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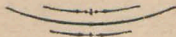

## ECLIPSES.

In the year 1888 there will be three eclipses of the SUN and two of the MOON, one of the latter only being visible in Western Australia.

1—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun on February 11th, invisible in any of the Australian Colonies. Begins on the Earth generally in long. 94d. 19m. E., lat. 64d. 7m. S. Greatest Eclipse in long. 35d. 46m. W., and lat. 70d. 49min S. Ends on the Earth in long. 95d. 2m. W., and lat. 39d. 36m. S.

2—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun on July 8, invisible in any of the Australian Colonies. Begins on the Earth in long. 45d. 59m. E., and lat 48d. 14m. S., greatest eclipse in long. 78d. 40m. E., and lat 67d. 44m. S. Ends on the Earth in long. 117d. 44m. E., and lat. 51d. 14m. S.

3—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun on August 7, visible in the Southern Hemisphere. Begins on the Earth in long. 138d. 37min. E., lat. 71d. 6m. N.; greatest eclipse in long. 53d. 15m. E., and lat. 70d. 13m. N. Ends on the Earth in long. 6d. 42m. E. and lat. 53d. 18m. N.

4—A Total Eclipse of the Moon on January 28th, partially visible in Perth.

5—A Total Eclipse of the Moon on July 22nd, invisible in Western Australia.

# WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

FROM "NOTES ON WESTERN AUSTRALIA," BY THE HON. JOHN FORREST, C.M.G.

THE first discovery of the Western Coast of Australia of which we have a fairly authentic account was made by Dirk Hartog, in the ship "Endracht," and Dirk Hartog's Island, on the Western side of Sharks Bay, was so named in consequence. A tin plate, having the following inscription upon it, was left at the North end of the island, afterwards named Cape Inscription:—

"25th October, 1616.—Arrived here the ship "Endracht," of Amsterdam—The first merchant Gillis Miebais of Luik; Dirk Hartog, of Amsterdam, captain. Sailed for Bantam 27th of same month."

This plate was seen by Vlaming in 1697, and by Baudin in 1803, but had disappeared in 1838, when it was searched for by Sir George Grey.

In 1619 Van Edels visited the coast near what is now known as Champion Bay, and gave his name to it.

In 1622 the South-west corner of Australia was discovered in the ship "Leeuwin," and the South-west Cape still bears the name of Cape Leeuwin.

In 1627 the South coast from Cape Leeuwin eastward towards the Great Australian Bight was discovered in the ship "Gulde Zeepart," and was named Nuyts Land. The magnificent flowering tree *Nuytsia floribunda*, commonly called the "Christmas or Cabbage tree," was named by Robert Brown, the great naturalist, in honor of Nuyts.

In 1628 the coast between Sharks Bay and Champion Bay was discovered by De Witt, and was named "De Witt's Land."

In 1629 Pelsart, in the ship "Batavia," was wrecked on Houtman's Abrolhos. The story of this shipwreck, and of the adventures of the immigrants, the mutiny, the supposed treasure, the marooning of two of the mutineers on the mainland near Champion Bay in 1629, are well-known to all readers of early voyages. Captain Wickham, R.N., in 1839, found on an island of the Abrolhos, named by him Pelsart Island, a part of the ship "Batavia," with a coin dated 1620, besides several fragments of corroded iron, &c.

In 1644 Tasman examined the North-western coast from the Gulf of Carpentaria to De Witt's Land.

In 1688 Dampier visited the North-west coast near Roebuck and Beagle Bays, and gave an interesting account of the aborigines, whom he describes as the "miserablest people in the world."

On Christmas Day, 1696, Vlaming discovered Swan River (so named by him on account of black swans being first seen on it), and Rottneest Island. He captured and took away with him several of the black swans, and, proceeding northward, examined the coast as far as the North-west Cape, passing Sharks Bay, where he recorded his visit on the tin plate left by Dirk Hartog in 1616, near what is now called Cape Inscription.

In 1699 Dampier again visited the Western coast, and examined Sharks Bay, so named by him, though it had formerly been named Dirk Hartog Bay, by Dirk Hartog, in 1616. He also discovered and mapped Dampier Archipelago, and added largely to the knowledge of the habits and customs of the aborigines and the natural history of the country.

In 1726 the ship "Zeephyk" was wrecked on Houtman's Abrolhos, in lat. 28deg. 53min. S., near Gun Island (so named by Captain Wickham, R.N., in 1839, as he found a gun upon it, besides many relics of the wrecked ship). The crew were able to build a boat from the fragments of the wreck, and reached Batavia in safety. In 1882 I visited Gun Island and found a large number of common clay pipes, a large quantity of broken bottles, wine glasses, corroded iron, &c., as well as two coins, bearing date 1720 and 1722.

In 1772 it is stated that Captain St. Alouarn anchored near Cape Leeuwin, and no doubt St. Alouarn's Island, near the Cape, is so named in consequence.



In 1791 Vancouver discovered King George's Sound and Oyster Harbor, and a tablet near a well he dug has recently been erected recording his visit.

