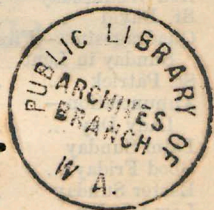

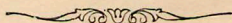

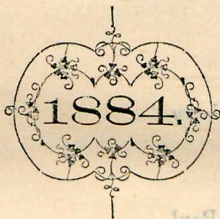

Gregorian Calendar, or New Style.

Previous to 1552 the length of the Year had been reckoned as 365 days 6 hours, as computed by Julius Cæsar (B.C. 45); but as the true length of a solar year is 365 days, 5 hours, and 49 minutes, an error had arisen from this computation amounting in 1552 to 10 days in advance. To rectify the Calendar, and to prevent future irregularities, it was decreed as follows by Pope Gregory XIII. —

The year 1582 to consist of	365 days
The Ordinary year to consist of	365 days
The year 1584, and every fourth year afterwards (termed leap year), to consist of	} 366 days
The years 1700, 1800, 1900, 2000, and so on, three out of every four centuries afterwards, to be reckoned not as leap years, but as ordinary years	

GOLDEN NUMBER.

Golden Number, in chronology, is that number which indicates the year of the Lunar cycle for any given time. It was called the Golden Number, because in the ancient calendar it was written in letters of gold, on account of its great usefulness in ecclesiastical computations, especially in fixing the time of Easter.

Garden Guide for the Year 1884.

JANUARY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This month is generally too hot and dry to admit of much being done in gardening operations, except in low, moist situations, where cropping can be carried on almost at any time. Where water is plentiful and easily applied, young crops should be watered once or twice a-week, care being taken that the soil be well stirred with the Dutch hoe after every watering. If rain or dull weather occur, a few cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, broad and kidney bean, lettuce, pea, onion, radish, and turnip seeds may be sown to a limited extent; with the exception of peas and beans, all the seeds should be protected from the

intense sub, by shading with calico, litter, or some other suitable material. Early potatoes should be planted for use in April.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Dahlias and roses should be looked after; the former requiring staking, disbudding, mulching, and watering; the latter to be pruned when necessary, so as to give a fine autumn bloom; dead flowers should be removed, and every means used to render the plant vigorous. Carnations should be layered. Chrysanthemums, phloxes, and other herbaceous plants will want staking and thinning.

F E B R U A R Y.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnip should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground, in readiness for cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Proceed with the propagation of the favorite plants by layerings, cuttings, or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi, for early blooming. Sow storks, larkspur, mignonette, &c. Take care that camelias, azaleas, rhododendrons, and the like plants do not suffer from want of water. Climbers must be regulated, the stronger growing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept clean and orderly.

M A R C H.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brocoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach, and turnip. Kidney potatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery. Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required, plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three-year-old beds should be destroyed.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Dahlias, hollyhooks, lilliums, and Pompom chrysanthemums will now be in their prime; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers; dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow hardy annual and perennial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, &c.; if not already trenched get it done at once. Herbaceous plants can be divided, and planted where wanted; carnations and pinks may still be propagated by cuttings under a bell glass.

A P R I L.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Finish manuring and digging ground ere winter sets in. Take care that young crops of turnips and carrots are kept free from weeds. Continue planting out cabbage, cauliflower, and celery; the latter would be much benefited by an occasional dose of guano-water. Sow peas (early varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potatoes, shallots, garlic, rhubarb, and horse radish. Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let them be this.

FLOWER GARDEN.—This is one of the busiest months in the year; most kinds of evergreens and ornamental and flowering shrubs are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be made in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, lilioms, and other bulbs that have done flowering; store them away in boxes, pack in dry sand. Finish planting hayacinths, tulips, crocusses, narcissi, anemones, ranunculi, ixijs, &c. Renovate edgings of camomile, thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil some stiff loam should be incorporated with it.

M A Y.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Asparagus, rhubarb, and sea-kale beds will want cleaning and manuring. Sow broad beans, peas, lettuce, onions, radish and spinach, for successful crops. Plant out early cabbages and late sowings of celery. Finish manuring and digging all vacant ground, whether wanted for immediate use or not; bear in mind that turing over ground in a wet state does it more harm than good. If ground is wanted for other purposes, carrots, parsnips, and other tap-rooted vegetables may be taken up and stored.

FLOWER GARDEN.—As dahlias and hollyhooks die off the stalks should be cut down and cleared away; the former being taken up and housed in a dry shed or cellar. Look over your seedling, annual, and other plants; thin them where thick; keep slugs and other vermin away. Prune perpetual flowering, banksian, and other spring-blooming roses. Continue planting evergreens and flowering and ornamental shrubs; stake the same when necessary. Propagate by cutting fuschias, roses, &c. Attend to the hedges, keeping them well clipped; if new ones are required, use hawthorn, furze, osage orange, or acacia, where strength is required; if light, small hedges are wanted, the small-leaved prickly acacia, Cape broom, sweet briar, or pittosporum are the best.

JUNE.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Get all heavy work in the most forward state possible. This is the best month for planting all descriptions of fruit trees; trenching and deep draining are essential to their well-doing; if soil is poor and manure be needed, use bone dust in preference to guano. Commence pruning fruit trees, beginning with those that have lost their foliage. Sow, to a limited extent, cabbage, cauliflowers, brocoli, early carrots, lettuce, and radishes. Make good sowings of broad beans, peas and leeks. Finish planting garlic, shallots, horseradish, rhubarb, sea-kale, and asparagus.

