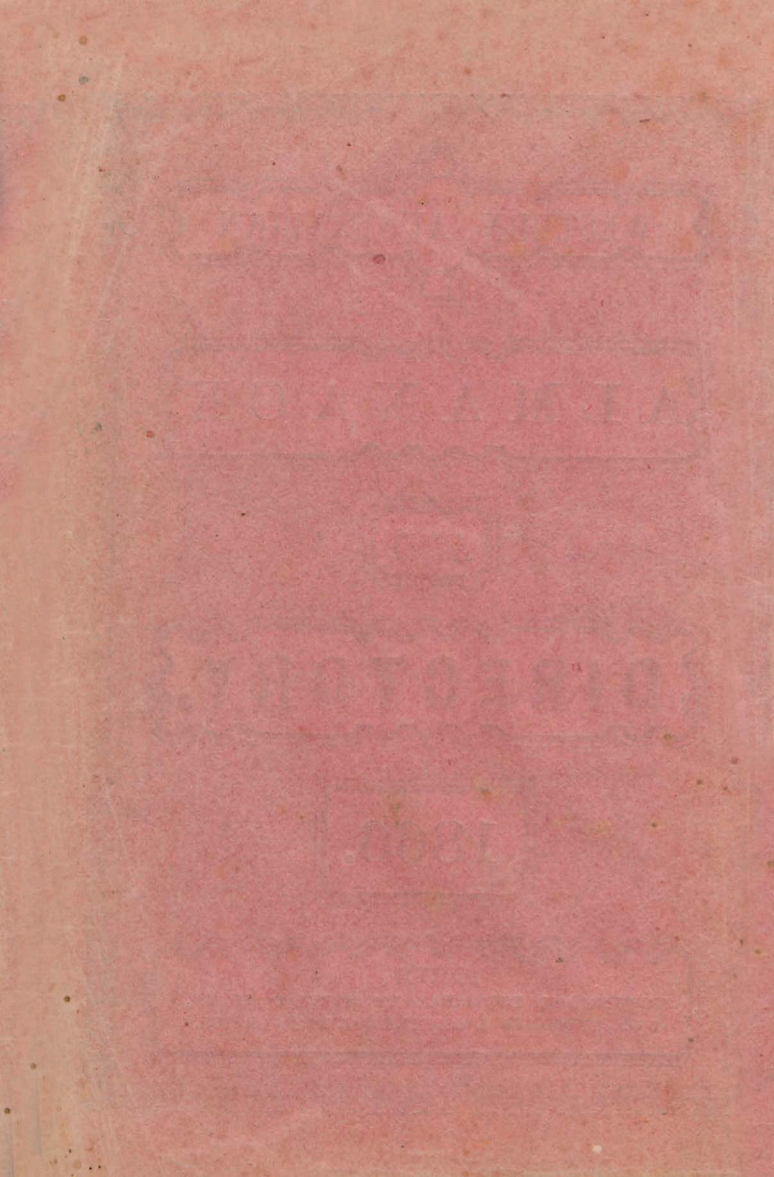

ECLIPSES IN 1866.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME.

In the year 1866 there will be three Eclipses of the SUN, and two of the MOON.
I.—*March 17.* A partial Eclipse of the SUN, invisible in the Southern hemisphere.

II.—*March 31.* A total Eclipse of the MOON, invisible in Australia, the MOON being below the horizon while eclipsed.

III.—*April 15.* A partial Eclipse of the SUN, to the extent of 0.665 of his diameter, visible in the southern half of Australia. Begins on the Earth generally at 0 hours 53 minutes p.m. in lat. 64deg. 55min. S., long. 33deg. 30min. E.; and ends at 4h. 10m. p.m. in lat. 34deg. 15min. S., long. 135deg. 25min. E.

IV.—*September 24.* A total Eclipse of the MOON, visible throughout.
First contact with the shadow at 8h. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ m. p.m. on the E. by N. limb.
Beginning of the total phase .. 9h. 1m. p.m.
End of the total phase .. 10h. 37m. p.m.
Last contact with the shadow .. 11h. 36m. p.m. on the W.S.W. limb.

The MOON will be full at 9h. 49m. p.m., while totally eclipsed.

The apparent or sundial time will be 8 minutes faster than the true or meantime.

V.—*October 8.* A partial eclipse of the SUN, invisible in the Southern hemisphere.

Prepare ground for onions; plant out califlowers, brocoli, cabbage, &c.; sow peas, beans, carrots, spinach, lettuce, cress, and endive for early crops; sow early stone turnips; sow wheat and Cape barley; examine fruit trees, removing all decayed limbs and suckers; keep potato crop clean.

Sow cabbage of all sorts, peas, broad beans, and turnips; earth up celery, and continue to transplant cauliflowers, &c.; wheat sowing should now be finished; prune and transplant deciduous fruit trees. This and the next two months are the most favorable for breaking up new ground.

Plant potatoes; sow cabbage, turnips, chilies, and peas; prepare ground for melons, cucumbers and pumpkins; clean and manure the ground near the vines of the previous year, and continue to prepare ground for maize.

THE COLONY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA,

AS defined by Her Majesty's Commission, includes all that portion of New Holland situated to the westward of 129 degrees East longitude; its greatest length is therefore 1,280 miles from North to South, and 800 miles from East to West. The City of Perth is situated in 32 degrees South.

**A BRIEF CHRONICLE OF OCCURRENCES AND EVENTS FROM
OCTOBER 1, 1864, TO SEPTEMBER, 1865.**

[Under the above head the most remarkable events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the ALMANACK. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1864.

OCTOBER.—The first party despatched by the Roebuck Bay Association leave Fremantle in the Flying Foam on the 3rd instant, with 28 sheep and 6 horses.....Rifle match between the Metropolitan and Fremantle Volunteers comes off at the latter place on the 20th, and terminates in favour of the Perth Corps.....A Debating Society formed at Perth.....Large tracts of pastoral and agricultural land discovered by Mr. Hunt to the eastward of York.....Swan District Agricultural and Horticultural Society formed at Guildford.....Establishment of telegraphic communication between Perth and Fremantle proposed.....First meeting of the shareholders of the Roebuck Bay Association held

at Perth.....A cricket match between the Perth and Fremantle Clubs played at Fremantle on the 20th instant; the former being the victors by 10 wickets.

