





The antimicrobial and wound-healing properties of all honeys are due to honey's very high sugar content, which forces water out of bacterial cells, and honey's natural acidity which inhibits the growth of most bacteria. Honey contains a special enzyme called glucose oxidase, which breaks down glucose (sugars) found in the honey itself into hydrogen peroxide, well-known disinfectant. а This chemical reaction is naturally activated when it comes into contact with the moisture from the wound. However, not all honeys are created equal; Manuka honey is well known for its special healing properties and is the honey of choice for medical purposes. Honey

has been found to have some very beneficial effects on wounds:

- Attracts and stimulates the proliferation and activation of white blood cells
- Inhibits microbial growth antibacterial
- Protects the wound
- Draws lymph into the wound, providing nutrition and decreasing wound swelling
- Provides a local source of energy for healing cells
- Provides antioxidants
- Provides a moist environment
- Accelerates sloughing of devitalized tissue
- Stimulates growth of new blood vessels and connective tissue
- Allows formation of a protective layer of protein over the wound


One honey on the veterinary market that we use is the PAW Manuka Wound Gel. It is a sterile medical grade wound dressing made from Leptospermum.sp (Manuka) honey (80%) and natural oils and waxes for wound management. It is ideal for dogs, cats, horses and other

companion animals with wounds, burns, grazes and as a general first aid. It is natural and non-toxic for animals and it is a non-adherent gel which reduces trauma at dressing change time.

How to use Manuka Honey

Grossly contaminated wounds should be lavaged thoroughly first with a sterile saline. Apply Manuka honey (approx. 3mm layer) directly to the wound or to a suitable dressing (e.g. on a gauze dressing under a bandage). Dressing change frequency will depend on clinical circumstances. It can vary from once per day for draining wounds to up to 7 days for unsoiled dressings. If wound exudate reaches the outer layer of the bandage, the dressing must be changed. Honey can be used on infected and necrotic wounds until healed. Cautions Honey is not recommended for use in body cavities or in heavily exudative wounds. In the event of a slow or non-responding wound, please seek veterinary advice.

<u>Lead Up To Anzac Day - ABROAD WITH THE A.I.F.</u> <u>A LETTER TO THE MAYOR of Bunbury</u>

With Anzac Day coming up shortly, I thought it appropriate to publish a letter from Lieutenant R.N. Walmsley in reply to a letter he had received from Mr J.T, Blair, the Mayor of Bunbury

"Your very welcome letter to hand. Many thanks. As you will probably know, I am at present in Egypt, having left Palestine some months ago. Like thousands of others, I have not yet seen any real action; the only danger as yet is attacks from the air, which do not prove very dangerous as a rule. Of course we do not take any chances. I note your remarks regarding Militia, but at the same time, in view of the situation in the Far East, Australia may want all her local resources trained for local defence measures. I fully agree with you that there are many who could I think do the job properly and join the A.I.F. I think your effort regarding the contribution scheme is very good and if you can reach your goal of up to £75 weekly, it will be a splendid effort. You remarked about me finding soldiering interesting. Well, since having my commission, I do like it very much better: naturally it makes a very big difference to one's personal comfort as well.

I will endeavour to write you something about these parts: On arriving here we were sent to Palestine, arriving there in February, very wet and cold. However we soon got used to tent conditions and started solid training. That country is really wonderful, after being in Egypt. Everywhere, one sees orange groves and fertile fields while wheat and various other cereals are grown. Cultivation is still being done under very crude conditions - in fact one would say primitive conditions. One sees a crudely made plow made out of a bent piece of wood being drawn by such weird combinations as a cow and a donkey, or a mule and a horse, or even a camel. Of course, Arabs are the main race of people and still follow the customs that have been theirs for centuries. As one travels along, it is quite a usual sight to see the 'lord and master' riding along on his ass, whilst his women trudge along behind carrying their worldly possessions, usually in baskets which they balance on their heads. In this way, they certainly can carry a great load and their poise under these loads would, I'm sure, make any of Bunbury's mannequins feel envious. As well as these people, there are a great number of Jewish people who also do a lot of farming but under very much more modern methods.

