SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 27, 1988

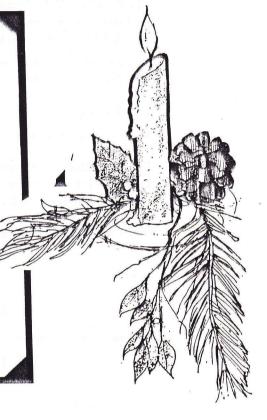
Meet in Garden City Shopping Center, Booragoon car park by 10am for 10.15 departure.

We may head for the Casino after the evening so arrange appropriate baby sitters etc.

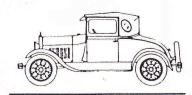

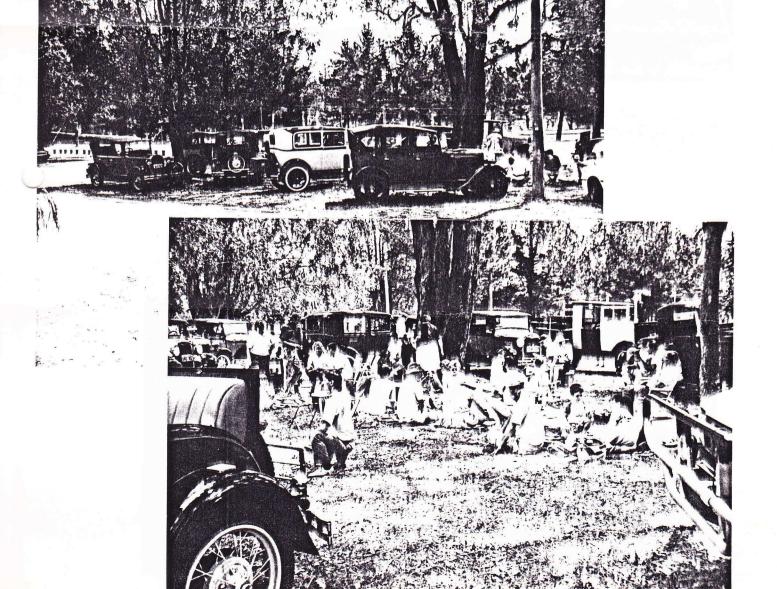
Looking back at the line of FordA's, driving along the South West Highway, gleaming in the sunlight was a great sight.

Final Chapter

Next day and a few miles down the road we were back in our own state again. While at Eucla we decided to have a look at the ruins of the old telegraph station, from the sandhills surrounding it you could see the old jetty, so it was off to have a look at it too. Again as happened many times on the trip other people at these places get talking to you and time soon slips by.

On the road again just about one hour and a car went past in the opposite direction the occupants waving frantically, they turned around and caught us up only to find they were old friends from way back, another half hour talking and then off again. Nearer Madura the road is being rebuilt, very wide and smooth, but for about 10 miles we had to travel on a two wheel track that was a little rough and with no where to pull over to let the large trucks and cars behind to pass. Remember I did not have a ready spare, although I could mend or change a tube if I had to.

A quick refuel and snack at Madura before climbing the old pass to show the family the blow holes in the sides, that especially in the hot summer, emit beautiful cool refrigerated like air. Of course, there was another reason for me going this way, between the top of the old and new pass is an air field, alongside one section of it is the remains of a few Model A's and a straight 8 Studebaker, all very tired but I thought as one was a truck there may be something of use. We found them, had a quick look and took the usual photographs, there was nothing to salvage much to Kath's delight, as by now everytime someone or something was wanted out the back, doors brackets etc had to be shifted. The front passenger could not get out the left side of the cab as I had panel tied along the running board also.

Back on the main road heading for Caiguna we noticed that the sun set at 4.30 pm (W.S.T.) no wonder why Eucla and Border Village have their own time zone. Remember also, that it was the 21st June, the shortest day of the year.

That night we slept in the truck, next day we continued on to Balladonia and arrived in Norseman before dark, did some shopping and took an overnight van so that we could cook our own meal.

Down at the tourist centre we were advised of a free bus tour of the town and some of the mines. On this tour you could go places where the public were not allowed to go. Just north of Norseman they are opening up old mines into huge open cuts, sinking incline shafts for vehicles to drive down etc, one hole we saw was 300 feet down, men and vehicles and large pieces of mining gear looked minute. Again photos were taken. Other mines were pointed out and histories related by a tour guide as we drove around. Now I realise why when in Ballarat and Bendigo etc, even though they are old mining areas, I have yet to see any pit head gear, one of these ones at Norseman was brought over from Bendigo in 1939 and it is quite huge.