NOVEMBER.—Intelligence reached Perth from Port Gregory of the safety of the Zephyr, after having stranded on a sandbank in the harbour.....Arrangements again made for executing natives, guilty of the murder of white men, at the place where the murder was committed, and five hanged in the Champion Bay district, shortly afterwards, for killing a shepherd named Bott.....The Daylight arrived from London on 1st instant, bringing an unusually large cargo of merchandize.....A sad accident happened to a lad at a bonfire on Guy Fawke's night, by having a ramrod shot through his body, discharged from a gun accidentally.....Several forged Western Australian Bank notes passed at Newcastle.....Stevens and Haynes, desperadoes, connected with the Sharks' Bay affair of 1859, again convicted of burglary, and sent to the Convict Establishment.....Mr. Hunt and party returned to York from his expedition to the eastward, fully verifying the reports of former explorers of the good country passed over.....The City of Perth proposed to be divided into wards.....Mr. Ranford, of South Australia, accepts an offer to supply 1000 jarrah telegraph-posts for the Adelaide Government, and large additional orders afterwards received for the same description of timber.....Much excitement prevails in the Colony, as well as in the neighbouring provinces, about the new Northern country, vessels with large numbers of stock constantly being despatched from Melbourne... The Perth Amateur Dramatic Corps give an entertainment with every success.....The Tien Tsin engaged to convey stock to Tien Tsin Bay by Mr. W. Taylor.....A man named Coghill attempted to murder a girl at Fremantle by cutting her throat with a razor.....A native murdered by a European in the employ of Mr. Steere, on the Blackwood.....Much dissatisfaction expressed in Albany at the presence of convicts, the settlers stating that they had not received benefits accruing therefrom in the same ratio as

other districts. A lengthy reply to the memorial on this subject by the Government appears, sympathizing with its petitioners, and signifying that the Governor had given directions for the removal of all convicts of whatever class from the district.....The timber trade prosecuted with considerable spirit, and news received from Melbourne that Lloyd's Association in Australia had made favorable mention of it for ship-building purposes.

DECEMBER.—The Roebuck Bay Association engage the Nile to convey stock to their station on the North Coast... Two prisoners escape from Perth Prison; they give some difficulty in capturing, by crossing the bar at Fremantle and reaching the north end of Rottnest, before they were secured by the Water Police.....A disease, resembling diphtheria, appears in Perth, and many fall victims to its ravages.....A convict on the public works attempts to kill a fellow-prisoner, by striking him on the head with an axe.....A bazaar took place on 7th instant, for raising funds for building a new Congregational Church in Perth, at which the large sum of £130 16s. 4d. was realized..... The South Australian steamer arrives at Fremantle from Adam Bay, on her way to Adelaide, thus making a complete circumnavigation of the continent.....Mr. Robert Sholl appointed Resident Magistrate at Camden Harbor, and the Government has prepared a fully equipped body of officials to accompany him to the new Northern Territory... The Volunteers have a firing match at the Perth butts, to contend for prizes given by the citizens.....Pile driving for the New Bridge at North Fremantle commenced..... The band of the Metropolitan Volunteers plays at the Government Gardens.....About 300 members of the City Bond of Hope repair on their anniversary day to Freshwater Bay for their festivities.....Price of flour, £22 per ton; wheat, 7s. per bushel.

1865.

JANUARY.—Land Regulations for the Northern Territory published, as also regulations for purchasing and leasing

mineral land, and received with general satisfaction throughout the Colony.....Prize firing by the Fremantle Volunteers on the 20th instant.....General School examinations held, and a report made of the marked success in education in all the districts.....The Hastings chartered by the Roebuck Bay Association for the conveyance of stock to the Northern Territory.....Much alarm again felt from several persons having become victims to the complaint resembling diphtheria.....A young woman accidentally shot in the head on the Sound Road, and shortly afterwards dies.....A passenger and delivery conveyance established between Fremantle and the metropolis.....The Home Government notifies its unwillingness to send convicts to the new Northern Territory.....Another order for 1800 cubic feet of jarrah timber received through Mr. Ranford, of South Australia.....News received from England that a committee, consisting of Major Sanford, Messrs. Mangles, and other influential gentlemen connected with the Colony, had waited upon the Secretary of State, to ascertain what compensation would be granted the colonists on the cessation of Transportation. The committee were assured by Mr Cardwell that some allowance would be made, but advised that money should not be asked for.....A comet of considerable size and brilliancy visible.....Intense hot weather prevails; the thermometer frequently ranging over 100 degrees.....Several cases of sunstroke occur.....Instructions for the Government Resident at Camden Harbor published.

FEBRUARY.—The Nile arrives from Roebuck Bay with intelligence that an expedition, headed by Mr Panter, had been absent for 58 days, having taken provisions and intended to be away only a fortnight.....The Government arranges for the Clarence Packet to proceed to Roebuck Bay, with a party to search for the missing explorers, Messrs. Panter, Harding, and Goldwyer.....Several bridges burnt on the roads to the Eastern districts.....Tenders accepted to extend the jetty at Geraldton for £325, and for the supply of timber for £500.....The

seventh anniversary of the Perth Lodge of Oddfellows celebrated.....The Bishop's School re-opened under the head-mastership of the Rev. F. T. Tayler.....A young aboriginal native woman barbarously murdered near the new Perth gaol by two native men from the Canning.....Favourable reports received from Roebuck Bay: the country in the neighbourhood of the Bay said to be well adapted for agriculture and grazing.

MARCH.—The annual Sunday School festivals take place.....Very successful performances by the Perth Amateur Dramatic Corps.....A native woman murdered at Perth in a house in Murray Street.....Considerable exports of flour made from Fremantle.

APRIL.—Three men accidentally drowned in the roadstead at Fremantle.....The river steamer Lady Stirling for the first time crossed the bar at Fremantle, with a load of timber to the shipping.....Discouraging accounts received from Mauritius of the low prices for horses shipped by the Sea Ripple.....The ship Vortegern sails with a large cargo of timber for India... ..A cricket match played between the Perth and Fremantle Clubs, which resulted in favour of the latter.....The foundation stone of a new Church (St. Paul's) laid at Bunbury.....Firing by the Metropolitan and Fremantle corps of Volunteers for a prize rifle.....The foundation stone of a new Mechanics' Hall laid at Guildford.

