## Our Association

The first meeting of what was formerly known as the West Australian Epilepsy Association was called by Ruby Hutchinson, MLC, now deceased and was held at Royal Perth Hospital in 1963.

The Association moved to the premises at 14 Bagot Road, Subiaco in 1965, and its name subsequently altered to the Epilepsy Association of Western Australia (Inc), (EAWA) in 1998.

In June 2002 we moved to a new building which is located adjacent to Sir Charles Gardiner Hospital at the corner of Aberdare Road and Hospital Avenue, Nedlands. This building known as the Centre for Neurological Support – The Niche, has been sponsored by Lotterywest and encompasses 14 other neurologically based organisations, the Independent Living Centre (ILC) and Cystic Fibrosis.

EAWA is run by a committee of volunteers whose office bearers are elected annually. The President has a seat on the Board of Epilepsy Australia, the national coalition of state Epilepsy Associations. EAWA is an associate member of the Neurological Council of WA, a group of organisations who work together to provide greater understanding of neurological disorders.

## Aims and objectives

*“To educate those with epilepsy, their family, friends and society, to enable the epilepsy sufferer to integrate successfully in the community, and enjoy a full and productive life-style”.*

## EAWA Services and Activities

Advisory Service: provided by staff and volunteers who are available to discuss queries either by phone (anonymously if preferred), or on a one to one basis at the Association’s office.

Library: Includes books and videos, available to anyone visiting the Association. A borrowing service is available to members free of charge.

Support Groups: Monthly meetings are held for anyone affected by epilepsy. Group meetings are also held at the Neurological Council and at Gosnells Library. Please contact EAWA for details.

Speakers: can be arranged to talk to the media, to visit schools, nursing homes, businesses or any interested community organisation.

Annual Seminar: Speakers include doctors, health care professionals and other service providers.

Support Research: Donations and research assistance.

Regular Newsletters: Sent to members on a quarterly basis.

## Social Implications of epilepsy

An epileptic seizure means a loss of body functions that may be invisible to onlookers and may involve strange sensations or a disturbance in the ability of the sufferer to communicate for a period of time.

Seizures can also be very visible with bizarre behaviour and movements, both frightening and disturbing for the onlooker.

The social implications of epilepsy are often related to the unpredictability of seizures and the reactions of other people to them

The *frequency* and *severity* of seizures may also have a profound effect on life-styles.

Epilepsy may also affect:

- Children striving to achieve academic roles
- Young people hoping to gain a driving licence
- Adults seeking employment

By making available information on all aspects of living with epilepsy, EAWA helps to give people the opportunity to make informed decisions about their life-styles.

### **General Information**

Approximately one or two people in every hundred will have epilepsy at some stage in their life.

The majority will achieve control with medication.

Epilepsy can occur at any age and may be the result of many factors including head injuries, brain infections and strokes.

Some types of epilepsy may be inherited.

A seizure is a single self-limiting event resulting in altered brain function.

Epilepsy is the term used for recurrent seizures that are usually self-limiting.

The time between seizures may vary considerably

It can affect anyone of any age and any intelligence.

It does not, of itself, cause a person to be intellectually handicapped.

## Summary of Activities 2013/2014

### President and Secretariat report

1. Appointment of a Patron to the Association:

Our association was very honoured to have appointed a Patron during the last twelve months. Our Patron is the Right Honourable Ms Lisa Scaffidi, the Lord Mayor of the City of Perth. Details of Ms Scaffidi from Wikipedia are as follows: Lisa Scaffidi (née Sanders) (born 12 February 1960) is the first female lord mayor of Perth, Western Australia. Scaffidi won the seat in the October 2007 council elections following the retirement of her predecessor, Peter Natrass, after a record twelve years in the position. Scaffidi was educated at Churchlands Primary School and Methodist Ladies' College after which she graduated as a dental therapist from the WA Institute of Technology (now Curtin University). She served as an air hostess with TAA in 1980, worked in the hospitality industry in a marketing capacity and, in the 1990s, helped to promote export of semi-precious stones. She was the WA state director of the Committee for Economic Development of Australia (CEDA) for over ten years. She served two terms as a councillor before successfully contesting the lord-mayoralty. She regards the office as a full-time position and aims to maximise her accessibility to constituents. Ms Scaffidi has a family connection to Epilepsy

2. Website and Facebook traffic:

The EpilepsyWA website and Facebook page are receiving a substantial level of traffic. Last year at this time we were receiving around 2000 hits on the website. Now a year later we receive around 50,000 hits per week on the website. Our Facebook page currently receives around 2000 hits per week. This is dependent on the posts that are made. Currently posts are done around twice per week.