We left Norseman after lunch, and headed for Kalgoorlie via Kambalda, what a change to the countryside, many places that were accessible when we were there in '80-81 are fenced off, the ground cover is ripped away, fences put up etc, what a dust bowl in the summer when the Esperance Doctor comes in. Lets hope it is all replaced when they are finished.

Late afternoon saw us in Kalgoorlie, we drove around and had a look at a lot of it. While Kath rang a friend from a public phone a chap pulled up in a Commonwealth car and wanted to have a look and a quick talk. I learnt that he is part way through restoring a 1934 Bedford Truck and as his truck was not the one that I knew of in Boulder I told him of one that was there in 1981 and gave him directions of where to find it.

Another enjoyable comfortable evening in the on-site vans, rather than putting up tents on the partly crowded lawns. Before leaving Kalgoorlie next morning we had a further look around and a walk up and down the main street for a few blocks, a refamiliarisation you might say.

Midday again before we leave Kalgoorlie, you can see that we were in no hurry to get home, the weather had been fine all this time, the countryside was beautiful and green and while we had the chance we made the most of it.

Into Coolgardie, no real changes here, so on to Yellowdine for the night. This stop was recommended by the Creedy's, its where they broke down in their modern car and had to spend a few days on one of their trips to the west. The accommodation is quite good, but the toilets and showers had to be shared by all ocncerned. I believe by now though that should be taken care of.

It was now Saturday morning and we left for a casual drive to Northam, not wanting to arrive late at night back home. At Northam it was quite cold (as usual) and it now started to rain, but we didn't care we had had in most cases fine weather.

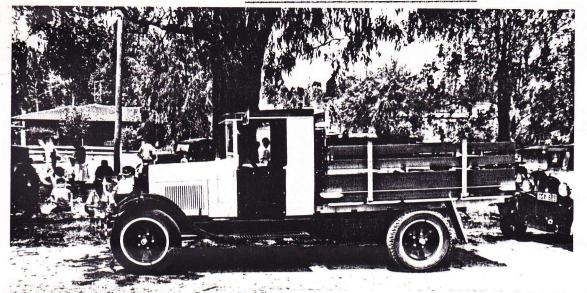
Next morning we called into friends in Mundaring before arriving in Perth just after lunch. After spending a few hours with my parents we arrived home and started to unpack etc.

Well there it was for those who like some figures we travelled 11,255 miles (18,109 km) we used 758.85 gallons fuel (3449.82 litres). Our average consumption for the whole trip being 14.83 mpg. The cost of fuel only was \$1,988.28, hows that, the BiCentennary Year and the year of the truck. We did use a bit of oil 7.26 gallons for a cost of \$116.00 did not burn it it leaked and blew out. Petrol ranged in price from 41.9 cents per litre on the Gold Coast to 80.4 cents per litre at Balladonia and Cocklebiddy. Accommodation is also dearest in W.A.

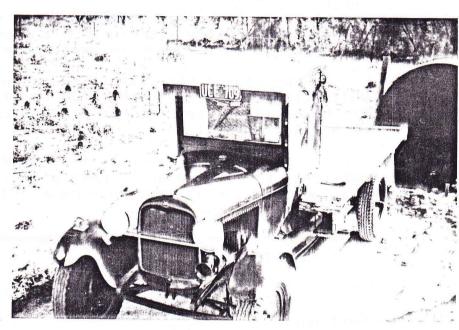
All of the proceeding occurred in almost 17 weeks, and it was worth being part of the two rallies and looking around a little of this great country of ours.

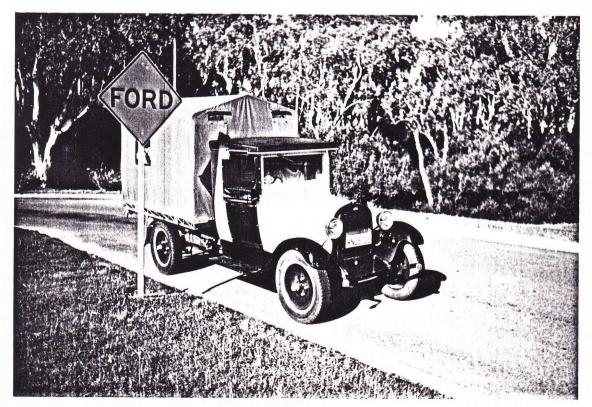

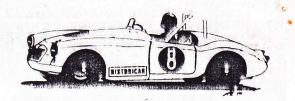