MAY.—The Mary Ann, a coasting cutter, on her way to Champion Bay, driven on shore in a leaky state, to save her.....News received by the Clarence Packet—by which vessel Mr Maitland Brown and searching party return from Roebuck Bay—of the discovery of the remains of the unfortunate explorers, Messrs. Panter, Harding, and Goldwyer. An inquest was held on the bodies on the 16th May, when a verdict was returned to the effect that they were killed by the natives, and on the following day they were interred in the Perth cemetery.....A wall proposed to be built round the Perth Cathedral.....A man named Phipps found dead in his house, under singular cir-

circumstances.....Encouraging accounts received by the Kestrel from Tien Tsin Harbour.....A probation prisoner killed by a mass of clay falling upon him near the Commissariat Store Satisfactory reports received from South Australia of the telegraph posts shipped at the Vasse by Mr Mason.....Another fire broke out at the Convict Establishment, fortunately in an open place, and was easily extinguished, without doing much damage.....News received of the intention of the P. & O. Co. forming a coaling establishment at or near Fremantle.

JUNE.—Castor oil manufactured by Mr Moffat from seed grown in the Colony.....Advices received from Melbourne that the flour sent there from this Colony in the Wild Dayrell only realised £16 per ton.....Two cargoes of horses and flour sent by the Bridgetown and Tien Tsin to Singapore and Batavia.....A farmer's club organised at Northam.....The Tartar arrives from London; she encountered heavy gales between Fremantle and the Cape of Good Hope, during which about 130 tons of cargo were thrown overboard.....The Legislative Council assembles on the 22nd.....Firing for a prize rifle between the Perth and Fremantle Volunteers takes place at the Fremantle butts on the 19th instant. Ten rounds per man only were fired, the remaining 10 to be contested for on a future occasion at the Perth butts.....The third anniversary of the City Band of Hope celebrated by a tea-meeting, presided over by the Bishop of Perth.

JULY.—Very favourable reports received from the different whale-fisheries in the colony.....Four aboriginal natives hanged—two for killing a half-caste girl at York, and the others for the murder of a native man at Albany... An Amateur Dramatic Company formed at Fremantle, and make their appearance for the first time on the 17th instant. The new Perth Causeway Bridge opened for traffic on the 17th inst.

AUGUST.—Much uneasiness felt in the Eastern districts from the want of rain.....A letter appears in the *Inquirer & Commercial News* on the subject of telegraphic communi-

cation between Perth and King George's Sound.....A bazaar in aid of building the Congregational parsonage at Fremantle held on the 2nd instant, when upwards of £70 was received.....Messrs. K., A., & M. Brown, of Champion Bay, commence purchasing horses on a very extensive scale, for shipment to India.....Demolition of the old Perth causeway bridge. The piles, which have been under water for upwards of 24 years, are found to be perfectly sound; and as a specimen, His Excellency the Governor determines upon sending a log to Governor Denison at Madras.....The mail-coach between Fremantle and Perth overturned, severely wounding many of the passengers, and Hardman, the driver, very much injured.....Intelligence received of the murder of Mr Edward Clarkson by natives, about 90 miles east of Newcastle.....The convict-ship Racehorse arrives on the 10th instant with a full number of prisoners on board.....A public tea-meeting held in connection with the Wesleyan Sunday School.....A memorial signed by the greater number of settlers at Champion Bay, urging upon the government the necessity of forming lines of traffic in the district.....A messenger arrives from Mr Hunt's exploring party to the eastward with reports from that gentleman, which are considered very satisfactory. Although no extensive tract of good land had been found, wells had been formed, and the country made available for 300 miles beyond York.....The Beatrice, with the first cargo of coals brought to Fremantle for the P. & O. Company, arrives from King George's Sound.

SEPTEMBER.—A memorial in course of signature, praying for a change in the Constitution of the Legislative Council by increasing the number of non-official members equal to that of the Government members.....The hall of the new Mechanics' Institute at Guildford opened on the 5th instant.....Perth Horticultural Society proposed to be revived.....Several prisoners escape from the works at North Fremantle, but are speedily recaptured.....New Congregational Church, Perth, opened for divine service on the 6th.

56 GOVERNORS OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA,
FROM THE YEAR 1829.

CONDITIONS.—To be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides.

Except the name and address of the person to whom sent there must be no other word, or communication, letter, character, figure, or number written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted.

Newspapers received from beyond seas (except newspapers received direct from France or foreign countries by way of France) will be delivered to their original address free of charge, but if re-posted in the Colony, one penny each must be prepaid. All newspapers re-posted are liable

to a fresh rate of postage. Newspapers sent to any Post Office and unclaimed must be returned to the General Post Office, Perth, at the expiration of thirty days.

The General and other Post Offices are open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, Sundays excepted.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have a shilling stamp affixed thereon by way of fee in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded. A statement of the hours of closing the mails is kept affixed on some exterior part of each Post Office, in order to avoid the frequent occurrence of letters being put in after the departure of the mails : but late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of any Inland Mails, and till within a quarter of an hour of the despatch of any Ship Mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed

to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices at the following rates:—

POST OFFICE SAVINGS' BANKS.

Post Office Savings' Banks are opened at the under-mentioned Post Offices for the receipt and repayment of deposits on every working day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—

Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Bunbury, Vasse, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, and Wanerooka.

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling, or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to any more than £30 in any one year.

When the first deposit is made the Depositor will receive a numbered Book, in which his name, address, and occupation, and the date and amount of his deposit, will be entered.

Any Depositor, wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited, can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings' Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth. By the return mail he will receive a warrant from Perth, which will enable him to get his money at the Post Office named by him.

The system adopted in the Government Schools of this colony corresponds in its main features with the national system of Ireland. Certain modifications have however been introduced, with the view of meeting the special requirements and circumstances of the colony.

The primary object of the Government has been to secure, on the basis of religion, a sound and serviceable education for the children of the middle and lower classes, without any distinction of religious sect; and of which all can avail themselves without fear of interference with their religious convictions.

The proceedings of each day are commenced with general instruction from the Scripture Lesson Books, in which the Ministers of all religious denominations, co-operating with the Board, are invited to take part as often as they please, stipulating only that they abstain from alluding to those differences of opinion which unhappily divide the Christian Church, but no children are required to attend without their parents' sanction.

Not less than five hours of every school-day are devoted to secular instruction.

The General Board have expressed their willingness to facilitate to the utmost of their power any arrangements Ministers of religion may wish to make for the special instruction of the children of their own denomination in the school-room during the half-hour usually set apart for reading the scripture lesson.

For the purpose of facilitating such special instruction, the Board are willing to supply Bibles on the application of any Minister co-operating with the Board.

The increasing number of pupils attending the Govern-

ment Schools affords every reason for supposing that the system meets with the general approval of the public.

ROMAN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS.

