MINUTES OF MEETING HELD on Sunday 21 May 1992 with 7 Model A's and 5 Moderns

Acting Secretary Judy Calleja read the Minutes from the previous meeting (May 17). AN AUSTRALIAN ADVENTURE

Model A Ford 12th National MARC meet - Perth, Western Australia April 16-21, 1992

What an exciting adventure for two well-seasoned Colorado MAFCC members! We have traveled some 40,000 miles in our beloved SuperCoupe over the past 20 years - all over the United States and Canada, but Perth, Australia? Where in the world is that place?

Well, friends, Perth is the most isolated city in the world, on the southwest coast of Australia, 11,500 air miles from Aurora, Colorado. Nearby the historic port city of Fremantle looks out on the Indian Ocean to the west, and is the site of the first settlement of Western Australia in 1829. Perth was named the "City of Light" by then astronaut John Glenn as he saw all lights of Perth turned on for him, during one of our earliest space flights. The terrain and Mediterranean climate is similar to that of southern California but without the smog or traffic. The season was Autumn in April (not "fall" because the leaves don't fall) with temperatures ranging from 74F daytime to 65F night. The sun and moon rise and set in the northern sky and you can see the stars of the Southern Cross. Aussies drive on the left side of the road from the right side of the car and the water goes down the drain in a counter-clockwise direction. And if that isn't topsy turvy enough, we lost a day going to Australia, but gained it back as we flew across the Pacific towards America, leaving Sydney at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 22, arriving in San Francisco at 1:30 p.m. the same day and time we left Australia!

The Phaeton or "Tourer" is the most prevalant Model A (they say A-Model) in Australia with the 5-window Coupe somewhat rarely seen and desirable. Open cars are more common because of the comparatively mild weather and more of them could be stacked for shipping to the island continent. The cars we saw were well cared for, in good running condition, and loved as we love ours. They really drive those cars. Many were driven from east to west across Australia (approximately the same area as the United States) some 2500 miles, and then back home again, ah-ooga'ing all the way. The Indian Pacific train towed some 32 Model A's on special cars, following their owners who were having a 3-day party in the train cars ahead.

Our Western Australian friends did an excellent job putting on this National MARC meet. It was extremely well organized, ran smoothly, and lots of fun, similar to our High-Country tour. There was both Concours and Touring class judging. There were tours and outings each day to scenic and interesting areas around Perth. We saw their beautiful white beaches, with people on Easter holiday enjoying the sand and surf; historic port city of Fremantle; Whiteman Park, a natural, outdoor park with native bush and wildlife; the oldest inland town of York, where we had Devonshire tea and scones and saw many unusual cars at the York Motor Museum. On all the outings the Model A's were on display for the public, and people just swarmed around thoselittle cars, enjoying seeing them just like they do here in Colorado and the United States.

A very special time was our visit with Tuppy the pet kangaroo, who lives with and guards the Model A parts. She became our friend when we fed her milk and cookies (biscuits).

As always, the people are the best part. Our new Australian friends are among the most friendly, hospitable and warm people we have met anywhere. When we finally arrived at Perth airport, 11,500 miles from home, after four days among strangers, and rolled our little luggage cart off yet another airplane, the sweetest sound we ever heard was our names being called out by our host Model A'rs who were there to welcome us. We showed our appreciation and conveyed warm greetings from the Colorado Model A folks by giving away nearly 100 of our brand new unique souvenir buttons — and the Aussies love them. Those little blue and white buttons are all over Australia, sending a message of friendship halfway across the world. The common bond we share a our love for the humble Model A Ford — brings us together for great fun, companionship and memories.

PIPELINE RECOMMENDATIONS

The following is a list of general guidelines for pipe selection.

1. All pipe is to be made of a long hole, surrounded by metal or plastic centred around the hole.

2. All pipe is to be hollow throughout the entire length - do not use holes of different length than the pipe.

3. The inside diameter of all pipe must not exceed the outside diameter, otherwise the hole will be on the outside.

4. All pipe is to be supplied with nothing in the hole so that liquid, steam, etc can be put inside at a later date.

5. All pipe should be supplied without rust; this can more readily be applied at the job site. Note: Some vendors are now able to supply pre-rusted pipe. If available in your area, this new product is recommended as it will save a great deal of time on the job site.

6. All pipe over 153m in length should have the words "LONG PIPE" clearly painted on each end so the crew will know it is a long pipe.


7. Pipe over 3.2 kms in length must also have the words "LONG PIPE" painted in the middle so the crew will not have to walk the entire length of the pipe to determine whether or not it is a long pipe.

8. All pipe over 152mm in diameter must have the words "LARGE PIPE" painted on it so the crew will not mistake it for a small pipe.

9. Flanges should be used on all pipe. Flanges must have holes for bolts quite separate from the big hole in the middle of the pipe. 10. When ordering 90°, 45° or 30° elbows, specify right-hand or left-hand; otherwise you will end up going in the wrong direction.

11. Specify level, uphill or downhill pipe. If you use downhill pipe for going uphill, the contents will flow in the wrong direction.

12. All couplings should have either right-hand or left-hand threads. Do not mix the threads; otherwise as the coupling is being screwed on one pipe, it is unscrewing from the other.