3. Culturally and Linguistically Diverse and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities:

The information obtained from the longitudinal study indicates that the area that is currently not well serviced in terms of awareness are the Culturally and Linguistically Diverse and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups. The incidence of Epilepsy is also higher in these groups because of the higher incidence of head injuries and the journey through torture and trauma backgrounds. Epilepsy WA will work with EDAC to achieve the penetration into these groups. The objective is to conduct at least one session with each of these groups in each of the forward three years:

1. Somali
2. Sudanese
3. Ethiopian
4. Eritrean
5. Burmese
6. Iraqi
7. Iranian
8. Indian
9. Chinese
10. Other CaLD
11. ATSI – The ATSI groups will be serviced via the documents that have been developed by the Epilepsy Foundation of Victoria

#### 4. Support Groups:

Two support groups are held every month. These support groups are in Gosnells and in Nedlands. The Support Group in Nedlands is for parents of children with epilepsy. Gosnells is an adult group. In addition, our Office Manager holds support groups at PMH Children's hospital when she is there.

The support group has been moved from the Gosnells Library to the Gosnells Hotel. I take this group out to lunch each month. The group dynamic has changed a lot since making this change. They all are very comfortable sharing their ups and downs in a much more relaxed and happy environment. The meeting at the library were quite hard to manage and the attendees did not share very openly and it was difficult to hold their attention for 1 and ½ hours. In the new format we have to wrap things up after 2 hours as the conversation is enjoyable and easy. One of our attendees wasn't able to come often due to the stuffy room at the library, and she felt safest bringing her mother along. She now attends every month and comes along with her carer and loves going out with her friends. This group regularly has 8 - 12 people attending.

Grey Matters Parent Support Group

This is a very successful support group attended by mothers who have children with epilepsy. All the attendee's children have other difficulties and disabilities with epilepsy being the main link to each other. We have a database of 75 families who have attended or are attending this meeting. This group ranges from 4 – 16 regular attendees.

Often, there is a lot of emotional anguish being shared and mothers regularly break down. It is a safe place for them to share all their fears. It is also a fantastic source of education and knowledge that these parents have and are willing to share.

6. Other issues:

WA Card: This was a matter that was raised and pursued by Epilepsy WA and one of our then Board members. It has finally come to fruition. It is one that has implications for People with Epilepsy (PWE) because of the restrictions on driving for PWE's. FYI: WA photo card—secure form of identification

To provide the Western Australian community with an additional secure form of photographic identification, a new photo card will be available from 1 July 2014.

The new photo card will have the same level of integrity as a driver's licence and will be recognised by the Department of Transport as a form of primary identification.

It's a voluntary card that will assist people who do not hold a driver's licence or passport to conveniently prove their identity.

The photo card will be available to people aged 16 years and older and will be valid for five years. Card-holders will have the option of including their address on the card, and can choose to have two cards—one showing their address and one without it.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

### TO THE MEMBERS OF: EPILEPSY ASSOCIATION OF WA (INC.)

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report of Epilepsy Association of WA (Inc.), which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2014, and the Income Statement, a Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, other explanatory notes and the Statement by Members of the Committee as set out on pages 3 to 8.

#### Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The committee of the association is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report, and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 of WA and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The committee's responsibilities also includes such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those Standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Independence

In conducting our audit, we have complied with the independence requirements of Australian professional ethical pronouncements.



**Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion**

As is common for an organisation of such type, it is not practicable for Epilepsy Association of WA (Inc.) to maintain an effective system of internal control over donations and other fund raising activities until their initial entry in the accounting records. Our examination of the income for the above activities was therefore limited to the amounts recorded in the accounting records.

**Qualified Auditor's Opinion**

In our opinion, except for the matter referred to above, the financial report of Epilepsy Association of WA (Inc.) presents fairly, in all material respects the financial position of Epilepsy Association of WA (Inc.) as of 30 June 2014 and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements.

**Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution**

**1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF ACCOUNTING**

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 of WA. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Epilepsy WA has purchased the Emfit Epilepsy Bed Sensor to assist our members with choosing the best bed protection for their loved ones who have Tonic Clonic seizures whilst sleeping.