FLOWER GARDEN.—If possible, finish planting all kinds of trees; choose calm, dull weather for the purpose of transplanting, and take care that the roots are mutilated as little as possible. This is a good time for sowing grass seeds for lawns and borders. Dig neatly your flower beds, adding, if necessary, a little well-rotted manure. Finish pruning roses, flowering shrubs, &c. Old rose stools that have been standing for years should be taken up and replaced with young vigorous plants.

JULY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Plant largely of early potatoes; sow parsnips upon rich deep soil—the latter ought to have been trenched two feet or more. Sow peas largely—Bedman's dwarf, blue imperial, champion of England, Burbridge's eclipse, climax, and alliance are among the best for general purposes. Sow largely of the various kinds of broad beans in rows thirty inches apart. Established plantations of rhubarb and sea-kale may be forced by covering the crowns over with pots or slates, and covering these again with fresh horse-manure. Plant globe artichokes in rich soil, in rows four feet six inches by three feet. Sow main crops of onions, also spinach, radish, and small salads.

FLOWER GARDEN.—If former directions have been carried out there will not remain much to be done this month, with the exception of keeping all the walks, borders, and beds neat and clean.

AUGUST.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This month will close the season for planting fruit trees, &c., so that all diligence must be used. August is the chief month for sowing seeds of various kinds—such as cabbage, cauliflower, carrot, leek, lettuce, onion, parsley, parsnip, peas, radish, spinach, salsafy, and scorzonera. If frames are obtainable, make up hot beds for early cucumbers, melons, vegetable marrows, &c. Tomatoes may be sown in pots in a frame for planting out in October. Plant Jerusalem artichokes and main crop of potatoes.

Plant out cabbages, cauliflowers, leeks, and onions.

FLOWER GARDEN.—If the manuring and digging of the flower garden be not completed before now, it should be attended to at once. Tall-growing annuals will require tying up. Propagate fuschias, chrysanthemums, and climbers from cuttings. Re-pot plants commencing growth and wanting pot-room. Dahlias for early flowering may be started in a little bottom heat; seeding nemophilas, larkspurs, clarkias, &c., may be transplanted if too thick.

S E P T E M B E R.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This is the busiest month in the year for seed-sowing; most of the hardy vegetables may be sown, and towards close of month all the tender sorts. Potatoes all kinds should be planted for main crops. Make a sowing of peas for succession. Early long-pod beans may still be sown in low-lying ground. Sow scarlet runners, dwarf French beans, beet, carrot, cucumber, melon, vegetable marrow, pumpkin, onion, radish and spinach; mustard and cress should be sown every fortnight; sow celery on a hot-bed. Tomatoes and capsicums may be sown in warm situations; if any have been raised in a hot-bed, harden a little and plant out. Plant Chinese yams and sweet potatoes in well-trenched soil. Fruit trees will require attention; with the finger and thumb displace any superfluous shoots, and, if time can be spared, the blossom buds should be thinned, especially of young trees.

FLOWER GARDEN.—The floriculturist has generally numerous insect pests to annoy him in this month, such as green and black fly, red spider, scale and thrip, to say nothing of slugs, caterpillars, &c. Gishurt's compound will be found the best remedy for the former. Plant out calceolarias, cupheas, geraniums, heliethropes, pansies, salvias, &c. Sow both tender and hardy annuals.

O C T O B E R.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—If season be moist, carrots, leeks, onions, and parsnips may still be sown. Sow largely of kidney beans, early turnips, capsicums, tomato, cucumber, vegetable marrow, pumpkins, melons, and parsley; also tall-growing varieties of peas—they will not grow very high at this season of the year. Plant out largely cabbage, cauliflower, brocoli, and celery; also, sow again for succession. Weeds will grow apace—choose a fine sunny day for hoeing them down, and rake off when withered, to prevent there starting into growth again.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Balsams, cockscombs, globe amaranthus,

zinnias, and other tender annuals, should now be wn, if not so already done ; if sown in pots, and transplanted into flower beds, place in sunny weather an empty flower pot over the patches of young plants ; remove the pots every evening, or the plants will grow up weak and spindling. Climbing plants will be growing fast, and will require constant trimming and training.

NOVEMBER.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Beds of rhubarb and sea-kale that have been forced should be cleaned off. Cease cutting asparagus, or you will weaken the roots. Attend to cucumbers and melons ; if any have missed, sow again. Stop leading shoots of cucumbers, to induce laterals. If tomatoes are not planted against a wall or fence, they should be tied up to strong sticks and pruned moderately, or fruit will be small and few. This is the time for preventing a great deal of pruning in winter. Use the finger and thumb judiciously in disbudding and stopping fruit trees ; thin the fruit where thick ; increased size and superior flavour will be the result. Vines will require frequent attention as regards training, tying, and thinning shoots.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Hybrid perpetual roses should have their shoots pruned back immediately they have bloomed. Newly-planted shrubs or plants suffering from hot sunshine should be protected by boughs of tea-tree or wattle. Empty casks, with both ends knocked out, make very good shelters, although rather unsightly. At close of month budding may be proceeded with.

DECEMBER.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, and savoy may be sown in shady places ; peas, kidney beans, lettuce, spinach, and turnips can also be sown, but not to any extent. Matured onion bulbs should be harvested at once, or the sun will injure them for keeping. Plant out early celery plants in trenches, and give abundance of water when established. Early potatoes for seed, when ripe, should be taken up and greened, by exposing them to the atmosphere for a few days, under the protection of a shed or verandah.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Bulbs that have flowered and died away should be taken up and packed in dry sand. This is the best month for planting out dahlias for autumn blooming. Roses and fruit trees may be budded. Newly-planted shrubs and trees will be benefitted by having some rottled stable straw spread on surface of soil, which should first be well stirred.

