The Pharmacopœia.

THE Second Edition (p. 188) of the Translation of the Pharmacopœia of the Royal College of Physicians of London, by Dr. G. F. 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ECLIPSES IN 1869.

CALCULATED TO MEAN TIME AT PERTH.

- In the year 1869 there will be two Eclipses of the SUN, and two of the MOON.
- I. *January 28.*—A partial Eclipse of the MOON, to the extent of nearly half her diameter. The first contact with the shadow will be at 8h. 11m. a.m. on the MOON's north-eastern limb. Middle of the eclipse at 9h. 20m. a.m. Last contact with the shadow at 10h. 29m. a.m. on the North western limb. The MOON will be full at 9h. 12m. a.m.
- II. *February 10—11.*—An Annular Eclipse of the SUN during the night of the 10th and morning of the 11th, but not visible from any part of Australasia.
- III. *July 22.*—A partial Eclipse of the MOON, to the extent of more than her semi-diameter. The first contact with the shadow will be at 8h. 22m. p.m. on the south-eastern limb. Middle of the Eclipse at 9h. 44m. p.m. Last contact with the shadow at 11h. 7m. p.m. on the south-western limb. The Moon will be full at 9h. 36m. p.m.
- IV. *August 8.*—A total Eclipse of the SUN, visible only in the northern hemisphere.

Prepare ground for onions; plant out cauliflowers, brocoli, cabbage, &c.; sow peas, beans, carrots, spinach, lettuce, cress, and endive for early crops; sow early stone turnips; sow wheat and Cape barley; examine fruit trees, removing all decayed limbs and suckers; keep potato crop clean.

Sow cabbage of all sorts, peas, broad beans, and turnips; earth up celery, and continue to transplant cauliflowers, &c.; wheat sowing should now be finished; prune and transplant deciduous fruit trees. This and the next two months are the most favourable for breaking up new ground.

EXTENT, CLIMATE, AND PRODUCTIONS OF
WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

THE colony of Western Australia, as defined by Her Majesty's Commission, includes all that portion of New Holland situated to the Westward of 129 degrees East longitude; its greatest length is therefore 1,280 miles from North to South, and 800 miles from East to West. The City of Perth is situated in 32 degrees South latitude, and 115 degrees 46 minutes 43 seconds East longitude. With so extensive a coast line on the Indian Ocean, and with a westerly aspect, from which the prevailing winds blow, there are abundant rains during the tillage season, and the farmer is relieved from that anxiety about his crops which is felt in other parts of Australia by drought. The heat of summer is moderated by alternate land and sea breezes. The Darling and Roe ranges of hills, rising to the height of 1500 to 2000 feet above the sea level, lie parallel to the western coast, at ten to twenty-five miles from it, and are dotted with numerous thriving farms amongst its hills and valleys. These ranges are twenty to fifty miles across, and on their eastern side the undulating grassy lands are situated which constitute the principal sheep and cattle runs.

The colony possesses one of the most healthy climates in the world. The mortality since its occupation has not averaged one per cent. No portion of the world is better suited to the European constitution. The mean of the barometer is about 30 inches, and of the thermometer about 63 degrees. In general salubrity of climate, Western Australia possesses a marked superiority over any of the Australian colonies. It is subject to no extremes of heat or cold. Cattle have never been known to die from lack of water, and in the very driest weather there is a sufficient supply of food for them. Exposure to weather, by night or day, appears to produce no ill effects on the constitution of the colonist, many of whom, for months together, rarely sleep in any but the most temporary dwellings. Snow

is never seen; ice only in the depth of winter, and then only in the very early morning.

Owing to the superior attractions of the goldfields discovered in neighbouring colonies, the tide of emigration from England has hitherto swept past the shores of Western Australia, and but little is known abroad of its actual capabilities and resources.

