#### A PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE


I take this opportunity to wish all members the compliments of the season and to pass on a few of my thoughts about the first two meetings of 1999.

#### **CLUB MEMBER PROFILES**

I have attended many runs with the *Model A Restorers Club of WA* since joining with David in September 1993, and met many interesting people. There is a feeling of friendliness within the club at the runs and other gatherings, which is reflected in the chatty nature of some sections of the newsletter. With time to spare for a few months, I considered how I could contribute to the newsletter, and decided to seek information from the foundation and long-time members of the *Western As* who have maintained their links with the club.

I went through the Application for Membership forms which came my way when I became Secretary in July and identified eleven dated May to July 1980. On checking through the first receipts issued and the minutes of the first meeting at Bill and Dorothy Bennie's home on 22nd June 1980, I discovered two more couples who are still members. I have contacted most of these members and have enjoyed learning about them. Some are country members and thus unable to attend often. Others have maintained their memberships but have different priorities for Sundays these days.

Our first profile is of Ray and Toni Mahony. The impression I have is that nothing is too hard or too much for either of them, and they demonstrate great confidence in each other. Ray bravely trusted Toni and two friends to enter the *Rally West '79* event just one month after his Model A was registered. On several occasions Toni has been alone at a run, driving the Model A, which shows she has no worries about the condition of the car maintained by Ray. She still completes all the question sheets, and I think she won the ridiculously difficult quiz set by David on the first run we organised.

Names: Ray and Toni Mahony

Date of Joining or First meeting attended: Inaugural members present at first meeting 22/6/80. How did you become involved? Ray and Toni have been members of MARC Australia since about 1974 and joined with Bill Bennie and others to form the WA club. Bill Bennie was the moving force. Positions held in club: Both Ray and Toni have been Secretary/Treasurer at various times - can't remember when. Ray was Vehicle Examiner in the early days. (He was the first Vehicle Examiner, offering to fill the position on 26/9/81)

**National Meets attended:** 1992 in WA. Ray organised security for the rally through his SES connections. Toni helped setting up tables for dinner. We just might get to Wodonga in 2000.

Memorable events: Very brave husband allowed wife to take car and 2 girlfriends on Rally West '79 only one month after registration - we damn near won it! And had a ball! The most enjoyable events with the Model A Restorer's Club have been the Kirup runs. All seemed to enjoy watching the kids slide down the hill on pieces of cardboard, dodging tyres at the bottom. They have attended three. The one which included a trip to Collie, when they went to a country and western place, was interesting. It was the "Museum of Memorabilia" belonging to Harvey Dickson on the other side of Boyup Brook.

#### Family and Personal history:

Ray has been a lecturer in Auto Mechanics at TAFE for 25½ years. Toni has been a call centre and licensing officer with the Department of Transport for 11½ years. They have four children. There were no cars in Ray's family. They lived very close to a train station and his father rode a push bike. Ray could always pull his push bike apart and fix it, but he never knew about cars and had no idea what other kids were talking about, when they related tales of driving places and breaking down. He was determined to remedy this and he worked at a service station in 3rd year high school. He liked it and continued there for the start of his apprenticeship. He spent 10 months there, then moved to Sydney Atkinson's Holden dealership to complete his apprenticeship. He was determined to show that he had potential as an Auto Mechanic and proceeded to win the top apprentice award for his year. This included an all expenses paid trip to tour all the Holden dealerships in South Australia and Victoria. He was a Ford service representative for the eastern section of WA 1969-71. He applied to TAFE in '72, got in May '73. He has been at many different TAFE centres, the past 10 years in the correspondence section, providing for all aspects of the apprenticeship program for auto mechanics.

There were always vehicles on the farm at Wubin, near Dalwalinu, where Toni grew up. She remembers a big Fargo truck coming to the farm when she was very little, and a Customline later. Her family had the local vehicle plates DL1, DL2, DL3, DL4 and DL6, and her Uncle Fred had DL5 and DL7. Her mum still has DL 6 on her car at Chittering.

**Family members:** No 1 son Raphael is now a Fireman in the RAAF, stationed at Richmond, NSW. No 2 son Kimberley is a police officer and lives in Kingsley. He is part of Mirrabooka District Support Group. No 3 son Kieran has just completed the third year of Occupational Therapy with one more to go. He lives at home sometimes. Andrae, No 1 daughter, has finished her TEE and plans to become a PE teacher. You see her sometimes on runs.

What music do you listen to? Ray likes light classical, rock 'n' roll. Toni - everything from opera through choral to modern day pops EXCEPT heavy metal - YUK!