Messages are delivered free of charge within one mile of the office; over that distance, mileage at the rate of 1s. per mile is chargeable.

On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after office hours, and on Sundays, double the ordinary rate will be required upon all Messages.

Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables.

Conditions.

1. The length of a word is limited to a maximum of ten letters.
2. Only ordinary dictionary words should be used. Artificially-constructed words are subject to the cipher rate.
3. Groups of figures may be transmitted, and will be charged at

the rate of three to the word, if expressing ordinary commercial quotations; but if used for code purposes they will be subject to the cipher rate.

4. Groups of letters or artificially-constructed words will be treated in the same manner as figures.

5. Cipher telegrams must be collated—i.e., repeated back in their entirety from station to station. Half rate extra is charged for collating.

6. Any combination of code employing in the same message groups of figures and letters is strictly prohibited, and telegrams composed in this manner cannot be accepted.

7. Addresses may be written in code, at the sender's risk, under arrangement with the administrations concerned. The signature may also be a code word, or the last word of the message may replace it.

8. The following abbreviated form for expressing "Reply paid," "Acknowledgment of receipt," "Collating," and "Telegram to follow," has been agreed to, so that only one word need be paid for to convey these instructions:—

In addition to the above charges, a fee at the rate of two pence per word on every Cable message paid in this Colony is charged, as hitherto, to defray the cost of remitting the Cable charges to South Australia.

FOREIGN MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New South Wales, and New Zealand, can be obtained at the General and District Post Offices, and for the Cape of Good Hope, Hong Kong and Germany, *at the General Post Office only*, at the following rates:—

For Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, New Zealand, and Hong Kong, not exceeding £5, one shilling; above £5, but not exceeding £10, two shillings. For the United Kingdom and the Cape of Good Hope, for sums not exceeding £2, one shilling; above £2 but not exceeding £5, two shillings; above £5 and not exceeding £7, three shillings; above £7 and not exceeding £10, four shillings. For Germany, not exceeding £2, two shillings; above £2 but not exceeding £5, four shillings; above £5 but not exceeding £7, six shillings; above £7 but not exceeding £10, eight shillings.

INLAND MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders are issued and paid within the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the General and undermentioned Post Offices in the Colony, at the following rates of commission:—For sums not exceeding £2, 3d.; above £2 and not exceeding £5, 6d.; above £5 and not exceeding £7, 9d.; above £7 and not exceeding £10, 1s. No Money Order can be issued for a larger amount than £10.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Post Office Savings Banks are opened at the undermentioned Post Offices for the receipt and re-payment of deposits on every working-day from nine in the morning till four in the evening:—Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, York, Newcastle, Vasse, Northam, Bunbury, Albany, Champion Bay, Pinjarrah, Northampton, and Williams River. In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

TOWN LETTERS.—For delivery within the limits of the City or town in which the letters are posted—Under half an ounce, one penny; exceeding half an ounce, two pence; and for every ounce, or fraction of an ounce, two pence additional.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four pence; or for every ounce, or fraction of an ounce, three pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted by sailing vessels to the Australian Colonies, three pence per half ounce; to all other places, sixpence per half ounce.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Via Brindisi—Under half an ounce, 6d.; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, 1s.; and for every ounce, or fraction thereof, sixpence additional.

LETTERS FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Three pence for every half ounce or fraction of an ounce.

NEWSPAPERS.—Newspapers printed and posted in the Colony for delivery beyond the boundaries of the City or town at which they may be published, and posted within one week from the date of publication, Free. Newspapers posted for transmission to places beyond the limits of the Colony, for delivery within the City, or any town in the Colony, for delivery within the boundaries of such City or town, 1d. each. Newspapers received from places beyond the limits of the Colony are delivered free, but when re-posted are subject to a charge of 1d. each.

BOOKS, &c.—Scale of Foreign Book Postage and Artistic Matter: Via Brindisi for the United Kingdom—1 ounce, 1d.; 2 ounces, 2d.; 4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 4d. for every additional four ounces. Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand—1 ounce, 1d.; 2 ounces, 2d.; 4 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each additional 2 oz. India, Hong Kong, Ceylon, and Mauritius—4 4 ounces, 4d.; 8 ounces, 8d.; and 8d. for each $\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. or fraction of $\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. Malta and Gibraltar, same scale as India, &c. Regulations—Every book, packet, or parcel of any kind, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides. No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight; nor contain any written communication.

BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY.—2 ounces, 1d.; 4 ounces, 2d.; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each additional 4 ounces.

REGISTRATION AND LATE FEES.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late Letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland Mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

The governing body of the Church of England in Western Australia is the Synod, established in 1862, and consists of the Bishop, all licensed clergymen, and lay communicant representatives elected by the congregations; no act being valid unless it carries the consent of the three orders. The Synod must meet at least once in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place in every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, but which in the first instance nominations are made, and the appointments ultimately confirmed by the Bishop. The elections of Synodsmen usually take place in November, and the Synod assembles in July. Secretary—Rev. G. H. Sweeting, Registrar of the Diocese—Septimus Burt, Esq. Secretary to the Standing Committee of the Synod—Rev. D. Glyn Watkins. Trustees of Church Property—The Standing Committee of the Synod.

The Marriage Act.

[Epitomised.]

No marriage shall be celebrated, except under special license for that purpose to be issued by the Governor, or except after due publication of banns, or intimation in writing of an intention to have such marriage shall be affixed for three consecutive Sundays on the door of the place of worship in which it shall be intended to celebrate such marriage, until one of the parties shall give notice under his or her hand in the form given in the Schedule A of this Act or to the like effect, to the district registrar of the district within which the parties, or one of them, shall have dwelt for not less than seven days then next preceding; and shall state in such notice the name and surname, and the profession or condition of each of the parties intending marriage, the dwelling place of each of them, and the time during which each has dwelt therein. But if either party shall have dwelt in the place stated in such notice during more than seven days, it may be stated therein that he or she has dwelt there seven days and upwards.