Energy and capital alone are required to raise Western Australia to a foremost position. There is room for thousands of enterprising settlers. Millions of acres of good sheep country are lying vacant. Forests of "Jarrah" or mahogany, which effectually resists the "white ant," or "Teredo Navalis," said to be the finest timber in the world, offer a splendid field for capital, and every inducement is held out by Government. License fee merely nominal—labour cheap and plentiful. An abundance of sandalwood, in which a profitable export trade is carried on with Singapore and China. Rich lodes of copper ore, covering an area of some 5,000 square miles, visible in some places for several miles along the surface, eight feet in width, crowded together in such close proximity that it is difficult to find a square mile without indications sufficient to establish workings. Lead mines, giving 86 per cent. of pure lead. Fish abounds on the coast and in the estuaries.

Although the territorial extent of the colony is great, the population is still extremely limited. There is room for many thousands of enterprising settlers. Several gentlemen of capital from South Australia, finding the grazing country so much superior to what they had imagined, have within the last five years become denizens of Western Australia, and have taken up sheep runs in the southern districts, thus utilising lands which our own settlers have hitherto allowed to remain unproductive. Others have taken their flocks northward, to the Nickol Bay country. Between Roebuck Bay and Nickol Bay, nearly two millions of acres of first-class pastoral land have been recently discovered. The grasses here have a peculiarly succulent character, and are found to remain nutritious even after a drought of eighteen months.

There is a great extent of unoccupied country on the eastern side of the colony, recently opened by Mr. H. M. Lefroy and Mr. Hunt. Water is abundant at a few feet below the surface, and the feed in summer was at least of average quality.

TIMBER AND WOODS.—The principal timber-trees of this colony are of the Eucalyptus or Myrtle family. Amongst the most generally useful of these is that commonly called mahogany, and by the natives jarrah. Of this wood it was stated some years ago by the late Admiral Sir James Stirling, before a Committee of the House of Commons, that there is sufficient to build twenty British navies. None of the neighbouring colonies possess timber of similar character to the jarrah, or endowed with equally valuable properties. If cut at the proper season, *when the sap is down* (a precaution too little attended to), it will be found to be the most enduring of all woods. On this condition it defies decay; time, weather, water, the white ant, and the sea worm have no effect upon it. Specimens were forwarded to the Melbourne Exhibition of portions of wood which had been nearly thirty years partly under water and partly out. Others had been used as posts, and for the same period buried in the sand, where the white ant destroys in a few weeks every other kind of wood. For this peculiar property the jarrah is now much sought after for railway sleepers and telegraph posts in India and the colonies. It is admirably adapted for dock-gates, piles, and other purposes, and for keel-pieces, kelsons, and other heavy timber in shipbuilding. Vessels of considerable burthen are built entirely of this wood, the peculiar properties of which render copper sheathing unnecessary, although the sea-worm is most abundant in these waters. Another most valuable kind of timber is a variety of white gum, called Toorat—close-grained, not to be split, very hard, and capable of enduring a great amount of heat without rending. It is used for keels, capstans, windlasses, naves of wheels, &c., also in the engine rooms of steam-vessels, liable to exposure or great heat. Both toorat and jarrah

were used to a small extent in the construction of one of H.M. ships, the *Hannibal*, and the former wood especially met with high encomiums from the Admiralty surveyors. The Bluegum, which grows in immense forests, and attains a vast height and size, to the southward of Cape Leuwin, is allied to the toorat, and quite distinct from the Tasmanian one. A splendid field for capital will be found in these magnificent timber forests, and every inducement is offered by the local Government for its introduction. The license-fees are merely nominal; labour is cheap and abundant (although of a rough kind), and the chief difficulty at present experienced is the high price of freight. The Sandalwood of Western Australia has long proved a most valuable export, in large quantities, to Singapore and China. The Raspberry-jam, a species of acacia, has an agreeable scent, and is well adapted for cabinet purposes. The Casuarina, or Sheaoak, is remarkable for its numerous large bars of radial fibre, which render it difficult to be split in the direction of its circumference, and it shrinks the least of any wood in the direction of its radius. The sheaoak is used not only for shingles, but for axe-handles, spokes, and felloes, &c.; the Morell for shafts, &c. Both the white and blue gums are so hard as to be used for tramways. The "Eucalyptus Marginata," commonly called mahogany from its similarity to the wood from Honduras and the West Indies, is applicable for every purpose for which ornamental wood can be required, some of it being of the very finest grain and showing much figure, mottled curls, feathers, and excrescences—a feature peculiar to colonial wood, and highly effective in point of ornament. While it is highly adapted for ornamental purposes, it is no less valuable as a timber for heavy work, where strength, durability, and the property of resisting the attacks of the "white ant" and "Teredo navalis" are necessary. Thus for timbers of all kinds for houses, warehouses, wharves, jetties, bridges, &c., it is invaluable. For piles it should be used whole (not cut into quarters), either round or hewn; the former is preferable, there being very little sap,