The most memorable show you have attended. We've seen a lot and enjoyed them all. For a real change of pace, the show *STOMP* has to have been the most unusual and fun.

**Sporting interests:** Ray is the only person I know who isn't a sports follower. Toni loves all sports and actively follow the glorious *GLORY* soccer team.

Other interests: Ray - State Emergency Service, abseiling. Toni - genealogical research, reading.

About your car: Model: 1929 Phaeton.

Colour: blue and black



Ray has elaborated further - (see next page.) The second car stayed in the backyard. Ray used the diff out of it and sold it to Steve Read in 1996.


**Other restorations:** The current, long-winded project is a 1947 Ford Super Deluxe. Ray has had it 10 years, working on it intermittently.

#### MY VINTAGE CAR AND ME BY RAY MAHONY

It is interesting to recall when I was a very ignorant 15 year old first year apprentice motor mechanic, working the lube bay and driveway of a service station in Subiaco, refuelling a shiny black Model A Ford. To me this was a magnificent car and I made certain that the fuel hose never touched the body work and not a drop of fuel dripped onto the paint work.

One day, to my horror, the owner told me the block had cracked, and he was getting rid of the car. The Model A was traded in on an FC Holden Station Wagon. Trade in value £60. I could have afforded that, but then there was the cracked block, you would never get another motor for a car like that. Little did I know.

There were a few other cars of special interest to me at this time. I was quite taken with a very nice A 1 EXCELLENT 1922-24 Humber. This little car was for sale at "Tiger Motor Wreckers, Hay Street Subiaco". I would have loved this, but no way could I afford a car like that. I never asked the price but did hear it was sold for £10. I am still not sure I believe that. I regularly serviced a 1937 Austin 7 Sedan, and the service station had a 1926 Chev ute (rough but memorable). Others of special interest included a 1934 Vauxhall Coupe and a 1934 Hillman roadster.

In 1970-71 I was a service rep with the Ford Motor Company and every time I visited a country dealer I asked for the whereabouts of two things; 1. Cutler Roll Top Desk 2. Any Vintage Motor Cars. Late in 1971 I visited Don Hall's BP Road House/Ford Dealership in Mt. Magnet. Guess what? Yes he had two vintage cars - 1 only 1929 Ford and 1 only 1928 Ford, both of which were available for \$250. And yes he also had a Cutler Roll Top desk but not available, unless he sold the business, which he was considering. I was looking for ANY available vintage car, but imagine how I felt when the one I found was a Model A, just like the one I used to refuel - I was rapt!

The better of the two cars, the '29 Phaeton, was nearly complete and driveable although showing its age. It was originally purchased from Lynas Motors by "Wingy" Brown and owned by him until mid 1960 (I believe) when it was sold to the local Police officer who later sold it to Don Hall. The main outing for the car in its later years in Mt. Magnet was to take Father Christmas through town each year.

In January 1972 I saw a "For Sale" ad for the Mt. Magnet Road House. I immediately rang Don to tell him that I would buy the cars and, subject to price, the desk. He had put the desk aside but could not remember who wanted it. During the March long week-end I went to Mt. Magnet and got the desk for \$30 and paid \$50 deposit on the cars. Before I arrived that week-end some hot rodders had called in and tried to buy the cars, but Don, being a man of his word, kept the cars for me.

The restoration started in Perth, continued in Kalgoorlie and was finished in Perth in 1979. Because of the completeness of the vehicle it was a fairly easy restoration as far as restorations go. Complete engine and gearbox overhaul. Rear axle dismantle, clean and reassemble. New brake linings and drum skim. Dismantle body to renew timbers. I used Karri for the main side rails and cross beams and Meranti for the rest. A bit of panel beating, spray painting and re-upholstering. Toni did the upholstery work and I did the rest.

Out one week after registration, on a wet and windy day we, the family and John Parker, had our first official run to Gin Gin. Those in the back got quite wet while those in the front, having the protection of the wind screen remained relatively dry. The next week the hood was made and fitted. A week later Toni took the car with two friends on Rally West '79, an 1100 mile tour of the South West and won the Ladies' prize.

During a second trip to Gin-Gin I visited Don Hall, who had moved to Gin-Gin, and showed him the car. He could hardly believe his eyes but refused to drive the car for fear of damaging it.

As expected my lovable Model A has given me and my family a lot of pleasure over the years with only one major problem ie. a stripped differential pinion.

Why would anyone want anything other than a Model A, unless of course it was a '47 Super Deluxe?