The rent is to be paid by the said Tenant on the— each— during this tenancy. And the said Tenant hereby agrees to pay all— rates which may become due or payable during this tenancy, and to keep and at the end thereof deliver up the said— and premises to the said Landlord in good repair, as at present, fair wear and tear excepted; with the cess-pool cleansed, the glass all in the windows, and the locks and keys in good order. And the said Tenant hereby agrees not to sub-let, lease, nor assign over, nor in any way dispose of the said— and premises, or any part thereof, nor make, nor suffer to be made, any alteration in the said— and premises, or any part thereof, without the consent in writing of the said Landlord; and the said Tenant hereby agrees that he will not create any nuisance, nor do nor suffer to be done anything that might prejudice any insurance of the said premises or any part thereof. And it is hereby further agreed that if any rent shall be unpaid at any time or times when due (whether in advance or otherwise), or if the said Tenant do not fulfil all the conditions of this Agreement, the said Landlord shall have power to distrain for such rent, and to put an end to this tenancy; and in the latter case, this Agreement may be produced by the said Landlord as a notice to quit, duly given and expired. DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING A WILL.

A WILL cannot be made in language too simple or concise; must be written with ink, on paper or parchment, and if contained on one sheet, must be signed at the end by the Testator, in the presence of two or more Witnesses; and if written on more than one sheet, the Testator and the Witnesses must sign each sheet, independently of the end aforesaid.

The Witnesses (a) must rigidly comply with every particular required by the Attestation Clause, at the end of which clause they must sign their names (b).

The signature of the Testator must be acknowledged by him, in the presence of Witnesses; and in order that this be properly done, he must (after having signed the Will) take it in his hand and say, "I acknowledge this to be my

last Will and Testament, and request you to witness it." To avoid the evils of intestacy the following form may suffice as a general guide:—

WILL.

This is the last Will and Testament of me, Charles Smith, of Richmond, near Fremantle, in the colony of W. Australia, gentleman. After payment of all my just debts, funeral and testamentary expenses, I give, devise, and bequeath unto _____, also to _____, And as to the residue and remainder (c) of all my real and personal estate, I give, devise, and bequeath the same unto _____. And I hereby appoint _____, or the survivors of them, and _____ Executors of this my Will. As witness my hand this _____ day of _____ 18 .

ATTESTATION.

Signed and acknowledged by the said Charles Smith, the Testator, as and for his last Will and Testament, in the presence of us, being present at the same time, who at his request, in his presence, and in the presence of each other, have hereunto subscribed our names as Witnesses. }

A CODICIL TO A WILL is to be made with the same regulations as the Will itself, and may be written thus:—

This is a Codicil to my last Will and Testament, bearing date the _____ day of _____ 18 , and I direct it may be taken as part thereof. I give, devise and bequeath, &c. As witness my hand this _____ day of _____ 18 .

Obliterations or alterations of any sort in a Will ought, if possible, to be avoided as dangerous; when of necessity made they ought to be signed by the Testator and Witnesses in the margin, or as near to the alteration as possible, and the alterations specially noticed in the Attestation Clause as having been made before the Will was signed.

Marriage after making a Will renders the Will void.

If a person wishes to dispose of all his property in one gift, the words "all my real and personal estate" may be used.

It is not indispensable for a Witness to know the contents of a Will, which, if desired, may be so folded as to prevent any other than the signature and Attestation Clause being read.

It may be useful to remark that Personal (d) property left without a Will is divisible as under:—

If the deceased leave Children and no Widow, the whole property is to be divided equally amongst the Children.

If he leave a Widow and Children, the former is entitled to one-third (e), and the latter to the remaining two-thirds.

If he leave a Widow and no Children, the former is entitled to half, and the next of kin to the remainder, as under:—a Father, the whole amount; if no Father, a Mother, Brothers and Sisters, or their issue, equal portions; if none, Uncles, Aunts, Nephews, and Nieces, equal portions, &c.

(a) These must be parties not interested in the Will, or their claim to such interest becomes forfeited.

(b) In all cases where a name is given, it is indispensable to describe fully and clearly the christian name, the surname, residence, and trade or profession.

(c) The residue becomes the property of the next of kin, unless otherwise provided for.

(d) These rules do not apply to real estates.

(e) There are a few local and trifling departures from this rule.

A P P E N D I X .

LAND REGULATIONS OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

*Synopsis of the existing Regulations, proclaimed at
Perth, August 20, 1864.*

GENERAL RULES.

Applications for land, whether for lease, license, or purchase, to be sent in to the Surveyor-General, in established printed forms, procurable at the Survey Office, or from Resident Magistrates, without charge. Such applications are to contain at full length all the names of the applicant, his calling and address.

Selections of country land to be in one uniform shape, in length not exceeding three times the breadth.

Boundaries to be parallel to all others in the same district.

Opposite boundaries to be parallel, except on rivers or roads.

Frontage on a river or open water not to exceed one-fourth part of the outer boundaries of a selection.

Both banks of a river whose course is known and mapped, not allowed in one selection, except in special cases.

Required boundaries subject to Governor's approval or adjustment.

Descriptions by applicants to be full and particular, and to refer to some fixed mark in Survey Office maps.

Government not responsible for any errors in such description, but will rectify them when practicable.

Applicants liable to a charge for survey, when such is required for fixing a claim to land.

Such charge to be deposited before survey made.

Private surveys admitted under directions from Surveyor-General, to whom reports are to be made.

Maps of the country and of townsites open to inspection at Survey Office, and at the offices of Resident Magistrates of districts.

Two or more lots of land purchased by the same person at any one public sale, and adjoining each other, may on application, be included in one deed, and for one fee only.

Title deeds, when completed and enrolled, are deliverable by the Colonial Secretary, or by the Resident Magistrate of the district in which the land may be situated.

No title-deed will be prepared until the balance of purchase-money and the title-deed fee have been paid.

Applications for full title are to contain at full length all the names of the applicant; also his calling and address.

Lands granted, or sold by remission for military or naval services, are not chargeable with title-deed fees.

Deposits and payments for land to be made only to a Collector or Sub-Collector of Revenue, or to other persons duly authorised to receive the same.

Applications to purchase or lease land will have priority according to the actual time of paying deposit thereon.

Applications for land situate in a district where there is a Sub-Collector of Revenue, will not be approved until after the arrival of the next mail from such district.

Compensations to be given for any improvements on land resumed for public purposes.

No compensation allowed for improvements after the expiration, abandonment, or forfeiture of a lease, or for improvements on land under Class A license.

