

August 1930

An historic Drive in a Model A Ford reached its halfway stage when Charles Creighton and James Hargis of Missouri arrived in Los Angeles after chugging 3,340 miles from New York. Twenty-three days later, they made it back again. The incredible thing was not the distance, but that they did it each way without stopping the engine - and entirely in

reverse. ALSO - Balding heart throb Sean Connery was born. An ex-coffin polisher and muscleman, he made his stage debut in "South Pacific" and changed his name from Thomas to Sean in 1953 coincidentally the same year Ian Fleming wrote his first Bond novel "Casino Royale". Early contenders for the part of 007 included Trevor Howard, Peter Finch, James Mason and Richard Burton. Connery got it, despite refusing to make a screen test.

On August 19, 1931, the most successful jockey in history Willie Shoemaker was born, weighing in at only 2-1/2 lbs. This did not stop "the Shoe" from breaking the world record in his first full year of racing, with no less than 388 winners. Since 1949 the pint size (4 ft 11 in) ninety-nine pounder has ridden 30,000 races, winning 7,000 and a grand total of over sixty-three million dollars. Spectacular even in defeat, he lost the 1956 Kentucky Derby, though well in the lead, when to the amazement of the crowd, he misjudged the finishing line.

From WA to WA and back to

Saturday July 9 - BARRIE GUEST took us to Perth Airport and we caught the 'red eye' (midnight flight) to Sydney, arriving at 6.30am (4am Perth time). We transferred to the international terminal and flew out at 9.30am to Honolulu. During the flight Steve asked one of the 'hosties' if anyone knew the AFL scores as we knew that the Eagles were playing. About

15 minutes later the Captain announced all the football

scores, including the AFL.

We arrived in Hawaii at 11pm on Saturday night and then had another Sunday (courtesy of the International Dateline) which we spent visiting Pearl Harbour and the USS Arizona Memorial. The tour included a short film with original news footage covering the assault on Pearl Harbour. Navy launches took us out to the Memorial. All the staff were volunteers, a lot of them survivors of the actual attack. After a quick tour of the City and Punchbowl Cemetery, I got the impression that people living in Hawaii consider themselves Hawaiians and not Americans - there is a succession movement underway.

On Sunday night around midnight (again) we left beautiful Hawaii and caught a flight to Vancouver, BC, Canada. After a 5 hour flight we arrived at 8.30am Monday morning and tried to find an hotel with 'help' from a clerk at the free booking and information desk at the airport. We were eventually booked into the cheapest hotel at \$95 per night which, with GST ended up costing us CA\$115. The Canadian economic situation seems to be on a par with England: high cost of living and low

wages. The GST is a real killer.

We enjoyed the long summer days and it was hard not to think it was still afternoon when it was 9pm. We phoned Mark and Kathi Eckerick (who we had met at our Perth Meet) and they arranged for Mark's parents to travel from 30 miles south of the Canadian border to pick us up. Steve had developed some bug and wasn't in the best of shape so it was terrific to have Bill and Joyce Eckerick take us under their wing and look after us including delicious barbecued fresh salmon.

On Wednesday we boarded a ferry and cruised through the San Juan islands. North-West Washington is green

and lush and very, very scenic.

We spent Thursday and Friday nights with Kathi and Mark and, on Saturday morning, left Spokane with a group of Model A-s to stay in Tacoma with their friends who had a car entered for judging on the Tuesday. Steve, Mark and others worked on that car until 11pm that night, and then until midnight on Monday - sound familiar?

A couple from Idaho arrived with a Roadster which was having problems - which Steve fixed and they took it for a test drive. Steve was offered a 'drive' and promptly headed for the left side of the road; the owner had almost recovered by the time they returned! His prized Model A was the 241st off the production line!!