The following year D'Entrecasteaux, in search of Count La Perouse and his officers and crew, who had not been heard of since 1788, examined the South coast, naming Esperance Bay, the Reecherché Archipelago, &c. The celebrated botanist Labillardiere accompanied this expedition, and he has left us an account of the voyage.

In 1802 Flinders, in the ship "Investigator," examined and carefully mapped King George's Sound, Princess Royal Harbor, and the whole of the South coast. He was accompanied on this expedition by Robert Brown, the great naturalist, and William Westall, the famous landscape painter.

In 1803 Baudin and Hamelin, in the French ships "Geographe" and "Naturaliste," in search of Count La Perouse expedition, examined the West coast from Cape Levequë to Cape Leeuwin, naming the Naturaliste Channel and many other localities in Sharks Bay, Leschenault Inlet, Geographe Bay, Cape Naturaliste, Cape Hamelin, and many other places, the names of which are now familiar to all West Australians, Baudin was accompanied on this expedition by the naturalist Leschenault.

In 1818 Captain Freycinet examined the Western coast and visited Sharks Bay, and the naturalist Gaudichaud has left an account of this voyage in his "Botanique Voyage autour du Monde, par Freycinet."

After this the next record is that of Captain (afterwards Admiral) P. P. King, R.N., between the year 1818 and 1822, who carefully surveyed the whole Western coast, from King George's Sound to Cambridge Gulf. King's charts and sailing directions, with additions by Wickham and Stokes and others, are for the most part in use at the present time. In these surveys he was assisted by Lieutenant (afterwards Commander) Roe, R.N., the first Surveyor-General of this Colony, as well as by Allan Cunningham, the naturalist.

In 1826 the Government of New South Wales despatched a detachment of the 39th Regiment, under Major Lockyer, to King George's Sound, to form a settlement.

In 1828 Captain (afterwards Sir James) Stirling, R.N., in H.M.S. "Success," surveyed the coast from King George's Sound to Swan River, and on the 1st of June, 1829, the Colony of Western Australia was founded by Captain Stirling, who was appointed Lieutenant-Governor.

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## Flower Garden Guide.

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**JANUARY.**—Dahlias and roses should be looked after; the former requiring staking, disbudding, mulching, and watering; the latter to be pruned when necessary, so as to give a fine autumn bloom; decayed flowers should be removed, and every means used to render the plants vigorous. Carnations should be layered. Chrysanthemums, phloxes, and other herbaceous plants will want staking and thinning.

**FEBRUARY.**—Proceed with the propagation of the favorite plants by layering, cuttings, or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, &c. Take care that camelias, azaleas, rhododendrons, and the like plants do not suffer from want of water. Climbers must be regulated; the stronger growing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept neat and orderly.

**MARCH.**—Dahlias, hollyhocks, lilioms, and Pompom chrysanthemums will now be in their prime; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers; dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow hardy annual and perennial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, &c.; if not already trenched get it done at once. Herbaceous plants can be divided, and planted

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—This month is generally too hot and dry to admit of much being done in gardening operations, except in low moist situations, where cropping can be carried on almost at any time. Where water is plentiful and easily applied, young crops should be watered once or twice a week, care being taken that the soil be well stirred with the Dutch hoe after every watering. If rain or dull weather occur, a few cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, broad and kidney beans, lettuce, pea, onion, radish, and turnip seeds, may be sown to a limited extent; with the exception of peas and beans, all the seeds should be protected from the intense sun, by shading with calico, litter, or some other suitable material. Early potatoes should be planted for use in April.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground, in readiness for cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brocoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach, and turnip. Kidney potatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery. Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required, plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three-year-old beds should be destroyed.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Get all heavy work in the most forward state possible. This is the best month for planting all descriptions of fruit trees; trenching and deep draining are essential to their well-doing; if soil is poor and manure needed, use bone dust in preference to guano. Commence pruning fruit trees, beginning with those that have lost their foliage. Sow, to a limited extent, cabbage, cauliflowers, brocoli, early carrots, lettuce, and radishes. Make good sowings of broad beans, peas, and leeks. Finish planting garlic, shallots, horseradish, rhubarb, sea-kale and asparagus.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Plant largely of early potatoes; sow parsnips upon rich deep soil—the latter ought to have been trenched two feet or more. Sow peas largely—Bedman's dwarf, blue imperial, champion of England, Burbidge's eclipse, climax, and alliance are among the best for general purposes. Sow largely of the various kinds of broad beans in rows thirty inches apart. Established plantations of rhubarb and sea-kale may be forced by covering the crowns over with pots or slates, and covering again with fresh horse-manure. Plant globe artichokes in rich soil, in rows four feet six inches by three feet. Sow main crops of onions, also spinach, radish, and small salads.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—This month will close the season for planting fruit trees, etc., so that all diligence must be used. August is the chief month for sowing seeds of various kinds—such as cabbage, cauliflower, carrot, leek, lettuce, onion, parsley, parsnip, peas, radish, spinach, salsafy, and scorzonera. If frames are obtainable, make up hot beds for early cucumbers, melons, vegetable marrows, etc. Tomatoes may be sown in pots in a frame for planting out in October. Plant Jerusalem artichokes and main crop of potatoes. Plant out cabbages, cauliflowers, leeks and onions.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—This is the busiest month in the year for seed sowing; most of the hardy vegetables may be sown, and towards the close of the month all the tender sorts. Potatoes of all kinds should be planted for main crops. Make a sowing of peas for succession. Early long-pod beans may still be sown in low-lying ground. Sow scarlet runners, dwarf French beans, beet, carrot, cucumber, melon, vegetable marrow, pumpkin, onion, radish and spinach; mustard and cress should be sown every fortnight; sow celery on a hot-bed. Tomatoes and capsicums may be sown in warm situations; if any have been raised in a hot-bed, harden a little and plant out. Plant Chinese yams and sweet potatoes in well-trenched scil. Fruit trees will require a little attention.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—If the season be moist, carrots, leeks, onions, and parsnips may still be sown. Sow largely of kidney beans, early turnips, capsicums, tomato, cucumber, vegetable marrow, pumpkins, melons, and parsley; also, tall-growing varieties of peas—they will not grow very high at this season of the year. Plant out largely cabbage, cauliflower, brocoli, and celery; also, sow again for succession. Weeds will grow apace—choose a fine sunny day for hoeing them down, and rake off when withered, to prevent their starting into growth again.