Existing contracts, promises, and engagements to hold good.

Unauthorised occupation of Crown Lands punishable.

Governor not compelled, but only authorised, to let or sell lands applied for.

FOR THE SALE OF LANDS.

Waste Crown Lands for sale, are distinguished as town, suburban, country, and mineral lands.

Town and suburban lands to be sold by Public Auction, at upset prices, to be regulated by the Governor.

Ordinary country land to be sold at the fixed price of

ten shillings per acre, to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same, and in lots of not less than 40 acres each. Special lots of smaller size are charged a higher price.

A deposit of one-tenth the purchase money is payable when the land is applied for; and the balance, with title-deed fee of £1 within one month afterwards.

Deposits returnable if applications not granted; but forfeited on non-completion of purchase, or if applications are not followed up.

Country lands may be selected for purchase previous to survey.

All lands to be sold according to some numerical mark or reference, which is also to be inserted in the title-deed.

Town and suburban lands will be advertised for sale by Public Auction as they are applied for, in at least 2 consecutive *Government Gazettes*, in which the place of sale, the upset price of each lot, and the officer by whom it is to be sold, will be stated.

The days of sale for such lands are—at Perth and the Vasse, the first Wednesday in every month; at Bunbury, the second Wednesday in every month; and at Albany and Geraldton, not less than 2 months after the date of notice.

The appointed time for Land Sales by Public Auction is one hour after noon.

The applicant for a lot has the benefit of the upset price as his first bidding.

A fee of £1 payable in advance for every title-deed from the Crown.

In all title deeds the Crown reserves the precious metals and a right to make roads, canals, &c.; also to resume for public purposes.

Lands may be granted for public purposes, without purchase.

Remissions in the purchase of land may be granted to naval and military officers and men.

Lands purchased with such remissions to be granted to the purchasers after 2 years' residence in the Colony.

Licenses to cut timber may be issued at 10 shillings per

month for a pair of sawyers, or £20 per annum per 1 square mile for special selections.

No part of any such special selection will be sold during the currency of a timber license without the written consent of the lessee.

Licenses to cut sandalwood may be issued at two shillings and sixpence per man per month.

The Agent General for Crown Colonies is authorised to receive payments in England for lands to be purchased in Western Australia.

The sale and other disposal of the Waste Lands in Western Australia are regulated by instructions from the Queen, or through one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

FOR PASTORAL LANDS.

For pastoral purposes the Waste Lands are divided into Class A and Class B, except in the North and East districts hereinafter mentioned.

Class A lands are for annual license, subject to renewal.

Class B lands are leased for 8 years, without right of renewal.

Lands let for pastoral purposes are known as runs.

No part of an occupied townsite will be let as a run.

Unoccupied townsites, if let, will be subject to special conditions.

Lands required for special purposes may be exempted from lease or license.

The rents payable are irrespective of any future rates on stock.

Runs are liable to forfeiture if appropriated to other than pastoral uses, or for non-payment of rent, or on conviction for felony.

Runs are transferable in the form printed on the back of each lease or license, attested by one credible witness.

Transfers are to be forwarded to Surveyor-General for Governor's approval, and for record in the Survey Office; and are chargeable with a fee of 10s. in advance.

Transfers not sanctioned unless the land has been properly stocked.

Leases and licenses are prepared in the Survey Office, and are deliverable by the Collector of Revenue, or by a Sub-Collector at out-stations.

Leases not fully paid for within 2 calendar months after being deliverable, are forfeited, together with all improvements and deposits.

Only half rent is chargeable for the current year on all runs granted after 30th June.

Government reserves the right to lay out roads, take indigenous produce for public purposes, and graze any stock at work on a run.

Persons may search for minerals on a run, paying the lessee for any damage caused to him thereby.

Persons may pass over any unenclosed part of a run, with or without stock or conveyances.

The aborigines have a right to seek their subsistence on any unenclosed part of a pastoral or tillage lease, or on any part of an annual license.

Lessees are permitted to cut timber, and to make use of that or of any other indigenous produce of their runs, but not sell or remove the same off their lands.

The Government may grant licences for any person to cut and remove timber, sandalwood, and other woods, off runs.

Boundaries of runs may be altered on application, by paying certain fines for new leases.

No such alterations allowed in leases issued under the Regulations of 1850.

Any valuations required are to be made by one person appointed by the Governor, and another by the lessee of a run, or by an umpire if they cannot agree.

Rents for leases are due in advance on the 1st of January in each year, and must be paid before the 15th of that month or they are liable to an extra charge.

Rents not paid as above, may be paid within 60 days after rent-day, with an addition of one-fourth as fine.

Failing the payment of rent and fine as above, a lease becomes absolutely forfeited, or is chargeable with a fine of half the annual rent.

In all leases the year is computed from 1st January to 31st December; and a term of years will commence from the 1st of the previous January.

Deposits are returnable on applications not granted; but they become forfeited if applications are not followed up.

On the determination of any lease by forfeiture or otherwise, the land therein described, and all improvements thereon, revert to the Crown.

LANDS IN CLASS A.

Lands in Class A are let for one year only, as depasturing licenses.

Annual rent two shillings per 100 acres, and no license fee.

No license issued for less than £1.

Full rent is payable in advance when a license is applied for.

Lands in Class A, whether under license or not, are open at all times for sale or tillage lease, and must be given up by a lessee when so disposed of.

No compensation can be claimed for improvements on Class A land.

Unoccupied townsites are obtainable on annual license only.

No renewal of annual license can be *claimed*, but preference will be given to existing lessees whenever practicable.

Applications for renewal must be sent in to Surveyor General before the end of a year.

Licenses will be given to other applicants, if renewals of them are not applied for before the end of a year.

Alterations required in boundaries previous to renewal, are to be applied for by the end of November.

A holder of not less than 10 acres of land in fee simple within a Class A license, has a right to run gratuitously

within such license 1 head of great stock (not being a bull or stallion) for every 10 acres so held, and so long as said land may be let for pastoral purposes.

Holders of fee-simple land as aforesaid, have no claim for trespass by stock, unless such land was properly fenced when trespassed on.

LANDS IN CLASS B.

Lands in Class B are let on pastoral leases for 8 years or less.

B leases are not renewable; but the lessees have a preferable claim to them.

No lease to contain more than 10,000 acres.

Any number of leases may be granted to the same person.

The annual rent for a lease is £5, and 10 shillings per 1000 acres for the land it contains.

An abatement of rent is made on application if 1000 acres or upwards be sold or resumed for public purposes.

