BREAK IN AT WAROONA PHARMACY

Thieves used an angle grinder to remove a padlock, jemmied the door and kicked out the glass and mesh from the main door in order to gain entry to Waroona Pharmacy at 2am on Tuesday.

Their activities were recorded on the in-store surveillance camera as well as on the main street cameras. They evidently used the bushes growing in front of the shop to hide their activities.

A small quantity of medication was stolen during the burglary, but the perpetrators must have been disappointed as very little medication is kept on the premises.

Security officers and police were promptly on the scene, preventing further damage.

Cameras showed cars and trucks passing during the robbery and police would appreciate any members of the public who witnessed any suspicious behaviour to report the matter on 9733 7400. The car believed to be involved is a dark blue Holden Commodore station wagon.

It is believed measures will be taken to remove the shrubs from the front of the Pharmacy.

Only 68.2 mm of rain was recorded in May over 10 days. Most of this came over two short rainy periods at the end of the month.

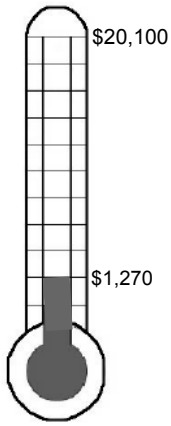
This is well below the average of 143.4 mm.

WINTER SPRINKLER BAN.

Perth-Mandurah and the South West region are now subject to a total winter sprinkler ban and a fine will be imposed for infringement.

The winter sprinkler ban applies to all scheme and bore water users. This follows a successful two-month trial ban during July and August last year with an estimated 2.2 billion litres of water saved – equivalent to filling 880 Olympic-sized pools.

Water Minister, Dr Graham Jacobs, appealed to households and businesses to embrace the permanent

ban with enthusiasm, pointing out the city had just experienced its hottest and driest summer on record. "Last year's trial was definitely a success, with an independent survey indicating 93 per cent community support", the Minister said.

Dr Jacobs said feedback showed bore users needed to be able to regularly operate bores for short period for maintenance. This would be permitted under new by-laws.

SENIOR PET MONTH: IS YOUR PET AGED 7 OR OLDER?

Now the colder weather has finally kicked in, it is important to take extra care of older pets. Most pets are considered seniors once they are 7 or older.

Diet: As your pet ages their nutritional needs change. Warning signs of these problems include bad breath, sleeping more, increased urinating and drinking, and changes in weight and behaviour. A senior diet should contain higher levels of antioxidants, high-quality protein, essential fatty acids, vitamins, minerals, and optimum levels of fibre. Even if you don't use a premium food (like Hills or Advance), most supermarket foods have formulations specifically for mature or senior pets.

Teeth: Tartar build-up and gingivitis are common problems in nearly all senior dogs and cats. Dental disease not only causes bad breath, but pain and discomfort when eating and can also cause heart or kidney disease (from spread of bacteria from the gums into the bloodstream). To help prevent dental disease feed raw bones 2-3 times a week or consider switching to a

specialised oral care diet (e.g. Hills t/d). You should check your pet's teeth on a regular basis for yellow or brown stains or redness in the gums or bleeding. If any of these symptoms are apparent or there is a strong unpleasant odour you should consider a dental check-up.

Lumps: Senior pets commonly develop lumps in older age. Some lumps like cysts, warts and lipoma (fatty lumps) are not life threatening and can be easy to deal with. However, there are cancers that can also cause skin lumps. It is recommended that if you find any lump on your pet you should get it checked by a vet. It is important to take note of when a lump first appeared and whether it has changed at all over time (especially if it has grown a lot in a short period of time).

Remember, symptoms of old age diseases are often only evident once there has been significant internal damage, so don't wait until your pet has visible warning signs before switching to a senior diet and scheduling a veterinary health check.

FAST FACTS ON SENIOR PETS

- * Pets become senior citizens at around the age of seven years.
- * A seven year old pet is equivalent to a 50 year old person.
- * Switching to a food specially formulated for mature 7+ can slow down the development of old age diseases.
- * Mature adult pets are at a higher risk of diseases including arthritis, kidney

disease and canine brain ageing (doggie Alzheimer's).

- * Well cared for pet dogs can live on average between 10 and 15 years, and cats slightly longer, about 13 to 15 years. (However we routinely see 18+ year old cats!)
- * One of the oldest cats recorded, Ma, lived to 34 years.
- * The oldest recorded dog, an Australian cattle dog called Bluey, lived to 29 years.
- * Disease is detected in 23% of 7+ pets that have a senior health check, even though they appear healthy.
- * Veterinarians recommend that mature adult pets have a veterinary check up every six months. Six months is the equivalent of 3 to 4 years in your pet's life.

