MINUTES

of Meeting held at Kings Park on Sunday, May 17, 1992 with 34 members, 4 visitors and 4 children, 11 Model A Fords.

President LAUREL COOKE opened the meeting , welcomed visitors Vivian Pitassi and Bill & Myra Fitzgerald.

Apologies: JUNE SMITH, PETER&FAYE LYNCH, TONY&RITA PARIN (came later), BILL&DOROTHY BENNIE.

Secretary HELEN SHARP read the Minutes from the previous Meeting (March 22) which were passed as correct, Moved BARRIE GUEST, Seconded RAY MAHONY.

HELEN gave a Financial Report: Club balance: \$3,104.92, to Club from National Meet account: \$11,922.15. BEVAN gave details of the National Meet Finances with a breakdown of fund raising and expenses. He advised that the Club was successful in being granted as a Tax Exempt Organisation by the Australian Taxation Office. A request for recompense for a replacement toner cassette for Bevan's printer was approved. Members confirmed the National Meet Committee's suggestion to place the funds from the Meet Account into a Term Deposit Account with Town & Country Bank. Bevan also thanked MELISSA & MATTHEW READ for all their unsung help during the Meet preparation and operation.

On behalf of the Club, DORA ANNEAR thanked all those involved in running the National Meet, Seconded LAUREL COOKE. KELVIN PEPPER reported that Dennis Ashton had broken the tow ball on his bus on the way home. There were no other comments on the Meet.

General Business:- The proposed motion to change the Constitution could not go ahead as the written Proposal to be signed by seven members had not been sent on by GORDON GODWIN. However, It was moved JOHN McLEAN, Seconded LAUREL COOKE and passed that the Club's Fiscal Year be amended to:- From July 31 to June 30 and that the Annual General Meeting be held in July of each year.

BEVAN read out a proposal from the State Delegate's Meeting that an Agenda be circulated at least 3 months prior to any Bendigo or National Meet State Delegates' Meeting and that the Club vote on matters raised and if the decision was unanimously voted in by all States that the Club would abide by that motion. Also that any additional matters raised at a State Delegates' meeting be referred to each State for consideration, if all States agreed then the motion would be adhered to by all Clubs. The matter was put to members and approved.

BEVAN mentioned that at the State Delegates' Meeting he was requested to approach the Board of Directors of the Model A Ford Club of America Convention in Dallas with a view to having Australia made a Region of MAFCA and each State could become a Chapter. He explained that a benefit would be the MAFCA/MARC official Judging Standards if we could amend them with Australian variations. MAX ANNEAR suggested that we also approach the Model A Restorers Club in Dearborn, MI along the same lines. This action was approved with a final decision to be made following a detailed report from Bevan on any implications, costs, etc.

JUDY CALLEJA agreed to be the Club Secretary/Treasurer and STEVE READ agreed to be the Club Editor in the absence of the SHARPS for several months.

President LAUREL requested photographs of the Meet to be placed in a special Album as all of the regular contributors to the Club photo album had been too busy at the Meet to take any photographs.

BARRIE GUEST thanked STEVE READ, COLIN DAVIDSON and ALAN & DARREN JEFFREE for all their help in getting his car ready in time for the Meet.

Discussion ensued on future runs and destinations for long-weekend destinations. ALAN JEFFREE suggested shearer's quarters at a farm in Kirrup. After discussion it was agreed to plan for a visit to Hyden in September and to Kirrup in March.

STEVE READ proposed that as last year's Vehicle Examinations had taken nine months and as leaving the date open for members to have their vehicles examined at their leisure did not work at all that we return to a set date when all three vehicle examiners would be present. STEVE and MAX ANNEAR proposed that the Examination day be combined with a barbecue at STEVE's workshop - approved unanimously by all members.

MAY MEETING MIGRATION

First-up, many thanks to the JEFFREE clan for organising the May Run after the mild mayhem of the National Meet in April.

The day was slightly confusing as some members chose not to meet as indicated in the Newsletter, then congregated at a different location to that described in the Route Sheetstill, gave some of us a chance to drive around some more in our Model A-s finding out just where people actually were getting together.

Eleven Model A Fords was a bit less than the previous month's get together with 100 Model A-s, but that couldn't last, they had to go home sometime - although we still had entrants here up to three weeks after the Meet - even some staying at Noalimba.

It was most interesting to see the number of people wearing their handsome, Perth National Meet souvenir Sweat Shirts - got yours?







BODY SQUEAK

If a squeak develops between the cowl metal and pillar of a town sedan, it's probably due to the cowl metal coming in contact with the round headed metal rivet that was formerly used in the pillar - the factory later used flat head rivets at this point. The squeak can be corrected as follows:-







When drilling the hole, extreme care must be used not to drill through the outer panel.

After completing, solder up the drilled hole, smooth down and touch up with paint.

REPAIR EQUIPMENT

THE AUTOMOBILE OWNER'S GUIDE

(date unknown)

The necessary repair equipment should be divided into two sets, one to be carried with the car, which we will call road repair necessities, such as 25ft of 5/8" manilla hemp rope, which will probably come in very handy and save the original cost many times in one year. Even with good roads and the general tendency toward improvements, there still remains a great many miles of bad road that becomes very troublesome with their customary chuck holes and slippery brims, which often lead a motorist to bring up in a ditch after a short rain storm. The advantages of this rope are explained in this way; should you slide into the ditch or get into a deep rut, the wheels will usually spin and you are helplessly stuck. A pull from a passing motorist, or farmer, will help you out of your difficulty. Should any part of your car break, or give out, any passing motorist, or farmer, will give you a tow to the nearest garage and thereby avoid delays.