Leases are granted without competition to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same.

On application for a lease, the lease fee is to be deposited, and will be forfeited, together with all claim to the land, if the application is not followed up.

Lessees in actual occupation, have a pre-emptive right to purchase at 10 shillings per acre any portion of a run, not mineral nor less than 40 acres, during the first year of a lease.

No other person can purchase within a lease during its first year without the written consent of the lessee.

After the first year of a lease, all unsold lands within it are open to general selection for purchase.

During the first year of a lease, a homestead may be selected and reported for approval, at the rate of 2 acres for every 100 acres in the run.

A lessee will have the exclusive right of purchasing land within any such homestead during the first 3 years of his lease; after which, all unsold portions will be open to general sale.

Portions of a homestead may be sold to others, with the written consent of a lessee.

Lessees have a claim to compensation for any improvements effected on portions of their runs sold or resumed.

Purchasers of land within B leases have a free right to depasture on the unenclosed portions of the run, horned cattle or horses, not being bulls or stallions, at the rate of 1 head for every 10 acres so purchased, so long as such portions continue to be let for pastoral purposes.

Such right as aforesaid is without prejudice to the right of the Crown to sell or to grant on tillage lease.

Purchasers of land within B leases have no claim for trespass by stock, unless the land trespassed on be properly fenced.

The conditions of leases granted or renewed under the Regulations of March, 1850, and January, 1860, are not interfered with, except as follows—

- 1.—Lands are sold at fixed price of 10 shillings per acre, instead of by Auction, and in lots of 40 acres, instead of 10.
- 2.—Tillage leases may be granted within pastoral leases, with written consent of the lessee.
- 3.—With a like consent, lands may be sold to other than the lessee.
- 4.—Enclosed portions of pastoral leases are not public thoroughfares.

TILLAGE LEASES.

Lands for tillage purposes are let on leases for 8 years or less.

Tillage leases are not renewable; but the lessees have a preferable claim to them.

No lease to contain more than 320 acres.

Any number of leases may be granted to the same person.

The annual rent of a lease is 1 shilling per acre, payable in advance; but no lease is granted for a less sum than £5, except for the last half of a year.

Abatement of rent for future years is allowed on account

of any part of a lease sold or resumed, provided the total rent be not thereby reduced below £5.

Application for a lease to be accompanied by a deposit of £5, which will be forfeited if the application is not followed up.

Lands available for tillage leases comprise all the waste lands not allotted or reserved.

Lands in B leases will be let on tillage lease or sold to the lessees of the former only, unless with their written consent.

With the foregoing exception, a lease is granted to the first bonâ fide applicant for the same, and without competition.

A lessee is entitled at any time to purchase, at the fixed price of 10 shillings per acre, any portion of his lease, not being mineral land, nor less in quantity than 40 acres.

Any other person may purchase in like manner, with the written consent of the lessee.

Mineral lands within tillage leases will be sold or let under such Regulations as may hereafter be established.

The lands in forfeited or abandoned leases, if improved or relet, will be subject to such increased rent as circumstances may justify.

Leases are liable to forfeiture if not occupied, cultivated, or improved, during the year preceding any rent-day.

PRE-EMPTIVE CLAIMS.

Land to be applied for in manner pointed out in the General Rules.

Existing improvements on land for purchase by other than a lessee, to be valued and charged to the purchaser.

Such valuation not to exceed the actual outlay made by a lessee.

The lessee of a tillage lease has a pre-emptive right to purchase within the same during the currency of his lease.

The lessee of a B lease granted under the Regulations of 1850, has a similar right to the foregoing.

Such pre-emptive right may be waived, and by written consent of a lessee of any lease, portions of the same may be sold to other persons.

Land is sold at the fixed price of 10 shillings per acre, whether improved or otherwise, and in lots of not less than 40 acres.

Pre-emptive rights do not extend over mineral lands.

A lessee exercising a pre-emptive right, to obtain certificates of Resident Magistrate that he is in actual occupation of his lease, personally or by agents; also that the current year's rent has been paid.

The lessee of a B lease under the Regulations of 1860, or under those of 20th August, 1864, has an exclusive pre-emptive right to purchase within such lease until the end of its first year.

Any such lessee has a similar right to purchase any part of his selected homestead, until the end of the third year of his lease.

NORTH AND EAST DISTRICTS.

Lands in the above districts are disposed of on more favourable terms than in other parts of Western Australia.

The North District is comprised between the sea-coast and the meridian of 120deg. east longitude, and to the north of the River Murchison, and of a true east line through Mount Murchison.

The East District is comprised between the meridians of 121 and 129deg. east longitude, and between the South coast and latitude 30deg. South.

The lands are divided into Class A for annual license, and Class C for more extended occupation.

Class A comprises all land within 2 miles of the sea-coast, and Class C the remainder.

Lands in Class A are let on depasturing license, under the Regulations hereinbefore explained, except that the annual rent for the same is five shillings per 100 acres for each of the first 4 years, and 10 shillings per 1000 acres for each of the second 4 years, payable in advance.

Application for the Governor's permission to proceed to either district for the purpose of taking up land, must be made to the Colonial Secretary in a certain printed form.

Such permission, if granted, will be valid for 12 months from its date.

To entitle an applicant to claim this permission, he must undertake to convey to the district at least 200 breeding sheep, or 100 head of great stock, or a due proportion of both.

On any quantity of stock not less than the above number reaching the district, they and their natural increase will be allowed free pasturage over the unappropriated Crown lands during the term of the permission.

During said term, the person or company of persons named in such permission will be entitled to select, and report to the Surveyor-General, a pastoral run of 100,000 acres of land in the district.

On the Governor's approval of such selection it will be assigned in pastoral occupancy to the applicant, free of rent for three years, commencing from the end of the first year's free permission to depasture.

The assignment last aforesaid will not be made unless the application for it is accompanied by a certificate, signed by some credible person, of the date on which the stock enumerated in the Governor's permission to proceed actually arrived on the land applied for.

Such assignment will not be transferable.

A selection of 100,000 acres may include lands in both Class A and Class C, and must be made in conformity with the General Rules.

At any time within the 3 years named, the whole or any part of a run may be selected and reported to the Surveyor General for lease or license, in blocks not exceeding 20,000 acres each.

Class C lands thus selected will be let on pastoral lease for 8 years, commencing on 1st of January next after the date of application for the same.

Class C leases are chargeable with rent at the rate of 5 shillings per 1,000 acres for each of the first 4 years, and 10 shillings per 1,000 acres for each of the second 4 years.