and the outside portion of the heartwood is stronger by far than the inner portions, near the centre; hence the desirability of keeping the annular rings complete. This timber is moreover subject to the peculiarity of being defective at heart, and although the sound timber does resist the teredo and white ant, the heart and defective portions do not. Hence the importance of keeping the outer annular rings intact, for neither of these insects will touch the sound wood.

MINERALS.—There is an inexhaustible quantity of iron ore in this province. A bar reduced from magnetic iron ore taken from Darling range of ironstone hills was some time ago proved in conjunction with one of iron of commerce and one of Swedish, both the latter being reduced from flat iron to assimilate them. The result was a deflexion of about five to eight in favour of Western Australian iron. Gold has not yet been discovered in the province, but copper is found in profusion, and the ore exceedingly rich in quality. For want of capital, however, but little has been done in mining operations. Private individuals engaged in various other pursuits cannot conveniently carry on works requiring a large amount of capital. Such works must be undertaken by companies especially devoted to the object. By-and-by, no doubt, capitalists will be found to direct their attention towards the Champion Bay district, and mining operations will be carried on with vigour and success. The Geraldine lead mines are also extremely valuable. Large quantities of ore have been taken, varying in richness from seventy to eighty-six per cent. of pure lead.

WINES.—The vine flourishes here in the utmost luxuriance. In every variety of soil—in sand, in marl, and limestone—it appears equally at home. There are, however, as yet few vineyards; two or three only being from ten to thirty acres in extent, but many of them are annually increasing in size. The wine produced is all consumed in the colony, and usually the same year in which it is made. There are not many casks of wine four years old. It is

therefore scarcely fair to pronounce it of any character at present, but beyond doubt the *promise* of excellence in quality is very great. The fruitage every year is most abundant. No ill treatment from inexperienced hands prevents the vine in this climate from yielding a large crop of grapes. The wine produced, although so new, is greatly preferred to the adulterated mixtures commonly imported.

HORSES AND CATTLE.—Horses form an item of export to Singapore, Madras, and Calcutta. The voyage to these ports is easy, and usually rapid. The colony is admirably adapted for horse-breeding. Most of the country is also well adapted for cattle.

SYNOPSIS OF THE LAND REGULATIONS OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

The Land Regulations of Western Australia are extremely "liberal," more so indeed than those of any other Australian colony. All lands, except town and suburban, and those in the north and east districts, are included in Class A and B. Lands in Class A are occupied for depasturing purposes under annual licenses, at a rental of 2s. per 100 acres, and no license fee. Lands in class B are leased for eight years, at an annual rental of £5 per 1,000 acres, but any number may be granted to the same person. In both classes the existing occupier has a preferable claim for the renewal of his lease or license. Leases are granted without competition to the first *bonâ fide* applicant. During the first year of a lease a homestead may be selected and reported for approval at the rate of two acres for every 100 acres in the run. A lessee has the exclusive right of purchasing within any such homestead during the first three years of his lease. During the first year he has a pre-emptive right of purchase, at 10s. per acre, over the whole of the run,

and at all times he has a claim for compensation for improvements on any part which may be sold.

The agricultural regulations are worthy of special notice, including as they do the liberal principles of "deferred payment" and "free selection before survey." Lands are let for tillage purposes on eight years' leases, but no lease to contain more than 320 acres, but any number granted to the same person. The terms are an annual rental of 1s. per acre, with a right to purchase at 10s. per acre at any time during the lease. All waste lands are available for tillage, but no lease is granted in Class B except with the consent of the lessee of the run.

Country lands, Class A, are sold at a fixed price of 10s. per acre to the first applicant, and town and suburban lands are disposed of by auction; upset price of the former £5 to £10 per lot, and the latter £1 to £3 per acre.

