Had toretire for some years but put on list of the Reserve of Officers. This required waiting for lifts and pedal radio messages etc. In the final outcome they only got one of the two parts needed. A mechanic came hundreds of miles from Norseman to service another person's breakdown & one of the boys limped in with that vehicle; then having to get a lift back 330 miles to their camp.