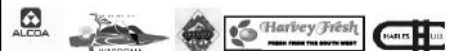

Approval was given to an application for planning consent for a dwelling in Styles Road, Preston Beach, subject to conditions, including demolishing an existing building.

It is proposed to set up a not-for-profit respite facility for people with handicaps such as Down's Syndrome and Autism Spectrum Disorder in Haub Road, Lake Clifton. Council resolved to approve the application subject to all relevant approvals and consents from government agencies being obtained prior to commencement and various other conditions being met.

An application to operate a Bed and Breakfast facility at Preston Beach was discussed. Approval was granted. No more than four guests are to be accommodated at any one time and no more than two guest vehicles shall be contained on site. A number of other conditions are also to be met.

The Dept. of Environment & Conservation are permitted to fence, undertake weed control and rehabilitate reserve adjacent to SW Highway.

A "farm manager's dwelling" has been approved for a property on Hall Road, Waroona.

Planning consent was sought for the placement of a mobile food van, to sell seafood, on a lot adjacent to SW Highway, between the Tourist Centre and a truck and parking bay. This was approved for use on Saturdays and Sundays only and the applicant is to obtain Water Corp agreement as the lot is presently owned by them.

The Waroona St John Ambulance requested Council approval to construct a new ambulance sub-centre on a portion of the reserve on Fouracre Street. Council supports this application in principal subject to approval to enter into a lease agreement for the land, between the Shire of Waroona and St John Assoc of WA, by State Land Services.

The Shire President and the CEO are to sign and seal the Financial Assistance Agreement for a Royalties for Regions project – Country Local Government Fund Planning Component - contribution towards development of a Forward Capital Works Plan. It is recommended that the Shire apply for a total of \$28,000 under the scheme being \$20,000 towards hiring a consultant to produce the required plan, and \$8000 being for staff costs associated with the production of the plan.

TO CULL OR TO RELOCATE?

The recent culling of kangaroos at the Preston Beach Golf Club has caused quite a lot of publicity both locally and throughout the state.

There are many golf clubs within the Peel Region and a number of them participated in a survey by the Murray Coastal Times on how they handled their kangaroo problem.

Meadow Springs Golf Club has upward of 200 kangaroos and this is expected to increase as more bushland in the area is developed. A spokesperson for the developer said about 190 roos had been relocated to reserves in the South West in the past three years.

Mandurah Country Club is home to about 50 kangaroos which are



measured by members. The only time their kangaroos are a problem is at mating time. Members actually patrol the Club's boundaries to ensure the kangaroos do not stray on to nearby roads.

Pinjarra golf course manager commented that kangaroos were not a problem on the course but that she was

tr in favour of relocation rather than culling.

Evidently there is one resident kangaroo at Secret Harbour who seems to be quite happy in his isolation.

A spokesperson from The Cut golf course in Dawsville declined to comment.

Whilst there are plenty of kangaroos on Waroona golf course they have a clear outlet to the forest in the east and are rarely seen during playing times.

It seems that on most courses the kangaroos are an asset and even an attraction to visitors.

TEAM EFFORT PAYS OFF FOR \$13.9M REDEVELOPMENT OF HARVEY HOSPITAL

After years of broken promises made by successive Governments, money has now been allocated to commence a \$13.9 million refurbishment of the Harvey Hospital, a very pleased Member for Murray-Wellington Murray Cowper said.

\$800,000 has been allocated in the State Government's budget for planning to commence immediately on a major refurbishment of the 75 year old building, due for completion in 2014.

The redevelopment of Harvey Hospital will include a new emergency unit, refurbished in-patient care, an ambulatory service and GP clinics.

"After the disappointing closure of the Yarloop Hospital three and a half years ago, it has taken persistent lobbying of the Health Minister, Treasurer and the Premier to get this project up," Mr Cowper said.

Mr Cowper admitted, "Last year's budget was a disappointment, prompting me to write to the Premier, detailing concerns on behalf of my constituents."

"I also had a chance to bend the Premier's ear when he visited Harvey in October last year," he added.

"The Harvey Hospital was my number one priority in the Murray-Wellington electorate", Mr Cowper said.

"If it were not for the fantastic support from my federal colleague, Nola Marino, we may have been still waiting."

The Federal MP for Forrest Nola Marino said "The timing could not have been better. Murray and I are meeting next week with the Board of Hocart Lodge and the Harvey Shire. This great announcement will also create options for planning for our age care facilities in Harvey."

GIVE PEEL INFILL SEWERAGE PRIORITY

Unreliable and outdated sewerage tanks sitting in backyards throughout the Peel Region may soon be obsolete. Speaking in Parliament Canning MP Don Randall said long suffering Dawesville, Falcon, Mandurah, Waroona and Pinjarra homeowners would be relieved that the Infill Sewerage Program was back on the State Government's agenda.