Class C leases are chargeable with one fee of £5 at the

commencement of each lease, but not after the first year. There is no fee on Class A licenses.

Both leases and licenses are transferable while chargeable with rent, on the Governor being satisfied the lands have been properly stocked.

During the free occupation of a run, and during the first year of a lease, the lawful occupant is allowed a right to cultivate.

No claim for damage by trespass of stock is admissible, unless the land be properly fenced at time of trespass.

Runs or leases may be resumed, wholly or in part, for public purposes, as also for sale, on giving 12 months' notice.

Compensation will be given for all improvements lawfully made on rented lands resumed as above.

In all other respects the disposal and tenure of Crown Lands in these districts will be governed by the existing Land Regulations.

No protection or Government establishment guaranteed, until deemed expedient by the Government.

N O R T H D I S T R I C T.

FOR THE SALE OF LANDS.

[*Proclaimed at Perth, January 27, 1865.*]

1.—With a view to providing for the early and extensive settlement of the Northern portion of the Territory of Western Australia, in which large tracts of good country are reported to have been recently discovered, the Country Lands therein which shall first be selected for purchase as hereinafter provided, to the total extent of 150,000 acres, within twelve calendar months from the date on which these Regulations shall come into operation, shall be sold at the fixed price of seven shillings and sixpence per acre; and any portion of the said quantity of 150,000 acres which may remain unsold at the end of the twelve months

aforesaid, or the purchase of which shall not then have been fully completed, shall be sold afterwards at not less than ten shillings per acre, or such other sum as may then have been established as the minimum price for Waste Crown Lands in Western Australia.

2.—One town lot of half an acre may be sold at the same rate and at the same time to every purchaser of 160 acres, of such Country Lands, or of each multiple thereof, within twelve calendar months from the date on which these Regulations shall come into operation.

3.—Every application for Country Land must be for 80 acres, or for some multiple thereof.

4.—The deposit on any application for land must be one-tenth of the purchase money thereof.

5.—One calendar month shall be allowed for completing a purchase, and paying the title-deed fee of £1.

6.—Any balance of payment due upon a purchase, which shall not be paid within the month allowed by clause 5, shall be charged with a fine of 5 per cent. in addition within the next 60 days, and of 10 per cent. in addition after the expiration of the said 60 days.

7.—If the total amount of purchase money, fines and title-deed fee, be not paid within 6 calendar months from the date of sale, the sale shall be cancelled, and all payments forfeited to the Crown.

8.—No purchaser of land shall have any right to occupy the same until his purchase shall have been completed by payment of the balance due thereon, and the title-deed fee.

9.—Country Lands available for general purchase shall be within such limits of territory as shall from time to time be publicly notified as open for sale by the Government Resident.

10.—Within such limits there shall at all times be open for purchase by the first bonâ fide applicant who may have paid the required deposit of 10 per cent. (1) all unsold and unreserved lands within Class A of the existing Land Regulations, (2) all unsold lands in Class C of the existing Land Regulations which may not be public reserves or

held under any lease chargeable with rent, (3) all unsold portions of any Class C Lease (except a selected homestead) after the expiration of the first year of the lease, and the expiration of six calendar months' notice to be given by the Government Resident or any other person authorised by the Colonial Government, and (4) after the expiration of the third year of the lease, and of a like notice, all unsold portions of any such homestead.

11.—All sales of land within the limits referred to in clause 10 shall be made and conducted by the Government Resident of the District; to whom applications are to be made in the prescribed forms.

12.—The Government Resident shall also be Sub-Collector of Revenue, and shall receive all applications and payments for land.

13.—Applications for land shall have priority according to the actual time of receipt by, and payment of deposits to, the Government Resident.

14.—Applicants for Town and Suburban lots by purchase shall have the benefit of the upset price as their first bidding at Auction.

15.—Claims to Town lots in virtue of Country lands purchased, shall lapse if the required lots be not selected within six months after the completion of the purchase of the country land.

16.—No title-deed fee will be charged for town lots acquired by the purchase of country land.

17.—Full titles will be prepared at Perth; and in the meantime the completion of a purchase shall be notified to the purchaser, and such notification shall serve as authority for the immediate occupation of the land.

18.—One title-deed fee only shall be charged for all adjoining town and suburban lots purchased by any one person at any one sale, provided that the same may be required to be included in one and the same deed. The same rule is to apply to adjoining Country lots.

19.—Town and Suburban lots shall be sold by Public Auction by the Government Resident or his appointee, at a

time and place to be publicly notified, and after notice of not less than two weeks.

29.—The upset price of Town and Suburban lots shall be notified from time to time by the Government Resident.

21.—Compensation shall be given according to valuation or agreement, for any lawful improvements effected on lands under lease which may be resumed for public purposes, or be purchased by other than the lessee of such lands, provided such improvements were made prior to the notice of the intended resumption.

22.—Payments for land shall be receivable at the Revenue Office in Perth, at the option of applicants, to whom receipts are to be given for transmission to the Government Resident with any application for land.

23.—Purchasers of Country land within the limits of Class C Leases, shall have no free right to depasture stock within such limits, except upon their own purchases.

24.—All unsold lands shall be liable to resumption by the Government wholly or in part, and at any time, for public purposes.

25.—In laying out the Country, or in receiving applications for the purchase of land, suitable sites shall be reserved for the exclusive use of the Aboriginal natives, so as to afford them free access to wood and water.

26.—No Convict or person holding a Ticket-of-Leave, or person under sentence or order of Transportation or of Penal Servitude, shall be introduced or allowed to remain within the Northern portion of the Territory of Western Australia to which these Regulations are intended to apply.

27.—Save in so far as the same are altered by these Regulations, the existing Land Regulations are to be deemed to be in force in the New Districts.

MINERAL LAND REGULATIONS.

[PROCLAIMED AT PERTH, JANUARY 17, 1865.]

For the Sale of Mineral Lands.

1.—Lands known or supposed to contain minerals shall be termed “Mineral Lands,” and shall be sold as such to the first applicant for the same, in lots of not less than 80 acres each, and at the fixed price of (£3) three pounds per acre, payable by a deposit of one pound per acre at the time of application, and of a similar amount on the same date in each of the two following years; or, such lands shall be let on mining license or lease, in the manner and on the terms hereinafter provided.

2.—An application to purchase mineral lands shall be addressed to the Surveyor General in the form prescribed, and shall be accompanied by the receipt of the Collector, or of a Sub-Collector of Revenue, for a deposit of one-tenth of the purchase money.