Lands supposed to contain minerals are sold to the first applicant at a fixed price of £3 per acre, payable by annual instalments of 20s. Prospecting licenses are granted at the rate of 3s. per acre, and mining leases of not less than eighty nor more than 160 acres, are granted for 10 years at 8s. per acre.

No finer opening is presented anywhere to the pioneer settler than in the North districts of the colony; the country has been proved to be first class, and the regulations offer the greatest facilities for settlement. The lands are divided into Class A for annual license, and Class C for more extended occupation. Class A comprise all land within two miles of the sea-coast, and Class C the remainder. Class A is let on depasturing license at an annual rent of 5s. per 1,000 acres for each of the first four years, and 10s. per 1,000 acres for each of the second four years. No fee on Class A license. Permission is granted for taking up land in these districts, valid for twelve months from date. On any quantity of stock, not less than 200 breeding sheep, or 100 of great stock, reaching the district, they and their natural increase will be allowed free pasturage over the unappropriated Crown

lands during time of permission. During said term the person named in the permission will be entitled to select a run of 100,000 acres, which, on the Governor's approval, will be assigned to the applicant free of rent for three years. Such selection may include land in both classes, A and C. At any time within three years the whole or any part of the run may be selected by the lessee for lease or license, in blocks not exceeding 20,000 acres each. Class C Lands thus selected will be let for eight years, chargeable with rent, same as class A, and a fee of £5 at commencement of lease. In all other respects the regulations are equally liberal. No capital, it will be noticed, is required for taking up land, while labour is cheap—men's wages, per month, from 30s. to £3 with rations.

BRIEF CHRONICLE OF OCCURRENCES & EVENTS

FROM OCTOBER 1, 1867, TO SEPTEMBER, 1868.

[Under the above head the most remarkable events of the Colony since its foundation have been published from year to year in the ALMANACK. The following notes are given as a continuation of the Colony's history.]

1867:

OCTOBER.—North Fremantle Bridge finished. This Bridge spans the River Swan, near Fremantle, and is 954 feet long and $46\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide.....Large quantities of gum exported to England and Melbourne, the yield being greater than in any previous year. Equinoctial gales set in on the 11th, accompanied with an extensive fall of rain, causing the rivers in the Southern districts to overflow,

and doing damage to life and property.....Perth Horticultural Society's Exhibition held on the 16th.....The new harbour, Port Eucla, situated near the south-east boundary of Western Australia, in latitude 31deg. 43min. 27sec. S., longitude 128deg. 52min. 44sec. E., attracts the attention of the Government and the colonists. The country in the neighbourhood is represented as valuable, both as regards pastoral capabilities and native productions.....Dr. Müller, the well-known Government botanist of Melbourne, visits King George's Sound.....Announcement made in the *Government Gazette* of the acceptance of the resignations of Messrs. J. W. Hardey, E. Hamersley, and L. Samson, as members of the Legislative Council.....William Blower, a man in the employ of Mr. Liddelow, on the Canning, drowned in a most singular manner. Whilst engaged in washing sheep, he was attacked by a ram, which inflicted such severe injuries upon him, that before assistance could be rendered, he was drowned.....Severe gale at Dardanup. The wind was so violent that it blew down some trees in a paddock, killing a valuable milch cow.....A settler named Wheetman drowned when crossing the Blackwood River.....Sheep shearing delayed by continued wet weather... Revenue of quarter, £18,035; expenditure, £26,302..... The foundation-stone of a new Wesleyan Church in Perth laid by His Excellency Governor Hampton, on the 24th. The style of this building is Early English; its dimensions are 94 by 45 feet; the tower, which will be surmounted with a spire, will be 100 feet from the ground-floor..... The annual show of stock of the Victoria Agricultural and District Society held at Geraldton on the 16th.....By a return compiled by the Secretary to the Board of Education, the number of Government schools on the 30th Sept. was shown to be 41, and the average number of scholars 1,405.

