

At the initial line up of vehicles, seventeen Model As made an impressive display. Some four modern cars bringing along members with Model As in mid-life crisis.



RALLYING NEW ZEALAND STYLE

We arrived in Christchurch on Monday 24th January, picked up a hire car and drove to Invercargill. On the way, we travelled through the beautiful countryside, taking in as much of the sights as possible, Lake Tekapo, Mt. Cook, the Tasman Glacier and Queenstown on another magnificent lake. We reached Invercargill on the Wednesday afternoon. We booked into a motel and called in to see the owner of the 1928 Chevrolet Sedan, which we were to borrow for the next four weeks.

Reg spent Thursday and Friday getting it roadworthy.

On the Thursday evening, the Southlands Car Club invited us to their meeting and we enjoyed a great evening, meeting the members and having a ride in a veteran Darraq bus, that had been lovingly restored. It originally carried passengers and mail in the surrounding districts, after being exported from France.

Members were very kind and welcoming. We went to one house and saw some restorations and borrowed a grease gun. Another member loaned us a gasket set, in case we should need one and was very helpful.

A group from the South Island were linking up and travelling to Hamilton in the North Island to attend the Royal Sun Alliance Rally 2000. Some were leaving from Bluff on the Sunday and travelling 550 kilometres to meet at Timaru. We felt this was too much for us and the car in one day, so opted to leave a day earlier.

We spent several hours at a crankup day, which was in a paddock. Tractors, stationary engines, steam traction engines and vintage vehicles were displayed and cranked up for the general public.

We then travelled up the east coast enjoying more scenery. Passing through Dunedin, we eventually stayed in a cottage in Moeraki Boulders. These appear to only be in one location on the beach. They are perfectly round and it's quite puzzling as to how they were formed. Oamaru has an historical section, which has various old shops, antiques and a car museum. We arrived in Timaru Sunday night and met some of the Stirling Tour group. One couple had shipped their Frazer Nash from England.

On Monday we travelled to Christchurch via the ski fields, so saw some more snow. We then spent a couple of days there. One day was spent looking at a marvellous museum which has sections with a good selection of like items. eg. lights, wheelchairs, bottles, toys, tools, etc. Also the owner gave a very amusing talk on how he got started. Then we went to a tractor museum, which was mostly Allis Chalmers right up to a huge one that was used to make airstrips during the war

Some English members brought out six Austins in a container and joined the group in Christchurch.

To make sure we caught the ferry in plenty of time we drove most of the way to Picton on the previous day. Staying about 30 kilometres away, meant we had a leisurely drive and could pause and see things that took our interest. The ferry was a catamaran and only took about one and three quarter hours to cross. We sailed majestically up the sound, into the ocean and across to Wellington.

At Wellington we reformed and all set out together over the mountain at Haywards. The power cables run under the sea, from here to the South Island. Electricity, generated by the mighty rivers of both Islands, runs through these cables, either way, depending on supply and demand. We climbed and meandered through a mountain range until we reached the sea on the other side.

A stop at the Southward Motor Museum was a must, with a great range of vehicles. Pride of place, on a rotating dais in the foyer, was the Twenty Millionth Ford A.

That night we stayed at a village where the Mt. Ruapeho ski run starts. Next day everyone stopped at Horopito, which must have the largest collection of old vehicles and parts in the Southern Hemisphere. After some hours, we wrenched ourselves away and continued past the Glow worm caves and Kiwi house (tantalising) to arrive in Mystery Creek about 15 kilometres from Hamilton. This was the Rally 2000 Headquarters for the next 14 days.

The entrance was at the top of a hill, with a steep drive, overlooking the venue. Pines lined one side and flags the other. In the basin below tents and caravans were set out in a semi-circle. Behind these were the Food Pavilion, Headquarters, workshops, parking and the Exhibition Hall, which seated all the entrants and supporters. Here the spectacular opening ceremony was held. To the rousing music, banners of red and orange slowly unfurled from a central spot to resemble the rising sun. The dignitaries arrived in various vehicles, the last of which carried "The Queen". The oldest member of the V.C.C. in New Zealand at 99 years and the youngest member at 16 years were also brought on stage and honoured.