**KITCHEN GARDEN.**—Beds of rhubarb and sea-kale that have been forced should be cleared off. Cease cutting asparagus, or you will weaken the roots. Attend to cucumbers and melons; if any have missed, sow again. Stop leading shoots of cucumbers, to induce laterals. If tomatoes are not planted against a wall or fence, they should be tied up to strong sticks and pruned moderately, or fruit will be small and few. This is the time for preventing a great deal of pruning in winter. Use the finger and thumb judiciously in disbudding and stopping fruit trees; thin the fruit where thick; increased size and superior flavor will be the result. Vines will require frequent attention as regards training, tying, and thinning shoots.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, and savoy may be sown in shady places; peas, kidney beans, lettuce, spinach, and turnips can also be sown, but not to any extent. Onions, carrots, and parsnips will require thinning and weeding. Matured onion bulbs should be harvested at once, or the sun will injure them from keeping. Plant out early, celery plants in trenches, and give abundance of water when established. Early potatoes for seed when ripe, should be taken up and greened, by exposing them to the atmosphere for a few days, under the protection of a shed or verandah.

The Military Posts are Perth, Fremantle, Guildford, Geraldton, Albany, and Northampton. At each of these places there is one company of Rifle Volunteers, with the exception of Perth and Fremantle, where there are two companies. There is one division of a battery of Field Artillery (two Armstrong twelve-pounder field guns) at the former station, and at the latter there is one division of a battery of Naval Artillery (two old six-pounder field guns of obsolete pattern).

The troops are purely Volunteers, drawing merely a capitation grant of £1 10s. per effective, a small allowance for bands and corps drill-instructors, and a sum of £110 annually for prizes for rifle contests. Twelve parades per annum and the expenditure of 40 rounds of ball ammunition at target practice for an effective entitles to capitation grant. Inspection and field days are included in this number, but not recruit drills.

On special occasions, when the communication may be kept open after office hours, and on Sundays, double the ordinary rate will be required upon all Messages.

Messages may be transmitted in Cypher in the English language on payment of an additional charge of fifty per cent., but Cypher words must not average more than two syllables.

In these Banks deposits may be made to the amount of one shilling or any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, provided the deposits do not amount to more than £30 in one year. Any depositor wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in the printed regulations and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth.

LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Via Brindisi—Under half-an-ounce, 6d.; exceeding half-an-ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, 1s.; and for every ounce or fraction thereof, sixpence additional.

LETTERS FOR THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES, TASMANIA, AND NEW ZEALAND.—Two pence for every half-ounce or fraction of an ounce.



**NEWSPAPERS.**—Newspapers printed and posted in the Colony for delivery beyond the boundaries of the City or Town at which they may be published, and posted within one week from the date of publication, Free. Newspapers posted for transmission to places beyond the limits of the Colony, for delivery within a City or any town in the Colony, for delivery within the boundaries of such City or Town, 1d. each. Newspapers received from places beyond the limits of the Colony are delivered free, but when re-posted are subject to a charge of 1d. each.

No packet or parcel must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight, nor contain any written communication.

**BOOKS AND PARCELS TRANSMITTED WITHIN THE COLONY.**—2 ounces, 1d.; 4 ounces, 2d.; 8 ounces, 4d.; and 2d. for each additional 4 ounces.

#### REGISTRATION AND LATE LETTERS.

The system of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, etc., without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of fourpence in addition to the postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded. Late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of Inland mails, if, as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

Licenses to cut Timber—£20 per annum for any quantity of land not exceeding 640 acres, and £40 per annum exceeding 640 acres and not exceeding 1,280 acres; or 5s. per month for each sawyer, cutter, or splitter.

Licenses to cut or remove Sandalwood from Waste Lands of the Crown—2s. 6d. per month for each man.

Licenses to cut Timber in the Special Area on the Darling Range—Lots fronting on Eastern Railway are, on application, put up to auction at an upset rent of £100 per annum, for a term of fourteen years. Lots not fronting on the Railway are dealt with in a similar way at an upset annual rental of £20, for a term of fourteen years.

