



MODEL A SPRING RUN – 6 OCTOBER TO 11 OCTOBER 2003

Nine families assembled at the Gullshop, Karagullen on Brookton Highway on Monday 6th October to leave at 9.30am.

The group motored to Brookton and called in to Ken and Coral Hall's farm just south of town. John & Pat with Reg the tail-end Charlie, were delayed for some time, caused by a flat tyre and having to change a wheel. Our members had lunch on the homestead verandah. While at Ken's, Max cleaned out his carby, John Laurie repaired a tube as well as patching his troublesome leakless water pump.

Ken showed members his collection of cars, tractors and old stationary motors. His car stable of restored cars – Essex Roadster, Chev 4 Tourer, early T Model Tourer, 1927 Buick Tourer and 1931 Model A five-window coupe, all very impressive. Ken and Coral joined us and we all headed south.

Afternoon tea was in front of the old Cuballing Hotel, just south of Pingelly. Heading for Narrogin we made a detour to Geoff Hunter's handle turning factory. Here we had a guided tour and saw top quality mallet handles being manufactured. Local mallet trees are felled, sawn and turned. They make all sorts of wooden handles – axe, shovel, rake, pick, hammer, hoe, etc, etc. Fifty percent is sold in WA, the rest sent east. Four or five locals are employed full time. The factory is on Geoff's farm and was started by his parents in 1967.

Once in Narrogin we rested up in the motel (Hans had to change a wheel). Kerry and Lyn McPharlin, members from Narrogin and Maurie Turner from Corrigin (108km away) joined us for the in-motel evening meal. Before eating, the group was entertained by the Narrogin Scottish performers. We had their organiser sing to us and then accompanied by bagpipes we had several Scottish dances performed.

Most of Tuesday was spent looking around Narrogin, accompanied by Lyn and Kerry. The ladies started by visiting a classy stained glass and leadlight business, the guys to an aboriginal furniture making business. Five local aboriginals are trained by an enthusiastic tradesman of English descent. They fell, saw, dry and kiln the jarrah and sheoak to make the top class finished pieces.

After the above excursions we all drove out to the Narrogin Agriculture High School. Here we were shown the many facets of their farm and the courses that these lucky young students are given. A fabulous, cheap lunch and we all headed for Collie.

Twice along the way John Hall's car developed a severe miss accompanied by quite a tapping noise. Both times after stopping and many heads under the bonnet the miss and noise disappeared, never to return.

We stayed at the Collie Motel for two nights, which gave us all of Wednesday to look around Collie. John hired a coaster bus for the day and drove us around and around. We visited two mines before we eventually found the Griffin Open Cut Mine, where we had a video then tour of the open cut.

Then it was out to the Worsley Bauxite processing plant and a guided tour. The raw material is brought in from Boddington on an endless belt, which travels 52kms. From here we returned to Collie for lunch. During the afternoon John drove us out to a small but mostly automated jarrah timber mill, which still operates, carrying on a Saunders 50 year tradition.

Thursday morning saw us heading for Donnybrook. Our first stop being the picturesque Harris River Dam. After morning tea it was off to Wellington Weir. Unfortunately Coral Blewett had a fall in the car park, which lead to several stitches once we arrived in Donnybrook. From the weir we drove through a pristine forest, on dirt road, to Gnomesville. From Gnomesville to Donnybrook saw the end of a beautiful south west day's drive.

While in Donnybrook we did the tour drive thing and visited Leanne & Chris Wringe, the Balingup Cheese factory and the local shops.

A special feature of our stay here was the celebration of Jim's birthday where we had party hats and party poppers. Jim was presented with a prepared card, which turned out to be a (pretend) free voucher for a well known Perth Madam. There is talk that Lilly's sister, Kath knocked on Jim's motel door later in the evening.




Max & Dora Annear were seconded to the judging panel, and once again showed their support for the club.


The monthly meeting was held at one o'clock under the shade of the tents, never seen so many people attend the meetings, though some people left their cars for the day in the safety of the organisers.

Junking Old Cars to Stabilise the Motor Market

The scrapping of old cars by hundreds of thousands a year to stabilise the motor industry is a program that many observers are watching with keen and optimistic interest.