NOVEMBER.—Much disappointment expressed at the circumstance of the Duke of Edinburgh not visiting Western Australia in the *Galatea*, which arrived at Adelaide on the 29th October.....The 12th instant was

one of the most noted gala-days ever witnessed in Western Australia, on the occasion of opening the new Perth and Helena bridges by His Excellency Governor Hampton—a ceremony which had been for some time delayed in expectation that the Duke of Edinburgh might be present. The weather was favourable, and never before did the colonists assemble in larger numbers, or witness a gayer scene. The Perth bridge (or rather bridges) spans three distinct channels of the River Swan, and is rather more than three quarters of a mile in length. The Helena bridge is 1600 feet in length, and is a fine structure. Both bridges are built of Jarrah timber.....Much indignation expressed at an attempt made by the Government of South Australia to include Port Eucla in their territory... An important concession made to tillage leaseholders to extend their leases, under favourable conditions, for a period of eight years.....The first free election of unofficial members of the Legislative Council takes place in various parts of the colony. The following members were returned:—Perth, Mr. J. G. C. Carr; Fremantle, Mr. Walter Bateman; Eastern Districts, Mr. S. P. Phillips; Swan, Victoria Plains, &c., Messrs. Hardey and Brockman; Southern Districts, Mr. James Lee Steere.....Grand fête given in the Government Domain to the school children of all denominations—nearly 2000 in number. The entertainment was given to make amends for the disappointment of the scholars at the non-arrival of the *Galatea*, they having been trained to sing the National Anthem on the expected arrival of Prince Alfred in that vessel.....Scab-Inspectors appointed for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Scab-in-Sheep ordinance.

DECEMBER.—The well-known coaster *Favorite*, one of the oldest vessels engaged in our colonial trade, belonging to Messrs. Bateman, wrecked at Port Gregory..... Arrangements being made for shipping flour to England... Several rare and valuable plants introduced from Melbourne by Mr. Carey—among them, the quinine-tree, mango, tamarind, coffee-plant, tea-plant, Chinese yam, &c.....A

post-office established at Brookton.....Medals received by exhibitors of Western Australian products at the Melbourne Exhibition.....Another expedition to the North-east territory projected by the York Agricultural Society.....A railway or tramway between Perth and Chauncy's Springs—the latter place to form the terminus for the Eastern districts—prominently brought forward.....Price of flour, £15 per ton.

1868.

JANUARY.—Great commotion amongst boat-owners in Perth and Fremantle in fitting out for the Pearl-shell fishery at Nickol Bay.....An orphanage for destitute children established by the Sisters of Mercy.....The last convict ship *Hougoumont* arrived on the 10th with 279 convicts; transportation to Western Australia consequently terminates from this date.....Jam-wood prepared by Mr. G. Throssell for export to Melbourne.....Sandalwood-nuts, which contain a large quantity of a valuable essential-oil, also collected for export.....A fleet of about ten boats start for the pearl-shell fishery at Nickol Bay.

FEBRUARY.—H.M.S. *Brisk*, 16 guns, arrives from Sydney, at the request of Governor Hampton, in consequence of some apprehension of a possible outbreak among the Fenian convicts recently arrived in the *Hougoumont*.....Five valuable blood mares introduced by Mr. W. Burges from Ireland.....A co-operative society established at Albany.....Bi-monthly mail established between Perth and Champion Bay.....The W. A. Turf Club arrange that the Western Australian Races for 1869 should come off on the 31st March and 1st April.....A meeting to promote the establishment of Representative Government held at Perth on the 21st instant.....The Western Australian Races come off on the 19th and 20th, the winning horses being, for the Maiden Plate, Mr. Ougden's Minnie Grey; Town Plate and Queen's Plate, Mr. D. Macpherson's Annie Laurie; Publicans' Purse and Ladies' Purse, Dr.

Attfield's Bushman; Volunteer Plate and Settlers' Stakes, Mr. Lockyer's Erin; Red Hart Stakes, Mr. S. E. Burges' Red Hart; Haek Race, Mr. J. Lockyer's Young Stirling.

