RALLY WEST 99 As observed by Pat Bussard

RALLY WEST 99 has come and gone, and all who participated have memories of an enjoyable rally in the south west area around Busselton. Fifteen club members attended, fourteen in their Model A-s: Jim and Nina Williams, John and Barbara Forbes, Ken and Enid Harris (of Katanning), Alan and June Smith, Reg and Coral Blewett, David and Pat Bussard, Greg and Jill Axford, Chris Butler with his brother Ross from New Zealand, Hartley and Pauline Edwards, Max and Dora Annear, Jack and Mavis Berkshire, John and Pat Laurie, Barry and Joy Fowler (of Coorow) and Don Sutherland. Ross and Lorraine Chamberlain chose to attend in their Chev, but offered his Model A to friends Bill and May Holt who did a good job keeping up. With the Fowlers were Kay and Frank Lewis of Moora who intended to drive their Chevrolet Four, but decided otherwise. Frank is the Holden dealer in Moora, owns a Chev, and he did not enjoy being passed by other Chev participants while he was in the Model A!

Four other Model A vehicles were also present: Richard Turpin and Christine Lathwell of Albany drove a 1930 roadster; George Goodchild and Joan Conning of Denmark were in his 1928 phaeton; Frank and Jenny Cocks with Helen Franks as navigator were in their original 1929 phaeton; and David and Sue Reid seemed to enjoy themselves in a 1928 phaeton owned by George Saunders of Collie. There were also about ten Model T-s so Fords were well represented in the 121 vehicles participating.

To my knowledge, all Model A vehicles were driven to Busselton and back home at the end of the week. Some arrived on Saturday to be ready and rested for the activities, while others got in on Sunday. Chris and Ross Butler arrived late on Sunday and missed the huge afternoon tea put on by the Shire of Busselton to welcome participants. It was great to see Mike and Laurel Cooke who came to chat with old friends and to see their '28 tudor, now owned by the Fowlers.

We stopped for morning tea and lunch at various places after driving on a variety of roads, ranging from highways to narrow scenic routes, though the organisers kept us off gravel. The list included Willyabrup Hall, Margaret River, Anniebrooke Flower Farm, Meelup Beach, Elgin Hall, Donnybrook Recreation Centre, Acton Park Hall and the Bootleg Brewery. It was indeed a week of queues, and I hope we can find better ways to cater for large numbers when we plan for our National Meet in Perth in 2004.

During the lunch break at the Donnybrook Recreation Centre, the Model A-s collected to one side of the parking lot for a photo opportunity. When the other vehicles had made some room, those who were parked elsewhere joined the A group. Frank Cocks was finally rounded up and the group was complete, except for Ken and Enid Harris. I ran after them when I realised they were leaving, but gave up. Several people took photos so I hope we get some copies for the club photo library. There may even be a video!

Children viewed the vehicles at several places during the rally. John Forbes was asked if he knew what the horn on his car sounded like! John tactfully turned the question around and let it roar. The children commented on all the "bull bars". One child pointed to the radiator on a vehicle and asked his teacher what went in there. She was not about to tell and tried to guide the learning by asking what it might be. First guess was petrol, so the next guided question was "What do you drink?" Answer: "Coke".

On Friday morning, I asked Don Sutherland what he felt was the best part of the rally and he said it was just about to happen, as David appeared with a beer. June Smith enjoyed the lovely relaxing week tootling around the country roads. Alan Smith thought it a very good rally. In 1992 it was competitive and this (1999) was much more relaxed with more cars. He among others felt it was a pity that the distances were listed in kilometres. be a mile in front. Mavis Berkshire said it was her first experience of such a long rally and it was wonderful. Fifteen Model A-s and a few moderns assembled at the Causeway for a 10.30am departure, under the strict supervision of Max.







CLUB MEMBER PROFILES

As I mentioned in the Club Member Profile about Tom and Georgina Hart of Ongerup, it is a different proposition collecting information about people who live out of the metropolitan area. I visited city members while preparing their stories, and found clues to their lives apart from cars and the club. While I have met Laurel and Mike Cooke (and Jordan too!) most of this information has come from letters and phone calls. As in previous Club Member Profiles, I have included some personal comments in italics and in brackets.