They really are doing very well and work under a co-operative system and pool all their produce in the one pool. I understand they are all quite happy and very satisfied. As regards the cities, Tel-Aviv is by far the largest, having a population of 900,000. Of this number, a great many are refugees from all parts of Europe. The city is very modern and can boast some very fine buildings. One could, however, describe it as a city of flats, for one hardly ever sees private houses.

After leaving this very fine city, the place of interest is Haifa. This city is not as large as Tel-Aviv but much more modern, it only really having been built as it is now, during the last ten years. From Mt. Carmel, which is about 2,000 feet above sea level, one can command a wonderful view of the harbour and city. I understand that before the outbreak of war, this city was fast becoming a tourist resort. It caters on a very large scale for wealthy Europeans and judging by the very up-to-date hotels and flats, I can image it. All around this delightful city, one can see views of mountains (snow-clad) and other views that are really never to be forgotten. After leaving Haifa, we travel on over the historical 'Plains of Armageddon', which you will recall is stated to be the place where this war will end. This country is indeed a wonderful fertile plain and is farmed by Jews. On a portion of this plain, there is a 'Love Colony', where young Jewish people have a trial marriage. It seems to be very popular and is growing yearly. After travelling through this beautiful country, where one can see the hills and fruit trees of all kinds growing wild, we arrive at that wonderful old-world city of Jerusalem. Indeed one could write of this place for hours. It would require a man well-versed in biblical history to really do the various sights to be seen, justice. I saw such places as the Tomb of the Virgin Mary, the Church of Nativity, which was built by the Crusaders, the Garden of Gethsemane and further out, the Dead Sea and Jericho, all beautiful places and sights, never to be forgotten.

I am sorry that space does not permit me to describe more fully, but when I get a chance, will write again and tell you a little of Egypt".

With a little help from the students at Waroona District High School, the Coolup Land Conservation District Committee (LCDC) will continue a project to protect rare flora and Nationally listed TEC's. The National Landcare Program funded Community Environment Grant was awarded to Coolup LCDC in June last year to help build on weed management activities started in 2014 as part of the Bandicoot Brook Reserve Colleen restoration program. Archibald, NRM Support Officer, based at the Waroona Landcare

Centre provides the Coolup LCDC with guidance and support. A 68ha linear reserve of remnant vegetation, Bandicoot Brook Reserve provides an important linkage between the Murray River in the east and the Peel-Harvey Estuary in the west. The reserve is home to critically endangered clay pan

One of Western Australia's most important wetlands has been given a boost, with funding from the Peel-Harvey Catchment Council helping to

the fragile 🛒 protect environment Lake at Clifton. The PHCC has provided almost \$10,000 to the Lake Clifton-Herron Landcare Group through round two of their Community Environment Grants, enabling the group to carry out on-ground activities across a stretch of shoreline at the lake. The Lake Clifton-Herron Landcare group used some of the funds to carry

out a weed survey which is now informing a weed control programme which will take place shortly. A further \$15,730 of funding is committed through Phase two of the PHCC Community Environment grants, and will go towards implementing weed control at the site. *"The weed survey will also help inform an action plan for the lake, and this will need to be considered carefully to get the best result for future projects," Jenny Rose from the Lake Clifton-Herron Landcare Group said. Lake Clifton is one of the most valuable environmental sites in*

PHCC CEO Jane O'Malley said. Removing weeds will help clear the way for future planting programs to re-establish a native buffer of vegetation, which provides habitat for local and international implement strategic and effective weed control, encouraging native plant regeneration and improving the condition of the surrounding clay pan communities. Bandicoot Brook

Reserve is a perfect site for both education and community activities. The Waroona District High School Year 9 Bushranger's class have adopted the reserve as their study area. A Waroona Resident's Story