The district registrar shall forthwith post a true copy of such notice in a conspicuous place in his office, and shall also enter a true copy thereof fairly in a book to be for that purpose provided by the registrar general, to be called "The Marriage Notice Book;" and such book shall be open at all reasonable times without fee to all persons desirous of inspecting the same; and for any such entry the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Every district registrar shall, on the first day of every month, transmit to the registrar general all such notices received by him during the month preceding, and such notice shall be thereafter kept in the general registry, in such order and manner as the registrar general shall think fit, so that the same may be most readily seen and examined.

After the expiration of seven days from the entry of such notice, the district registrar, upon being requested so to do by or on behalf

of either party mentioned therein, shall issue under his hand a certificate in the form of the schedule in this Act annexed; Provided that no lawful impediment be shown to the satisfaction of the district registrar why such certificate shall not have been sooner forbidden, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, by any person authorised in that behalf as hereinafter provided; and every such certificate shall state the particulars sent forth in the notice, the day on which the notice was received, posted, and entered, and that the full period of seven days has elapsed since the posting and entry of such notice; and for every such certificate the district registrar shall be entitled to a fee of one shilling.

Any person whose consent to a marriage is required by law may forbid the issue of the district registrar's certificate, by writing, or causing to be written at any time before the issue of such certificate, the word "forbidden" opposite to the entry of the notice of such intended marriage in the marriage notice book, and by subscribing, or causing to be subscribed thereto, his or her name, place of abode, and character as parent or guardian.

No marriage in pursuance of such notice shall be celebrated three calendar months after the entry of such notice, nor until the certificate mentioned in the fourth section hereof shall have been produced to the minister or district registrar celebrating the marriage, nor in any case until a declaration upon oath, or a solemn affirmation shall have been made in manner prescribed by the Ordinance 19th Victoria No. 11, section 4.

The Act shall be taken to be part of the Ordinance 10th Victoria No. 11 as fully and effectually as if incorporated therewith, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Marriage Law Amendment Act, 1879."

The Dog Act.

(Epitomised.)

This Act takes effect from 1st January, 1884, and repeals 4 and 5 Vic. No. 14, 10 Vic. No. 5, and 38 Vic. No. 2.

The word "owner" in this Act means any person who shall at any time keep and have in his custody under his control any dog, and the occupier of any house or premises where any dog is kept or harbored, or permitted to live or remain. Provided, that such occupier shall not be deemed to be the owner if he can prove that he was not the proprietor of the said dog, and that such dog was kept or harbored, or permitted to live or remain in the said

house or premises, without his sanction or knowledge. Provided also, that where there are more occupiers than one in any house or premises let in several apartments or lodgings, or otherwise, the occupier of that particular part of the premises in which such dog shall have been kept or harbored, or permitted to live or remain, shall be deemed to be the owner of such dog, subject as aforesaid.

Registration of Dogs.
The owner of every dog shall, on or within fifteen days after the first day of January, 1884, and on or within fifteen days after the first day of January in each and every ensuing year, register such dog at the office of the municipality within which municipality it is intended to keep such dog, with the person appointed to register dogs at such office; or if it be not intended to keep such dog within any municipality then such dog shall be registered at the Court of Petty Sessions which shall be nearest to the place where it is intended to keep such dog, or at the residence of any person who shall have been appointed as for that purpose.

The owner of every such dog shall, previous to such registration, pay to the person appointed to register dogs in a municipality, for the use of the municipal council, or to the Clerk of the Court of Petty Sessions, or to such other person duly appointed by the said court as aforesaid, the registration fee mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto; and shall at the time of such payment deliver to the said clerk, or to the person appointed as aforesaid, a description of the said dog, embracing the several particulars of the animal with a declaration thereunder written of the truth thereof, under the hand of such owner or of some person authorised by the owner in that behalf. Every such registration shall be in force from the day on which the same shall be so made until the thirty-first day of December then next ensuing and no longer; provided that when a registration shall be made after the first day of July in any year, one half only of the fee mentioned in the Second Schedule shall be payable in respect of such registration.

If any person shall knowingly make a false declaration respecting all or any of the particulars contained in the aforesaid description, or shall insert or omit, or wilfully cause or permit to be inserted or omitted, in such description, any matter or thing whatsoever contrary to, or for the purpose of concealing the truth, he shall forfeit a sum not more than forty shillings, to be recovered as a penalty under this Act.

Every clerk of such Court, and every person appointed as aforesaid, shall keep for public inspection a correct list, arranged in alphabetical order, of the names of all persons who shall have

registered any dog during the current year, and the number of dogs registered by each person, together with the registered number of such dogs; and any person applying for the particulars of any dog so registered, or for the name of the registered owner thereof, or for a certified copy of the receipt hereinbefore mentioned, shall be entitled to receive the same on payment of a fee of one shilling.

In any proceedings under this Act it shall not be necessary for the informant to establish the fact of non-registration; but the proof of due registration shall lie on the defendant, and the said receipt, or a certified copy thereof, shall be admissible as evidence of such registration.

Every person who, after the expiration of fifteen days from the first day of January, 1884, and after the expiration of fifteen days from the first day of January in each and every year thereafter, shall be the owner of any unregistered dog, shall forfeit and pay, in respect of such unregistered dog, a sum of forty shillings, recoverable as a penalty as aforesaid. Provided that this section shall not apply to the dogs of aboriginal natives.