Licenses to collect and remove Guano—General and Special, a sum equal to 13s. per registered ton of vessel; which charge may be increased in case of an Exclusive License.



Stamp Tax.

“THE STAMP ACT, 1881,” has been repealed, and the provisions thereof have been re-enacted with amendments, by “The Stamp Act, 1882,” which commenced and took effect from the first day of October, 1882.

Every instrument, i.e., all written documents, matters, or things enumerated, must be stamped on the face of such instrument, and every stamp so used must be duly cancelled by writing across it the person's initials, together with the true date.

Every person who refuses to cancel a stamp, or wilfully neglects to do so, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding £10.

Persons having doubts as to the amount of Stamp Duty, may apply to the Colonial Treasurer for adjudication; the fee being One Shilling.

Receipt means any note, memorandum, or writing whatsoever, whereby any money amounting to £2 or upwards is acknowledged to have been received or paid; and the Penny Stamp shall be cancelled by the person by whom the receipt is given.

## Summary of the Cattle Trespass, Fencing and Impounding Act, 1882.

The various enactments and provisions in force respecting the law of Trespass by live stock, the poundage thereof, and the encouragement of the construction of boundary fences, were consolidated and amended by the 46th Vic. No. 7, and came into operation on the 1st October, 1882. We purpose giving a *precis* of this Act, copies of which we are frequently applied for.

### TRESPASS AND DAMAGE.

Any owner or occupier of land may seize any cattle found trespassing on his land, and secure the same in the public pound nearest to the scene of trespass, or if there be no such pound within three miles of the scene of trespass, then in any private pound or place of security, until such cattle be lawfully released, or satisfaction made for such trespass and damage, or order made by a Justice of the Peace in respect of such cattle. Any such owner of land is required to make complaint before a Justice of the Peace, forthwith, of any such trespass and damage, and such cattle impounded in a private pound shall be fed and taken care of by the impounder, treated with reasonable care, provided with food and water for their sustenance, and protected from ill-usage. If the owner of the cattle impounded shall be known to the impounder, he shall so inform the poundkeeper. (Sec. 3.)

Any owner of land unlawfully and wilfully killing and maiming cattle trespassing, on conviction thereof before a Justice of the Peace shall forfeit and pay to the owner thereof its value. Any dog, pig, goat, rabbit, poultry or pigeon found trespassing may be killed. Any such body, so killed, shall be left exposed to view at the place killed for the space of at least six hours, and if not claimed and removed by the owner may be disposed of by the owner of the land but not be consumed by him for food. These enactments shall be cumulative on and not be a bar to any proceedings for injuries to cattle or any other animals under the 24th and 25th Victoria, C. 96, nor to proceedings for compensation for damage by dogs, &c. (Sec. 4.)

Any entire horse, ass, or bull above the age of one year found trespassing without a keeper on any land, the owner of such land may castrate such cattle if unbranded, and if the owner thereof be unknown. When the owner is known, three days' notice of the intention to act as above shall be given in writing to him by the owner of the land prior to his so doing. No compensation shall be given to the owner of such cattle for such castration. (Sec. 5.)

The penalties for trespass payable to the land owners are:—On unenclosed country land—For every entire horse, ass, or bull, in the day time, not less than £2 nor more than £4. In the night time, not less than £3 nor more than £5. For every horse, mare, gelding, calf, filly, ass, mule, ox, cow, heifer, calf, camel, deer, and foal, by night or day, threepence. For every head of "small cattle," by night or day, one penny. For trespass on enclosed land, whether town, country, suburban, not being a public street or thoroughfare in a city or town, or public cemetery, for every entire horse, ass, or bull, in the day time, not less than £2, nor more than £4. In the



night time, not less than £3 nor more than £5. For every other head of cattle, by night or day, a sum not exceeding twenty shillings. For trespass on public street or thoroughfare, in a town or city, or in an enclosed public cemetery, entires, not less than £3 nor more than £5; very other head of cattle, a sum not exceeding 40s. Such cattle, being "great cattle," if not branded with a registered brand, the penalties shall be doubled. In no case of trespass of cattle (excepting entires) shall the total amount of fine, on enclosed country land, exceed £5. (Sec. 6.)

No expenses for keep of cattle impounded shall be recovered for more than seven days, unless such cattle shall have been advertised with a full description thereof, and no cattle shall be sold, nor any cattle other than pigs, dogs, goats, rabbits, poultry or pigeons be destroyed under color of trespass, unless by order of a Justice of the Peace, after default of discovery of the owner, shall have been advertised with full description thereof, including marks, colors, brand, and height, in *two newspapers* published in the Colony, for three successive weeks, nor until seven days after the last of such advertisements, nor unless a written or printed placard be posted on the pound at which such sale shall be held for seven days prior to such sale. (Sec. 7.)