MARCH.—H.M.S. *Brisk* leaves Fremantle for Sydney on the 1st instant.....Large number of horses sent to India in the *Hougoumont* and *Tartar*.....By a Post-office Return, it is shown that the number of accounts opened with the Savings Bank up to 31st December, 1867, was 1,567, and the amount of money deposited, £32,358. The amount withdrawn since its establishment in 1863, was £21,300. A Protestant orphanage, similar to that of the Sisters of Mercy, established in Perth, chiefly through the instrumentality of the Ven. Archdeacon Brown.....Between seven and eight tons of pearl-shells brought in one vessel (the *Albert*) from Nickol Bay.

APRIL.—Constable Griffis and two others murdered by natives at Nickol Bay.....The master of the brig *Sea Nymph* fined £100 for a breach of the Quarantine Laws... A colonial Marine Insurance Company proposed to be formed at Fremantle.....A large meeting, at which the Governor presided, was held at Perth on the 24th instant, for the purpose of expressing indignation at the attempted assassination of Prince Alfred in Sydney. An Address of sympathy for the Queen, and one of congratulation to His Royal Highness, were drawn up, to be forwarded through the Governor.....A tramway company formed at Dungarra, and the work of laying a line from the beach to Denison proposed.

MAY.—First Race meeting on the Canning takes place on the 6th instant.....The Colonial Marine Insurance Company formed at Fremantle, with a capital of £10,000.....Mr. Compton arrives from Calcutta to procure railway sleepers; a contract made with Mr. B. Mason to supply the first shipment, 20,000.....Her Majesty's birthday celebrated on the 28th.....Arrangements being actively made for the reception of two companies of the 14th Regiment from Tasmania.

JUNE.—A meeting held in Perth, at the instigation of Mr. W. Burges, to consider a proposal for placing a steamship on the coast.....H.M.S. *Virago* arrives from Hobart Town on the 4th instant with a detachment of the 14th Regt.....Severe gales felt on the coast.....A Telegraph Company projected, to establish, in the first instance, a line between Perth and Fremantle..... The Working Men's Association and Mechanics' Institute at Fremantle amalgamated.....The schooner *Emily* wrecked on the coast to the north of Fremantle, and all the lives on board lost.....New orders of Council received from England.....Post Office established at Minninup.

JULY....The cutter *Albatross* wrecked near the Irwin, and eight persons drowned. The ship *Northumberland* foundered near King George's Sound.....A botanic garden proposed to be formed in Perth.....A Working Men's Literary Society formed at Geraldton.....The brig *Sea Nymph* driven ashore at Fremantle..... A tramway proposed to be laid between Guildford and the Eastern Districts.....A Co-operative Society inaugurated at Newcastle.

AUGUST.—Post Office receiving pillars erected in the City.....Confirmatory news received of the loss of the schooner *Emily* near Eglinton Rocks, and the body of one of the seamen found.....Two boys, named Parnham, aged six and eight years, drowned in the River Swan... A new lead mine—the Womboura—opened in the Champion Bay district.....Increased activity in the timber trade on the Canning, and a steam saw mill erected by Mr. B. Mason at his station in that district.....A Friendly Union Benefit Society formed at Fremantle.

SEPT.—The blocking of the sandy portion of King George's Sound road (about $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles) completed, and opened for traffic....Trepang fishing commenced on the Northern coast; as also whale-fishery by Mr. Dempster.Intelligence received of the appointment of Sir Benjamin Pine as Governor of Western Australia.

INLAND LETTERS.—For transmission between separate Post-Towns within Western Australia—Under half an ounce, two pence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, four pence; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, three-pence additional.

SHIP LETTERS.—On letters transmitted out of the Colony by Sea to destination, or to nearest port beyond the Colony, as opportunity occurs—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, one shilling additional.

The above rates must be fully pre-paid by stamps, or the letters will be detained.

FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.—Via Southampton.—Under half an ounce, sixpence; exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, one shilling; and for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, one shilling additional.

VIA MARSEILLES.—Not exceeding half an ounce, 10d.; above half an ounce and not exceeding 1 ounce, 1s. 8d.; above one ounce and not exceeding 2 ounces, 3s. 4d.; above 2 ounces and not exceeding 3 ounces, 5s.; every ounce additional, 1s. 8d.

CONDITIONS.—To be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides.

Except the name and address of the person to whom sent there must be no other word or communication, letter, character, figure, or number written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted.