It shall be lawful for any person at any place to seize and detain any dog unattended and wandering at large, and upon notice thereof given to any Justice of the Peace, such Justice shall summon the owner to appear before him and claim such dog; and if such owner or some one on his behalf shall not, within twenty-four hours after service of such summons, or within such further time as such Justice may deem reasonable, appear and claim such dog, the same shall be forthwith killed; and if any unregistered dog shall be found at large in any part of the colony without being under the immediate control of some person, any such dog so found at large shall be liable to be immediately killed and destroyed; and all persons are hereby authorised, and all constables specially or generally authorised in writing by a Justice of the Peace in that behalf, are ordered and required to seize, kill, and destroy every such dog so found at large accordingly.

If any constable or any other person shall wilfully or maliciously kill or destroy any dog which shall not be at large contrary to the provisions of this Act, such constable or other person shall pay to the owner of such dog the full value thereof, and also a penalty of not less than twenty shillings nor more than five pounds, recoverable as aforesaid.

If any constable who shall be ordered by a Justice of the Peace in writing to destroy any unregistered dog which may be at large contrary to the provisions of this Act shall neglect to destroy or to use his best endeavours to destroy the dog mentioned or described

in such order, such constable shall for every neglect forfeit and pay, as a penalty, a sum not exceeding forty shillings.

Dogs of Aboriginal Natives.

It shall be lawful for any person to lay a complaint before any Justice of the Peace to the effect that an aboriginal native has in his possession an unregistered dog which has killed, maimed, or wounded sheep, or an unregistered dog not required by the said native for the procuring of food and likely to cause injury to sheep. On reasonable grounds shown, the said Justice shall cause the said native to be summoned or brought before him, and shall investigate the said complaint. If the complaint be proved to the satisfaction of the said Justice, the said Justice, if he shall think fit under all the said circumstances of the case, may order the destruction of the said dog; provided that no dog shall be destroyed under this section if upon demand, to be duly made by the Justice, the said native shall agree to register the said dog, and shall do so within one week, in which case the Justice shall cause the dog to be registered in the manner prescribed by this Act as nearly as may be, receiving and duly accounting for the registration fee. And provided further, that any native summoned or brought as aforesaid, and in possession of more than two unregistered dogs, shall be allowed to select and keep any two of such dogs, neither of such dogs being proved to have killed, maimed, or wounded sheep; and no order for the destruction of dogs under this section shall apply to or include any dogs so selected and kept, and every dog registered by a native, under the provisions of this section, shall, during the period of registry, be exempted from the operation of any other provision of the section.

Every order for the destruction of a dog under the next preceding section shall be directed to a constable to be designated by the said Justice, or if there be no constable within five miles of the place where the said Justice is sitting, to some other fit and proper person who shall be willing to execute the said order without reward.

Destruction of Wild Dogs.

If any person shall produce to any Justice of the Peace the tail of a dog, and shall prove to the satisfaction of such Justice that it is the tail of a wild dog, he shall be entitled, if such dog was destroyed within the Central District, to a reward of ten shillings, and if such dog has been destroyed in any district other than the Central District he shall be entitled to a reward of five shillings, to be obtained as hereinafter mentioned. The said Justice shall forthwith cause the said tail to be entirely destroyed in his presence, and he shall give to the said person a certificate in writing signed by the

said Justice and certifying that the whole tail of a wild dog has been produced to him by the said person and has been entirely destroyed in his presence, and that the said person is entitled to such as aforesaid as a reward for the destruction of a wild dog.

Upon the production of such a certificate as aforesaid to the Clerk of the Court of any Petty Sessions or of any Resident Magistrate, or Police Magistrate, such person shall be paid by such Clerk the sum named in the said certificate, and the said Clerk shall retain the said certificate and deal with it as hereinbefore provided for.

Miscellaneous.

If any dog shall in any street or upon any highway rush at or attack any person, horse, bullock, sheep, or any other such domestic animal, whereby any such person or animal may be injured, endangered, or put in fear, the owner of every such dog shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than five shillings nor more than five pounds for every such offence over and above the amount of any damage which such dog may have occasioned, and such penalty and damages shall be recoverable as aforesaid. But the recovery of such penalty only shall not affect the right of any person to proceed by action or otherwise against the owner of such dog for damages for any injury sustained by reason of the attack aforesaid.

If any person shall wilfully set on, urge, or permit any dog to attack, worry, or chase any person, or any horse, sheep, bullock, or other such domestic animal, he shall forfeit and pay, as a penalty, any sum not exceeding ten pounds; but the recovery of such penalty shall not affect the right of proceeding by action or otherwise for damages as aforesaid.

In any action or other proceeding for damages for injury done to man or beast by any dog, it shall not be necessary for the party seeking such damages to show a previous mischievous propensity in such animal, or the owner's knowledge of such previous mischievous propensity, or that the injury was attributable to neglect on the part of such owner.

All offences against this Act, and all penalties in respect thereof, shall be heard and determined, and all damages (in cases where the amount claimed shall not exceed twenty pounds) for any injury occasioned or done by any dog as hereinbefore mentioned, and the value of any dog improperly destroyed as aforesaid may be ascertained and recovered in a summary way before any Justice of the Peace.

One half of all fines and penalties under this Act shall, in municipalities, be paid to the municipality, and shall elsewhere be paid into the Colonial Treasury; and one half of the said fines and

penalties shall be paid to the person who has informed against the offender.

Every person who refuses to cancel a stamp, or wilfully neglects to do so, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding £10.

Persons having doubt as to the amount of Stamp Duty may apply to the Colonial Treasurer for adjudication; the fee being One Shilling.