I am writing today to express my disgust and disappointment at the Shire of Waroona & Shire of Murray at their underhanded and bully-like tactics that they have chosen to undertake to treat Waroona Rate Payers, (citizens like myself who have lived in Waroona for over 30 years), with regards to bushfire readiness. I understand that we can all try to minimise the impact of a fire considering the catastrophic Waroona fires of Jan 2016 which I will never forget, but this is over the top and has become less about our welfare and more about these shires standing over the little people and intimidation, as well as capitalising on a disaster as far as I am concerned. Around mid-October 2017. I received a brochure from the Waroona Shire with which the headline read: "Firebreak Notice, Burning of Garden Refuse & Camp and Cooking Fires". As I do not own a large property that requires a firebreak and I don't burn off in summer and make camp fires, I didn't take that much notice of the brochure (and I know many other people within this shire that didn't) as I am usually inundated with brochures coming from everywhere, so I put it on my fridge and didn't think anything else of it. Then in mid-December I received a letter from the Murray Shire, with a \$250 fine with a very threatening penalty if I didn't pay it within 14 days, as they can then breach a person (on top of the fine) for failing to take no action by registering us with the Fines Enforcement Registery (FER) after which "your driver's licence may be suspended or cancelled; your details



may be published on a website; your vehicle may be immobilised or have its number plates removed; and your property may be seized and sold. If the matter is registered with FER additional costs will also be payable to you." This is utterly disgusting and I don't even see what this is supposed to be about aside from being some sort of stand-over tactic, all without even a warning first. Or I could choose to take the matter to court, which of course is not an option when a person is on a very low income and up against two shires that are using our massive land rates that we pay each year to fund a lawyer, and they have all their confusing regulations and stipulations that makes them basically untouchable. Apparently they can go onto someone's property at any time (like they did to me), without a warning, walk around their yard, and they don't even have to knock on your door to have a conversation about your yard, to which I admit the grass did get away from me at the end of winter, but if the Shire of Murray Ranger had paid me the courtesy of knocking on my door, he would have found out that I had a lawn mowing contractor arranged to come out and sort my yard. I then made an appointment to meet with the Murray Shire Ranger who issued the fine (and who is an "AUTHORISED OFFICER" meaning: a person authorised by the Shire of Waroona and appointed as a Bush Fire Control Officer."), to ask him why I didn't get any warning notice (eg via a letter, stating what I needed to do to

my yard to bring it up to the shires satisfaction and to give a reasonable amount of time for it to be done, before a fine is issued), and why they chose to fine me instantly, and he said that the brochure was some kind of legally binding document that had all the requirements of the landowner's obligations because it had the word "Notice" on the front. I told him that I didn't understand the brochures significance as it didn't have anything on the front cover that alerted me to it, and as far as I was concerned it was just another brochure. When I got home, I looked through the brochure and found in the middle pages a section (that I am assuming applies to me, as the brochure is very confusing and unclear) that reads as below (under the heading of): FIRE PREVENTION REQUIREMENTS AII land 4049m2 or less (a) All flammable material on the entire property is to be reduced and maintained to a height of less than 5 centimetres, (does that include my house as it is also "flammable material"). It goes on to talk about private driveways and "Asset Protection Zones" which has a whole page of what this means which includes the following: "the following work is required to be completed and maintained within an asset zone. The fuel loading (flammable material) is to be reduced and maintained to be a height of less than 5 centimetres or less than 2 tonnes per hectare". There is another heading in the brochure **"BUSHFIRE MANAGEMENT PLAN"** "means a plan that has been developed and approved by the Shire to reduce and mitigate fire hazards within a particular subdivision, lot or other area of land anywhere in the district". I understand this one, yet when I look at the large vacant block of land at the back of my property (and others around town), there is a very undefined fire break, there is waist high "fuel" as they are calling it these days, everywhere, including right up to the fence line of my property where we have a large shed, there are large dry partially burnt logs

