



## CALLING OF SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING FOR THE ELECTION OF RALLY DIRECTOR FOR NATIONAL MEET, PERTH, 2004 26<sup>TH</sup> NOVEMBER, 2000

An election was held at the October general meeting of the Club for the position of Rally Director for the National Meet in 2004 to be held in Perth. Ray Mahony was declared the successful candidate by one vote at the meeting.

However, after the meeting, upon scrutinising the results and attendance book at the meeting, one vote lodged was unaccounted for, ie. someone entered an extra vote. Because of this anomaly the Secretary and President declared the election null and void and advised the candidates of their decision.

There has been considerable discussion regarding the election, with reference to the constitution of the club on voting rights. Several members voted at this election by mail, being unable to attend on the day. This was seen by some as being unconstitutional, but there is nothing in the constitution to allow or disallow voting by this means at a general meeting. This means of voting is allowed at the AGM and Special General Meetings (Section 11c). The constitution also allows for each adult member of the club to be entitled to vote (Section 11a); allowing an independent vote for both spouses/partners in a family membership. There is no allowance for proxy voting in any situation within our constitution.

In the interest of fair play and after consultation with all the Club Committee members, it has been decided to call a Special General Meeting to be held on 26<sup>th</sup> November, 2000. This will be held prior to the General Meeting on the same day, for the purpose of the election of a Rally Director, National Meet, Perth, 2004.

Not having received any further nominations for this position, the nominees remain David Bussard and Ray Mahony.

Postal votes will be accepted by the Secretary or President up to 24 hours prior to the meeting, ie. 12 noon Saturday, 25<sup>th</sup> November, 2000.

Voting at the meeting will be by secret ballot.

#### ALL FORD DAY

All Ford Day was held on October 29, one of a series of similar events in all capital cities to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Ford production in Australia. Our participation began on Saturday when W Cowlin and D Bussard arrived on site to erect the tent kindly lent by P Gilberthorpe. The loan of the tent was accompanied by the cryptic instruction that "the legs must cross," and the assurance that everything we needed was contained in two bags. Everything but the tent pegs we later concluded, before setting off to the nearest salvage yard to try and buy something to use as tent pegs. Some long pegboard rods seemed the best option; the club now owned \$8 worth of the chrome plated variety. The tent was soon erected, with the only pause in proceedings being a return to the salvage yard for another \$3 worth of tent pegs.

The expected group of R and C Blewett, D and P Bussard, W Cowlin, C Davidson, J and B Forbes, J and S Hall, J and P Laurie, G McIntosh and D Sutherland was to assemble at the good ship Rockingham on the outskirts of town on Sunday to drive to the site as a group at 8:30 am. John and Pat Laurie had advised they were driving down and would arrive later, but at the appointed time there was no sign of John and Shirley Hall. We decided to go anyway, trusting in Shirley's reputation as a navigator to deliver them safely to the site. There was a significant line to enter the site by the only access road, so with Bill Cowlin in the lead we started another line and were waved through to our site without stopping, I suppose age does have some rights.

Total entries approached 500, with all local Ford clubs well represented, plus a large number of private entries. The event was well organised with plenty of space for each club and good access for the viewers. No attendance numbers were available, but based on a personal comparison with the recent Autojumble at Cannington I would estimate in excess of 3000 visitors, which is a large increase over the recent All Ford days. Largest representation was the Mustang Club, with at least 50 cars.

Several new Fords were on display. The most impressive was an F350 pickup featuring a 7.8 litre turbo diesel, seating for six and an enclosed bed large enough to hold a barn dance. Also present was a new Mustang convertible that had chick magnet written all over it. The usual vendors were present, as well as the Rockingham High School team of engine assemblers who put on a display every hour. About half the students doing the assembly were females.

Concourse judging took place during the day, at about 2:30 pm we heard a rumour that John and Shirley Hall had been sighted somewhere south of Mandurah but no one believed such a thing could be true. At the final presentations, John and Barbara Forbes won the judging for the best 1930-1939 vehicle with their 1929 Roadster and Colin Davidson won the 1900-1929 class with his 1931 Town Sedan. Luckily, the trophies had not been engraved so they were able to swap later.

The event broke up about 4:15pm and 500 vehicles headed for the single exit. All the members enjoyed the day, and I would like to thank all of those who attended on Sunday; and especially thanks to Bill Cowlin for his help with the tent on Saturday. We had good contact with the public, talked among ourselves, and saw a lot of interesting Fords. John and Shirley were eventually located safe at home.

THE FIRST



... was the French-built two-seater 2-1/2hp Renault, manufactured at Billancourt in 1898. Remarkably robust for such a small car, one model drove from Paris to Rambouillet in 2hr 49min in 1899, covering the 65 miles at an average speed of nearly 24mph. The enclosed Renault (there was also an open version) was intended principally for the use of doctors on their rounds and, with its very short wheel base, has been described as having 'a silhouette like a top hat on a roller skate'.

**Enclosed Body** The first on record in Britain was Dr W.W. Barrett of Hesketh Park, Southport who acquired a six-seat Daimler in December, 1898, and had a special enclosed body built for it. There were three windows on either side and three doors, one at the rear of the vehicle.

FOR THE TECHNOLOGICALLY CHALLENGED: This month's emphasis is on scanning pictures. If you scan photographs for your own usage, the process of saving them to disk is your own choice. However, if you scan anything, be it photographs or documents, to send via e-mail to someone else, bear this in mind: save the file as a JPEG file. This option is found on the Save page (press Ctrl + S to see this screen). On the bottom, left-hand side is a sentence 'Save as type' with a box to its right. This box will usually say BMP. Change it to JPEG, then click okay. Hence when you attach this to an e-mail, it won't take hours to send, and the person receiving it won't have to make a cup of tea whilst waiting for it to download to their computer. Also BMP files incite the recipient to consider using the image to wallpaper their house because the picture is so big. Finally, articles scanned the correct way up (sky at the top, grass at the bottom) is an added bonus. Here endeth today's lesson ....

## Mestern Model A News

The following article appeared in the Sep/Oct 2000 issue of the Motor Traders Association of WA magazine. Anyone who knows Stuart would agree with the bouquet given to D & S Engine Reconditioners.

## Bouquet for D&5

During November 1999 I reconditioned the diesel motor of my Toyota Landcruiser after it had seized due to a lack of water.

I removed and stripped the motor and sent the cylinder block, crankshaft and head to D&S Engine Reconditioners in Maddington for re-sleeving and overhaul.

I subsequently rebuilt the motor and it ran faultlessly for eight months until July 2000 when it suffered a catastrophic failure, seizing with a great deal of mechanical noise.

Removal of the sump revealed a large quantity of metal fragments. Needless to say that after spending several thousands of dollars on the original overhaul I was quite upset.

I contacted Mr Stuart Scammell at D&S Engine Reconditioners and he asked to see the vehicle which was soon arranged. D&S removed the motor, then stripped and assessed the considerable damage to the internals.

They subsequently repaired rebuilt and reinstalled the motor at absolutely no cost to myself. Despite

motor originally and they

tion my mechani-

cal competence they chose not to.
At all times they were up front, helpful, nonconfrontational and a

pleasure to deal with.