History of Western Australia.

*Brief Chronicle of Occurrences and Events from
October, 1882, to September, 1883.*

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the W. A. Almanack. The following Notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's History.]

1882.

OCTOBER.—News received at Victoria Plains of the murder of an aboriginal native named Bob, formerly in the employ of Mr. James Clinch, of Berkshire Valley; four natives arrested and charged with the offence.....The Crown obtains a number of convictions against sawyers and others for illegally cutting timber on Crown lands.....Bicycle Clubs formed in Perth and Fremantle.Capt. H. O'Grady, of the barque Amur, fined £100 by the Fremantle Bench for a breach of the Quarantine Regulations; a deputation of residents at the Port having subsequently waited

upon His Excellency the Governor to obtain a mitigation of the penalty, the fine was reduced to £25.....His Excellency Sir William Robinson proceeds on an official visit to Champion Bay..... Three tons of stone from the Three Wonders Company's claim at Woongong forwarded to the Ballarat School of Mines for the purposes of assay..... Prompt measures taken by the authorities to put down larrikinism in the centres of population in the Colony..... Two young squatters—Messrs. Forrester and Collins—arrive at Perth from the Fitzroy River; the journey overland having occupied eighty days..... The prospectus of a Steam Navigation Company, with a capital of £50,000, issued; the promoters, represented by Messrs. Harrold Bros., of Adelaide, purposed extending this colony's present steam service from Adelaide to the Straits Settlements; owing, however, to inadequate support being forthcoming, the shares list is withdrawn..... The criminal calendar of this month's quarter sessions unusually heavy..... A gentleman named Miller arrives from Adelaide for the purpose of equipping a party to proceed to the North-west coast to prosecute pearl shell fishing by means of the diving-dress..... The dead body of a police-constable named Robert Holmes, who was widely respected in all parts of the colony, found in the bush at Rockingham; from the evidence adduced at the inquest it is supposed that the poor fellow received a stroke of the sun while riding in from Mandurah on duty, and that in a fit of temporary insanity he blew his brains out with his revolver, which was found by his side..... Intelligence received from Sir Julius Vogel that the Electric Light Company purpose sending to this colony an engineer bearing definite proposals to introduce the electric light in Western Australia..... The obituary for the month includes the names of Mr. Thomas Paisley, for many years in charge of the Fremantle Lunatic Asylum; Mr. Stephen Sainsbury, for many years a valuable agent for *The Inquirer* newspaper at Guildford; Mr. Robert Holmes, and Mr. Alfred Pickford Bussell, J.P.

* NOVEMBER.—Intelligence received of the promotion of Chief Justice Wrenfordsley to the position of Chief Justice of Fiji and Chief Judicial Commissioner of the Western Pacific..... News of hand of the total loss of the barque Bridgetown, by stranding, at Natal. This vessel was for many years engaged as a trader between London and Fremantle..... Baron von Müller, the Government Botanist of Victoria, strongly advocates the cultivation of the wattle-bark and castor-oil trees in this colony..... Mr. J. J. Harwood, the promoter of the Three Wonders Gold Mining Company, receives encouraging news from the Ballarat School of

Mines relative to the specimens of quartz forwarded there by the company last month; the yield was delared to be seven penny-weights of gold to the ton. A rich silver lode reported to have been discovered in the vicinity of the mines at Woongong.....The *aphis* makes extensive ravages in the vegetable gardens in and around Perth..... *The Inquirer* and *Daily News* newspapers publish a series of articles condemnatory of the system of the treatment of aboriginal native prisoners prevailing at the Rottneft Penal Establishment.....During the fortnight ending November 15, 557 tons of sugar were imported into this colony from Mauritius..... Intelligence received from London by wire of the appointment of His Excellency Sir William Robinson to the Governorship of South Australia. The intimation was received with feelings of considerable regret, testified by the numerous addresses to His Excellency by all classes throughout the colony immediately it became known. The Press, in reviewing His Excellency's Administration, is unanimous in crediting it as one of the most successful and beneficial by which the colony has been ruled.....His Excellency Governor Barlee, of Honduras, for many years Colonial Secretary of Western Australia, arrived at Perth on the 21st instant on a short visit. His Excellency was accorded a public reception by the citizens at the Townhall, and an address of welcome was presented to him by the Mayor (Mr. G. Shenton) shortly after his arrival..... Mr. George Shenton elected Mayor of Perth for the third time in succession..... Mr. B. C. Wood elected, unopposed, Chairman of the Fremantle Municipality.....A pearl found at Kimberley realised £1,500 in the London market.....Some mutilated remains discovered at "The Sinkings," near Albany, during the early part of this month, proved to be those of a teamster named Jock King, who, it was afterwards ascertained, had been murdered by a comrade, named John Collins; Collins subsequently executed for the crime in the Perth Gaol.....A locket, valued at £25, manufactured by Mr. F. Mason, jeweller, of Fremantle, from gold obtained in the North-west district.

DECEMBER.—Mrs. Broad, a widely-respected resident of the Victoria Plains, struck dead by lightning on the evening of the 1st instant.....£500 worth of hay destroyed by a fire at Mr. Loton's Belvoir estate, on the Swan.....The prospectus of a company for the purpose of working auriferous country at the North-west issued by Mr. Jones, who has received from Melbourne the report of an assay yielding $2\frac{3}{4}$ ounces of gold to the ton.....Intelligence received of the promotion of Lord Gifford, V.C., Colonial Secretary of this

colony, to a similar position at Gibraltar.....A large number of sheep and other stock and station plant shipped at Fremantle for the Kimberley district by the barques Amur, Honor, and Birmah.An unusually large number of black snakes killed this month near the lakes contiguous to Perth.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mr. C. L. Howard, Inspector of Police; Mrs. William Bingham, Master Daniel Congdon, and Mrs. Charles Heal, senr., a very old colonist.