piled up from when the Waroona fire happened (from over 2 years ago), that resembles a bonfire ready to be lit. There is also a large fallen log that can burn for days if a fire takes hold of it, but the Murray Shire Ranger told me that the dry log is not a threat. This land used to be burnt back every year until around 14 or so years ago, and was a large contribution as to why the fire was so intense at the back of our houses on McLarty Street and threatened them, but so long as they have a firebreak they are ok according to these shires. Interestingly, at the very back of the brochure, it has the Shire of Waroona logo, and says: "Bush Fires Act -1954" and I wondered why it wasn't put on the front cover with some kind of wording addressed to all landowners, stressing that the brochure was important to read because you could be fined, but of course that would be too obvious. My lawn mowing contractor came out to mow my lawn and tidy up the yard which cost me \$250 which is a lot of money on a low income, but I accept responsibility that my yard had to be done. Another Murray Shire Ranger then came out and was "satisfied" with the job and said he would take it back to the other Ranger. Thinking that it should be the end of it, the Shire Ranger has decided to continue with the fine, though I have written several letters asking for some empathy & discretion of being on a

low income, and pointing out that it would be counter-productive to fine me because I could use the money from their imposed fine instead to continue having the lawns maintained, which is the end goal of what these Shires want, but they would rather take the little money that I earn and I can only but conclude from this, that this has become more about them asserting their powers and revenue raising because my yard has now been sorted. These Shires have the backing of our Rate Payers money (including mine) to afford a lawyer knowing that I can't afford one, or I would challenge the brochure and the way that it has been presented in such a deceitful manner that it brings no importance to its significance, as well, the inconsistencies of some yards being required to be 5 cms or less in fuel, yet abutting large blocks can have waist high "fuel" and dry logs, years of accumulated leaves, (to which I don't have any trees in my back yard) up close to their neighbours yards and sheds. When driving I have noticed these inconsistencies are all around our town, with large blocks being allowed to stay as they are for decades so long as they have a firebreak. I have done a lot of volunteer work in this Community and I do try to do the right thing, but it appears to me that this is no longer about caring for our welfare in the event of a fire, because if they genuinely cared, they would work with and help people on low incomes and pensioners considering the excessive amount of Shire Rates

we pay each year, instead of putting up barriers by persecuting people and trying to make them feel like criminals. Backyard Buddies

Your monthly guide to animal and plant pests, diseases and weeds



Cacti are well known for their ability to survive the toughest conditions, making them a common choice for beginner gardeners and those seeking to create a low maintenance garden.

As there are no native Australian cacti all cacti in Western Australia (WA) are introduced exotic species.

A group of cacti known as opuntioid cacti are declared pests in WA and are Weeds of National Significance; these are Austrocylindropuntia species, Cylindropuntia species and Opuntia species (except *Opuntia ficus-indica*). The most well-known opuntioid genus is Opuntia, commonly referred to as prickly pear.

Do you know that agaves and euphorbias are not cacti? These succulent plants are often mistakenly advertised as cacti.

In WA, most opuntioid cactus infestations are relatively small, but the risk of new infestations developing and spreading within WA has increased significantly with the rise of online plant sales, plant trading and weekend markets.

Whole plants, plant segments and seeds have been found for sale online. Cacti sellers often have a variety of plants available and have been known to identify them incorrectly.

Several of the most threatening opuntioid cacti have been found in gardens and advertised for sale including wheel cactus (*Opuntia robusta*), snake cactus (*Cylindropuntia spinosior*) and Hudson's pear (*Cylindropuntia pallida*).

without the risk of dispersal; however, cacti can spread when birds eat the fruits and pass the seeds in their droppings. Some species (particularly Cylindropuntia species) disperse widely when small sections break off in vehicle tires, in the coats of livestock or native animals or human clothing and footwear. Cactus infestations have also started from people dumping unwanted plants. Once established, cacti can form dense infestations that are difficult and expensive to control. Cacti can also injure pets, people, livestock and native animals.

