

M.A.F.C.A. Convention - Dallas, Texas Bevan Sharp

We leave Perth on a Qantas 747-400 then for some unknown reason) change to a smaller 747 for the longer haul across the Pacific to Los Angeles - with a stop-over in Tahiti. It's always interesting to leave Sydney and arrive in Los Angeles before you left (so to speak). We flew out of Sydney at 8pm Friday and arrived in Los Angeles at 730pm the same day (crossing the International Date Line, you know).

After an overnight in Los Angeles we fly into Dallas, Texas by American Airlines to be met at the airport by John some-one-or-other who had to collect another couple from another Terminal - who turned out to be Kevin and Margaret Driscoll from Victoria (you may remember that they attended one of our Club meetings a few months ago).

Kinda warmer in Texas with temperatures around 90F and quite humid. We were threatened with major thunderstorms all week but only received a few light showers - nearby areas copped tennis-ball sized hail!!

We checked into our huge room - it helps to know the Rally Chairman personally as Charlie Viosca had allocated us a suite (at the same price as a normal room) at the Sheraton which had a lobby, lounge, king-size bed and a bar with refrigerator and coffee percolator - for some unknown reason, hotels and motels in America do not usually have a fridge or tea/coffee facilities as they do in Australia.

The format for U.S. Meets (or "Conferences") is different to Australia in that they only have one Run for all the cars and each day there are several seminars and bus trips to various destinations. In fact, at this event the "Mandatory Run" for all the cars entered for judging was just to drive around the car park!

This Conference was most interesting to me as Rally Headquarters was located halfway between Dallas and Fort Worth (at Arlington) and Clubs from both cities had hosted Geoff McEwan and me as we had driven through during the "London to Sydney" - consequently dozens of Texans wanted to renew our brief 1988 acquaintance.

Also, I had been corresponding with several people on the National Board of the Model A Ford Club of America endeavouring to solve the problems with late delivery of their "The Restorer" to Australia and New Zealand and "lost" subscriptions. Plus, I had been instructed at the Perth Meet State Delegates' Meeting to negotiate with the Board on making Australia a Region and each State a Chapter of M.A.F.C.A., etc. Consequently members of the Board were eager to help solve these situations and I had several long conversations with individual Board executives.

As a result of all these negotiations it is now possible for Australia to become a Region of M.A.F.C.A. and each State may become a Chapter; we also have permission to use and adapt the new MARC/MAFCA updated and very comprehensive Judging Standards - they are well into producing a supplement on Canadian Standards and they look forward to our input and comments to ensure its accuracy.

Helen went on several shopping, antique and craft trips - I went to the famous Webbers where they have an amazing treasure trove of automobillia to take your breath away - from authentic metal signs to parts for antique petrol pumps, models, photographs, etc.

Those at Dallas who were also the Perth Meet included: Bob and Martha Trousil from California, Wayne and Louella Kipp from Colorado, and Len Hoyland from New Zealand. It was great to see

Ross Letch's Perth Meet Plate on the Kipp's Roadster - the Dallas "plate" was a piece of cardboard with the number written by hand!!

The only other "foreigners" at Dallas were a Canadian couple, the Mal Bradleys and Harry Huckstepps from New South Wales and Len Hoyland and Dereck Thomason from New Zealand. The Kiwis had bought five Model A-s in Wisconsin somewhere and were going to dismatle them and pack them into two 20ft containers to ship back home.

As usual there were lots of modified Model A Fords present - high compression heads, overhead valves, huge twin carburettors, and so on, heaps with hydraulic brakes and overdrives. There was also a virtually infinite variety of colours and body shapes, from an absolutely original, never been restored Fordor to a Roadster that the owner had amended to a "boatail" instead of the rumble seat".

Another regular feature of American events is the Hubley Derby where they have a long ramp down which they race Hubley Models of Model A Fords. At the finish line there were two judges, one was Conference Chairman Charlie Viosca - the other was me.

We went to a baseball game - the Texas Rangers versus the Toronto Blue Jays at the huge Arlington Stadium which is just a short walk from the Sheraton - a small crowd with only 24,000 people. The game was very slow to my way of thinking with kids constantly shouting "hot dogs", "crackerjacks", "cold sodas" or "beers" in your ears in strident American voices as they walked up and down the terraces. I was amazed at the huge number of people constantly walking around and feeding their faces - it was explained to me that most of the spectators probably lived in small apartments or "condos" so the game was treated the same as we would if we went to a picnic!!

An amazing aspect of the game was the unbelievably parochial attitude of the crowd and biased use of the huge electronic TV screen. If the Toronto team scored or ran out a Texas player there was not even a ripple of applause or a mention on the screen. On the contrary, if a Texas player did something right the crowd went wild and the scoreboard featured a multitude of bizzare celebrations. Oh, by the way, the Toronto Blue Jays won on the night!!

There were a total of 97 cars entered for judging: 36 Restored, 35 Touring, 23 Modified and 3 Original. Best of Show was a '31 Phaeton with 452 points.

We had the loan of a '29 Roadster for the Run to Circle C Ranch and I can now sympathise with all you "open car" Model A drivers as we did not have any side curtains and it was raining a bit on the trip to the Ranch - coming back the weather was fine - as was the motoring. They turned on a small rodeo for us and we enjoyed a Texas BBQ.

On the last Saturday, we took Kevin and Margaret Driscoll to the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport at 4am in Charlie Viosca's huge van - at least there not much traffic at that time of the morning and we could afford to get lost without affecting the rest of Texas.

The Awards Dinner was held in a huge hall. We won a big trophy for the Longest Distance Travelled.

The next one is a joint MARC/MAFCA event in Tacoma, Washington in 1994.....
