Vehicle Examination

All Club vehicles were supposed to be examined by October 5, 1991 - that's some twenty weeks ago and there are still a few Model A Fords which have not been examined. The reasoning for this reluctance is elusive - it's totally painless, it's totally free, you can have your vehicle examined by a person who knows Model A Fords and can help you IF you have any problems, plus you get a completely free safety check - you will not get any of that from a Police inspection.

An Examination is not Concours judging - the examiner does not have the slightest interest in what year your car could be, or what is authentic or not. All he is concerned with is the vehicles' safety and that MUST surely also be of concern to you.

The fact remains that ALL vehicles should be examined not only under the Club by-laws but to help you. Don't look on it as an imposition or yet another piece of bureaucracy sent to impinge on your piece of mind.

Concessional Licence

As you will see from the enclosed Minutes - if you have a vehicle on Concessional Licence and it has not been examined, or an examination form from an approved Club has not been sent to the Secretary, a list is being compiled to send to the Police - this is not a vendetta, it is a legal requirement on our Club as one authorised to have Concessional Licences.

MINUTES

of Meeting held at Manners Hill Park on January 19, 1992 with 33 members and 5 children.

President LAUREL opened meeting at 11.20am and welcomed new members LINDSAY and WENDY BLACKLOCK and country members ALAN and GAIL DUNS.

Apology from: LUCAs, ANNEARS, ALAN and DARREN JEFFREE, KITCHENS, LETCHS, MAVIS SPENCER, DAVID BLEWETTS, GODWINS.

President LAUREL thanked Bevan for producing the 1992 Members' Register.

Secretary HELEN read correspondence from: Castle Hotel York, Battye Library, Ford V8 truck for sale, Home Building Society, Maurice and Maxine Creedy, Bay to Birdwood Run, Duncan's Motor Trimming, Brookton Old Time Motor Show, C.C.C. Classic Car Show, Model A raffle, E-Type Jaguar raffle, Pickles auction, Motorbooks, King Edward Hospital run.

Financial Report: Treasurer HELEN reported a Club balance of \$2,057.25. Discussion was had on a tax liability of \$361.14 to June 30, 1991 which was basically tax on interest earned. DON PHILP reported that the V.C.C. no longer paid income tax and it was agreed that BEVAN will speak to Drew Shack about the matter. BILL BENNIE moved, seconded BARRIE GUEST and passed that the accountant's account of \$250 be paid and that after discussion with Drew Shack to clarify if we did have to pay the tax that the tax account be paid from the National Meet account.

Coming Events: After discussion regarding several options for events in February and March that we decline to participate as a Club in the Boyanup Rally and the Classic Car Show as they were too close to the National Meet. Members who wished to enter the King Edward Hospital run on February 16 to phone HELEN promptly. After discussion on problems with a morning BBQ at Kings Park it was decided to hold the February run at Como as usual. STEVE READ to check that the barbecues will be operational.

Meeting on March 22 to be at Leederville Lesser Hall to finalise details for the National Meet in April if available - to be booked.

National Meet - BEVAN reported that we currently had 133 entries totalling 320 people and 99 Model A-s with 83 entries who had paid their accommodation and meals - with about ten more likely entries. We have 33 entries from N.S.W. and only 33 from W.A. at this stage. He pointed out that the balance in the account was basically to pay Noalimba. Problems were being encountered with some Club permits.

BILL BENNIE endorsed what had been stated in the Newsletter about vehicle examinations and particularly Concessionally licenced vehicles need to comply. He confirmed that any unexamined vehicles would be reported to the authority at the end of January. Discussion was had on country members' vehicles and these owners were reminded that they will need to send a copy of their examination to the Club for our records.

BEVAN reported that he and RAY MAHONY, STEVE READ and Jim Allcock had driven some of Maurice Brockwell's vehicles and PETER LYNCH had driven his Model A to support the Friends of Compass parade.

ANGELO CALLEJA asked if anyone had an electric windscreen wiper for his 1930 Model A. JIM WILLIAMS demonstrated a modern points/condenser plate for the distributor and offered to loan the plate for anyone to use as a pattern.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 12.20pm.

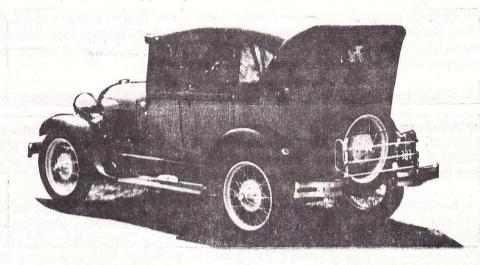
OIL PAN LEAKS? - Excessive oil pan leaks at either end of the pan may be reduced by removing the pan and inspecting for straightness, particularly at the crescent edges. These often get warped or dented. Also check the "clothes-line rope" asbestos packing, which may dry out, twist or crumble - replace with square, graphite pump packing from hydraulic suppliers which is more elastic and thus fills in irregularities better than the rope - measure groove depth for correct fit.

