

Expressions of appreciation were made to the Easterbrooks for their commitment from the outgoing office bearers.



### PERTH to

## TOOWOOMBA

to PERTH

As experienced by Ray and Toni Mahony in their 1929 Model A Ford

16<sup>th</sup> March to 17<sup>th</sup> April 2002

Sunday, 14<sup>th</sup> April. The day started with a visit to the service station adjacent to the caravan park for fuel at 95.9 c/litre, then we headed west. With blue skies over head and a stiff south-south-east breeze blowing it was pleasant driving. As we travelled through Penong to Nundroo it became overcast, but stayed dry. We fuel up again at Nullarbor. Would you believe that in just four weeks fuel here had increased from 119 cent to 124.1 c/litre.

8.3km west of Nullarbor there is a two wheel track that heads north. If you take this track you will find, just off the road, a blow hole, then if you follow the track out half a mile you come to two caves. The first, on the right has quite a small opening, which goes straight down into a fairly large cavern. The floor of the cavern appears to be about 20-30 feet down. The second cave is on the left and has quite a large opening and provides easy access the cavern. It is not a spectacular cave but is interesting and worth the short drive.

Between Nullarbor and the border we stopped at a number of spots to view the cliffs. If you want to se the cliffs to best advantage then I suggest you forget the designated lookouts and take some of the small tracks to the coast. The best spot we found was 120.5km east of the border. The track is slightly rough but nothing to worry even the most cautious, especially when you see the view. The cliffs from here are nothing short of magnificent. We arrived at Eucla at 5.30 Central Western Time, refueled and booked into a park cabin. Cabins are very basic and cost \$38. Fuel here had increased by 4 cents to 116 c/litre. We had dinner in the garden restaurant. There are probably not too many people that realise there is a lovely garden and guest's swimming pool behind the restaurant.

While talking to some caravaners I was told for the second time that I was getting along at nearly 80 km/hr. As far as I was concerned I have been doing 40mph, which calculates to 64 km/hr. I made some calculations using roadside distance markers and time taken and discovered that I have been cruising along at a steady 75 km/hr. When I get to 45 mph, which I can easily do, I am doing over 80km/hr and doing it very nicely thank you. Elizabeth had a slight bout of indigestion today, but nothing serious.

(313 miles)

Monday. 15<sup>th</sup> April. When we got up there was a heavy fog and everything was quite wet. We packed the car and were about to leave when a fellow came over to see the car and have a chat. To his and Toni's surprise, he worked in Transport with Toni. In fact Toni looked after him and got him to hospital last year when he had a heart attack at work. We got away at 7.45am and headed down the Eucla Pass. The days drive was generally uneventful, there was practically no wild life. We saw only about half a dozen eagles, three emus and a couple of bob-tailed lizards.

We purchased fuel at Madura, 127.8 c/litre, and Ciaguna 123 c/litre. About ten km west of Ciaguna we pulled off the road to see the blow holes then drove further from the road to see if we could find some kangaroos. We were lucky and found five, four small ones together and a big boomer by himself. The rest of the day was so-so and fairly warm. We pulled in to Balladonia at 5.00 pm Western Standard Time. The room here was \$86.

(329 miles)

Tuesday. 16<sup>th</sup> April. The sky was fully overcast when we got up, although dry and decidedly cool. We fueled up at 122.9 c/litre and got away at 7.45am. I thought the drive from Balladonia to Southern Cross would be just that, a drive from Balladonia to Southern Cross. However driving about 50km it started to rain. The rain, which was steady and widespread, continued practically non-stop until we were about 100km from Southern Cross. We stopped in Norseman where we topped up with petrol, 112.3 c/litre and went for a drive through the town centre and out to the cemetery where we located some of my rellie's graves, which Toni photographed for her family tree records.

About 10km before getting to Norseman Elizabeth had a bad bout of indigestion, so bad in fact that I couldn't even drive down hill without her rattling and back firing. I thought I had better try to do something to ease her pain. We stopped and I checked the points, which we ok. I then checked numbers 3 and 4 spark plugs. No 4 plug was totally clogged with carbon. The plugs were cleaned and a little loose carbon was knocked free inside the cylinder. Elizabeth continued to back fire while under load until about 10km past Norseman.

The rest of the drive to Southern Cross was pretty straight forward; we bought petrol in Coolgardie for 102.9 c/litre and arrived in Southern Cross at 5.35. After checking into the caravan park we went down to the Club Hotel and had a nice meal for \$6.00. Rain continued into the night and there has been some lightning.

(353 miles)

Wednesday. 17<sup>th</sup> April. On this the last day of our journey we awoke to clear blue skies. We packed and got on the road by 8.15. As the morning progressed the sky became overcast and it started to rain about 60km out towards Merredin. The rain which continued almost to Northam was quite heavy and the day was cold. We decided to stop in Merredin and put the front side curtains up.

Along the way we purchased fuel at Bodallin (94.9 c/litre), Northam(92.9 c/litre) and we topped up when we got home (89.9 c/litre).

In Northam we bought a couple of pies for lunch and ate them by the river while watching ducks and swans.

We arrived home at 3.25.

(233 miles)

We used 1532.71 litres of fuel, traveled a total of 6570 miles, which calculates to 10573 kilometers. Fuel consumption calculates to be 14.5 litres/100, or in the old language, 19.44 miles per gallon. Not good, however considering the fact that I was towing a trailer and having problems with missing and back firing a fair bit I suppose it is understandable. I also used 29 litres of oil, and no oil change in that. I burnt some and leaked a lot.

Would I do it again? Probably yes, although I don't think I would take a trailer again. If you have the space you take things you probably don't have to. I would think twice about going through the Great Dividing Range again, although most of the problems I had were only an indirect result of the hills.

Just the reaction, of other road users and people you meet along the way, to a vintage car travelling all that distance makes the trip worth while.

Overall we both enjoyed the trip and would recommend it to anyone. Most people see the drive across the country as a long boring drive through dry desolate nothingness. If you take your time and look at what you are driving through, take in the wild life and drive a little way up some of the tracks you will be surprised at what there is to see.