#### LIABILITIES OF CATTLE OWNERS.

It shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace, on complaint for trespass, and damage sustained, whether such cattle shall have been impounded or not, to issue his summons to the owner of the cattle trespassing, and to adjudicate thereon and to make an order for the trespass and for the damage claimed, and for payment of poundage, feeding or other incidental expenses as the Justice shall deem fit. And in case such order shall not be complied with to levy the amounts ordered to be paid at the sale of the cattle so trespassing, or, if needful, under the provisions of the 14 Vic. No. 5. Undue delay on the part of the owner of the land in making complaint, or by ill-treatment of the cattle impounded in a private pound, may subject him to a reduction in the amount of compensation claimed. (Sec. 9.)

Destruction of trespassing cattle not impounded, where it has been impossible to do so, and where the owner has not been discovered after compliance with the 8th section, may be ordered by the Justice of the Peace, together with the production and delivery to a police constable of the hide of such cattle destroyed, being "great cattle." Non-compliance with this order will subject an owner of land to a penalty not exceeding £5. Destruction of cattle improperly obtained will render the person so committing himself to legal proceedings as if this Act had not been passed. (Sec. 10.)

The owner of land impounding cattle, and neglecting to proceed for alleged trespass or damage committed by such cattle, may be proceeded against for his neglect. And the Justice of the Peace may order the delivery of the cattle impounded, and damages not exceeding £5. If an excessive claim is made by a poundkeeper or person impounding, the cattle may remain impounded till the question is settled by the Justice. (Sec. 11.)

The occupier of land, or other person in whose charge trespassing cattle at the time of the trespass shall be deemed to be the owner of such cattle so as to render him liable in all proceedings for such trespass or damage. (Sec. 12.)



## MINOR TRESPASSES AND DAMAGE.

Subject to the reservation of public rights, in all cases of trespass on land committed by any person, with or without any cattle, the owner of such land may complain thereof to a Justice of the Peace, who may inflict a penalty not exceeding ten pounds. But if such trespass shall have been found to have been justified, or so trifling as not to merit any punishment, the Justice may dismiss the complaint. (Sec. 15.)

The Council of a municipality may publish a scale of penalties less than those already enacted (Sec. 5) which shall be payable to such municipality for trespass on their lands in addition to compensate for damage to any pathway, fence or gate, or to any tree planted or growing in a townsite. Any police constable may impound in a public pound any cattle which he shall find trespassing, whether tethered, depasturing, feeding, or roaming about in any townsite or municipality, and proceed thereon as if he were an owner of land as mentioned in this Act. (Sec. 16.)

In addition to the penalty for trespass of cattle, damages to an amount not exceeding £30 may be recovered for damages on enclosed country land, and on enclosed town and suburban land not exceeding fifty pounds. (Sec. 17.)

In respect to Town herds nothing shall be construed to apply to any town herd which shall *bonâ fide* be driven or led by any person straight into, through, or out of any city or town, and not depasturing, feeding, or roaming about therein and not doing damage. (Sec. 18.)

For any trifling complaints a Justice of the Peace may give a certificate of dismissal as a bar to further proceedings. (Sec. 19.)

No compensation can be recovered for damage committed by trespass of cattle on town or suburban allotments—4 William IV., No. 4. The proprietor or tenant of a town or suburban allotment being desirous of erecting a common boundary fence between the same and any next adjoining land (not the property of the Crown) may, by requisition in writing, call upon such person to erect a moiety of such common boundary fence after due notice, proceed to erect such fence, and may enter on the land of such party and cut down necessary timber, and may recover costs for the erection of such moiety. By the 46 Vic. No. 7, the proprietor of any town or suburban land failing or neglecting to comply with the foregoing provision will not be entitled to damage by any live stock straying over or through the said allotment. (Sec. 21.)

No more damages shall be awarded in respect of trespass committed upon any grain or other crops in any land not being a townsite, unless the same shall have been enclosed by a sufficient fence; provided such trespass be not wilful nor malicious. The term "sufficient fence" shall be construed to mean any substantial fence reasonably deemed sufficient to resist the trespass of great and small stock, including sheep, but not including goats and pigs. If the sufficiency be disputed, the Justices of the Peace, or Court, may settle the question. (Secs. 22-30.)

Boundary fences must be kept clear mutually between the said lands to the distance of ten feet. Any person neglecting to keep his side of the boundary fence so cleared, after three days' notice from the opposite owner, will be liable to have his land cleared, and compensation may be claimed by law for such clearing. If such adjacent land be unoccupied, it shall be



lawful for the owner, having cleared his own side, to make entry and clear as aforesaid, without notice. (Sec. 23.)

Sections 24, 25, and 26 deal with dividing fences destroyed by accident; parties using such fences to pay one-half the cost of erection if such adjoining land shall have been acquired subsequent to land fenced by the adjoining owner, and such mutual fences shall be kept mutually in repair.

Any trespass committed by reason of, or in consequence of the negligence or culpable conduct of the shepherd, herdsman, or other servant of the person under whose immediate care and charge such live stock were at the time of trespass, may be mulcted of any portion of his wages, not exceeding five pounds, or in default be committed to gaol for a period not exceeding three months. Such fine may be retained by the master or employer of such servant in satisfaction of any damages or penalty he may have been adjudged to pay. (Sec. 27.)

No owner of land within the limits of a pastoral lease or license is entitled to trespass or damage against the owner of surrounding or adjacent land unless his land is sufficiently fenced; wilful or malicious trespass excepted. (Sec. 28.)