Pat Bussard

Names: Michael and Laurel Cooke

Date of Joining or First meeting attended: Inaugural members at first meet. (*They also attended the planning meetings, one of which was held at the home of Max and Dora Annear. There is no membership application form from the Cookes for the early years, al though they were issued with Receipt #3 from the first receipt book when Michael was Secretary/Treasurer.)*

How did you become involved with the Model A Restorers Club of Western Australia (Inc.)? Ian Irwin of MARC Australia approached Michael and Laurel at the MARC Canberra rally at Easter 1978, suggesting that a Western Australian branch be formed. It took another two years of planning with Bill and Dorothy Bennie and some others to get the WA branch up and running in July 1980.

Positions held in club: with dates: Both have been President or Secretary/Treasurer at various times. (Michael was the Secretary/Treasurer for the first two years and was succeeded by Laurel, from the documents I have viewed. Laurel was President at the time of the highly successful 12th National MARC Meet in Perth 1992.)

National and International Meets attended: 1978 Canberra, to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Model A Ford; 1982 Echuca, VIC; 1984 Kiama, NSW; 1986 Adelaide, SA; 1990 Cleveland, QLD; and 1992 Perth, WA.

Memorable club events or runs or Highlights: The first long weekend away trip for the Model A Restorers Club of WA was to Hyden when they expected three vehicles but about 13 turned up. The long trip to Kiama in New South Wales when their son Jordan was 4 months old. It was his first rally. Driving across the Nullarbor with other club members in their Model As to the rally in Adelaide. The 1990 trip to Brisbane with Bevan and Helen Sharp, when they trailered their vehicles and got caught for a few days in the Ningham floods. Lots of away and home runs with the club, all of them with great memories.

Funniest memories: The underdone dinners on the first manifold run. The "Something you no longer want" gifts at the first Christmas party when strange items appeared with no one admitting who brought what. Laurel still has her red backed spider in the vegemite jar - does anyone want to own up after all these years?

Family and personal history: Laurel's lot is a real mixture. Poll tax returns of 1379 show Stirk descendants to be found in the Yorkshire area. They are also listed in the "Flodden Field Roll" relating to the 1513 battle of that name fought between the English and Scots in Northumberland. Her great-grandparents came from Northumberland, after a three month journey on the Barque Daylight, arriving in Fremantle on August 27, 1876. Early in 1881 the family acquired a bush block at Kalamunda (called at that time Stirk's Landing) in the larger district of Gooseberry Hill. Their block involved all of what is now Stirk Park and a large portion towards the current town centre and down the hill towards Perth. Laurel's other great-grandparents arrived in Queensland from Scotland and Germany, moving to WA during the gold rush at Kalgoorlie. Laurel is a third generation Australian.

Michael is much less complicated, with his father's side originating from Ireland, and his grandmother from London. His mother is a descendant of Scandinavians who sailed to the Orkney Islands (off Scotland), then moved onto the mainland. His father worked for Claude Neon. Michael is a second generation Australian.

Michael and Laurel married in 1966 and travelled around Australia until 1968, doing a variety of jobs which included spray painting Holdens on the Dandenong assembly line. They returned to Perth and

built a new house in Hammersley in early 1969 but decided domestic life was not for them as yet. They went overseas to South Africa, Mozambique, and Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) for one year. The next two or three years were spent in England where they worked for the Australian Government and Chrysler Corp with trips to European cities and Morocco, North Africa. Three years in Calgary, Alberta, Canada followed, where Laurel work for an oil company and Mike as a painting contractor. During trips around Canada and into the United States they collected many Model A parts before returning to Perth via the UK, Europe, Istanbul and Africa in late 1976. They lived briefly in their Hammersley house while they built a new home in Kingsley – and restored the Phaeton for the 1978 trip to Canberra. From 1978 to 1984 they made various trips back to Canada and the USA, and took a three month trip around the world with Jordan. During this time, Mike also restored the Tudor sedan. He later purchased a 1966 Ford Mustang and restored it to mint condition. The Mustang was sold just prior to their move to Busselton in 1996.