The Premier's Budget announced that \$100 million will be committed to the Infill Sewerage Program over the coming four years. Mr Randall said he

had written to the Minister for Water calling for 1,800 Canning households in 13 locations to be listed as a priority for connection. He has urged the Minister to formally cost and accommodate local infill projects from the funds set aside in the forward estimates. A newly established Steering Committee is to reconsider the outdated infill sewerage series and re-rank priority locations on the basis of health and environmental need.

Most of the Canning homes deferred under the program lie between the river and the estuaries, posing grave risks of raw sewerage run off which must weigh heavily in the rankings. The Peel Region is home to rivers, estuaries and world acclaimed heritage listed wetlands. If action is not taken these picturesque areas could be left swimming in sewerage and local governments left without the infrastructure needed to accommodate the growing population.

The response to Mr Randall's survey of affected areas earlier this year showed overwhelming support for connection.

WHAT'S IN A NAME - HAUB STREET, LAKE CLIFTON

The Haub name was well known in the early days of settlement between the Harvey River and Lake Clifton. When Rudolph Haub, an engineer from Germany, arrived in WA via Sydney after immigrating sometime in the 1880s, he sent for his wife and two children, after selecting land near old Charla Downs. The railway ended at Pinjarra so he brought her to the rough living accommodation by horse and buggy – a full day's journey.

The couple had four children. Around 1907 Rudolph left the family and returned to Germany. His wife, Augusta, later moved to Waroona and completed raising the family.

Their eldest son, Otto farmed near Lake Clifton. In December 1919, on the shores of the lake, he was shot and killed by Robert Pahl, a farmer whose holding was on the Harvey River about 8km from the shooting site. There had been ill feeling between the two men for some time over various matter,

among them the difference of opinion on duck shooting and the depredations of Haub's wandering sheep on Pahl's 'cultivation patch'.

There was apparently, at that time, a market in Perth for wild ducks and Robert Pahl used to regularly shoot wildfowl on Lake Clifton for this purpose. Otto Haub was against this and would shoot into the air or water nearby to cause the ducks to take wing if he spotted Pahl ready for a shoot. Tempers flared one day when Otto and Robert met face to face by the lake shore and the resulting shootout ended in Otto's death from gunshot wounds to the chest.

Robert Pahl was caught in Perth and at his trial, where he pleaded not guilty on the grounds of insanity at the time crime was committed, he was sentenced to be 'kept in strict custody in Fremantle gaol until His Majesty's pleasure is known'. He remained in custody about 10 years.

A FALLOUT FROM ASH

The consequence of the erupting volcano in Iceland has been enormous disruption and discomfort, especially throughout Europe. Even so, death and disability directly due to the falling ash has been remarkably rare. Not so rare are the serious health problems associated with the manufacture of ash from smoking tobacco.

There would hardly be a man, woman or even child in Australia who doesn't know about the dangers of smoking.

In Australia, there are still more male smokers than female, however, amongst teenagers, more girls smoke than boys. This, sadly, seems to be a worldwide trend. Women now comprise 20% of the world's one billion smokers. The problem has now reached such proportions that the World Health Organization (WHO) has given overdue recognition to this epidemic of tobacco smoking amongst women with the theme this year for World No Tobacco Day (31 May) "Gender and Tobacco" and an emphasis on the way cigarettes are marketed to women.

Protecting women from a lifetime of dependence on nicotine can stop the increasing prevalence amongst women of crippling and often fatal heart attacks, strokes, cancers and lung diseases.

We know that smoking is most likely the greatest single preventable cause of death

and disease in the world. Even passive smoking - inhaling someone else's second hand smoke - is a major problem. So why would anyone still be a smoker?

Well, there are probably many reasons why people begin to smoke - peer pressure is a particularly relevant factor in young women - and the reality is, once you start smoking it's mighty hard to stop. Nearly two thirds of smokers would like to stop smoking, but fewer than 1 in 20 people who try to quit will actually remain non-smokers after three months.

Up until recently, it was thought that stopping smoking completely - either cold turkey or with the help of nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) - was the best way to ensure becoming a long term non-smoker. But this "quick stop" method doesn't suit everyone.

The "cut down then stop" (CDTS) method has now been given the official seal of approval. Evidence has shown that reducing the number of cigarettes smoked with the assistance of NRT, makes it easier for some heavily addicted smokers to ultimately quit completely.

Also, the simultaneous use of more than one nicotine replacement therapy product used not to be considered appropriate. But experience has shown that some smokers who continue to have cravings

with single therapy, or those who have quit in the past and then relapsed, will benefit and become long term quitters by using the patches and gum together.

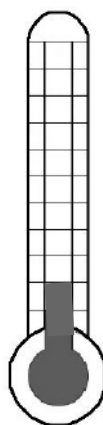