Goats or swine running loose without a keeper in constant attendance within one mile of any enclosed land not occupied by such goat or swine, the owner shall be liable for each head so running loose to a penalty for each head not exceeding five shillings, in addition to any fine or damages for trespass. (Sec. 31.)

#### POUNDS AND POUNDKEEPERS.

Section 32, c. 37 relate to the appointment of pounds and poundkeepers by the Justices of the Peace acting in or for any Resident Magistrate's district. All powers and authorities required to be exercised or done by such Justices other than the hearing of complaints and informations shall, within the limits of a municipality be done by the Council of such Municipality. A poundkeeper need not require an auctioneer's license. No poundkeeper, husband, wife or child of any person so selling, nor any person impounding such cattle shall purchase at such sale any impounded cattle ordered to be sold.

#### POUND BREACH OR RESCUE.

No person shall release or rescue cattle in or on the way to the pound, nor pull down damage or destroy such pound or place, or fixing or fitting thereto, under penalty. Every owner of land and every person lodging or causing to be lodged for alleged trespass any cattle, or delivering the same to the poundkeeper shall be jointly and severally responsible to the poundkeeper for all fees, charges and expenses of keeping, feeding, and impounding such cattle, which may be recovered summarily.

#### PROCEDURE.

Summary proceedings are to be taken before one or more Justices of the Peace, and all dues, penalties, damages, and fees may be recovered under the provisions of the 14th Victoria, No. 5. Any person aggrieved may give notice of appeal to the Supreme Court. Such notice shall be given to the Justice of the Peace making such order or conviction, within seven days after the making thereof and depositing £10 to cover costs.



## Gun Licensing Act, 1885.

In this Act the term "gun" includes a firearm of any description, and an airgun, or any other kind of gun from which any shot, bullet, or other missile can be discharged.

It shall not be lawful for any person to use, or carry for use, a gun within the boundaries of any Municipality or within a distance of five miles beyond such boundaries elsewhere than in a dwelling house, or the curtilage thereof, without having in force a license duly granted to him under this Act.

No person under the age of sixteen years shall be entitled to obtain a license under this Act.

Every license to be granted under this Act shall be in the form contained in the Schedule A hereto, and shall be granted, on payment of the sum of Five shillings, by any collector or sub-collector of revenue, or any other person appointed in that behalf by the Governor, to any person not under the age of sixteen years applying for the same, provided he is not by law prohibited from using or carrying a gun. Provided that if any person applies for a license who in the opinion of the collector or sub-collector or other person appointed as aforesaid, is under the age of sixteen years, it shall be lawful for the collector or sub-collector or other person appointed as aforesaid, to refuse to grant the applicant a license until he shall have satisfied such collector or sub-collector, or other person appointed as aforesaid, that he is of the age of sixteen years. Every license shall bear date the day on which it is granted, and shall expire on the thirty-first day of December then ensuing, and no license shall be transferable.

Every collector, sub-collector, or other person appointed in that behalf, who shall grant licenses under this Act, shall keep a register in the form in the Schedule B hereto of all such licenses granted by him, specifying the christian and surname, place of residence, and occupation of every person licensed, and the date of each license; and any Justice of the Peace, or police officer, or constable, or any person licensed under this Act, may at any time inspect such register of licenses.

Every person who shall use or carry for use a gun within the boundaries in any Municipality or within a distance of five miles beyond such boundaries elsewhere than in a dwelling house or the curtilage thereof, without having in force a license duly granted to him under this Act, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two pounds. Provided always that the said penalty shall not be incurred by any of the following persons, namely:—

- (1) By any person in the naval, military, or volunteer service of Her Majesty, or in the police force, using or carrying for use a gun in the performance of his duty, or when engaged in target practice.
- (2) By any honorary member of a volunteer corps using or carrying for use a gun when engaged in target practice.
- (3) By the occupier of any lands using or carrying for use a gun for the purpose only of scaring or killing birds or vermin, or of firing at a mark or target on such lands, or by any person using or carrying for use a gun for the purpose only of scaring or of killing birds or vermin on any lands by order of the occupier thereof.
- (4) By any gunsmith or his servant using or carrying for use a gun by



way of testing or regulating its strength or quality in a place specially set apart for the purpose.

In any information for the recovery of the penalty imposed by this section, it shall be sufficient to allege that the defendant used or carried for use a gun within the limits aforesaid without having a license in force under this Act, and it shall lie upon the defendant to prove that he is a person not incurring the penalty, by virtue of the proviso contained in this section.

When a gun is carried in parts by two or more persons in company, each and every one of such persons shall be deemed to carry a gun.

It shall be lawful for any police constable to demand from any person using or carrying for use a gun (not being a person in the naval, military, or volunteer service of Her Majesty, or in the police force, using or carrying for use a gun in the performance of his duty, or when engaged in target practice, or an honorary member of a volunteer corps using or carrying for use a gun when engaged in target practice) the production of a license granted to such person under this Act.