Two mobs had a raging gun battle, one lot hidden behind an "A" Model on grandstand steps, along with a truck and motorbike. Each night there were different entertainments, eg. an Irish night, Bavarian night, Rock & Roll, with many members dressing for the era.

The runs were hub rallies to six different destinations. These were split up into short, medium and long runs and again to and from the destinations and Mystery Creek. This meant the roads and towns were not too overcrowded, as vehicles were heading in all directions. One day was a picnic day, in one location, for everyone to get together. There were some stalls, a mini swap meet and a double-decker bus running between the grounds and the town.

Another day was for the different makes to get together, visit various schools and have a picnic or lunch according to the whims of the organisers. On our run we visited a hydro-electric power station on the Waikato River. The immense power of the water was awe inspiring. Most days a paddle steamer was available for day and evening cruises with lunch or dinner supplied. Another option was a coach trip along the Coramandel Peninsular to the Driving Creek railway, where we took a very narrow gauge train on a see-saw trip up a steep mountain. There was an International visitors day. This was held at a lovely venue, where a church was decorated with beautifully arranged dried flowers, Marriages are held here, with a place next door for the reception and a lovely garden for photos. Dried flowers and arrangements could also be purchased.

Originally there were over 1200 entrants, 70 with Model A Fords. Entrants and supporters came from England, Ireland, America, Holland and Australia with six couples from Western Australia. On the last evening of the rally, there were speeches, prize-giving, with some prizes donated from MAFC of America and superb entertainment. The banners were rolled back into the centre, with lights dimming, giving the appearance of sunset.

Dinner followed, a very well organised buffet, with lines down two sides of eleven tables, so people were served relatively quickly.

After the rally was over, we made our way back to Christchurch via Rotorua with its salmon ponds and geysers, Lake Taupo with the Huka Falls and snow capped mountains. Back on the ferry with a few of the other rally members.

In the South Island we were very fortunate to see a seal colony, flower festival, over the V.C.C. clubrooms, the Antarctic Exhibition, the French Colony of Akaroa and a ride on a tram around the city of Christchurch.

We arrived back in Perth after a very exciting and satisfying glimpse of spectacular New Zealand and warm memories of the very friendly people.

We scared away the rest of the patrons and took over the place (as per usual). An enjoyable meal, a quick ferry service by Craig to pick up the cars, and we were back at the motel. Customs, Model A Parts & the G.S.T.

A friend within the Customs has forwarded sixteen pages relating to the importation of parts and panels for cars more than 30 years old. During the last five years various exemptions have been gazetted which for all practical purposes means no duty will apply to car parts for the Model A. However the sales tax of 26.4% continues until June 30, 2000.

As of July 1, 2000 the sales tax disappears and is replaced by the goods and services tax (GST) of 10%. The previous rule of not collecting TAX if it came to less than \$50.01 will also apply with the GST.

This is the only good new about GST. Now us restorers will be able to bring in more in the one consignment than was previously so. The GST free limit will be US\$500 but do not overlook the fact that the US\$500 limit includes packaging and handling, insurance and postage or freight.

With the present exchange rate at 57cents to the US 100 cents that equates to AUS \$285 all up. The formula is simply our dollar value multiplied by five. eg. $57 \times 5 = 285 Also the uplift is to be abolished. ie. The 20% profit mark-up paid on top of cost + duty. Customs advises that it will be important for the supplier to note on his invoice and particularly on his customs declaration that the consignment is for Model A parts more than 70 years old. Customs as you will be aware handle a huge amount of incoming and unless the above is made clear it is liable to be taxed. Trying to get a refund from customs is akin to removing Saddam.

Trust this is of some help to our members.
