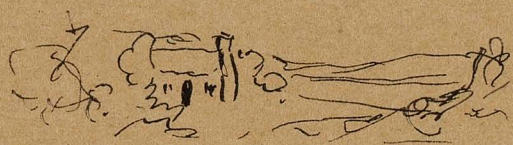
On Tuesday we arrived at

settlers.

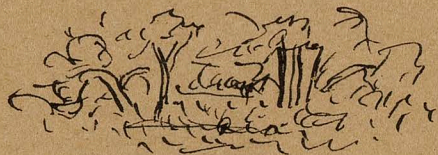







he next day, being still tired after our journey, we took a short walk of nearly two miles — looking for “subjects” — and afterwards rested.

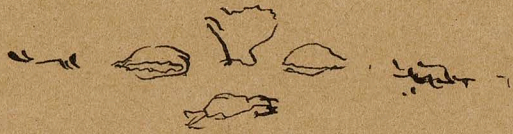
On the third day we went to work in earnest down by a swamp.







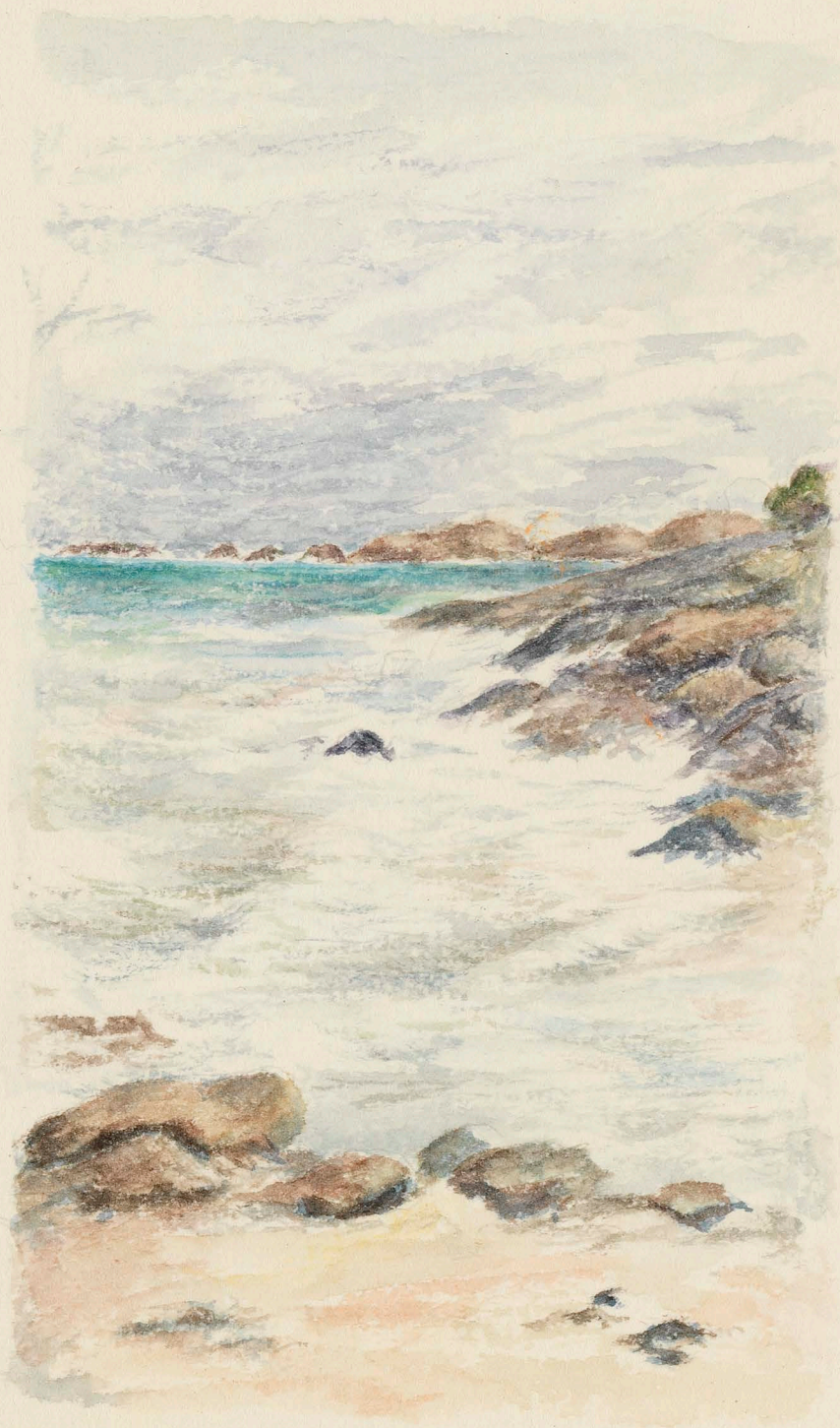
 One day we got rowed across

and sea, and looking for shells.





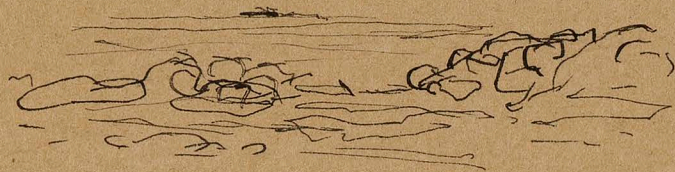
Cloudy weather now set in so we went