If the person upon whom the demand is made shall not produce a license duly granted to him under this Act, and permit the constable demanding the production thereof to read the same, it shall be lawful for such constable to require such person to declare his christian and surname and place of residence, and if such person shall refuse to declare his christian and surname and place of residence as aforesaid, he shall for such refusal forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Two pounds, over and above any other penalty to which he may be liable under this or any other Act.

And it shall be lawful for such constable to arrest such person so refusing and to convey him before any Justice of the Peace, and such Justice shall upon due proof on oath of the offence, or upon the confession of the accused, convict such person as aforesaid.

All offences against this Act shall be summarily punishable upon conviction before a Justice or Justices of the Peace in petty sessions.

It shall be the duty of every collector, sub-collector, or other person appointed in that behalf as aforesaid issuing licenses under this Act to send in a report to the Colonial Secretary of the names, descriptions, and places of residence of all persons to whom they shall have issued licenses during the past month, and such names and additions shall be notified in the *Government Gazette*.

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## THE CLOSE SEASON.

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### CLOSE SEASON FOR BIRDS.

Wild ducks of any species; teal, emu, black swan, wild geese; from the first day of July to the thirteenth day of November in any year. Bustard, bittern, bronze-winged and other pigeons, gnow, quail, Rottnest and other snipe; from the first day of August to the thirtieth day of November.

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### CLOSE SEASON FOR PRAWNS.

The close season for prawns commences on first May and ends on thirtieth November in any year.

 to which in the first instance nominations are made, the appointments being  
 ultimately confirmed by the Bishop. The elections of Synodsmen usually take

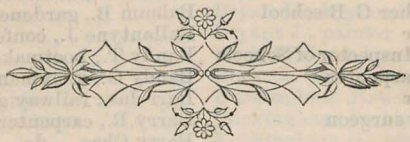

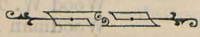

## Brief Chronicle of Occurrences and Events,

FROM OCTOBER, 1886, TO SEPTEMBER, 1887.

[Under the above head the most remarkable Events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the Almanack. The following Notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

## 1886.

OCTOBER—The Government receive a telegram from the Resident Magistrate at Wyndham (Mr. Hare), stating that gold has been discovered on the Ord River.....Opening of the branch line of railway, from Spencer's Brook to Northam, by His Excellency Governor Broome.....The s.s. *Gulf of St. Vincent* arrives with a large number of immigrants and saloon passengers.....An action for libel for £3000 damages brought by Mr. G. W. Leake, Q.C., R.M., against Mr. John Horgan, barrister, takes place at the Supreme Court, the jury being unable to agree to a verdict.....A Perth Working Men's Club opened at Perth.....The *Government Gazette* contains a notice to mariners embodying information furnished by Staff-Commander Coghlan relative to the dangers in the Geeloink Channel, between Champion Bay and the Abrolhos; also, the appointment of Sergeant-Major Alexander Campbell, Staff-Drill Instructor, to the rank of Lieutenant and Adjutant on the Staff of the Western Australian Volunteer Force.....The Fremantle Volunteer Fire Brigade hold their first annual meeting.....The Chief Officer of the s.s. *Gulf of St. Vincent* (Mr. Delmahoy) who fell down the hold of that vessel, and fractured his spine, succumbs to his injuries.....The Rev. J. B. Gribble delivers a lecture at the Perth Working Men's Hall. Subject: "My Recent Crusade in the Eastern Colonies".....Mr. E. H. Wittenoon, representative of the Geraldton constituency, resigns his seat in the Legislative Council.....Sir Thomas Campbell addresses his constituents at Albany.....Mr. John Horgan, solicitor, served with another writ for libel at the instance of Mr. G. W. Leake, Q.C., R.M.....The Perth Horticultural Society hold their Annual Show at the Town Hall.....The Agricultural Society's Show at Newcastle, takes place; also, the Show of the York Agricultural Society.....A telegram received at Fremantle, from Carnarvon, announcing the death (by drowning) of Capt. Hendra, master of the barque *Arafura*.....A telegram received from the other Colonies announcing that Mr. Mordant Locke's four-year old stallion "Isonomy" was the winner of the Caulfield Stakes. The above stakes were worth about £300; the distance being one mile and a furlong; time 1 min. 47 secs. (see *D.N.* Oct. 19, 1886.).....The Albany-Beverly railway opened.....News received from Albany of the death by drowning of Lewis Snider, and his son, Dan Snider. This sad event took place during the banquet which was being held in connection with the Albany-Beverly Railway.....A public meeting held in the Town Hall (the Hall being densely crowded) for the purpose of presenting Mr. A. P. Hensman with an address, regretting his having resigned the position of Attorney General.....Good News from the Kimberley Goldfields continue to be received.....The annual prize firing of the M. R. Volunteers takes place.....The tender of Messrs. Clifton & Fraser, for the erection of the new Fremantle Post Office, for the sum of £3,046, accepted.....Obituary—Mr. Frank Bateman, Mr. Samuel Nugent, Mr. Charles Smith, Mr. George Lilly, sen., Mr. Anthony Hordern, Mr. Lewis Snider, Mr. Dan Snider, Mr. Richard Meares, jun.