JANUARY.—This year's Queen's Plate, run for on the 3rd instant, was won by Mr. G. Towton's horse Lowlander, in 5 minutes 55 seconds, distance 3 miles—the shortest time on record.....Intelligence received by telegraph of the promotion of Mr. John Forrest, C. M. G., to the office of Surveyor General and Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the room of the Hon. Malcolm Fraser, C. M. G., who succeeds Lord Gifford as Colonial Secretary.....Charles Cole, who was last month sentenced to death for the murder of a woman named Burkenshaw, reprieved by His Excellency the Governor, who, in compliance with the prayer of a public memorial in Cole's behalf, commuted the sentence to penal servitude for life.....Mr. George Leake appointed Acting Crown Solicitor.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mrs. W. J. T. Simpson, Mr. James B. Sinclair, and Master Bernal Osborne.

FEBRUARY.—His Excellency Sir William Robinson, Lady Robinson, and family leave Fremantle for Albany per the steamer Macedon, *en route* to Adelaide, on the 3rd. On leaving Perth and Fremantle His Excellency was presented with farewell addresses by each Municipality and several public bodies.....Chief Justice Wrenfordsley sworn in on the 20th instant as Administrator of the Government; His Excellency appoints Lieut.-Colonel E. F. Angelo as his Private Secretary.....News received by the barque Amur of the murder, by a native, of Mr. Anthony Cornish, at the Fitzroy River.....Intelligence received by wire of the appointment of Mr. F. Napier Broome, C. M. G., Colonial Secretary of Mauritius, to the Governorship of this colony.....The obituary of the month includes the name of Mr. Nathaniel Howell, a well-known and popular barrister of this colony.

MARCH.—A large consignment of oysters brought to Fremantle by the steamer Rob Roy from Sharks Bay.....Intelligence received from the North-west coast of a hurricane having swept over that district on the 9th ultimo.....Splendid rains fell this month on the

Upper Gascoyne.....Owing to the foundering of a small cutter at the Gascoyne Mouth a man named John Davies and a Chinaman were drowned.....Mrs. Pontivivo brutally murdered at Sharks Bay. A colored man, named Isaac Susetti, arrested and charged with the offence.....A woman named Greenway died suddenly in a railway carriage while proceeding from Fremantle to Perth on the 14th instant.....A man named Morrison sustained such injuries by the fall of an embankment in a cutting on the second section of the Eastern Railway that he died in the Colonial Hospital on the 4th instant.....Potatoes sold by auction at Perth and Fremantle at £21 10s. per ton.....An immense shark harpooned by Mr. Henry Strickland, jun., near Crawley, on the 11th instant.....Intelligence received from England of the death of Mr. Alfred Hilliman, for many years Sheriff of this colony.....At the Conference of the Congregationalist Churches fixed to be held shortly at Sydney the Rev. Joseph Johnston, of Fremantle, has been deputed to represent this colony.....The s.s. Macedon, bound from Fremantle for Beagle Bay, with a full cargo and a large number of passengers on board, stranded on the Transit Reef, off Rottneest Island, on the afternoon of the 21st instant, and afterwards became a total wreck; no lives were lost.....At Rockingham a son of Mr. Joseph Thomas severely injured owing to falling across the knife of a chaff-cutter.....Intelligence received from Adelaide of the death of Captain John Anderson Christie, who was for many years engaged on the coast of this colony as a master mariner.....On behalf of a large number of subscribers Dr. Waylen presented a purse of sovereigns to Mr. F. B. Shenstone-Flindell as a public recognition of that gentleman's services in collecting statistics and in various other ways promoting the construction of the Eastern Railway between Fremantle and Guildford.....Diphtheria prevalent among children in Perth and Fremantle, and several fatal cases occur.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mrs. J. O. Davis, Mr. James T. McCourt, Mrs. R. S. Dewar, and Mr. John J. Smith.

APRIL.—A remarkable offspring of a kangaroo slut born on Mr. Lomas Toovey's property on the Albany Road. The pup at seven months old was not larger than a cat, fur covering its body from head to tail like the small marsupials; its claws and legs bore no resemblance of the limbs of a dog; the animal was taken to Adelaide by Mr. J. Storrie, where it died soon after its arrival..... An exploring party, under the leadership of a Mr. Yuille, leaves Port Lincoln, S.A., for the purpose of exploring territory in this colony extending a thousand miles South-east of Eucla, but more particularly in the vicinity of Queen Victoria Spring, discovered by

Mr. Ernest Giles.....A special session of the Legislative Council opened by His Excellency H. T. Wrenfordsley, Administrator, Esq., of the Government, on the 13th instant.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mrs. William Weeks and Mrs. W. J. Clifton.

MAY.—Messrs. J. & W. Bateman, the contractors for the construction of the telegraph line between Northampton and Roebourne, purchase a number of camels from Sir John Elder, South Australia, for work on the line.....Intelligence received of the foundering of the schooner Ariel, Leidicke, master, near Beagle Bay; Mr. R. L. McKay being among the passengers.....A number of very fine sheep imported by Mr. C. Harper and others from South Australia.....Mr. J. F. Harper, acting Registrar of the Supreme Court, appointed acting Government Resident of the Roebourne district.....Mr. Matthew Burnett, the Evangelist and Social Reformer, lectures in various parts of the colony with great success.....Heavy rains fell to the eastward of York; the prospects of the season throughout the colony are unexceptionally good.....The first hansom cab imported into the colony from Melbourne by Mr. John Summers.....The remains of a man named Watson found in the bush at Turnpup, rear Kojonup, and two men, Moroney and Watkins, arrested on suspicion of having murdered him early this month.....The Government accept the contract of Mr. D. Gray for the erection of the Government Residency at Roebourne, at a cost of £1,904.....A number of gentlemen decide upon founding a Metropolitan Club in Perth, which is opened subsequently under the name of the Perth Club.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mrs. Higham, Mrs. J. McDonald, Mrs. J. White, and Mrs. John Corbett.