3.—On the Governor’s approval of an application to purchase mineral land, the deposit aforesaid shall be increased to the sum of twenty shillings per acre; after the full payment of which, the purchaser shall be entitled to occupy and make use of the land for mining purposes during the twelve calendar months next ensuing. On payment of the second instalment of twenty shillings, the purchaser shall have a similar right to occupy the land for the next twelve months following; and on the complete payment at any time of the total price of (£3) three pounds per acre, together with the title-deed fee of one pound, the purchaser shall receive the full title to the land purchased.

For License to test Mineral Land.

4.—Any person desirous of examining and testing the mineral qualities of land previous to purchasing or leasing the same as mineral land shall, on approved application, addressed to the Surveyor General, in the Form W, prescribed, be granted a mining license in that behalf, in the Form Y, for the term of one complete year from the date of approval; subject to renewal for a second year, at the option of the Governor.

5.—An application for a mining license shall be accompanied by the receipt of a Collector of Revenue for the full amount of rent chargeable for a year in advance, at the rate of two shillings per acre; and an application for the renewal of a license shall be accompanied by a similar receipt for rent at the rate of four shillings per acre. No such license or renewal shall be issued for a less term than one year, nor for a smaller sum than £8.

6.—On the Governor's approval of an application, a mining license will be issued, conveying to the licensee for a definite period, the exclusive use of the land described therein for mining purposes only; together with a right to depasture thereon any horses or cattle working upon the land, and the use of any indigenous timber, firewood, rock or soil, growing or being thereon, which may be required for the construction of buildings, fences, implements, machinery, shafts, dams, stockyards, and other works, improvements, or purposes, on the land, but not for sale or removal off it.

7.—No minerals, ores, rock or soil shall be removed off any land comprised in a mining license during the currency thereof, beyond such small quantities as may reasonably be required as specimens or samples.

8.—The Governor may declare, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, that any mining license has become forfeited, if it be shown to his satisfaction that mining researches thereon have been abandoned for one month continuously.

For Leasing Mineral Lands.

9.—The holder of any mining license shall, on approved application addressed to the Surveyor General in the Form X, be entitled to exchange his license for a mining *lease* for any period not exceeding 10 years, and at an annual rent of eight shillings per acre, payable in advance.

10.—For the same period, and on the same terms, mining leases shall be granted to other persons on approved application; but it shall not be necessary that an applicant

for a mining lease should have previously held a mining license.

11.—Mining leases shall be issued in the Form Z prescribed, and shall convey all the rights and privileges enumerated in section 6, together with a right of property in all ores and minerals raised from the land, as well during a lease as during the currency of any previous license.

12.—Mining leases and licenses shall be transferable in the manner pointed out in chapter 5 of the General Land Regulations, on its being shown to the Governor's satisfaction that mining operations within the land have been carried on to a reasonable extent, and on payment of a fee of twenty shillings on the transfer of a lease, and of ten shillings on the transfer of a license, such fee to be paid at the time of making application for approval of the transfer.

Miscellaneous.

13.—No mining license or lease shall be granted within the limits of an occupied tillage lease, except to the lessee of such tillage lease, or to others with his written consent.

14.—The purchaser of mineral land, or the lessee of a mining license or lease, shall pay to the lessee of any pastoral lease full compensation, according to agreement or approved valuation, for all lawful improvements which have been made by such last-mentioned lessee on any portion of his lease that may be thus absorbed for mining purposes.

15.—In no case shall the holder of a mining license or lease be entitled to any compensation for improvements, or for outlay of any description, after the expiration, abandonment, or forfeiture of his holding. On the determination of any such license or lease, all minerals and ores remaining on or in the land, and all improvements and works above and below the surface, shall revert to the Crown, unless it may otherwise have been previously arranged and sanctioned by the Governor.

16.—The Governor shall sell at any time to the lawful occupant of a mining license or lease, or to any other

person with the lessee's consent in writing, any portion of the land comprised therein, in lots of 80 acres each, and at the fixed price of (£3) three pounds per acre, payable as arranged in Section 1; and no land comprised within a mining license or lease shall be sold during the currency of such holding, otherwise than is herein provided.

17.—The lands available for selection as mineral lands, or for mining licenses or leases, shall be all the waste lands of the Crown open to general selection for purchase, lease, or license; and all lands under pastoral lease or license, except such homesteads as may have been, or which may hereafter be selected under authority by any existing Regulations.

18.—The acreage to be included in any one mining lease or license shall not be less than 80 acres, nor more than 160 acres.

19.—All rents chargeable for mining leases shall be payable to the Collector or to a Sub-Collector of Revenue within 15 days next after the established rent-day named in any such lease; failing with payment, a lease shall be absolutely and indefeasibly forfeited, unless within 30 days after such rent-day the lessee shall duly pay the full amount of the annual rent, together with an additional sum equal to one-half of the same. But the Governor may, in his discretion, cancel any such forfeiture, on sufficient grounds shown, and on the lessee duly paying, within 60 days next after such rent-day, a sum equal to twice the established rent for the current year.

20.—The residue of any unexpired term for which a forfeited or abandoned mining lease may have been granted, shall not afterwards be disposed of, unless the applicant for the same shall duly pay in manner aforesaid, such sum, in addition to the established rent, as the Governor may direct.


21.—All deposits and instalments which may have been paid on account of mineral lands, shall be forfeited, together with all claims to the land, if, by any default of

an applicant for the same, a purchase or lease shall not be duly completed.

22.—There shall be no right of way or thoroughfare through or over any enclosed portions of mineral land purchased or leased under these Regulations, except by recognised roads, or for Government purposes.

23.—In all other respects the rule for the sale, letting, and disposal of the waste lands of the Crown in Western Australia, shall apply to all lands therein which may be required for mineral purposes.

24.—Nothing in these Regulations contained shall be deemed to apply to auriferous lands or to coal.

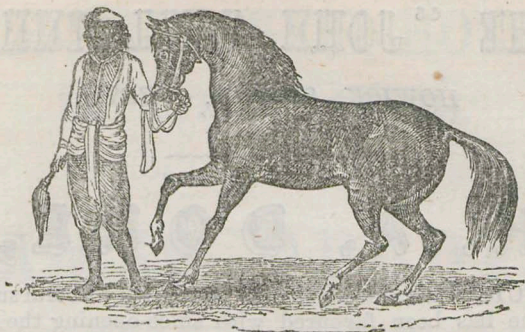