Newspapers received from beyond seas (except newspapers received direct from France or foreign countries by way of France) will be delivered to their original address free of charge, but if re-posted in the Colony, one penny each must be prepaid. All Newspapers re-posted are liable to a fresh rate of postage. Newspapers sent to any Post Office, and unclaimed, must be returned to the General Post Office, Perth, at the expiration of thirty days.

No book packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

The System of Registration is applicable to all descriptions of Letters, &c. without distinction. Letters intended to be registered must have stamps to the amount of eightpence affixed thereon by way of postage, and posted an hour before the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded. A statement of the hours of closing the mails is kept affixed on some exterior part of each Post Office in order to avoid the frequent occurrence of letters being put in after the departure of the mails; but late letters are received till within five minutes of the despatch of any Inland Mails, and till within a quarter of an hour of the despatch of any Ship Mails, if as a fee thereon, stamps to the value of sixpence be affixed to a Ship Letter, and stamps to the value of twopence be affixed to an Inland Letter, in addition to the stamp or stamps required for the ordinary postage.

Any depositor, wishing to withdraw money which he has deposited, can apply to the nearest Post Office Savings' Bank for a printed form of application. He must fill up the form in the manner pointed out in printed Regulations, and send the application to the General Post Office, Perth. By the return mail he will receive a warrant from Perth, which will enable him to get his money at the Post Office named by him.

On all goods, wares, or merchandize, not otherwise charged with a specific duty, 7 per cent. according to invoice value.

GOODS FREE OF DUTY.—Animals (living), bread and biscuit, bales for wool, bags and sacks, books, not being account; bottles (glass and stone) imported full, bran; bullion and other coin, baggage (personal) of emigrants; coals, coke, and other fuel; corn and other grain, flour and meal; implements of machinery (agricultural); meats (salted, cured, and preserved) except bacon and hams; machinery for mills, including millstones; maps and charts; oatmeal; pumps and other apparatus for raising water; pictures; prints and statuary; plants, seeds, and bulbs; provisions or stores (military or naval) required for the use of Her Majesty's service; pulse, rice, staves and hoops for casks; specimens of natural history; uniforms and appointments (naval, military, and civil), imported by officers stationed in this colony for their own use; goods specially exempted by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council.

PACKET LICENSES.—For every packet license, £10.

AUCTIONEERS' LICENSES.—For Perth or Fremantle, £10 per annum; for any other part of the colony, £5 per annum. A temporary license may be issued to a licensed auctioneer to sell by his clerk (or other deputy) for one day on payment of £1 1s.

DOG LICENSES.—For each dog kept within a townsite, 7s. 6d.; bitch do. 10s.; for each dog not kept within a townsite, 5s.; bitch do. 7s. 6d.; for each dog tending sheep or cattle, 2s. 6d.; bitch do, 5s.; for each pack of hounds *bonâ fide* kept in kennel exclusively for hunting, £1.; for transferring a license, 2s. 6d. To keep a cow in townsite, 5s.; calf, 2s. 6d.

TIMBER LICENSES.—For any quantity of land not exceeding 640 acres, £20 per annum; exceeding 640 acres and not exceeding 1280 acres, £40 per annum; or 10s. a month for a pair of sawyers.

RENT ON BONDED STORES.—For every pipe, butt, tierce, or puncheon, 6d. per week; for every half-pipe or hhd., 3d. do; for every barrel, qr-cask, half-tierce, keg, case of tobacco, and cases of wine above 2 gallons, 2d. do.; for octaves, and all small packages, 1d. do.; sugar, per ton, 1s.; tea, per ton, 1s.; do. per chest, 1d.; cigars, per thousand, 1d.

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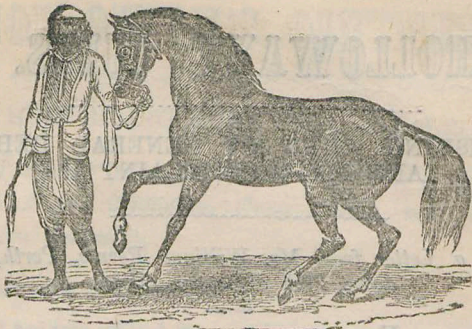