A Gold Lace Bantam duo of pullets and a Silver Lace cockerel which was delivered after the auction to "Petes Processing" for chicken meat production.(Not commercial). Pre sold a Brown Leghorn young cockerel, a brown leghorn pullet and a wheaten araucana pullet to the same buyer so happy they are all going to a good home. Weather wise it was shocking with gale force winds and no power for the majority of the auction and pleased I worked until 9.00pm Saturday night penning birds after the Warnbro Swans Football scratch

match on Waroona Oval. Always sad to sell home raised chickens hatched from your own eggs but that is the nature of animal production and husbandry. Sad farewell to Marshmellow a blue araucana hen and Archie a blue red rooster who were both very friendly and sold as a breeding pair. Also Colonel and lady a Gold Lace Bantam pair to allow new genes to be introduced which hopefully produces some show winning poultry. Top sale was a 13 week old Wheaten Arauncana pullet with Orange markings and a grey tail for \$35 and she will definitely be a show stopper as well as laying blue eggs. It could be compared to selling a pedigree heifer for big dollars. I can only dream. Even sold 4 chicken holding cages for a fair price and even an old cockys cage for \$5 which was threatened as rubbish tip material and helped clear the backyard area. Overall a very good first auction for the year and made a few dollars to cover some poultry feed costs. Some breeds are still moulting heavily but the Arauncanas and Brown/Black leghorns are still laying five eggs per day which is pleasing at this time of the year. Perhaps the Special Poultry Mix, Poultry Mix and Morgan Free Range High Protein Pellets supplemented by Livermol, Kelp(Seaweed) powder, Garlic granules crushed maize and lastly Shell Grit mixed in with feed. Not cheap by any means but it keeps the residents of Chookyard Hotel healthy and Anitone a tonic in their water. Spent \$40 on that invaluable tonic after the auction from a friend and it should last a couple of months. Particuarly proud of Priscilla A Faverolle Hen who went from 9 chicks back to two overnight and even at 14 weeks she keeps a close eye on them and just ushers the Silver Lace Wyandotte, a Wheaten Arauncana pullets and her into sleeping quarters with a rake. Fresh water and food always helps. Looking forward to the Young Bird Show on June 16th and by luck of the draw happens to be the weekend of the Great Southern Colts Carnival so I can concentrate on showing the chooks.



Looking forward to showing Ace 2 (Silver Lace Wyandotte), Duchess a stunning Columbian Wyandotte mainly white and neck striping and an unnamed wheaten araucana pullet. Will never outscore the large producers or Exhibitors but Chookyard Hotel holds its own in the quality stakes. Sold 3 dozen fertile eggs in the auction which consisted of Araucana, mix of Araucana/Brown Leghorn and Belgium Duccle Millefleur Bantam Eggs. It will be the last Araucana fertile eggs for six months until the young blue grey cockerel learns to sow his wild oats. A buyer from Martin (Near Gosnells) was always bidding for CYH Ara eggs because he liked the colouring. Even accidentally dropped an Araucana Egg on the Carpet in the family room and it did not break so it shows the hens are maturing and the dash of shell grit is working a treat. Autumn certainly has been hotter than January/February and the birds love the shade and therapeutic effect of two wormwood bushes given to me by neighbourly friend Pam as small cuttings. I started her off in the "Backyard" chicken experience and her chooks all have pet names. Have witnessed my neighbour Matts Silkies free ranging between two properties and its unreal how they follow the pathway between Recreation Road and Dehamel Street. Some of my chooks free range into Hulls paddock and I worry more about loose dogs and foxes rather than cars. Boots one of our two cats is timid with the chickens and after pushing open the front security screen on Tuesday night spent 45 mins playing games with myself at 11.00pm at night. So if you hear a bell, see a torch and calling you are not mistaken just a pet owner trying to ensure Boots and Leo are safely locked inside at night similar to Chookyard Hotel. 