JUNE.—The fifty-fourth anniversary of the colony's foundation celebrated in the usual manner—old-English sports being indulged in at Perth and in other parts of the colony.....His Excellency F. Napier Broome, Esq., C.M.G., arrives at Perth and is sworn in Governor of Western Australia on the 2nd instant. His Excellency was presented with addresses of welcome by the Municipalities of Albany, Vasse, Bunbury, Fremantle, and Perth. His Excellency was accompanied by Lady Barker and his son and Mr. Richard Bagot (Private Secretary.).....Intelligence received of the death of Sir Arthur Kennedy, on board the Orient Company's steamer Orient, off Aden; Sir Arthur was for some years Governor of Western Australia, and the news of his death was received with deep regret throughout the colony.....The Sons of Australia Benefit Society celebrate their 46th anniversary by a banquet on

the 13th instant.....His Excellency the Governor and Lady Barker give their first ball at Government House on the 28th inst., the 45th anniversary of Her Majesty's coronation.....Intelligence received of the death of Mrs. Alfred Waylen, at Balham, London; the deceased lady was the mother of the Colonial Surgeon of Perth.The obituary of the month contains the names of Mr. John Kenny, Mr. Joseph Campbell, and Mrs. Samuel Mitchell.

JULY.—The Hon. A. C. Onslow sworn in Chief Justice of Western Australia on the 2nd instant.....The Government appoint Capt. Smith, Messrs. W. T. Loton, W. D. Moore, and B. C. Wood to act as a Commission to enquire into and report upon the management of the Customs Department.....Intelligence received of the death of Capt. P. Walcott, for many years in charge of the revenue cutter at the North-west pearl fishery.....The cutter Jessie Edwards, Capt. R. T. Johns, supposed to have foundered at sea between Fremantle and Sharks Bay.....The W.A. Bank declares a dividend at the rate of 16 per cent. per annum.....At Albany several deaths occur owing to measles.....The prospectus of the Perth Coffee Palace issued, and a large number of shares subscribed for.....The native Nannacrow executed at Rottneest for the murder of Charles Brackle, on the Murchison.....The ordinary annual Session of the Legislative Council opened on the 18th instant.....Diphtheria rages among children throughout Perth.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mrs. DuBois Agett and Mr. Terence Farrelly.

AUGUST.—A large number of native prisoners die at Rottneest of influenza.....Intelligence received from Mr. Hardman, the Government Geologist attached to the Kimberley survey party, that he has discovered quantities of minute dark heavy grains in the Fitzroy River which have all the appearance of stream tin..... The Press denounce the passing by the Legislative Council of the Married Women's Property Bill, and upon its third reading the Bill was thrown out.....The prospectus of a new Pastoral Company at the North issued by Messrs. Forrest & Angove, Land Agents... ..Captain Hillman, of the Metropolitan Rifle Volunteers, promoted to the rank of Major.....The report of the Select Committee appointed by the Legislative Council to consider the construction of railways upon the land-grant system published in *The Inquirer* of the 29th instant. Among the proposals is one from Sir Julius Vogel to construct a line from Beverley to Eucla, and another from Mr. Anthony Hordern to construct a line between Beverley and Albany.....The Legislature passed a Bill for the Destruction of Rabbits, except those kept on islands not less than five miles from

the mainland.....The Fremantle Building Society distribute £5000 among the investors as the profits arising from the past eight years business.....Unusual tidal disturbances on the coast of the colony from the 25th to the 29th inst.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mr. W. H. Higman (formerly Superintendent of Roads) and Mr. Richard Rowland, an old and respected colonist, who arrived in the year 1830.

SEPTEMBER.—The Totalisator Bill passed its third reading in the Legislative Council. His Excellency the Governor withholds his assent from the measure for the present.....Lieuts. R. A. Sholl and Thomas Sherwood, of the Metropolitan Rifles, promoted to the rank of Captain.....The Legislature vote a subsidy of £1000 per annum for a steam service between Fremantle and Singapore, and £1200 per annum for a service of four voyages per year between Fremantle and London, and *vice versa*.....The Legislature recommend that the Perth and Fremantle Telegraph Offices should remain open for public business from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., continuously.....Mr. B. C. Wood, of the firm of Carter & Co., Fremantle, communicates with the Government expressing his willingness to erect a telephone exchange at Perth and Fremantle, conditionally that he be granted the sole right for fourteen years.....Trade is very slack, and complaints of excessive stocks and of scarcity of money are general.....A sperm whale, a number of porpoises, and other large fish found on the beach at Mandurah, supposed to have been killed by the tidal disturbances which occurred on various parts of the coast of the colony on the 27th ultimo.....A comet of extraordinary size and brilliancy reported to have been seen at Pinjarrah.....The fruit season promises to be an unusually prolific one.....The prospects of the colony are better than they have been for many years, property of all kinds gradually yet surely increasing in value, and everything may be considered in a fairly prosperous condition.....The obituary of the month includes the names of Mr. Joseph Kenworthy, Mrs. D. B. Francisco, Mr. C. H. Compton, and Dr. Ferguson (formerly for many years Colonial Surgeon of the colony.)
