

AUTO ONE CLASSIC CAR SHOW--- WHITEMAN PARK 21ST.MARCH 04

A display of Model A Fords from our club was organised by Peter Gilberthorpe to support this major car show and assist with the promotion of our National Meet and in particular the visit to Whiteman Park on Sunday 11th.April 04.

Whilst Perth was in the middle of a heat wave and temperatures around 38 C + forecast, some 13 members supported this event. The area for our display was a prominent position adjacent to the information pavilion on a grassed section with plenty of shade. 

18TH NATIONAL MODEL A FORD MEET PERTH WA 2004

A Special Thank You!



The Rally, hosted by the Model A Restorers Club of Western Australia April 8,9

Thursday morning gave us a bit of a break to clean up the cars, shop for groceries and do a load of wash. A trip to the nearby Mall reminded us how much in common we have with the Australians. A great big enclosed mall, it was much like home. My camera has been dropped so many times that the battery door must be held closed with that ever useful product, duct tape. We shopped several stores and determined that I would attempt to nurse it wome before buying a new one. Janice has had a bit of camera problem as well, so even though we have hundreds of photos, there are not many good ones. Too bad, get ready "friends and family" you will have to endure them all!

In the p.m. rally registration was held, the rally headquarters is located at a convention center at the "dog" track about 20 minutes away from the hotel. We found it, registered along with 168 others and chatted with many of the participants. Many having driven the Nullabor as did four of our cars.

There are many unusual Aussie Model A's as many, like the woodies were delivered as chassis and fitted with Holden bodies. Lots of homemade body parts some of them very well done and my personal favourite, an original complete, rough Phaeton. Complete with water injection, it cruised the Nullabor without a hitch.

Welcome, rally instructions, signups and intermingling were featured at the evening "Nibbles and Natter". Each morning and afternoon there are several tours available so it was a bit of a task to choose the ones we wanted to do. Naturally, we signed up for as many as possible. It's going to be a busy few days.

Friday, the morning tour took us on a walking tour of Perth, visiting many historic buildings, gardens and government facilities. The city is very well kept, the historic buildings well protected and pleasant to visit during a quiet time, (Good Friday). Model A tour guides were well prepared and practiced for the tour.