No fewer than 750,000 automobiles will be junked annually under this scheme, thus substantially reducing the number of defective and dangerous cars on our highways, with the probable result that automobile insurance rates will be slashed.

One important phase of this demolition program provides for improving the position of the automobile dealer by strengthening the entire distribution organisation.

"A distinct benefit to the automobile insurance world" – that is what the scheme should mean, in the view of *The Spectator* an insurance publication which discusses the matter thus:

'Plans which are believed to bid fair to stabilise the automobile industry within a few years and which casualty executives predict will considerably decrease automobile insurance loss ratios have been inaugurated by the leading companies in the automobile world'.

Originated by the Chrysler Company, the plans call for the return to the factory for rebuilding or junking of used cars which have been traded in for new models.

In operation, the scheme will mean the junking of approximately 750,000 cars annually, thereby cutting down the number of cars on the road and reducing the loss ratios as far as insurance companies are concerned.

General Motors and the Ford Motor Corporation are using the plan, it is reported. The former allows its dealers a credit from \$4 to \$8 for every new car they purchase while the Ford Company's credits are somewhat lower. When the dealer's credit reaches \$40, the company takes back a used car, paying the dealer the allowance price and junking the car. This means that for every five or ten new cars

This means that for every five or ten new cars sold, one old car will be eliminated from the market.

For the past two years casualty executives have been hoping for just such a plan and the effectual operation of this new scheme, which will eliminate the hazards to be found in the operation of used cars will prove a distinct benefit to the automobile insurance world, it is believed.

Dealers in the main are today standing strictly by the used car allowances in making credits for trade-ins on new machines. Automobile men declare that the industry this year has made great strides toward stabilisation.

Indeed, "more has been done in six months to put retailing on a sound basis than in all the thirty-two years since the first automobiles were sold."

Quoting this recent statement by the industrial editor of *Motor*, *The Index*, published by the New York Trust Company, proceeds with some interesting comments on the production and the used car problems.

To bring production into line with the demand is clearly the first thing to be done. Then, we are told, as we read further in the discussion:

In addition to promptly reducing current output by thirty percent, manufacturers are actively cooperating with their distributors in providing for the future in a continuous and thorough survey of actual consumer requirements.

Attacking the problem of adjusting the supply to the demand from the opposite end, an increasing number of manufacturers are cooperating on a junking program. Next to the curtailment of production, this plan is the most far reaching of all improvements adopted.

The used car, representing in most cases the greatest portion of an individual dealer's frozen assets, was very largely responsible for the problematical situation of the past year. Some automobile manufacturers have recommended that the "used-up" motor cars, which in their opinion not only constitute a menace to users of the highway, but also no longer furnish economical transportation to their owners, at the same time taking too large a share of the industry's replacement market, should be scrapped in wholesale fashion. While it is important that the consummation of this program shall not result in loading the cost thereof upon the new car buyer, the idea of assuming a share of this cost, and thereby stimulating the economical replacement has appealed to certain manufacturers who have already agreed on setting up reserves totalling \$15,000,000 and to be used during 1930 in promoting the removal, by the junking process, of some 400,000 automobiles from the second hand market and the roads.

Some automobile companies require that some cars be actually demolished under supervision of a representative. This thorough method is certainly the most commendable one, and the only one which will prove to be permanently satisfactory.

Origins of English Words

In twelfth century England the country's finances were 'computed' by the use of a large table: ten feet long and five wide, it had a ledge four fingers high running around its edge, giving it the appearance of a gaming table. Covering its surface was a black cloth marked into squares by white lines, looking like a chequers board – it was called the great Exchequer. Clerks would move the chequers around the board, using it like a kind of abacus.

Stacks of silver pennies were used and twenty dozen pennies weighed a pound. The Normans called an English penny an *esterlin*, which translated into Latin as *sterlingus* and the unit became known as the pound sterling.

To keep track of the tally, a hazel stick was cut with notches to mark amounts paid. To provide each party to a transaction with a record, the stick was split lengthwise from just below the handle – the two tallies being known as the foil and counterfoil. The sheriff's counterfoil was always the longer piece, including the handle, which was known as the stock.

In this manner, in the twelfth century, the terms: Exchequer, sterling, counterfoil and stock entered the language of English finance. From "London" by Edward Rutherford