NOVEMBER—The annual pic-nic of the Fremantle Boys' School takes place.....The following are the names of the placed horses for the Melbourne



Cup: 1, Arsenal, (4 yrs., 7st. 4); 2, Trenton, (5 yrs., 9st. 5); and Silvermine (5 yrs., 7st. 10).....The W. A. Agricultural Society hold their eighth annual Exhibition at Guildford.....The burial of the late Rt. Rev. Martin Griver, D.D., R.C. Bishop of Perth, takes place.....Dr. E. S. Shields, L.R.C.P.S., Edin., appointed Resident Medical Officer at Carnarvon.....Lieut. J. O. Maxwell, resigns his Commission in the Albany Defence Rifles.....A branch of the Bank of New South Wales opened at Fremantle.....A Soap and Candle Factory opened at Fremantle.....News received from Busselton of the death of Dr. Bompas. The deceased entered the Public Service of this Colony in 1869, and was the first Resident Medical Officer at Camden Harbor.....A press telegram, received from London, stating that Sir Frederick Broome, Governor of this Colony, would succeed Sir George Strahan, Governor of Tasmania.....The Perth Regatta takes place.....A number of gentlemen amateurs establish a company, to be called the Black Swan Christy Minstrels.....A voluntary subscription list, circulated for paying expenses (including the fine) incurred in the *Leake v. Horgan* case.....The Very Rev. M. Gibney appointed R.C. Bishop of Perth.....Efforts are being made to form a Reform Association.....It has been officially reported that argentiferous ore has been discovered near Roebourne.....The survey of the projected railway to Bunbury completed, under the direction of Mr. May, as far as the Serpentine.....Mr. C. N. Warton, the newly-appointed Attorney General of this Colony, in succession to Mr. A. P. Hensman, arrives from England.....Much regret expressed when it became known that an old and well-known colonist (Mr. F. B. Shenstone-Flindell) has died.....Obituary—Dr. Griver, Mr. G. Brian Williams, Mrs. M. A. Flannigan, Dr. Bompas, Mrs. Herbert, Mr. Frank Hanham, Mr. F. B. Shenstone-Flindell, Mrs. Quinn.

DECEMBER—Fryer's Circus arrives from Singapore.....A Rifle match takes place between ten of the M.R. Volunteers and the same number of the Sydney Artillery Rifle Club, proving a victory for the latter by 21 points. The Sydney men scored 770; the Perth men 749.....Collision between the s.s. *Keilawarra* and s.s. *Helen Nichol* off the coast of Sydney, N.S.W.....News received from Derby that a man named Franz Erdman, a German, had murdered his mate, Anthony Johnson, a Norwegian, at the Kimberley gold fields.....The Foundation Stone of the Albany Town Hall laid by the Mayor of that town (Mr. W. G. Knight).....News received of the wreck of the Ship *Earlscourt*, bound from London to Albany with a cargo of railway material, off the coast of Glamorganshire.....Wreck of the schooner *Belle of Bunbury* near Penguin Island, South of Garden Island.....News received that the celebrated jockey, Fred. Archer, had committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver at Newmarket, on November 8.....Mr. Edward Keane elected member of the Legislative Council for Geraldton.....The s.s. *Elderslie* arrives with a number of immigrants.....Obituary—Mr. Geo. Armstrong, Master O. T. Williams, Misses Rachael and Annie Herron, Rev. R. W. Campbell, Mr. E. W. Ashton, Mr. C. G. H. Cooper, Mr. John Dunne.

Daniels, Mr. Mark Fripp, sen., Mr. F. C. Singleton, Mr. Walter S. C. Rogers, Mr. Hugh O'Hanlon, Miss Mary Houston.

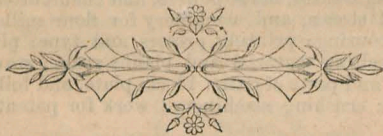
Animals, live (except as named in the first schedule); band instruments for volunteer force; bells, musical instruments, and parts of, for places of worship; bone and other manures, including all fertilisers and substances to be used in the preparation of artificial manures; books, printed not being account, including music and charts; coal, coke and patent fuel; cod oil in bulk; colored glass for church windows; fire engines; hides, raw; ice; immigrants' tools and instruments of trade, not exceeding £10 in value per immigrant; iron and steel, unworked, bar, sheet, rod, plate, and hoop; iron, pig; iron, galvanised sheet, plain; machinery for boring for water, coal, and other minerals; metal sheathing; outside packages in which goods are ordinarily imported, and which are of no commercial value except as covering for goods; paper, for printing

purposes; paraffine wax, paraffine scale and stearine; personal baggage (not including vehicles, glassware, chinaware, silver and gold plate, and plated goods, and furniture other than cabin furniture) which is imported with and by passengers, immigrants and travellers, *bona fide* for their own personal use, and not imported for the purpose of sale; plants, seeds, and bulbs; provisions and stores, military or naval, required for Her Majesty's service; rails and fastenings for railways and tramways; rock salt; specie, bullion, and coin; soda-ash and nitrate of potash; stones imported by municipalities for flagging; sulphur; surgical, scientific, and optical instruments; uniforms and appointments, military, naval, and civil, imported by officers stationed in the colony for their own purposes.