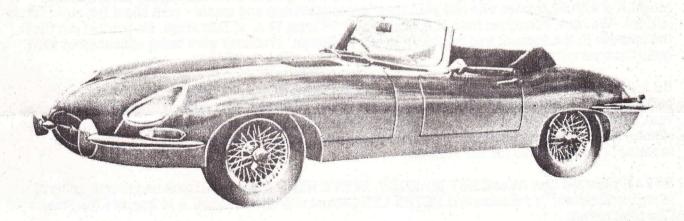

- That was January, 1992 -

An endeavour was made to assemble some of our vehicles to participate in the parade through Perth in support of the "Friends of Compass" - preferably "open" cars. In spite of a series of telephone calls it was not possible to get a few volunteers together - naturally many people were earning a dollar, some had cars in pieces and there were those who could not drop the roof on their Phaeton or Roadster.

So we did not let the side down a few of your members volunteered to drive some of Morris Brockwell's open cars in the parade. RAY MAHONY drove a huge straight-8 Packard (you almost needed a step-ladder to get in the door), STEVE READ piloted a Studebaker that "floated" around the corners (the starter was operated by the clutch). Being the only Pommy present, STEVE's co-worker Jim Allcock took charge of a Morris Minor while your Editor posed in a left-hand drive Thunderbird. PETER LYNCH drove his Coupe so the Model A Fords did have a presence in the end.

The only unusual event of the day was STEVE slamming the door of the Studebaker on the fingers of some innocent passing Aboriginal child. Interesting sight seeing STEVE carrying about the screaming infant through the crowd while he desperately searched for its mother.

January Meeting

The traditional January meeting in Peppermint Grove attracted a goodly number for the first meeting of '92. Good to welcome along new members LINDSAY and WENDY BLACKLOCK and country members ALAN dGAIL DUNS with the twins.

FORD PRODUCTION

From an article "Ford Production Methods" in Britain

In November, 1930 there were 80 plants of various sizes in Great Britain which constituted the Ford Motor Co. - employing from a few hundred to over 100,000 workers. The Dagenham plant was under construction which was to cover one million square feet and produce 200,000 units per year.

Follow the bouncing ball

Enormous quantities of steel balls were being manufactured and they were tested using an ingenious method. After passing tests for size they were then tested for hardness by rolling them from container down an incline from which they fell to an anvil. The height of the rebound then determined if they were fit for use. If the ball was hard it rebounded the necessary height to carry it into the OK container, while if too soft it failed to achieve the height and fell into the rejection basket.

The foundry at the River Rouge plant, the largest in the world, covered about 30 acres and poured upwards of 2,000 tons of iron per day - not one pound of which was lifted by hand.

Checking

Small, enclosed rooms were arranged for checking gudgeon pins, pistons, connecting rods and the rod and piston assembly to satisfy limits within 0.0004in. these rooms were kept at a constant temperature of 68F which is the temperature set for the use of Johannsen gauges. It had been found that with the addition of 13 degrees added to the

normal 68F that a connecting rod and gudgeon pin each increased 0.0001in, and a piston by 0.0002in. At 90F the variations were: connenecting rod - 0.00014in, piston - 0.00033in and a gudgeon pin - 0.00015in.

Piston production

After being machined, the piston was placed on a delicate scale to determine the amount it was overweight. On top of the machine was another scale which was in mechanical contact with a so-called chip cup. The machine scale was set to a reading corresponding with the overweight of the piston being checked and the machine started. Metal chips bored from the inside of the piston dropped into the cup and when the weight of the chips equalled the overweight the machine stopped, the whole operation taking a few seconds.

Crankshaft

Crankshafts reached the grinding department 0.050in oversize and 0.025in was removed in two operations. Special machines for honing were fitted with seven arms, each of which carried a head fitted with six honing stones made of carbide of silicon and lubricated with ordinary paraffin. The final operation for the shafts involved a battery of machines fitted with fine 320 grit aluminia paper. Each machine was fitted with a magazine roll feed for the paper so that a fresh section was pulled and used for each pin. After final inspection crankshafts were balanced dynamically.

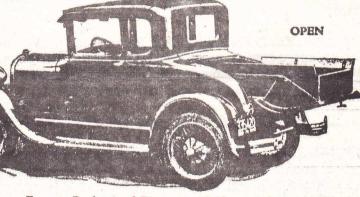
