enter holy orders, ordained priest at St. George's Cathedral.—Wesleyan church established at Bunbury; Rev. J. W. Moulton first minister.—News received of the sudden death of Mr. J. G. Murray, R.M., of Pinjarrah, on board the mail steamer, between Albany and Colombo.—Legislative Council opened, 10th; Governor's inaugural speech showed that the total trade of the Colony for 1883 amounted to £963,856, and that the balance of current revenue in hand at the end of June was £102,770.—A return shows that there were 109 lunatics in the Colony at the end of last year.—The Hon. Jas. H. Thomas, M.I.C.E., Director of Public Works and Commissioner of Railways, died, and is temporarily succeeded by Mr. Clayton T. Mason, of the same department.—Mr. S. E. Burges resigns his nominee seat in the Legislative Council; succeeded by Mr. W. T. Loton.—Communication on the Northern Telegraph Line established as far as Carnarvon, at the mouth of the Gascoyne River.... Mr. John Elsegood erects steam brickmaking machinery at Guildford, and the bricks first enter into general use in the erection of the Union Bank of Australia (Limited), St. George's-terrace.—Mr. Anthony Hordern returns from England to complete his proposals for erecting the Beverley-Albany railway.—The names of Mrs. R. R. Jewell, Mrs. Key, Corp. Pratt, Mr. Farquhar McRae, and Mr. W. Ryan appear in the obituary of the month.

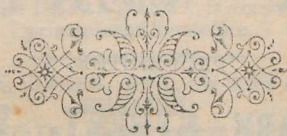
AUGUST.—A petition to the Government from the residents of Fremantle, through the Chamber of Commerce, solicits the adoption of Sir John Coode's B scheme of Harbor Works at Fremantle, calculated to cost £242,000.—An organ, built by Mr. Cecil Clifton, placed in St. Mathew's Church, Guildford.—Intelligence, causing sad regret, received of the death of Sir Fred. P. Barlee, K.C.M.G., Governor of Trinidad, and for nearly a quarter of a century Colonial Secretary of Western Australia.—Buildings for the Perth Gas Co. commenced.—The Governor, by message to the Legislature, sketches the outlines of the dedication of the proposed new public loan of £525,000.—Extensive floods on the Gascoyne and Murchison rivers.—Among the deaths this month were those of Mr. Lane, Mrs. H. Morley, Mrs. W. Sloan, and Mrs. M. T. Hamersley.

SEPTEMBER.—Lady Broome leaves for Europe.—The Palace Emporium, an imposing three-storey building erected by the W.A. Mftg. Co., opened, 6th.—In consequence of smallpox having broken

out out at Sydney and Melbourne all vessels arriving here from those ports compelled to undergo quarantine.—Second session of the fifth Synod of the Church of England opened, 22nd.—The Governor (Sir Fred. Broome) pays his first visit to the settlements at the North, proceeding as far as Derby.—Constable Hackett brutally murdered at Beverley by Andrew Miller and Thomas Carbury; Miller, with an accomplice named Brown, afterwards shot dead by the police and a party of settlers who went in search of them; Carbury was hanged at Perth.—The Governor prorogues the Legislative Council, 13th; and subsequently, by proclamation, dissolves it, and directs a general election to be held in November.—Sir Luke Leake, Mr. S. H. Perker, and Dr. Scott consent to stand for Perth, and Messrs. Marmion and Pearse for Fremantle.—Mr. Geo. Randell (who was in due course elected) opposes Mr. J. C. H. James for election as Mayor of Perth for next year.—The Church of St. Michael (Episcopalian), at Cannington, consecrated, 29th.—Mr. T. C. Carey, M.L.C., and Capt. Wilkinson (Railway Stationmaster at Perth) died, and were accorded public funerals—the latter receiving military honors.—Mr. William Gilbert died.