Michael, Laurel and Jordan are now happily residing in beautiful Busselton. Michael is still busy with his painting work. They are working steadily on renovating their current house. Jordan is almost 6 ft tall. He turned 15 last December and is in year 11 at Busselton Senior High School. He is a good average student when he puts his mind to it, but according to Laurel, is too sociable. She wonders if he could take after her? Laurel still keeps the home front in order with TLC, but has also completed a computer course at TAFE, which apparently sent the teacher grabbing for the Valium. When Jordan has finished school and time is not a factor, Laurel and Mike will travel again.

What music do you listen to? Most types of music except for heavy metal, opera and the real yokel type country stuff.

The most memorable concert(s) you have attended to date: Dr Hook in the early 80s was a real "feel good" show. They say the Neil Diamond concert in early 1999 was beautiful and they had a great time at Burswood.

Other interests: Michael enjoys travelling and reading. He is relaxing for now with NO projects that are pressing. Laurel is into gardening, photography, crosswords, travel and a million other things. Jordan likes video games, USA sports, ice hockey and football.

About your cars: Michael and Laurel do not have any Model A vehicles at present. They owned two during the early years of club membership.

#1: Model: 1928 Phaeton

The Phaeton was purchased by Laurel's uncle from one of his farm hands when it was about 6 years old. It was purchased by Laurel and Mike in 1975 and completed for the Rally in Canberra to celebrate 50 years of Model A-s in 1978. It was sold to a chap in Singapore who had a large collection of vehicles, and he shipped it to Malaysia. The story of its acquisition and restoration is told in Model A from the West, from Model A News Vol. 9 No. 6 Oct – Nov 1978, published by MARC Australia, which will be

included in a later newsletter

#2: Model: 1928 Tudor Colour: Blue, then painted the original green/black.

Colour: Green.

The Tudor was purchased March 1982 from a New Zealand couple who had bought the car in Auckland, NZ and shipped it to Australia, and completed in 1984. The car was complete but needed redoing so Mike stripped it down and did a full restoration. He got parts from the USA but the upholstery and engine work were done locally. Laurel was happy to have glass windows, but Mike preferred the Phaeton. The Tudor was sold to Barry and Joy Fowler of Coorow after the Cookes moved to Busselton.

Other restorations: 1966 Ford Mustang

Membership of other clubs: Veteran Car Club of WA (Vintage Section) 1976 - 1986.

Current projects: No car restorations at present as they sold both Model A-s. At present Michael and Laurel keep busy with the restoration of their house, saying there is no time or money for anything else! Suggestions for newer members: Attend meetings, whether in your Model A or a modern vehicle. Enjoy the company. Ask questions. Get involved in the running of the club as it is very rewarding.

THE FIRST



... in Britain was a 2hp Benz Velo purchased by coffee dealer Henry Hewetson of Catford in Mannheim for £80, and taken to England in November, 1894. For six weeks he drove the car around Catford without interference, but then was warned by an Inspector of Police that he would be prosecuted unless he complied with the provisions of the Locomotives on Highways Act 1865, including the requirement that the car should be preceded by a man on foot bearing a red flag. Hewetson secured the services of two youths, one of whom he employed to ride ahead of the car at some distance on a bicycle and give warning if he

sighted a policeman. The other rode in the car, but dismounted on receiving a signal from the first boy, and proceeded to stroll leisurely in front of the vehicle holding aloft a derisory 2 sq.in. of red linen on a pencil until the law was safely out of sight.

Petrol-driven cars were built in England during 1895 by J.H. Knight, Herbert Austin, Frederick Lanchester and J.D. Roots. At the end of motoring's first year there were 15 petrol vehicles on the roads of Britain, a few steam and electric cars may have brought the total to 20. It is estimated that there were 700-800 cars in Britain by 1900, compared to 5,000 in France. Ten years later there were 9,000 private cars in the London area and 8,000 taxis, there were 88,265 private cars in the country. By 1930 there were over a million, and 10 million by 1967.