Therefore, we will head our list of road repairs with: 25ft of 5/8" manilla hemp rope, 2 inner tubes, 1 blowout patch, 1 outer shoe, 1 set of chains, a jack, 1 pump, 1 tire gauge, 1 tube repair outfit, and patches, an extra spark plug, several cores and terminals, a few feet of primary and secondary wire, 1 box of assorted bolts, nuts, washers and cotter pins, 1 qt. can of lubricating oil, 1 complete set of good tools neatly packed in a small box and secured to the floor of the car under the rear set by fastening both ends of a strap to the floor and placing a buckle in the centre which will hold the box securely and avoid all noise.

Garage repair equipment should consist of the following: 1 set of tire jacks, a small vulcanising set and supplies, 1 can of medium cup grease, 1 can or tank of lubricating oil, 1 small vise, 1 box of felt washers, 1 box of assorted cotter pins, 1 box of assorted nuts, 1 box of assorted lock washers, 1 box assorted cap screws and bolts, 1 set assorted files, 1 hack saw, 1 Stilson wrench, 1 dope gun, 1 air pressure oil can, 1 valve lifter, several valve and assorted springs, 1 box of auto soap, 1 sponge and a good chamois skin.

This outfit should all be purchased at the same time and each supply and tool packed or placed in respective places, so that it will not be necessary to look far and wide when you wish to use some particular tool. With this equipment, and some knowledge and patience, the average man should be able to keep his car in excellent condition by doing his own adjusting and repairing.

F) Popping or blowing back in the carburettor:Incorrectly timed outlet valves.
Inlet valve not seating.
Defective inlet valve spring.

MOTOR WILL NOT START OR STARTS HARD

Defects in motor mechanism:Leaky head gasket.
Water or rust in cylinders.
Seized pistons or dry pistons.
Piston rings gummed to cylinder.
Valve stuck (rare).
Pump impeller frozen (winter).
Valve gears out of time.
Broken crankshaft (rare).
Broken exhaust valve spring.
Broken inlet valve spring.
Broken timing gear (rare).

B) Fuel system faults:No gasoline in tank.
No gasoline in carburettor float chamber.
Old or stale gasoline.
Tank shut-off closed.
Clogged filter screen.
Fuel supply pipe clogged by dirt.
Pipe clogged by water.

Gasoline level too low. Gasoline level too high (flooding). Filler cap vent clogged. Broken choke control. Bent or stuck float lever. Choke control stuck. Loose or defective inlet manifold. Not enough gasoline at jet. Cylinders flooded with gas. Leaky float (causes flooding). Water in carburettor spray nozzle. Dirt in float chamber. Gas mixture too lean. Carburettor frozen (winter). Sediment bulb full of dirt. Float valve stuck.

C) Ignition system troubles:-Ignition switch off. Loose terminal on coil or switch. Ignition wire shorted. Plug defective (no spark at plugs). Broken spark plug insulation. Carbon deposits or oil between plug points. Spark plugs points too near together or too far apart. Short circuited secondary coil. Stuck breaker points. Short circuit in distributor. Storage battery weak. Poor contacts at timer. Timer points dirty. Poor contact at switch. Primary wires broke or short circuited. Battery grounded by short circuited Storage battery connection broken. Loose battery wire or terminal. Defects in induction coil. Corroded battery terminals. Ignition timing wrong, spark too late or too early. Defective points in timer. Broken timer contact spring. No contact at points. Contact points burned or pitted. Contact maker lever stuck. Dirt or water in timer casing.

MOTOR LOSES POWER

A) Causes of poor compression:
Loose spark plugs.
Defective cylinder head gasket.
Cracked piston or cylinder (rare).
Leaky valves (regrind).
Warped valve heads.
Piston ring joints in line.
Head casing loose on cylinder.
Worn piston rings.

B) Other causes of lost power:-Exhaust valve lift insufficient. Inlet valve lift insufficient. Choked muffler. Carbon deposits. Tight bearings. Cylinder dry or over heated. Oil too light. Oil carbonises at too low temperature. Overheating due to driving with retarded spark. Overheating due to racing motor on low speed gear. Overheating due to too rich mixture. Oil feed interrupted. Fan belt loose or broken. No water in radiator. Pump defective. Note: all causes of irregular motor action also produce lost power.

If The Starter Will Not Turn:-

1. See that starter pedal is not sticking and goes all the way down. Disconnect storage battery under seat, if pedal sticks.

2. Note whether starter gear goes into engagement. If starter spins, "nurse", the pedal until gear engages. In all automatic shift systems make sure spring is not broken or pinion is not stuck to thread on shaft.

3. See that main leads between battery switch and starter are firmly connected, especially at the battery and starting switch.

4. Battery may be discharged. WANT MORE?

Poor battery ground wire.

Defective ignition lock.

Here's one from 'The Restorer' about safety glass: To determine if you have laminated safety glass - tap it with a coin. A low pitch will occur if it's laminated. A high pitch will be heard if it's regular glass (no lamination). This same high pitch can be heard if you tap on the glass of your modern car. That glass is tempered safety glass and cannot be installed legally in the windshield (in many foreign countries it is legal). Match test:- hold a match flame about an inch from the glass. Each piece of glass will give a dual reflection of flame tips. The distance between the tips is the thickness of the glass. On regular glass you will see two flame tips. On laminated glass you'll see three tips but if you look very, very close you'll see a fourth tip way in the back (very faint).
