


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

EASTER AT KIRUP

Another great weekend was had by the Mahoneys, Wards, Mooreheads, Guests. Newtons, Wringes and girls, Hulijs, Ron Andrews in his "A" Rod, Andrea and children plus the two Jeffree families. Morning tea stop was a stop over at Dawesville, where we all enjoyed Barry's Hot Cross Buns and real butter. We continued along the scenic drive which brought us back onto the highway. The drive thru to Harvey, and then onto the new Harvey Dam was our lunch stop -from there we all made our way to the farm, where Leanne and the girls had the Ern boiling for a cuppa.

Tents were errected, pump up matresses were all set up in the shed (Ray seemed to have trouble keeping his from folding up around him in the mornings), and the cars were tucked up in the sheds for the night.

Saturday, Alan and Gale Dunn met up with us from Manjimup, we had morning tea at Gnomesville where we had Trevor and Leslie Howden meet us in their original "A" that was a Taxi in Bunbury in it's day.

From there

we visited a winery in the Ferguson Valley- all agreeded the wine could mature a little. Lunch stop was in a new subdivision in Bunbury where we met up with the Cook's who joined us next day at the farm.

Sunday morning was a visit to the Cider Factory but found the Factory part was not taking tours being Sunday so next best thing was coffee and scones. Lunch was back at the shed ready for the afternoon trying our skills out at the Gym Kana. Bob was trying to capture some funny home video, not sure which was the funniest, as Bob found out Cow Poo doesn't cushion a fall from a running board of a "A" Model. Each night, the shed come alive with food, drinks ,jokes, laughter ,and a good day had by all.

Monday was pack up time, stopping half way home for a snack and a stretch of legs, we all parted to make our way home.

The correct point GAP according to original Model A specification is .020 inches. This does not provide a clue about the corresponding correct DWELL. Although modern automotive methods suggest using dwell as the method for setting points, the Model A specification did not. Some Model A owners, believing modern methods are an improvement, are setting points by dwell. Believing that performance is improved using modern techniques is misleading and can be detrimental. A critical look at this issue suggest troubles for those attempting to use modern dwell setting techniques without an understanding of the interrelationships of all the factors.

Setting Model A points by dwell meter suggests using a value derived from some other source. But what source: There is no published dwell angle for Model A from Ford. However, there are rules of thumb. But, there is no support for these values as compared to the values obtained from analysis and test on Model A distributors. For background, I looked at some early four cylinder cars to see what values were used. The four cylinder 1935 Willys recommends 47 degrees dwell, so does the four cylinder 1951 Henry J (reference #4). These substantially agree with a common rule of thumb, that says dwell should be half the cam angle. Therefore, an easy conclusion would be to use 45 degrees for dwell for the Model A. A generic source says 41 degrees dwell is a good value for a typical four cylinder engine. Again a tempting value for a typical Model A. A specific dissertation on Model A timing (reference #1) is the highest of all at 50 degrees dwell. All of these seem to be in consistent agreement. Should these values be applied to the Model A? Setting to 50 degrees dwell results in a gap of only .010 inches. Should any of them be used? No., they are all wrong and will subject the points to early failure.

DWELL is a value designed into the distributor. It is not a value to selected arbitrarily to fit modern techniques. The relationship between DWELL and GAP will be wrong. All of those suggested dwell values are larger than that designed for the Model A and result in smaller point gap with reduced point contact life. The questions are, what should you use and what is the DWELL value designed into a Model A distributor? 1928-31 distributors used a cam part number A-12210 (reference #2). The drawing for this part is on a scanned image file from MAFFI Computer System (reference #3). From analysis of this cam drawing it can be concluded that the designed dwell value for the car is 32.3 to 34.5 degrees.

Something a little more modern in four cylinder engines confirms how appropriate the Model A dwell was. Chevy Nova 1964-67: point gap .019, dwell 33 degrees. Chevy Vega 1971: point gap .019, dwell 32 degrees (reference #5).

Unless one has the proper dwell value for setting points the modern way, early failure is forecast. Doing it the old fashioned way is so simple as to wonder why it should be done any other way. Stick to the 1928-31 method; understand the past and your car will run just fine!


